• \$7 million in average annual receipts for most nonmanufacturing industries. There are many exceptions,

but these are the primary size standards for most industries. These define the maximum size that a firm (including its affiliates) can be to qualify as a small business for most SBA programs. (Please see more specifics directly in the sba.gov website.)

## I Could've Dyed

I'm not the kinda guy who can sit around watching TV, so every evening finds me in my shop where I've taken on everything from blacksmithing to upholstery. Ten years ago I became a leatherworker, although not the most profitable endeavor I've ever engaged in, it is by far the most enjoyable. I especially like the tooling and stitching part, and please note that I said "stitching". Women sew, men stitch, even though it might look exactly like sewing and some of our machines may even say Singer on them.

To make my own conchas for my leatherwork I took up engraving a couple years ago and it has darn near killed me. I've put several holes in my hand and now buy Band-Aids® by the gross.

There's a steep learning curve to both leatherwork and engraving and it has been only recently that I've been proud enough to put my name on my leatherwork. As for my engraving, no way am I putting my name on it! Although future collectors will be able to identify my work by the DNA in the dried blood on my pieces.

Note that I said I was a leatherworker and not a saddlemaker. The leatherworking field is a bit like karate in that there are various levels of talent, with saddlemaking and bootmaking being the black belt. When I tell people I do leatherwork they always ask if I've made any saddles, to which I say, "Of course, I've made several."

It's not an outright lie because I have made three saddles, except that none of

them is taller than six inches. They are miniature saddles, two of which I have displayed in my house. It is the story of the third saddle that I am most proud. My good friends Skinner and Joan Hardy lost their beautiful young granddaughter Lauren to cancer a few years ago and since then they've helped a lot of people through their Small Miracles Foundation that

they established to help families blindsided by pediatric cancer. If you have any spare money laying around this Christmas and don't know where to send it, they do good work. (www.smallmiraclesfoundation.org)

During one of Joan's visits to our house, she saw my miniature saddles and asked if I would make one and donate it to Small Miracles to sell in their annual auction. Imagine my excitement when Joan called after the auction and told me that the saddle brought \$15,000. Not because the saddle was any good mind you, but because the nice folks were so charitable. They were so giving that the buyer donated the saddle back to be sold every year. (Probably because he didn't want to keep it in his house permanently where guests might see it.) The second year it did even better, fetch ing \$50,000. So whenever someone asks if I

make saddles and, if so, how much do they sell for, I say truthfully, "Well so far I've been averaging right around \$32,500!"

My idols in the leather world are Don Butler from Wyoming, Doug Cox from Nevada, Jesse Smith from Colorado, and Ron Butler from California. I can look at their work for hours, studying every stamp. Because I'm self-taught, and because I'm a lousy teacher and student, asking saddlemakers for tips is the only training I've had. Which may explain why some of my early work is often mistaken for dog chew toys.

One year at a vaquero show I was studying a beautiful saddle with great intensity while peppering the saddlemaker with one question after another. I think he got tired of all the questions and finally blurted out, "You must be a saddlemaker?"

"Why do you ask?" I said proudly, as if I belonged to that fine fraternity. "Is it because of the many knife cuts on my fingers, the way I was trying to steal tooling tips from you, or perhaps you noticed the beautiful hand tooled belt I'm wearing that I made with my own two hands?'

"No. it was none of those things," he said with a chuckle. "But I do have a good tip you might want to remember. In the future I would not scratch the inside of your nose when your hands are still wet with what appears to be Fiebings® mahogany colored dye."

## Proposed constitutional amendments pass

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — All nine proposed amendments to the state constitution on the Nov. 5 election ballot passed.

Texas Secretary of State John Steen, the state's chief elections officer, on Nov. 6 commented that the 2013 constitutional amendment election "was our first statewide election with a photo ID requirement in place, and it was smooth, secure and successful."

The photo identification requirement took effect following a U.S. Supreme Court decision in June on a Voting Rights Act case that challenged the state law over its potential negative effects on voter turnout, particularly among Texas' black and Latino voters, older Texans, rural Texans and Texans of lower income.

On Election Day, Steen said unofficial vote totals for Proposition 1 indicate that 1,144,844 voters cast a ballot, a 66 percent increase over the 2011 constitutional amendment election in which 690,052 voters cast a ballot. Here are brief descriptions

of each proposition: Prop. 1, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation of a homestead property tax exemption for the surviving spouse of an armed forces member killed in action.

Prop. 2, repealing the State Medical Education Board and the "obsolete" State Medical Education Fund.

Prop. 3, authorizing a political subdivision to extend the number of days of an exemption from ad valorem taxation that are already covered by an ad valorem tax exemption.

Prop. 4, authorizing the Legislature to create an ad valorem tax exemption on the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the veteran by a charitable organization.

Prop. 5, authorizing the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead property, and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with such loans.

Prop. 6, providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund and for the fund to be used in assisting in the finance of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.

Prop. 7, authorizing a homerule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.

Prop. 8, repealing the article of the constitution relating to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo

Prior to joining AgriLife Extension, he was an agriculture science teacher at Water Valley High School.

Renfroe is also an Ozona High School graduate. He is the son of Bobbie and Billy Dell Renfroe, of Ozona.

### USDA Farm Service Agency urges farmers and ranchers to vote in County Committee Elections

WASHINGTON - USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia announced that the 2013 **FSA County Committee Elec**tions have started, with the mailing of ballots to eligible

The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is Dec. 2.

"The role and input of our county committee members is more vital than ever at a time when our country faces important choices regarding the funding and operation of our government," said Garcia. "New county committee members provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of disaster and conservation programs. With better participation in recent years, we have also seen promising increases in the number of women and minority candidates, helping to better represent the richness of American agriculture."

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official

regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. Agricultural producers in each county submitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended on Aug. 1.

Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can obtain ballots from their local USDA Service Center. Dec. 2, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers.

Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than Dec. 2.

Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2014.

Close to 7,700 FSA county committee members serve in the 2,124 FSA offices nationwide. Each committee consists of three to 11 members who serve three-year

Approximately one-third of county committee seats

are up for election each year. More information on county committees, such as the new 2013 fact sheet and brochures, can be found on the FSA website at www.fsa. usda.gov/elections or at a local USDA Service Center.

### Texas voters approve nine constitutional amendments

Texas voters approved a \$2 billion draft from the state's Rainy Day Fund to finance water projects in the fast-growing, droughtplagued state Tuesday night, along with eight other amendments to the state's constitution.

That amendment, Proposition 6 on the ballot, had by far the highest profile of the nine proposals. It will move the money from the state's savings account into a revolving account to provide public entities with low-cost loans for water supply and conservation projects.

Campaigns led by highprofile politicians including Gov. Rick Perry; House Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio; state Rep. Allan Ritter, R-Nederland; state Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay; and former state Sen. Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, spent more than \$2 million urging voters to pass the measure.

Some conservatives disapproved of using money from that account, saying such a move encouraged "wasteful" spending and raising questions about who might benefit from state spending on water projects.

In spite of those objections, the amendment passed

"Today, the people of Texas made history, ensuring we'll have the water we need to grow and thrive for the next five decades, without raising state taxes," Perry said Tuesday night. "Now it's time to get to work on the projects that'll help us meet our growing water needs, preserving and improving both our economic strength and quality of life."

Conservation and environmental groups also endorsed and backed the water proposition, in part because one-fifth of the money is set aside for conservation and reuse projects. "This bold action — by both voters today

and state leaders during the last legislative session — is reminiscent of the sweeping response our state made during the Drought of Record in the 1950s," said Laura Huffman, Texas state director of the Nature Conservancy. "What is different, however, is the strong emphasis on water conservation and the critical role it will play in enabling Texas to prosper and ensuring the viability of our lakes, rivers, aquifers and coastal bays.'

Turnout was bolstered by local elections in Houston and Harris County, where Mayor Annise Parker earned a third term with a relatively easy win over a well-financed opponent, Ben Hall. Harris County voters rejected a \$217 million bond measure that could have transformed the Astrodome into a special events center. Now the building, once billed as the "Eighth Wonder of the World," could become a candidate for the wrecking ball.

Voters in Austin sent a special House election to a runoff, where Mike VanDe-Walle, a Republican, will face Celia Israel, a Democrat, in a race to fill the unexpired term of former state Rep. Mark Strama, a Democrat who resigned earlier this year. The seat will be on the ballot again next year, with the winner of the regular

election carrying on after the current term expires in Janu-

ary 2015. Here's a summary of the other constitutional amendments that voters approved Tuesday:

· Proposition 1 amends Texas' Constitution to provide property tax relief to surviving spouses of military members. Spouses of service members killed in action will be exempt from some or all taxes on their homes, as long as they haven't remarried.

 Proposition 2 eliminates the constitutional requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, which haven't been operational in Texas for decades.

 Proposition 3 gives tax relief to manufacturers who hold aircraft parts in their inventories in Texas for extended periods of time. Current law exempts aircraft parts from taxation if they remain in the state for up to 175 days; this measure, backed by General Electric and others, will allow localities to extend that to up to 730 days.

· Proposition 4 exempts partially disabled veterans or their surviving spouses from some property taxes on their homes that were donated to them by charitable organizations. It was prompted by concerns of foreclosures on

veterans who couldn't pay the property taxes on those donated homes.


·Proposition 5 authorizes reverse mortgages used to buy homes while requiring more disclosures to be given to the borrower in advance. The Texas Constitution currently only allows traditional reverse mortgages, which allow anyone aged 62 or older to borrow against the equity of their homes.

·Proposition 7 allows home-rule cities in Texas to fill vacancies of elected offices by appointment instead of requiring special elections, as long as less than 12 months remain in the office's term. The amendment is designed to lessen the burden on municipalities that may be asked to conduct special elections within just a few months of each other if elected officials leave their positions early.

·Proposition 8 repeals the constitutional cap on the tax rate for Hidalgo County's hospital district. The current maximum tax rate is far lower than other such districts across the state, and supporters said that prevented the South Texas county from

establishing a viable district. ·Proposition 9 expands what the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can do to discipline judges and justices in Texas. The amendment allows the commission to issue various warnings or reprimands to those under its purview after a formal hearing process, or require training, in addition to its current duties, which include issuing public censures or recommending the removal of a judge or justice. Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes the measure, which was sponsored by state Rep. Harold Dutton Jr., D-Houston, and recommended by the state's Sunset Review Commission.






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### Lions fall hard to Brackett, bi-district game Friday against Flatonia

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### Lions champs, Lady Lions sixth at State Cross-Country

For the first time in almost a decade, the Ozona High School boys cross country team won a state championship Saturday at the UIL State Cross Country meet in Round Rock.

The Lions, who won the Class 1A title, earned the program's first title in 2004, when they competed in Class

"This group of guys has worked so hard over the course of this year that to see them walk away with this achievement, after losing to Forsan by nearly 30 points earlier in the season, it just makes all the early mornings worth it," said Coach Erik Thormaehlen. "The race was so close that we stood their waiting at the results board for quite some time, nervous as could be. We had a little luck on our side on Saturday to go with all of the hard work these guys have put in over the last several months. We know that we didn't do this alone, if you get my drift."

While the overall race shows that Omero Rodriguez and Iosiah Iurado finished second and 10th, respectively, the rest of their squad — Adrian Rodriguez (25th), Alex Hopper (35th), Noe Medina (52nd), Alan Landa (59th) and Christian Cantu (93rd) — performed just as strong to provide the needed team points.

Rodriguez's individual performance was the best finish by an Ozona Lion at the state meet, since Danny Sanchez won the individual race in 1987.

Both Rodriguez and Jurado made the All-State First Team with their top 10 finishes. This was the first time Jurado finished at Round Rock under 18 minutes, Thormaehlen. said.

Adrian Rodriguez finished as the highest ranking freshmen in the 1A boys race.

"He has been an outstanding addition to our team this year with a great work ethic and attitude," Thormaehlen said.

Hopper, Medina and Landa all had improved times over last year's state race, where the team placed fourth.

"Chris Cantu had one job in the boys race, beat Forsan's sixth guy, which he did by 11 seconds. Last week he lost to their sixth and seventh guy. If a team ties, the race comes down to the sixth runner. In the event that someone gets injured during the race, it could have come down to the seventh. We really needed to make sure Chris got their sixth guy in case of a tie or injury," Thormaehlen said.

Combined, the Ozona boys scored 74 points to earn gold medals. Forsan finished second with 78 points. Valley View came in third with 83 points.

"With five of these seven guys coming back, and a couple of new kids coming up next year from our eighth grade district championship team, the boys have already started talking about next year. That's a great feeling as a coach," Thormaehlen said.

Ozona's Daisy Guerra placed 17th with a time of 12 minutes, 31.80 seconds. Teammates McKenna Moses (22nd) and Gabby Treto (63rd) followed.

Estefania Torralba (72nd), Jordyn Lexi Poindexter (73rd). Alyssa Newlin (86th) and Madison Childress (88th) also ran for the Lady Lions. Guerra's top 20 finish

All-State. Moses, Treto, Torralba and Poindexter all had improved times on the course.

Newlin ran the course for the first time, but finished under 14 minutes for the third time this season, Thormaehlen said.

"Madie Childress had a difficult race after stepping into a hole. She ran about 22 seconds slower than her previous race at this course, but her heart and determination to finish the race and fight through the pain were very encouraging about the kind of attitude and mental toughness that the team has developed over the course of this year," Thormaehlen said.

The Lady Lions placed six in the team standings with

Harper, San Saba and Sundown finished on the medal stand for the 1A girls.

"The girls had an outstanding debut at state competition," Thormaehlen said. "The Ozona Cross Country teams would like to thank the entire community for their support this season. At a Nov. 6 special meeting, the commissioners received more details about the funding, including creating a reinvestment zone.

Mary Alice Smith, senior consultant and client services specialist with GrantWorks of Austin, presented the commissioners with funding information. The commissioners voted in September to hire GrantWorks to help them pursue the funding.

County Judge Fred Deaton said he has been told by state officials Crockett County could receive up to \$1 million.

Smith said exact funding is still not known. Also, the Texas Department of Trans-

portation is expected to release guidelines to go with the funding.

Smith said funding and guidelines will hopefully be released by the end of the month.

"There are so many unknowns and a lot of impact," Smith said.

Smith said by the Monday, Nov. 18, regular meeting the commissioners need to be ready to approve the publication of a public hearing on creating a reinvestment zone. The hearing needs to be held in December, Smith said.

There will then be a 30day comment period before the commissioners give final approval of the reinvestment zone in January.

The county would also need to establish an advisory board comprised of one to two local citizens and one to three people from the oil and gas industry that do business

the county during the process.

The commissioners were all a little hesitant due to the short time period.

"This is the game you play. We could very well be the foolish ones if we don't get in it and get going, and we could be foolish if we do get in it and get going," Deaton said. "We can't spend taxpayers' money and hope it turns out alright."

Smith said she anticipates that the January deadline for the funding may be pushed back due to TxDOT not release the requirements yet.

"When I find out any official changes, I'll let you know, but I would continue on," she said.

During this year's Texas Legislative Session, House Bill 1025 appropriated \$225 million for county road repair for damages from oil and gas activity.

Senate Bill 1747 cre-

ates the grant process to distribute funds to counties through the Texas Department of Transportation, which was scheduled to consider these rules in October or November.

A county must establish a designated County Energy Transportation Reinvestment Zone to be eligible for the grant. In the reinvestment zone, the tax money raised in that zone will go toward those road projects for at least 10 years and not in the county's general fund.

During the meeting, the commissioners discussed establishing a zone around County Road 205 and 209 in the northern part of the county, where the majority of oil and gas activity is taking place.

"You need to decide quickly if you are going to go after the money, the unknown amount. It's a shot in the dark because there are a

lot of questions," said Rhonda Shaw, county tax assessorcollector and chief appraiser.

Smith also said there is also no guarantee the funding will cover all the work that is needed on the roads.

"We don't know anything about construction limitations as to what they will allow you to do. I don't know if TxDOT is going to make any construction requirements. I'm leaning toward the fact there not going to make a lot of requirements, but I don't know," Smith said.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga said if TxDOT will be dictating how the county needs to use the funding, then maybe they should rethink pursuing.

"What I've heard and read so far, I'm not really for it. I'd rather keep on trucking the way we are. Let's go ahead and get going, but let's be cautious. We're just talking about a few roads. We need to keep all the roads up," Tambunga said.

Commissioner Pleas Childress III said that heavy production is taking place in the area of County Roads 205 and 209.

"About every three or four weeks, we need to fix those roads," Childress said.

Deaton said he would work with Shaw on looking at starting the process on a reinvestment zone and have something for the commissioners' Monday meeting.


"We can be one step further down the line, but we have not committed anything," Deaton said.

The commissioners also approved the yearly contract with Concho Valley Transit.

Commissioner Eligio Martinez was absent from the meeting.

Their next meeting will be at 9 a.m. Monday, Nov. 18 at the courthouse annex. The meeting is open to the public.

## TxDOT marks milestone in roadway fatalities

AUSTIN - As Texas marks a grim, 13-year string of daily roadway fatalities, the Texas Department of Transportation reminds drivers to stay alert and obey traffic laws in an effort to break the consecutive streak of carnage. To date, more than

45,000 people have been killed on Texas roadways since Nov. 7, 2000. "Having at least one per-

son killed on a Texas road every single day for 13 years is a sobering reminder that we must drive carefully and do everything in our power to stay focused behind the wheel," said John Barton, Tx-DOT deputy executive director. "These people are our spouses, children, friends and neighbors, and losing them to traffic deaths has a profound and permanent impact on their families. This staggering number of fatalities needs to stop increasing every 24 hours, and taking personal responsibility for our driving habits is the first step."

Texas has not had a fatality-free day since Nov. 7, 2000. Since then, 45,032 motor vehicle traffic deaths have occurred on Texas roadways. Despite a steady decline in traffic fatalities in recent years, Texas saw an 11-percent increase in fatalities from 2011 to 2012.

A leading cause of traffic fatalities continues to be al-

To date, 13,544 alcoholrelated fatalities have been recorded since Nov. 7, 2000. Distracted driving also is a leading cause of roadway deaths.

Since Jan. 1, 2008, there have been 2,719 fatalities caused by distracted driving. There also have been 5,469 unrestrained vehicle occupants killed since Jan. 1, 2008.

To decrease the chances of roadway crashes and fatalities, TxDOT reminds drivers to:

· Pay attention - put phone down and avoid dis-

· Buckle seatbelt - all passengers need to be buckled

· Drive speed limit - always follow speed limits and drive safer speeds when weather or conditions are present

· Never drink and drive drunk driving kills; get a sober ride home
