The Crockett County Care Center keep its census the same, for now.

At a Dec. 23 special meeting of the Crockett County Care Center, Health and Emergency Board of Directors, the number of residents at the care center was discussed.

Since September, the center has been struggling with staffing issues and keeping the high quality of care for the residents.

Director of Nurses Paula Hester said the center has nine people from Crockett County on a waiting list.

At previous meetings, the board decided to close off a wing of the center through attrition and screening out some of the admissions, concentrating on Crockett County residents or family of local residents.

Care Center Administrator Robert Stecher said some of the people have been on the waiting

list since September.


Texas Research study: Salinization of groundwater resources in Texas is a growing concern

VERNON - Degrading potable groundwater quality is a growing concern in Texas, as about 15 percent of all domestic wells in the state are at risk due to high salinity, according to a recent Texas A&M AgriLife Research study. The work of Dr. Sriniva-

sulu Ale, AgriLife Research geospatial hydrology assistant professor, and Dr. Sriroop Chaudhuri, his postdoctoral research associate, both in Vernon, has been accepted for publication in the "Science of the Total Environment" journal.

The study, "Temporal Evolution of Depth-stratified Groundwater Salinity in Municipal Wells in the Major Aquifers in Texas," was completed using the Texas Water Development Board's groundwater quality database for the period from 1960 to 2010.

Groundwater withdrawal accounts for about 36 percent of Texas' municipal water supplies, according to Ale. However, a myriad of wa-

US Rep. Pete Gallego sees tough race ahead

First-term U.S. Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, knows he will have a tough re-election campaign ahead of him, just because of the very nature of his district.

Gallego, who was in El Paso campaigning this weekend, was elected to represent Texas' far-flung Congressional District 23 in 2012. The district includes part of El Paso's Lower Valley and extends all the way to include part of San Antonio.

Gallego doesn't have a Democratic challenger, but there are three Republicans Francisco "Quico" Canseco, Will Hurd and Robert Lowry -- already in the race to try to unseat him.

The primary election is March 4. Early voting runs from Feb. 18 to Feb. 28.

His district is the only competitive congressional district in Texas out of 36, he said, citing two examples.

In the past 10 election cycles, this district has elected five different people to Congress, Gallego said.

It's such a swing district that Texas' junior U.S. Sen.



man noted.

The district covers just a tad less than 24 percent of Texas' land mass, Gallego said.

"You have to go everywhere, drive everywhere," Gallego said, when asked how one person can hope to represent such a diverse district. "You have to visit with a lot of people. The cool thing for me is campaigning isn't work anymore; it's more like catching up with old friends.'

Gallego joked that he recently made his final payment on his 2008 Chrevrolet Tahoe but it already has 217,000 miles on it, with about 70,000 coming in the past year since he was elected to Congress.

Gregory Rocha, a political science professor at UTEP, called Gallego's district an "anomaly."

"The voters in that congressional district voted for Mitt Romney over Obama for pres-

Ted Cruz, a Reident (in 2012), but chose him, publican, carthe Democrat (for Congress),' Rocha said. "There are only ried the district eight other districts that did by 6 points in that, and 17 (districts) voted while for Obama for president and a won Republican for Congress. That it by 5 points, represents about 5 percent of all congressional districts."

Gallego does have to worry about the 2014 race, because Democrats tend to turn out more during presidential elections than during midterm elections, Rocha said.

One thing Gallego's district does have is a huge military presence with Fort Bliss in El Paso and a handful of Army and Air Force installations in San Antonio.

Gallego was able to land a prime committee assignment on the House Armed Services Committee.

"I've learned a lot and developed great relationships with the leadership in the Pentagon," Gallego said. "I have such tremendous respect for the men and women in uniform.'

Fort Bliss will continue to be a prominent installation because of its size, terrain and strong relationship with the

Dewhurst orders health services studies

AUSTIN — Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst on Dec. 20 delivered charges for the Senate Committee on Health & Human Services to tackle before the 2015 Texas Legislature convenes.

Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, ordered the panel of nine senators to study what is being done by the state to enhance the health of Texas women. He also called on the committee to assess the effectiveness of programs designed to improve mental health for all Texans.

The committee will monitor all state-provided women's health programs, access to preventative services, efforts to reduce unplanned pregnancies and the maximizing of efficiencies, Dewhurst said.

Also, the lieutenant governor said, the committee will monitor programs designed to improve mental health and substance abuse services, assess their outcomes and address any gaps in the system.

PERRY TAKES VARIOUS **ACTIONS**

Gov. Rick Perry on Dec. 20 renewed for another month the current drought disaster proclamation for 114 of Texas' 254 counties. Perry originally issued the proclamation on July 5, 2011.

Meanwhile, also on Dec. 20, the federal government approved Perry's Dec. 13 request for disaster assistance to three central Texas counties — Travis, Hays and Caldwell — for damages attributed to severe flooding that occurred when hard rains hit the region at the end of October through mid-November.

In addition to the approval, the U.S. Small Business Administration granted Perry's request for additional assistance that will allow homeowners, renters and businesses in 11 central Texas counties to apply for longterm, low-interest disaster loans, the governor's office reported.

In other news, on Dec. 19, the governor posted notice of clemency he granted to 12 individuals "after each case was favorably recommended for clemency by the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles."

And, on Dec. 24, Gov. and Mrs. Perry publicized their wishes for "a happy and blessed Christmas to everyone in Texas, and to Texans all around the world."

MORE LAWS TAKE EFFECT

While most new laws are written to take effect either as soon as the governor signs them or on Sept. 1, some 47 pieces of legislation passed by the Texas Legislature were written to take effect as new laws on Jan. 1, 2014. Here are five of them:

- House Bill 294 by Rep.

Eddie Rodriguez, D-Austin, and sponsored by Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin: An exemption from ad valorem taxation

of certain property owned by a charitable organization and used in providing housing and related services to certain homeless individuals.

- House Bill 1349 by Rep. Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio, and spons o r e d by Sen. Donna Camp-PLEASE SEE

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency sets maximum and secondary contaminant levels for drinking water, with the secondary level being a non-enforceable threshold limit dealing mainly with aesthetics or odor, cosmetic or color, and technical effects – corrosiveness, staining, scaling and sedimentation, Chaudhuri said.

Water with total dissolved solids concentrations greater than the secondary maximum contaminant level of 500 parts per million can cause substantial damage to plumbing fixtures, he said. Levels above 1,000 and 3,000 parts per million are considered as brackish and moderately saline, respectively.

"In our study, we assessed spatial distribution of total dissolved solids in shallow, intermediate and deep municipal wells in nine major aquifers in Texas for the 1960s-1970s and 1990s-2000s periods," Ale said.

Previous hydrogeologic investigations of the Edwards-Trinity Plateau, Pecos Valley, Edwards Balcones Fault Zone Aquifer, Gulf Coast, Ogallala, Carrizo-Wilcox, Hueco-Mesila Bolson, Trinity and Seymour aquifers in Texas have also examined groundwater salinity, he said.

These studies, however, lacked depth-stratified long-term evaluation of groundwater salinization with specific reference to potable use, Ale said.

The objective of this study was to offer a qualitative overview of the spatial, both horizontal and vertical, and temporal extent of groundwater salinization in light of regional differences in hydrochemical processes, or changes to the ambient water composition.

To achieve this goal, the study was divided into three subtasks: map the total disgroundwater salinization differed across Texas, as reflected by noticeable regional differences in groundwater chemical composition," he said.

Ale said groundwater mixing via cross-formational flow between aquifers, seepage from saline plumes and playas, evaporative enrichment, hydrocarbon exploration activities and irrigation return flows led to groundwater salinization in West Texas.

In contrast, he said, ionexchange processes in the North Central Texas and seawater intrusion coupled with salt dissolution and irrigation return flow in the southern Gulf Coast regions caused groundwater salinization.

For both time periods, the highest average groundwater total dissolved solids concentrations in shallow wells were found in the Ogallala and Pecos Valley aquifers, and those in the deep wells were in the Trinity aquifer, he said.

In the Ogallala, Pecos Valley, Seymour and Gulf Coast aquifers, about 60 percent of the observations from shallow wells exceeded the secondary maximum contaminant level for total dissolved solids in both time periods, which indicates persistent concern over potable water quality, Chaudhuri said.

In the Trinity aquifer, 72 percent of deep water quality observations exceeded the secondary maximum contaminant level in the 1990s-2000s, compared to 64 percent observations in the 1960s-1970s, he said.

In the Ogallala, Edwards-Trinity Plateau and Edwards Balcones Fault Zone aquifers, extent of salinization decreased significantly with well depth, indicating surficial salinity sources.

Among all the major aquifers of Texas investigated in this study, the Edwards Balcones Fault Zone aquifer appeared to have the "best" potable groundwater qual-

We have run ads for employees. It's not that our salary base is lower, it's at the top. It's just the people are not there," Stecher said.

Stecher asked the board for guidelines on if the center should accept anymore residents.

Board President John L. Henderson said the center should stay where they are until the Jan. 9 regular meeting.

"We need to give our patient load some thought. We need to be compassionate toward the people working in the center, along with the ones on the list," Henderson said. "We don't have enough help and our hands are tied right now. I'm sorry we can't let everybody that wants in. Any additions to our current employee load we would be shooting our toe off."

Stecher said he has placed advertisements in The Ozona Stockman, The San Angelo Standard-Times and other area newspapers.

He also said other nursing home and care center

facilities are short staffed as well.

County Judge Fred Deaton said in the past the care center has tried to keep as many people in the care center as possible. Crockett County pays \$3,000 a month for each resident.

Oilfield jobs have made two working adult households into one adult working, Stecher said.

"The town is full of jobs. They aren't hard to find. We're in a cycle of an oilfield boom. Once it cycles the other direction, you could be covered up," Deaton said.

"We don't have housing. Getting CNA's has been difficult. The LVNs and RNs aren't there. We would like to hire them, but they are not there," Henderson added.

Stecher said the center is in the time frame of possible state inspection. Right now the center is free of all state tags, but Hester said if the state came the center could be tagged because of paperwork issues but not the care to the residents.

"Considering everything you all have gone through, you have done an amazing job," said Lupe Cervantez, board member.

El Paso community, Gallego said.

"We will work to continually strengthen (Fort Bliss)," Gallego said. "Fort Bliss is a core part of not only El Paso's economy, but its identity."

The recent budget deal brokered by U.S. Rep. Paul Ryan, R-Wis., and U.S. Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., provided a "very bipartisan ending to what has been a very partisan year," Gallego said. "I think it bodes well for the future; there is a spark of hope there."

The budget agreement minimizes a lot of the damage from automatic spending cuts known as sequestration, "It provides some flexibility to the military and provides some certainty over the next two years, which I think everybody desperately need-

he said.

ed," he added. Gallego said he will continue to take a bipartisan approach to representing his district.

"I grew up in the state House system (where he served for 22 years)," Gallego said. "The motto was, 'Vote your district.' It never said anything about being a partisan first. My approach is I'm an American first and I do what is in the best interest of the district and the American people. I think that guiding principle has served me well."

solved solids concentrations in the aquifers at different well-depths; assess salinity based on drinking water quality standards; and highlight the major clustering of chemicals in certain aquifers that led to groundwater salinization.

"As the importance of groundwater resources continues to rise in the future; and as more of our freshwater reserves are affected by rising salinity and other harmful constituents, findings of this study will aid the groundwater and natural resources managers as well as general public to understand geographic distribution and relative extent of groundwater salinization of the state's drinking water resources and plan for appropriate management actions," Ale said.

Over time, groundwater salinization across the state has become more "structured," with certain regions showing remarkable consistency in water quality degradation due to a progressive rise in salinity levels, he said.

"We identified hot spots of groundwater salinization at shallow depths across vast regions of West Texas in the southern Ogallala, northwestern Edwards-Trinity and Pecos Valley aquifers; intermediate and deep depths in the southern Gulf Coast aquifer; and deep depths in North Central Texas in the Trinity region," Ale said.

Groundwater salinization is a complex process resulting from various natural and human-induced changes of ambient hydrologic conditions, Chaudhuri said.

"Interestingly, our study revealed that the causes of

ity with the lowest salinity levels and concentrations of major inorganic constituents, Ale said.

A major challenge faced during the course of this research was the decreasing number of observations over the years and a lack of adequate spatial representation of groundwater quality data for each aquifer, he said.

It was therefore necessary to establish a more intense and "informed" water quality monitoring network, especially for regions that registered long-standing salinity issues.

Ale and Chaudhuri concluded in their study that management strategies to address high salinity issues in the state should be devised based on detailed site-specific analysis of factors influencing groundwater hydrochemical evolution supported by more intensive water quality monitoring and assessment.

In this regard, both groundwater and surface water quality monitoring is necessary to establish a detailed water budget and salt mass balance, they said.

Domestic well owners should also be encouraged to monitor water quality at regular intervals and be advised about appropriate well-head maintenance and protection strategies.

For agricultural regions, mainly in the Ogallala, Seymour and southern Gulf Coast aquifers, appropriate irrigation management strategies, based on local recharge, water-level changes and evapotranspiration, should be developed based on site-specific water and nutrient uptake by the crops and ambient soil quality.






