School board reverses class ranking policy for juniors, seniors

The class ranking policy for this year's OHS Seniors and Juniors has been changed. During a packed regular meeting last week, the CCCSD School Board unanimously voted to reverse the policy for the senior students graduating this year and this year's junior students back to the policy that was in place when they started at OHS.

This year's freshmen and

sophomores will remain under the policy that was originally approved in August 2011.

The former policy for the seniors and juniors puts them back on the same plan that they started with when they entered high school. This policy states that incentive points for dual-credit classes are 5 and advanced placement classes incentive points are 7.

The policy for the freshmen and sophomores states that incentive points for dual-credit and advanced place-

ment classes are 10 points.

When the board came back in open session, they immediately voted on the policy without any discussion.

Matters of policy, under the Texas Open Meetings Act, are normally discussed in open session.

Interim Superintendent Larry Taylor said the board's discussion in executive/closed session was due to talking about individual students and their ranking.

He said the board looked

at the top 10 percent, top 25 percent and valedictorian and salutatorian.

Before the board went into executive/closed session, two district teachers spoke about policy.

Coach Erik Thormaehlen said two weeks ago he learned about the policy, and presented a petition containing more than 204 signatures asking the board to change the policy.

The petition was signed by the county judge, county sheriff, several county commis-

sioners, former school board members and current OHS Students, Thormaehlen said.

OHS Students, parents and local citizens packed the OHS Library, where the meeting was moved to due to the number of people.

"Teachers and staff do not remember being informed. It's an injustice to these hard-working students," Thormaehlen said.

The OHS teacher and coach also used strong accusations against the former su-

perintendent, and stated that the article that appeared in the Aug. 17, 2011 Ozona Stockman was misguided in reporting the policy change.

Thormaehlen apologized to Stockman Editor and Publisher Melissa Perner after the meeting, stating that his intentions were not to accuse the Stockman.

OHS College Readiness Coordinator Susie duBois said the board had already made its decision on the policy and

ASU researching disincorporating Big Lake

Reagan County Judge Larry Isom met with Dr. Jack Barbour, department chair for Angelo State University's Political Science and Philosophy department, Friday, April 12, to discuss disincorporating the city of Big Lake.

Isom, who has been an outspoken advocate for the county taking over responsibility for Big Lake, said that the purpose of the meeting was to request Dr. Barbour's assistance in researching such a move.

"My goal is to get an unbiased opinion," Isom said. "I hope to get real facts that can

be passed on to the people of Big Lake and Reagan County. These guys have the expertise to look into the unknown and come back with answers."

Dr. Barbour said that he and associate Dr. Matthew Gritter, assistant professor of political science at ASU, are in the planning stages of what he considers a very broad project.

"Larry is asking us to put together a kind of pros and cons list for disincorporating Big Lake," Dr. Barbour said. "We are currently looking to make this a project for two of our classes in the Fall. I told Larry that we should have results in December if not earlier."

Dr. Barbour said that the two classes, Public Administration and Scope and Methods (both undergraduate courses),

will try to look into every aspect of disincorporating from the legal, the financial, the political and the process.

"I've done a little research since meeting with Larry, and have found that disincorporating is something that is being looked at across the United States," Dr. Barbour said. "There are various reasons that a community would want to do it, but the main one seems to be financially based."

Isom has argued that, due to the county's \$3 billion tax base, the county could have every road in Big Lake paved in five years if the city would disincorporate.

Dr. Gritter said that the project has some major challenges for everyone involved.

County roads deserve an investment

Advanced drilling techniques have spurred an oil boom in South and West Texas that is bringing economic prosperity not just to those regions, but to the entire state. The surge in oil and gas production holds great promise for our future as well — but only if we maintain the infrastructure that supports it.

That means taking care of our roads.

A consensus has emerged in the Legislature that the time has come to address our transportation infrastructure needs. And it is likely that Texas voters will get a chance in November to approve a constitutional amendment allowing for money from the rainy day fund to be spent on roads.

We believe that a portion of those funds should be used to repair and maintain county roads in high-impact energy producing areas. County roads, many of which are not even paved, were not designed to take on the punishing burden of oil patch trucks carrying heavy loads of fracking sand, water, and drilling equipment. With almost half of the nation's drilling activity taking place in Texas, these roads have taken quite a beating and are badly in need of repair.

It's estimated that a county road used for drilling one oil and gas well will endure the equivalent of 8 million passenger vehicles. Some 5,400 wells have been permitted in the Eagle Ford Shale region alone, and it's projected that 24,000 wells will be operating by 2022. Since 2009, the Permian Basin, the largest oil and gas producing region in the lower 48 states, has produced over 1 billion barrels of oil. And now there is the promise of the Cline Shale development on the eastern shelf of the Permian Basin; the U.S. Geological Survey says it's the largest Permian Basin discovery in the past 50 years.

Counties are primarily responsible for the repair and maintenance of county roads, and counties in the Eagle Ford Shale and Permian Basin areas cannot keep pace with all the maintenance and repair needs. They must have help from the state, and it's in everyone's best interest to see that they get it.

According to the Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Association's "State of Energy Report," the oil and gas industry in Texas employed

about 379,800 people in Texas last year, almost 40 percent of the national total. Texas has 11,700 oil and gas businesses — about 28 percent of all such businesses in the nation are based here — and the average wage for an oil and gas worker in Texas last year was \$128,100.

The numbers show how important this industry is to Texas and to the country. It provides tax revenues for counties and school districts, helps sustain the state and local economies, pays a living wage to working families, and is pushing the amount of money in the rainy day fund to historic highs.

We want the oil boom to continue, and that means keeping these roads in good shape. The energy production industry can't contribute to the economy if their trucks can't get in and out of the drilling sites that are only accessible by county roads. If we fail to maintain them, we could kill the "Golden Goose" that is providing so much prosperity.

To help counties deal with this problem, Senate Bill 1747 would create County Energy Transportation Reinvestment Zones. Once a county established such a zone, it could qualify for repair and maintenance funds based on the number of well completions, the number of weight tolerance permits, and the taxes collected from production for each county. Counties would also have to provide reports documenting road deterioration and contribute a match of up to 10 percent for road projects.

This bill establishes a mechanism that counties can employ, and the constitutional amendment would create a reliable funding stream. If the Legislature signs off on this approach — and we're hopeful that it will — then Texas voters will have their say this fall.

Unless you're traveling to a hunting lease, feeding cattle, or visiting your grandparents' ranch, you may never drive on a county road.

But that doesn't mean they don't deserve your support. If there's an oil lease along the way, it's a road to our future.

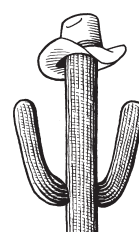
Although I really doubt if they'd have eaten it either.

Disaster recovery, investigation proceed

AUSTIN — An explosion on April 17 at a fertilizer storage and distribution company in the city of West left at least 14 people dead and an estimated 200 injured.

Counted among the dead were 10 volunteer firefighters who were called to the scene to extinguish a fire discovered there. As they fought the fire, an explosion powerful enough to knock down a nearby school and an apartment complex occurred at 7:50 p.m. Flames and the shockwave from the blast burned homes, shattered windows and incapacitated infrastructure up to several blocks away.

Officials said the blast, deafening in intensity, shook the ground like an earthquake. Dozens of people remain unaccounted for and search efforts have been continuous. Help from all directions poured into the city of about 3,000 people located between Waco and

Hillsboro on Interstate 35. "Like most small towns, West is a tight-knit community where neighbors look after each other and join together in times of need," said Nim Kidd, chief of the Texas Department of Public Safety Division of Emergency Management. "Local firefighters — most who work on a volunteer basis — medical personnel, town officials, and countless others came together last night under the most difficult of circumstances."

Gov. Rick Perry on April 18 signed an emergency proclamation certifying that the explosion has caused a disaster in McLennan County. On April 19, Perry toured the city of West to get a firsthand look at the damage and to check relief operations.

Ammonium nitrate and anhydrous ammonia, the two main ingredients in the 1995

bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, were present in quantity at the West Fertilizer Company on April 17. Both chemicals are commonly used in row crop production.

Officials must conduct forensic testing before they determine the actual cause of the blast. The Dallas Morning News on April 21 reported that the U.S. Chemical Safety Board, the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives and other agencies are investigating what happened.

JOB COUNT DROPS IN MARCH

Texas Workforce Commission on April 19 reported the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for March was 6.4 percent, unchanged from the previous month and down from 7.0 percent a year ago.

But, seasonally adjusted nonagricultural employment fell by 4,100 jobs in March. Employers added 14,900 jobs across five major industries in March, but these gains were offset by the loss of 19,000 jobs in six other industries, the Texas Workforce Commission reported.

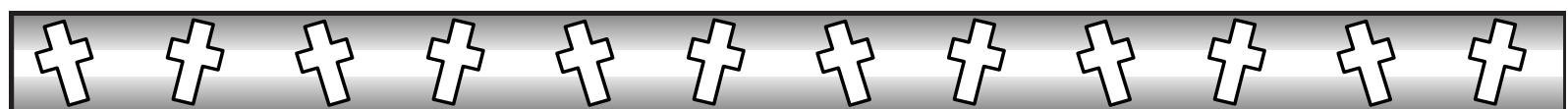

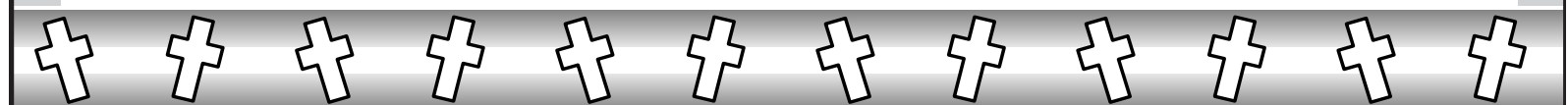

He said that getting all the information that they need will be one big challenge, as well as sensing what the political impact would be. Big Lake Mayor Terry Jones said that he welcomes the research and will be anxiously waiting on the results. "I think this research is a great idea that only serves

to benefit the citizens of Big Lake," Mayor Jones said. "Hopefully the this will paint a clear picture of what is best. Personally? I think incorporating would be a major step backward, but I'm looking forward to seeing what they have to say." Mayor Jones said that some of his major concerns deal with ordinances, the water system, the sewer system and the landfill.

Both Jones and Isom said that they are in favor of getting more information in front of the people of Big Lake. "I'm going to send every question I have to them in the hope that they can find answers," Isom said. "At the end of the day I only want what is best for our citizens, and I feel, no matter what the results are, this is a positive step in that direction."

that it should have remained in place. The board asked their attorney in November 2012 to compare students' grade-point averages with the new and old policy. At their December 2012 meeting, the attorney presented the results stating that the new policy would positively affect all students. "This policy encourages kids to take more rigorous courses. This policy is standard across the state," she said. "If the board reverses the policy, it will affect at least every student that is graduating on the recommended or distinguished graduation plan. That is about 35 or 40 students. This is just a lawsuit staring you right in the face. If the board members feel strongly enough to change a policy, the policy itself should be the only thing considered and then any change should be only to help kids."

BAND DIRECTOR HIRED

The board unanimously approved the hiring of Chans Moellendorf as the new OHS Band Director. Moellendorf comes to Ozona from Menard ISD where he has been head band director since 2008. He is a graduate of Fredericksburg High School and Angelo State University.

Also after a two and a half hour executive/closed session, the board voted on teacher contracts as recommended by campus principals. Taylor said the contracts approved were not all for the district. More will be presented at the May 15 meeting. Taylor also said nobody was terminated at the meeting. "He has growing success in both athletics and academics. It's only a wonder what this coach can do to improve this school," she said.

The board voted to take no action on purchasing real property at this meeting. The item was discussed in executive/closed session and voted on in open session.

The board also discussed the district's health insurance premium in executive/closed session. In open session, the board voted to not consider the insurance premium until they receive further information at a future budget workshop.

Technology Director Keith Harmsen presented technology plans and updates.

Approved policy update 96 dealing with DEC (LOCAL) Compensation and Benefits-Leaves and Absences; EFA (LOCAL) Instructional Materials - Selection and Adoption and FEB (LOCAL) Attendance Accounting.

In the District Spotlight, Taylor recognized the Lions and Lady Lions Track Teams on their success at the district meet, and presented new Athletic Director Ed Perez who attended the meeting.

Roll Call for the Absent was called for the 7 Aggies who had passed away, and a candle was lit for each of them.

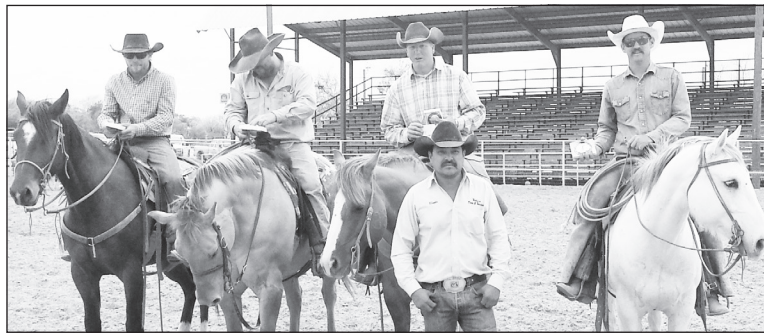

SENATE MOVES LEGISLATION

Two bills having to do with quick response to armed intruders on school campuses were passed by the state Senate last week.

Senate Bill 1857 by Sen. Craig Estes. R-Wichita Falls, would create a special training program for teachers and other school employees focusing "on how an armed concealed carry license holder should interact with the police during an active shooter situation, ways to keep in-

truders out of the classroom and training to improve accuracy under duress."

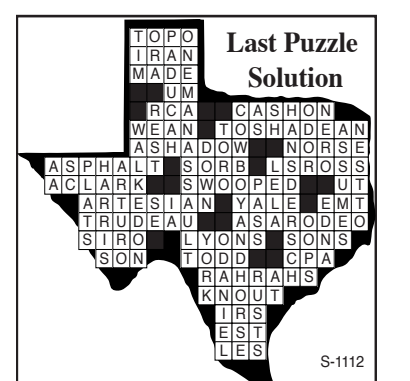
SB 17 by Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston, would provide school districts with funding assistance to send up to two employees to concealed carry training at no cost to the district. Both bills do not change current laws as to "who can carry where," according to the Senate News Service.

In other news, the Senate Natural Resources Committee on April 16 approved HB 4 by Rep. Allan Ritter, R-Nederland, and a long list of co-authors, legislation creating the state water infrastructure fund of Texas. Separate legislation will pull up to \$2 billion from the state's Rainy Day Fund and that money would be used to pay for projects, under the watchful eye of the Legislature. The bill now moves to the full Senate for debate.

SBOE PASSES RESOLUTION

On a 10-5 vote, the State Board of Education on April 19 approved a resolution that calls on the Texas Legislature "to reject all vouchers, taxpayer savings grants, tax credits, or any other mechanism that have the effect of reducing funding to public schools or limiting accountability or transparency for public tax dollars."

The resolution asserts that those things "do not provide accountability or transparency for state tax dollars and do not provide all parents and children with school choice due to the lack of transportation accompanying the voucher."

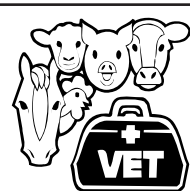

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
