Opposition to bill removing public notices from newspapers

transparency advocates are aligning against legislation that would remove public notices from local newspapers across the state.

Stickland, a Bedford Republican, is proposing that governments be allowed to post notices about meetings, taxes and policies on their websites instead.

Stickland said that the measure would save governments money and that newspaper notices are no longer

House Bill 335 is current-AUSTIN — Government ly being referred to the House Technology Committee.

"The law that requires public notices to be printed in a newspaper made sense back in the horse and bug-Freshman Rep. Jonathan gy days," Stickland said in a recent written statement announcing the bill. "It's outrageous that taxpayers have to pay twice — once for the ad space and then again for a copy of the newspaper just to get information that can be provided for free."

Critics of the propos-

al say Stickland's bill would make public information harder to find among thousands of websites statewide. Jim Moser, chairman of the Texas Press Association's legislative committee, pointed out that residents in Harris County would have to consult the sites of 496 units of government that levy taxes.

That's overwhelming," Moser said.

For decades, state law has required that state agencies, counties, cities, school districts and other entities



'Noisy' scouts show need to maintain funding for Texas state parks

recently received a letter from a man recalling an overnight experience he had at Guadalupe River State Park. When he and his wife pulled into park headquarters to get a camping space, they were warned that some Girl Scouts were in the park and there might be some noise.

Turned out there were 200 girls and their fathers on a father/daughter camping trip.

"For over 48 hours," the man wrote, "the sound of girls laughing, screaming and giggling echoed throughout the park. The girls' bikes zoomed past our campsite at the rate of 1 per minute. The scout leaders lead the girls in sing-a-longs, nature walks, chants and prayers."

At first I thought the letter was a complaint campers are usually seeking solitude — but then I read the next paragraph: "My heart was filled with joy at the sights and sounds I heard from the girls and their fathers becoming bonded together and becoming one with nature at a Texas state park."

What a testament to our state park system and the pleasure these outdoor facilities bring to Texas families. But the purpose of his letter was to express concern about news reports that Texas may have to close some of its parks.

According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the initial funding proposals by the House and Senate are more than \$4 million short of the amount needed to keep all 91 state parks up and running. That would put at least nine

parks in danger of closing. With all of the pressing needs confronting state budget writers, parks may not be on the same priority list with public and higher education, water and transportation infrastructure, Medicaid, child protection, and public safety. But with Texas Comptroller Susan Combs predicting a 12.4 percent increase in general revenue funds for the 2014-15 biennium, we may not have to make the stark choice of closing parks. Another approach is

tice of raiding the sales tax revenues on sporting goods — money that was originally dedicated to Parks and Wildlife but appropriated for other uses.

According to the Houston Chronicle, the proposed 2014-15 parks budget of \$140.7 million is about \$19 million less than we spent in the 2008-2009 budget cycle, despite soaring costs for maintaining our parks. Even the weather has been a factor, with hurricanes, wildfires, and drought taking their toll.

Senate Finance Chair man Tommy Williams said recently he is "not personally interested in seeing any state parks closed," and those are encouraging words. As the budget process proceeds, it will become more clear just what the Legislature can do to prevent that from happening.

Senate District 19 contains ten state parks, including Garner State Park in Uvalde County, which many consider one of the crown jewels of the state park system. I share Sen. Williams' goal of keeping all of them open.

And I certainly share the sentiments of the letterwriting camper: "Let me urge Governor Perry and the state Legislature to continue to fund the Texas State Park System in order for families to continue to enjoy and appreciate nature.

The state park experience allows treasured family time and valuable learning experiences for all."

We must keep our parks open for the benefit of all Texans, whether they like the sounds of birds or crickets, gurgling creeks, or Girl Scouts singing with their dads.

Texas joins other states in legal challenge

AUSTIN — Attorney General Greg Abbott on Feb. 13 announced Texas had joined 10 other states in a legal challenge to a federal law, the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010.

The preamble to the 848page law states its purpose: "To promote the financial stability of the United States by improving accountability and transparency in the financial system, to end 'too big to fail,' to protect the American taxpayer by ending bailouts, to protect consumers from abusive financial services practices, and for other purposes."

Abbott, however, said the law "is bad for banks, harmful to businesses and worse for consumers who want to borrow money. It gives too much power to the federal government — and puts taxpayer dollars at risk. Under this law, unelected federal bureaucrats

can unilaterally liquidate financial institutions in which the state invests taxpayer dollars. The State of Texas could be denied basic due process rights and taxpayers' dollars could recklessly be put at risk," Abbott said.

Over the last few months, The Associated Press and other national media entities have noted that Abbott, on behalf of the state, has sued the Obama administration more than two dozen times since January 2009. Complaints in the many federal lawsuits to which Texas has been party vary widely, including such topics as health care reform, offshore drilling, voter identification, redistricting, air-quality regulations and school prayer.

SURVEY SPELLS OUT NEEDS Members of the 83rd Texas


tee on People with Disabilities. Respondents ranked issues and gave open-ended input on any issue important to them. Some of the highest-ranking issues expressed in the survey include:

notification and warnings are provided in multiple formats,

including formats that are accessible to people who are blind, deaf, hard-of-hearing, or use American Sign Language (85.7 percent); - Increased

Former Ozona coach retires

Faught led
Lady Lions
to back-to-back
state championships

ANDREWS - As the final seconds wound down in the Seminole Maidens' 51-32 season finale victory over the Andrews Lady Mustangs, Terri Faught -- wife of Maiden head basketball coach Dickie Faught -- struggled to hold back her tears.

After all, it was a night which was three decades in the making.

As Dickie stepped off the court at Andrews High School's Mustang Arena, the two embraced with veteran coach asking "Why are you crying?"

Her tears were a signal of an end of a basketball era for the Faught family, as Dickie informed his program and school officials earlier this month this season would be his last at the helm of the Maiden program.

And, as of now, his career.
A career which included 608 career wins, three state championships in four state tournament appearances, and a slew of postseason appearances and post-season awards

"It really hasn't sunk in until just now that I am finished," said Faught following the Feb. 5 victory. "I was more focused on making sure that our girls came out and got themselves a win tonight that it never really crossed my mind that this would be it."

Faught left the court with a standing ovation from the

traveling Seminole crowd in attendance for Tuesday's contest, which saw the Maidens finish with a 16-15 overall mark and a 2-8 record in District 2-3A play, arguably the toughest 3A district in the State of Texas with four teams all ranked in the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches' polls earlier this season.

"I have been fortunate to have been able to coach at some great places and to have some great kids in my career," said Faught. "We had a tough go of it this year in district play, but it's been a fun ride. We'll just see what is in store for me next."

Faught also joked about putting up his dry-erase board and coach's whistle for what could be his final time.

"I know one thing, if I have anymore sleepless nights from here on out, it's because I am worried about how Dustin and Derek's teams are going to play," joked Faught.

Sons of Terri and Dickie, Dustin and Derek, are currently the head coaches of the Brownfield Cubs and Lady Cubs, respectively. Both are graduates of Ozona High

School.

In nine seasons at the helm of the Maiden basketball program, Faught compiled a 187-106 overall record and lead Seminole to the post season in eight of his nine seasons, which included six seasons of advancing to the Class 3A Regional Quarterfinals.

Faught's three state championship runs occurred in the 1987-88 season at Brownfield, and in the 1994-95, 1995-96 seasons at Class 2A Ozona.

"The first thing I think of about Dickie, regardless if he's on the court or not, is that he's a man of character and the type of man you'd want your kids to be coached by," said Chris Burtch, Seminole ISD Athletic Director.

Faught, earlier this season, collected win No. 600 before the Christmas holidays with a 31-19 victory over the Fort Stockton Prowlers at the 2012 Sandhills Basketball Tournament in Monahans.

Seminole entered entered into the buzzsaw of District 2-3A play with a 14-7 overall record, with the final two victories of the 2012-13 regular season coming over Andrews.

Uresti calling Congress to enact immigration reform


AUSTIN - State Sen. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, and other members of the Senate Democratic Caucus filed a Senate concurrent resolution last week urging Congress to swiftly enact meaningful, comprehensive immigration reform.

SCR 15 notes that America is a nation of immigrants and that their story is woven into our social and cultural fabric. It states that we require an immigration system that "provides for public safety, national security, economic prosperity, and the well-being of all who live and work in the United States."

Uresti, chairman of the Senate Hispanic caucus, said there is a growing consensus among the American public and elected leaders in both political parties that the time is right to address the issue. The resolution cites a January poll by the Associated Press that found 62 percent of Americans support immigration reform.

As far the economic benefits of immigration reform, the resolution cites a 2012 report by the CATO Institute that said reform could lead to a \$180 billion gain for American households. Closer to home, a study by the Perryman Group found that Texas would lose \$69.3 billion in economic activity, \$30.8 billion in gross state product, and approximately 403,000 jobs if all undocumented immigrants were removed from the state.

Uresti said immigration reform must reflect the nation's sovereignty and the right to secure its borders, but should not stop there. It must also be compassionate, and address the needs of temporary and migrant workers and young people who were brought to the United States as children without their consent.





publish public notices in a "newspaper of general circulation" in their jurisdictions.

The notices include everything from meeting agendas to requests for bids on projects. Crockett County Com-

missioners, County Judge Fred Deaton, members of the Crockett County CCSD School Board and Superintendent Chris duBois have all signed letters state officials opposing this bill.

Papers have to publish each notice at their lowest rate for classified advertis-The press association collects the notices on its website, creating a statewide archive that is independently maintained.

The annual cost of publishing notices statewide isn't known. In a 2012 survey by the Texas Public Purchasing Association, 33 government units that included counties, school districts and cities said they paid about \$498,000 on newspaper notices.

Stickland cited a 2012 survey by the Pew Research Center showing that 23 percent of Americans read a print newspaper the previous

"We spend a ton of money on posting these newspaper notices every year, and

we don't feel like there's any purpose to it," says Stickland's chief of staff, Tony McDonald. "Newspaper subscriptions are declining, and even if they weren't, it's not the sort of thing people read."

Similar proposals stalled in both the House and Senate in 2011.

"We're trying to save taxpayers money," McDonald said. "We understand some newspapers are going to take a hit. It's a government subsidy they would lose, but the law is not in place to give newspapers money. The law is in place to increase transparency. If there is a better way to do it at a cheaper cost, we want to do that.'

Donnis Baggett, executive vice president of the Texas Press Association, says the issue isn't lost revenue at newspapers, but lost public information.

"Public notice usually makes up 1 to 5 percent of newspaper revenue," Baggett said. "I don't think we'd lose any newspapers if we didn't have public notice."

If notices disappear from newspapers, Moser said, there would be no longer be a statewide archive of public notices — which could affect the public's ability to access the accuracy of records and hold government account-

- Adequate, efficient Special Education programs, services and procedures (84.7 percent). Also:

- Emergency planning processes that include people with disabilities (84.2 percent);

- Ensure appropriate (educational) accommodations are available during testing (83.2 percent);

- Education of employers about disability rights law related to employment (82.3 percent);

- Accessible post-disaster housing (82.2 percent);

- Integrate people with disabilities in the planning process for emergencies at the State and local level (82.0 percent);


- More resources and support for family caregivers, including respite services (80.0 percent); and

Strengthening existing anti-bullying laws in schools related to students with disabilities (79.1 percent).

DNA DATABASE IS CREDITED

Steven McCraw, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, on Feb. 14 recognized the CODIS (Combined DNA Index System) database for achievements. The CODIS section of the

DPS Crime Laboratory Ser-



vice received a unit citation for recent accomplishments. Notably, in November, CODIS registered the 10,000th cold hit, ranking fourth among the states in the number of hits, the DPS reported, and explained that "cold hits" are unexpected matches between DNA of known criminal offenders with biological evidence from crime scenes.

Since 1998, the DPS CODIS Lab has helped solve more than 640 homicides, 3,300 sexual assaults, 4,200 burglaries, 550 robberies and hundreds of other crimes in Texas and other states, Mc-Craw said.

FREIGHT PANEL IS FORMED For 10 consecutive years,

the Texas Transportation Commission reported earlier this month, Texas has been ranked as the leading exporter in the nation with more than \$251 billion in goods reaching consumers worldwide.

Recognizing the role freight plays in Texas, the commission recently established a Freight Advisory Committee. The panel of experts is to serve as a forum for agency transportation decisions affecting freight mobility.

Thousands of citizens turned out to pay their respects along the 200-mile route of the funeral procession that began in Kyle's home city of Midlothian and ended at the state cemetery.





ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
