Chavarria named second Lone Finalist

Raul Chavarria has spent a decade preparing himself to step into the role of a school district superintendent.

Last week, the CCCCSD School Board gave him a chance. At their June 26 regular meeting, the board unanimously named Chavarria as the lone finalist. The state requires a 21-day waiting period before Chavarria is officially hired by the board.

Chavarria, 48, is the sec-

ond lone finalist to be named after the first, Jon Orozco, withdrew his candidacy on June 21.

"I'm very excited. I know it was a tough decision by the board to begin with. To be considered for the position the first time is a big honor. To get it this time is an even

bigger honor," Chavarria said.

Since 2004, Chavarria has been the high school principal in Sonora. Prior to that, Chavarria was the high school principal for Memphis ISD near Amarillo for four years, and before that he was a teacher and coach at Alpine ISD for 10 years.

"We will be excited to have him here because of his commitment to our children, our staff and faculty, and our community," said Ray Don Myers, school board president.

DPS boosts patrols, fireworks safety tips

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols for a 10-day period, until July 7, that includes the Fourth of July holiday.

DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent.

"The Fourth of July is a time of celebration in our country, and we encourage Texans to enjoy and mark this holiday responsibly," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Impaired driving can quickly turn a time of celebration into a tragedy, so Tex-

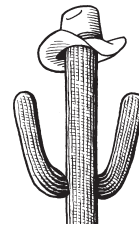

Auction Speedbumps

The key to a successful auction is speed, which builds the auctioneer's best friend: momentum. Never give buyers the opportunity to think rationally, that's the theory. But there are people who act as auction speedbumps. Here are a few.

Two Bits- This bidder always wants to cut the bid. If the auctioneer is taking hundred dollar bids he'll offer \$50, if it's 10 cents he'll offer a nickel, all of which makes the auctioneer chant tongue twisting numbers he wouldn't ordinarily use.

Coyote Charley- This bidder will loudly ask all sorts of questions that put doubt in the other bidder's minds so he can buy the animal cheaper. He'll ask, "Has the bull been anaplazed?" Or, "Has this horse always had that bump on his leg?"

Foghorn Fergie- A consignor's friend who wants to make brownie points by stopping the auction and saying, "I've used his bulls for years and only had five or six sterile ones." Invariably no one bids after this impromptu burst of brown-nosing.

Two Time Tom- Two animals enter the

ring and the auctioneer says, "Two times the money," meaning the price is doubled, or multiplied by 20 if there are 20 head. But when Two-Time is the buyer he'll say, "I thought that was for all of them."

Clerk's Nightmare- If we are using buyer numbers this guy never can find his buyer card and the whole show stops until he finds it. Or, if we are using buyer names this guy will mumble a name like Palafox Veteranavelfredavich.

Damfino- This person always wants us to stop the sale and point out the person he or she is bidding against. I always tell them, "Don't bid again and you'll find out."

Hollywood- It's customary at horse sales to not slam the gavel until the saddle has been removed so everyone can see the horse's back. But Hollywood, seeking his 15 minutes of fame, refuses to get off the horse, all the while performing tricks like standing up in the saddle or spinning around real fast, splattering everyone in the first row with wood chips and horse manure. Lawmakers stay for another special session

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry on June 26 summoned lawmakers back to Austin for a second special session of the Texas Legislature to begin July 1. Perry ordered lawmakers to write and pass legislation to do three things:

- Regulate abortion procedures, providers and facilities.
- Fund transportation infrastructure projects.
- Establish a mandatory sentence of life with parole for a capital felony committed by a 17-year-old offender.

Perry's first called session ended on June 25 with Sen. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, talking to death SB 5, legislation to increase state regulation of women's health care and access to abortion services in particular. Davis's 11-hour filibuster was augmented by motions and questions of parliamentary procedure by Sens. Leticia Van de Putte of San Antonio, Judith Zafirini of Laredo, Kirk Watson

of Austin, John Whitmire of Houston and other Democrats.

A crowd filled the gallery and corridors in support of Sen. Davis's filibuster, chanting loudly enough to create confusion on the Senate floor as midnight approached. Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, called SB 5 to a vote just before midnight, but the 19-10 vote was not finalized until 12:03 a.m. on June 26. The filibuster — nonstop talking with no breaks — and the slowed-down vote had eaten up the clock, causing other legislation on the brink of final passage to die at midnight along with SB 5.

Davis's success in temporarily stopping SB 5 drew national and world attention, but Perry, determined to push through his agenda

with the long-held advantage of a Republican-controlled Legislature, reissued his call for lawmakers to take up to another 30 days to pass the same set of bills that had just withered.

VOTER ID LAW TO TAKE EFFECT

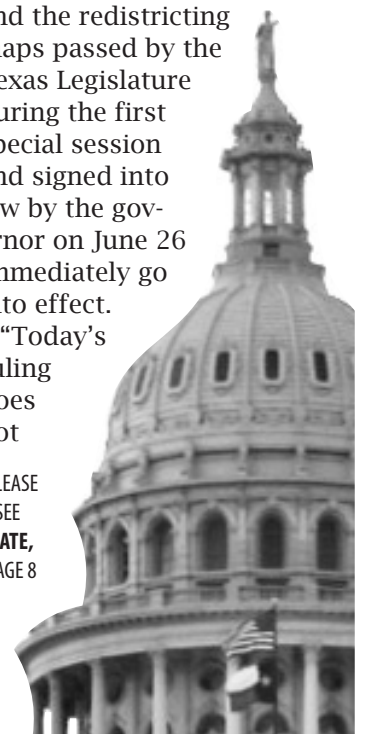
On June 27, the U.S. Supreme Court released its ruling in Shelby County, Alabama v. Holder, Attorney General et al., a case calling into question the constitutionality of Section 4 of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, a formula for determining which states or jurisdictions are held to a higher degree of scrutiny because of their history of racial discrimination.

Texas and other covered jurisdictions, as a result of the ruling, are no longer required to obtain federal judicial "pre-

clearance" of election laws. Attorney General Greg Abbott hailed the ruling, saying the Texas voter ID law and the redistricting maps passed by the Texas Legislature during the first special session and signed into law by the governor on June 26 immediately go into effect.

"Today's ruling does not

Never leave your child alone in a car

During the hot Texas summer, the danger of children dying from being left unattended in vehicles increases, warns Bev Kellner, Texas AgriLife Extension Program Specialist in Passenger Safety. Safe Kids USA has launched a new campaign titled, Never Leave Your Child Alone in a Car to help get the word out about the dangers of hyperthermia.

The problem is that temperatures in parked vehicles rise very quickly. According to figures from San Francisco State University's Department of Geosciences, in just 10 minutes, the temperature can increase by almost 20 degrees.

A child's body temperature rises three to five times faster than an adult's, making children more vulnerable to a deadly condition known as hyperthermia, or heat stroke. Heat stroke can occur at body temperatures above 104 degrees. Even mild outside temperatures climbing into the upper 90s or 100s each day, the danger becomes even greater.

Statistics from the Department of Geosciences at San Francisco State University show that Texas leads the nation with the highest number of vehicle hyperthermia deaths during the years 1998-2010. During that time, there were 71 deaths. There have already been 21 hyper-

thermia deaths nationally so far this year, with five having occurred in Texas. Last year in Texas, there were 13 vehicle heat-related deaths. Nationally, there were 49, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

In more than half of the cases during that time period, the death was due to the child being 'forgotten' by the caregiver. Such deaths are preventable when parents take precautions to make sure that children are not left alone in vehicles and cannot gain access to unlocked vehicles. According to Safe Kids, one-third of the heat-related deaths in 2000 were due to children becoming trapped in a vehicle they had crawled into.

Although many parents may think that this will never happen to them, it is a tragedy that can and has happened to many families. It is important that parents talk to their baby-sitters, grandparents, and others who care for their children to make them aware of the dangers of hyperthermia deaths.

Look for the Never Leave Your Child Alone in a Car campaign promotions, and follow these safety tips from NHTSA that can help caregivers reduce the risk of children being left unattended in hot vehicles:

- Never leave infants or children in a parked vehicle, even if the windows are partially open.
- Do not let children play

in an unattended vehicle. Teach them that a vehicle is not a play area.

- Make a habit of looking in the vehicle - front and back - before locking the door and walking away.

- If you are dropping a child off at childcare, and it's normally your spouse or partner who drops them off, have your spouse or partner call you to make sure the drop went according to plan.

- Ask your childcare provider to call you if your child does not show up for childcare.

- Do things to remind yourself that a child is in the vehicle, such as writing yourself a note and putting the note where you will see it when you leave the vehicle; or placing your purse, briefcase, or something else you need in the back seat so you will have to check the back seat when you leave the vehicle. Another reminder is to keep an object in the car seat, such as a stuffed toy. When the child is buckled in, place the object where the driver will notice it when he or she is leaving the vehicle.

- Always lock vehicle doors and trunks, and keep keys out of children's reach.

- If a child is missing, check the vehicle first, including the trunk.

- If you see a child alone in a hot vehicle, call 911 immediately.

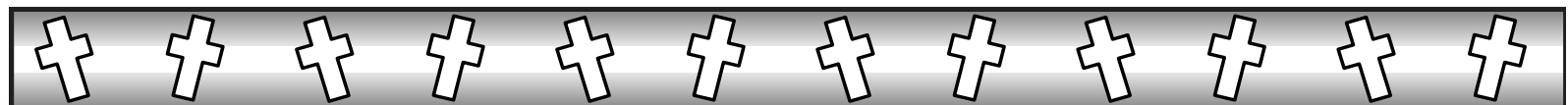

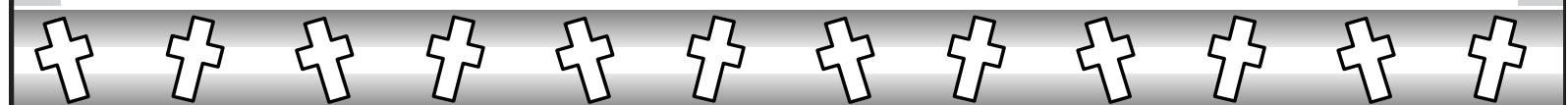

FSA County Committee nomination period begins

Reagan-Upton-Irion-Crockett County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Jed Hruska, announced that county committee election nominations began on June 17. Farmers, ranchers and landowners are encouraged to nominate candidates to serve on their local FSA county committee by the Aug. 1.

Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues. County committees are comprised of

three to 11 members.

Producers may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Organizations that represent minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. Nominees must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area (LAA) in which the person is a candidate. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and more information about county committee elections are available online at: www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.

"It is important that county committees are comprised of members who fairly

represent the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community," said Hruska. "All producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers are encouraged to participate in the nomination and election process."

Nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1. FSA will mail ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 4. The ballots are due back in the local county office by mail or in person no later than Dec. 2. All newly elected county committee members and alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2014.

During the 2012 July 4 enforcement effort, DPS troopers made 1,294 DWI arrests, and 361 of those arrests were the direct result of the increased patrols.

DPS enforcement also resulted in nearly 13,700 speeding citations, more than 2,200 seat belt/child safety seat citations, 750 fugitive arrests and 518 felony arrests during this period.

According to TxDOT, Independence Day traditionally ranks among the deadliest holiday periods on Texas highways as a result of alco-

hol-related crashes.

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Watch UR BAC program suggests that if you plan to celebrate with alcohol, you plan a safe ride home.

County AgriLife Extension Agent Whitney Walston reminds you that, "Death is not the only consequence from impaired driving. Often, people have a hard time recuperating financially from the cost of an arrest or the crash itself."

Here are a few simple tips from the Texas AgriLife Extension Agency to avoid a drunk-driving disaster:

- Plan a safe way home before the fun begins.
- Before drinking, designate a sober driver.
- If you're impaired, use

a taxi, call a sober friend or family member or use public transportation so you are sure to get home safely.

· If you happen to see a drunk driver on the road, don't hesitate to contact law enforcement.

· And remember, "Drink. Drive. Go to Jail." If you know someone who is about to drive impaired or ride with an impaired driver, take their keys and help them make other arrangements to get to where they are going safely.

The National Council on Fireworks Safety offers these common sense safety tips for using consumer fireworks in the hopes that injuries to consumers can be greatly reduced this season:

- Parents and caretakers should always closely supervise teens if they are using fireworks.
- Parents should not allow young children to handle or use fireworks.
- Fireworks should only be used outdoors.
- Always have water ready if you are shooting fireworks.
- Know your fireworks. Read the caution label before igniting.
- Obey local laws. If fireworks are not legal where you live, do not use them.
- Alcohol and fireworks do not mix.
- Wear safety glasses whenever using fireworks.
- Never relight a "dud" firework. Wait 20 minutes and then soak it in a bucket of water.
- Soak spent fireworks with water before placing them in an outdoor garbage can.
- Avoid using homemade fireworks or illegal explosives: They can kill you!
- Report illegal explosives, like M-80s and quarter sticks, to the fire or police department
- And note these special safety tips, if using sparklers:
 - Always remain standing while using sparklers.
 - Never hold a child in your arms while using sparklers.
 - Never hold, or light, more than one sparkler at a time.
 - Never throw sparklers.
 - Sparkler wire and stick remain hot long after the flame has gone out. Be sure to drop spent sparklers in a bucket of water.
 - Teach children not to wave sparklers, or run, while holding sparklers.

For the last 10 years, Chavarria said he has been preparing to be a superintendent by educating himself through various training and workshops, studying and networking and learning from other superintendents.

"I knew the big step was not having experience. I thank the entire board for doing their homework and having faith in me. I know it was a difficult and I will not disappoint," he said.

Chavarria is a graduate Fort Stockton High School. He received his bachelors and masters degrees, as well as his mid-management certification, from Sul Ross

State University, and his superintendent certification from Angelo State University.

A first generation college graduate, it was his football coach at Sul Ross that lead Chavarria to a career in education.

"He talked about his love of the kids and job. It is the relationship you build with kids and with people. It's the best profession ever as far as rewards go. It just brings me a lot of joy," he said.

One of the challenges Chavarria said he sees in Ozona is the turnover ratio in teachers.

"It's an issue that plagues all school districts. You lose a teacher in a school the size of Ozona, it makes an impact. You lose four or five

teachers in Ozona, it really makes an impact. We need to address the turnover rate and stabilize that. I hope we can work on building that trust once again," he said.

Chavarria and his wife, Jamie, have three daughters, Jessica, who teaches at Stanton ISD, Kaci, who lives in Chicago, Ill. and Elizabeth, a student at Angelo State University. Jaime Chavarria is currently the reading specialist at Sonora. She has also been offered a teaching position in Ozona.

Chavarria's contract will be negotiated at the July 17 regular meeting at the Administration Building. The meeting will be at 7 p.m. with a meal prior to that with the Chavarrias, the board members and their spouses.

INCREASE IN CAFETERIA MEAL PRICES

The board approved an increase in \$.10 for breakfast and lunch meal prices for the 2013-2014 school year.

OES Breakfast will remain free for all students. Lunch will be \$2.20 for students. At OHS and Ozona Middle School, breakfast will be \$1.20 and lunch will be \$2.35 for students.

Adult meals at all campuses will be \$1.60 for breakfast and \$3.10 for lunch.

France Brown, the National School Lunch Specialist at the Region 15 Education Service Center in San Angelo, submitted the recommendations to the board.

In an e-mail, she stated that the National School Lunch Program requires annual revisions to the meal prices.

By raising these prices a little bit each year the district will eventually reach the value of the free meal according to the National School Lunch Program guidelines, Brown's e-mail stated.

She also stated that if the district does not reach the value of the free meal, which is \$2.59, the district will lose the National School Lunch Program funding.

GRADUATION and DRUG TESTING POLICY UPDATES

The board approved changes to the OHS Graduation and student drug testing policies.

On graduation, the board revised the policy to state that a student who has not passed their standardized tests may participate in the graduation ceremony if they have participated in district tutorials, passed all their coursework and are enrolled in summer school.

Interim Superintendent Larry Taylor said the board will need to look at possibly revising the policy again after the district sees how end-of-course tests are factor into the requirements.

On the student drug testing policy, the board approved to allow for the testing of synthetic drugs.

FUTURE MEETINGS

The board held a special meeting Tuesday, July 2, to consider ordering a Tax Ratification Election on Sept. 3 to seek voter approval to obtain the two Golden Pennies that are not re-captured as a Chapter 41 district.

Also on the agenda for the July 2 meeting, is to consider resignations of teachers, teacher/coaches and administrators (if any have been received) and consider professional teacher contracts for the 2013-2014 School Year.

Details of that meeting will be in the July 10 Ozona Stockman.

The regular board meeting will be July 17 and a special meeting for budget workshop and board training is set for July 31. Both meetings will be at the Administration Building.

BUDGET AMENDMENTS

The board approved two budget amendments for the 2012-2013 budget.

The first amendment totaled \$147,765 be taken out of the district's fund balance for superintendent salary, \$116,000, and interim superintendent, \$31,765.

The second amendment moved funds around in the band budget for instrument repairs.

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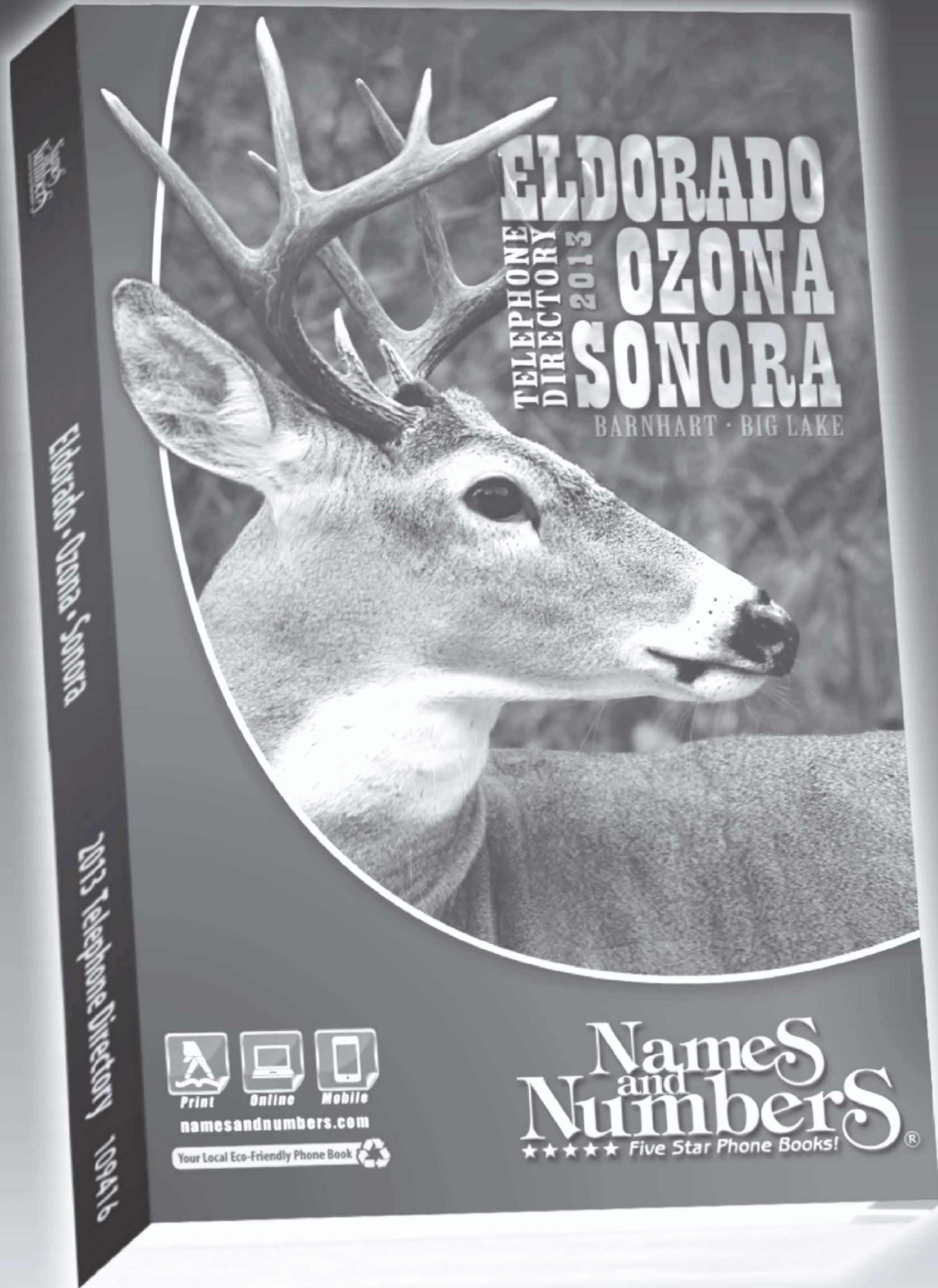

abolish the Voting Rights Act," Abbott commented.

"All states, including Texas, continue to be subject to Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act and the U.S. Constitution, which prohibit racial discrimination nationwide," he added.

Meanwhile, Texas' chief elections officer, Secretary of State John Steen, said photo identification will now be required when voting in Texas elections. A voter must show one of the following forms of photo identification at the polling location before being permitted to cast a vote: a Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety, a Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS, a Texas personal identification card issued by DPS, a Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS, a U.S. military identification card containing the person's photograph, a U.S. citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph, or a U.S. passport.

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or have expired no more than 60 days before being presented at the polling

place, Steen added.

SCOTUS REMANDS UT CASE

The U.S. Supreme Court, in a 7-1 decision published June 24 sent the civil rights case Fisher v. University of Texas at Austin back to the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans for reconsideration.

The high court ruled the Fifth Circuit erred in granting summary judgment to the university, and, attorneys for the plaintiff argued that the university's use of race in its student admissions policy violated the "equal protection" clause of the Fourteenth Amendment.

CRIME RATE DROPS IN 2012

Texas Department of Public Safety on June 26 announced that the overall major crime rate in Texas has dropped, while the actual number of violent crimes committed in Texas increased. Statistics in the agency's 2012 uniform crime rate report show the number of crimes per 100,000 people in Texas decreased by 3 percent in 2012 compared to 2011 but the actual number of crimes compared from one year to the next reflect a 1.2 percent increase in violent crimes over the same period.
