Primary election early voting runs through Feb. 28

Early voting in the March 4 Primary Election got underway Tuesday at the courthouse annex.

Early voting will run through Feb. 28. Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m., including the lunch hour.

For the Primary Election voters will have to decide whether to vote in the Democrat or the Republican primary.

County Judge candidates Fred Deaton (incumbent) and Larry Williams, and District and County Clerk candidates Lou Carson and Ninfa Preddy, will be on the Democratic Party ballot.

The biggest local race on the Republican Party ballot is for State Representative of District 53. Candidates vying for a spot on the November General Election ballot are Andrew Murr, of Junction, Rob Henneke, of Kerrville, Karen Harris, of Pipe Creek, Tink Nathan, of Center Point and Wayne Ramsay, of Bandera.

The winner of the November General Election will replace State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, who is running for state comptroller in the Republican Primary against Debra Medina, of Wharton, Glenn Hegar, of Katy, Raul Torres, of Corpus Christi and Mike Collier, of Kingwood.

When buying, selling businesses review financial statements

Being an adviser with the Angelo State University · Small Business Development Center for eight years now, I have seen many small businesses go up for sale. I have also seen many people who are interested in purchasing a small business. When valuing a business for sale, start by reviewing basic financial statements.

Let's say a husband and wife has been working in his father's small business for several years. They want to purchase the business from him. They know the market potential and the father has used an accountant to assist with taxes and other record keeping. How do they evaluate the company and gain the knowledge of what they should offer him for his business?

Two major financial statements should be reviewed with their accountant;

nent.

The Balance Sheet shows the assets, liabilities and net worth of the business. Items shown on the Balance Sheet may not tell the entire story. For example, is the equipment valued realistically? The equipment may be obsolete despite what is shown on the statement. Are the accounts receivable collectible? Also, the liabilities may not reflect a pending lawsuit or potential tax liabilities. These are just a few of the many questions to be asked to determine the value of a business.

The Profit and Loss Statement is the next important financial statement to review. Are sales correctly reflected? Many small businesses deal with cash and do not deposit all the sales receipts. If so, how can the seller prove the correct sales? Or, when selling a business, the sales may be overstated. The expenses may contain personal items that are not business related. It is a good idea to have an experienced CPA or business appraiser who represents your interests to represent you when purchasing a business.

In the example we are looking at we are probably dealing with a father who is trying to help his son and daughter-in-law as fairly as possible. Let's assume that in retirement, he would like to have an ongoing stream from the business. Since the business shows good prospects for the future structuring this deal will be beneficial to both parties. The buyers would like to give as small a down payment as possible to afford them maximum working capital.

This is not always the case though. Arriving at a total pay-

out amount would require knowing more information than is provided in this example. The advisers at the SBDC can help if you want to sell your small business or if you want to purchase a small business.

Go vote

t's time for our voices to be heard. The 2014 Primary Election Day is two weeks away, which means it's time for Crockett County citizens to get out and vote.

In the past two week's issues, the Ozona Stockman profiled the two local contested races that Crockett County voters will decide on March 4. Early voting began Tuesday, Feb. 18, and ends Feb. 28 at the courthouse annex. A candidate forum is scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 25, at the Senior Center.

This is a critical time for voters. Local races are where a person's vote is really counted.

A meager 11.1 percent of Texas adults voted in the primary elections of 2012. However, for those of you who will be making the decision about whether or not to show up and vote, consider the impressive power that each of these voting citizens wields in a low turnout election. Each of the voters who turned out in the 2012 primaries basically spoke for 9 other Texans.

In the 2012 Primary Election, 1,186 ballots were cast in the Democratic Primary and 13 in the Republican Primary out of 2,549 registered voters in Crockett County.

If it makes you angry to see such low numbers, then do something about it. Grab a friend and get them to go vote.

Information is the key in determining one's vote. Not only has our paper published information about the local candidates, we have seen these candidates visiting with voters.

As voters, it is our duty to become informed before we head to the polls. Just because someone is running for office doesn't mean we have to wait for them to approach us.

This year local voters have a choice of ballots in the Primary Election.

Primaries are for the political parties to nominate candidates to be on the fall ballot. Texas has open primaries, meaning you can cast a ballot in either party's primary, regardless of whether you've voted in

that party's primary before. However, you cannot vote in both primaries, you have a choice to make.

Crockett County officials are running in the Democratic Primary. The Republican Primary has many state WHAT'S ON OUR MINDS

races, including the State Representative District 53

We are not telling you which primary to vote in, that is your decision. We are just informing people that you have choice.

You must take one of the following IDs with you to the polls: a Texas driver's license, a U.S. passport, a state-issued ID card, a state-issued election certificate, a Texas concealed handgun license, a U.S. military ID or a citizenship certificate with a photograph issued by the federal government. With the exception of the citizenship certificate, none of the forms of identification may be expired for more than 60 days.

As a registered voter in
Texas, you have the right to:
 A ballot with written instructions on how to cast a

· Ask the polling place official for instructions on how to cast a ballot (but not suggestions on how to vote).

Cast your vote in secret and free from intimidation.
Receive up to two more ballots if you make a mistake while marking the ballot.

· Bring an interpreter to assist you as you qualify to vote if you do not understand the English language.

· Help to cast your ballot if you cannot write, see the ballot, or understand the language in which it is written.

• Report a possible voting rights abuse to the Secretary of State (1-800-252-8683) or to your local election official.

· Cast a provisional ballot if your name does not appear on the list of registered voters or you do not have proper identification.

 Vote once at any early voting location during the early voting period within the territory conducting the election.

· File an administrative complaint with the Secretary of State concerning violations of federal and state voting procedures.

Information about voting can be found at votetexas.gov or at the Crockett County Tax Office. On Election Day, or when early voting begins, it is also our duty to go out and

vote.

Remember if you don't vote, then don't complain.

Candidates show differences as primaries near

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Counting down to Primary Election Day on March 4, Republican Greg Abbott and Democrat Wendy Davis remain the presumptive frontrunners for governor in their respective party races.

For lieutenant governor, state Sen. Leticia Van de Putte of San Antonio stands alone as the Democrat vying for that powerful office, while Republican primary voters will have a field of four candidates to choose from in that race: incumbent Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst; Jerry Patterson, land commissioner; Todd Staples, agriculture commissioner; or Dan Patrick, chair of the state Senate Committee on Education.

while agreeing on most issues, one popular way those four Republican candidates seek to differentiate themselves is by publicizing lists of endorsements by various political action committees and other special interest groups.

Last week Abbott, the current state attorney general, said corruption and gangs are a threat to security along the border with Mexico. His likening the border region to a third world country, however, drew a blistering response from South Texas residents.

Davis, a state senator from Fort Worth, focused on public school funding. She pointed to a pending state district court case dealing with fairness in the education finance system and called on Abbott to stop defending the state law that sparked the case.

Davis suggested that the state Legislature be called into special session to revise the law. Abbott has said that as attorney general, it's his job to defend state laws against court challenges.

Davis also spoke in favor of gay marriage and "open car-

ry" by local option. An open carry law would allow Texans who have the appropriate state permit to wear a firearm in plain view in public.

Abbott previously has made his opposition to gay marriage known and he labeled Davis's open carry statement as political opportunism.

Early voting began Feb. 18 and will end on Feb. 28.

BUSINESS FILINGS INCREASE

Texas Secretary of State Nandita Berry on Feb. 10 reported that in calendar year 2013, some 150,979 certificates of formation creating new limited liability companies, corporations, and limited partnerships were filed with her office.

The number of filings, she said, represents a 5.6 percent increase from 2012, when the office received

142,872 filings.

"We've cut red tape and made it possible in many cases to start a new business in Texas virtually overnight. Texas is wide open for business. Welcome to the land of opportunity," said Berry, who appointed by Gov. Perry and sworn in on Jan. 7. PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 10

Growing a community garden

Local citizens hold first meeting, exchange ideas and plans

A garden for the entire community is the idea talked about during the first meeting of the Ozona Gardening Group Monday night at the Calvary Baptist Church.

What started as an idea on Facebook, a small group of members met to talk about making it a reality.

"We are going to have to work to really get this started," said Jessica Everett. "We want to help improve the community and get people involved."

Community gardens provide fresh produce and plants as well as satisfying labor, neighborhood improvement, sense of community and connection to the environment.

Typically, they are publicly functioning in terms of ownership, access, and management, as well as typically owned in trust by local governments or not for profit associations.

Abilene and Brownwood have community gardens started. Community gardens are located throughout the United States and Canada, according to the American Community Garden Associa-

The Gardens of Grace Community Garden Abilene is a six-month new community garden, according to information on the American Community Garden Association.

It contains 22 raised bed gardens, square foot gardening style, available for the neighbors of the garden. In addition, at this time, there is a section of 50 foot rows for vegetables. The garden began in March 2010 and they

are at the end of our first growing season.

The host organization is Grace Fellowship/Highland Church of Christ in Abilene.

According to the American Community Garden Association, The Brownwood Community Garden is a collaborative effort of local, state, and federal agencies, working with community groups and local businesses to provide and perpetuate:

·fresh produce yearround for area food pantries; ·space for community members to garden;

·educational opportunities for the community to learn about sustainable gardening practices;

·employment opportunities for low-income unemployed individuals.

It was founded in 2009.

At Monday's meeting, lots of information and ideas were thrown around about how to get a garden started in Ozona.

The first priority was land. Several locations were mentioned, including near the Senior Center, by Ozona Elementary School and some private lots in town.

"I think we need to get the county involved. It would be great to help supply our Meals on Wheels," said Jeanie Pittman.

An opportunity to provide local resident with fresh produce, perhaps plant flowers and have an area for children were all ideas tossed around at the meeting.

"We need to find a location and come up with a plan," Pittman said.

Funding, water, fencing, rules, membership and other issues were discussed. Different tasks were delegated among those who attended.

One issue Sandy Montgomery brought up was security for the garden and keeping it from being vandalized.

"How can we prevent that, and keep people from taking items," Everett said. "We don't want to give off the wrong impression. It is for the community."

Montgomery said that after the garden gets going there is potential for a farmer's market.

Memberships and donations were also talked about.

"We want to get as much donated as we can," Pittman said. "If we actually get it going we will probably have more donations that we need."

Marsha Tomlinson also said it would be a great way for people to exchange gardening ideas and learn from others expertise.

A memory garden, areas for children and other projects were discussed.

"It's up to us being able to get it started. If we stand our ground, we will have people joining us," Tomlinson said.

Everett said this first meeting was to get people's minds rolling and ideas flowing, as well as starting to form a plan.

"I'm not a big gardener, but I do like this town. I want everyone to feel like they have a part in this," Pittman said. "I do want this to be a part of the community."

The group plans on meeting again in a few weeks.





Water, local control issues paramount in HD-53 Race

BY ALANA ROCHA TEXAS TRIBUNE

HORSESHOE BAY — The race to replace longtime state Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, could come down to first impressions. And the people in House District 53 might all get a face-to-face opportunity with the aspirants: Communities across the 12-county area are organizing nearly a dozen candidate forums between now and the March 4 primary.

District 53 includes Crockett County.

Three of the five Republicans running are actively campaigning, crisscrossing the district and answering questions directly from constituents.

Llano County residents filled the common area inside the Quail Point Community Center in Horseshoe Bay last month to chat with Karen Harris, Rob Henneke and Andy Murr over light snacks.

The Texas Tribune was unable to reach Tink Nathan and Wayne Ramsay, neither of whom appeared at the Republican forum.

"I think the turnout shows that they're engaged," Henneke said of HD-53 residents. "But we have to have this many candidate forums just to reach the different communities that are out there."

Henneke is a Kerrville native and the current Kerr County attorney who formerly worked as an assistant attorney general under Greg Abbott.

Harris lives in Bandera County, where she is a radiologic technologist, smallbusiness owner and has served on the state Health

and Human Services Commission Council. Murr grew up on a ranch in Kimble County.

After practicing law in Dallas, he returned home to win election, first as Kimble County attorney, and most recently as county judge, a job he resigned in Septem-

On matters of religion, taxes, water rights and education, little separates the

Each told the Horseshoe Bay audience that if elected, he or she would call for full repeal of the state's business margins and estate taxes, and promised to oppose

Citing Texas' flourishing economy, the candidates argued the state could get by without new tax revenue if the state ceded more control to local governments.

Murr said he's familiar with the education system because his wife is an elementary school teacher.

He said he would push for legislation to keep the federal government out of local school decisions, and advocate for increased vocational education courses. "It's not just cows, sows and plows anymore — we have moved on," he said. Harris and Henneke echoed the importance of increased training for skilled labor.

But in this Hill Country district that lies to the west of San Antonio, fighting the persistent drought is issue

The three candidates vow to take active roles in ensuring a fair process implementing the constitutional amendment that voters overwhelmingly approved in November to divert some money from the Rainy Day Fund to pay for the state water

Henneke said he would push the Texas Water Development Board to define "rural" and "conservation" when it comes to how the state prioritizes water projects.

"You should know that I would want to work with [the Lower Colorado River Authority] to make sure they're educated about upper basin's needs," Murr said. Harris, too, vowed to be a "watchdog," ensuring the money is spent as intended.

"I think I would be proud to have anyone of them serve as my representative," said Liz Ellis, a member of the Llano County Tea Party who attended Tuesday's forum. "I think that they are somewhat more conservative than our previous representative. I think they'll be more likeminded with the rest of us here."

Henneke said that from "the broad-brush answers, you know we're all running as Republicans in this race. Listening to all of the discussions today, I was the only

candidate that had a firm line against expansion of government. I think that's where the differences came out after to-

"I'm much prettier than they are," Harris joked of her male opponents.

She said she's not seeking a lifelong career in politics. "I am looking to do this because it is something that I feel that I must do and am compelled to do. I think that, in and of itself, sets me apart and gives me a unique perspective on things."

Murr acknowledged the diversity of the region: "Different growing regions, different sources of income and use of the land, but overall the perspective, the composition, the people remain the same. They're conservative and independent-minded."

The winner of the Republican primary will face one of two Libertarian candidates in November. There are no Democratic candidates in the race.

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Ozona Lady Lion Track and Field History

In the spring of 2011 I made a decision to apply for a job at Ozona High School. I had only been to Ozona a couple of times (stopped through on the way to ski in New Mexico) but was ready to make the professional leap into being a high school head coach in track and field and cross country. In my first two seasons as the head coach of the Lady Lion Track and Field Program, I knew nothing about the program's history. There was no record board in the field house, no information that I could find in the coaches office, only a few stories from different people in the community that helped grab my interest.

Last summer I made the decision that I wanted to learn more about the program. I was fortunate enough to know Melissa Perner well enough at this point to ask her if I could come down to the Ozona Stockman and go through the archives. Using the Stockman and public library, I was able to create a history of the girl's track and field program.

The Ozona Stockman put up with me for about eight days of researching and graciously allowed me to hunt for the answers I needed.

This upcoming track season will be a special milestone for Ozona Lady Lion Track and Field. This will be the 40th season in the program's history. I want to say how much I appreciate the staff at the Stockman and the public library for helping me along the way in this search. I hope you enjoy reading this article as much as I did writing it.

The Ozona Lady Lions competed in Track and Field for the time ever in the 1974-1975 school year. In the spring of 1975 the Lady Lions were coached by Sandy Tarno. The girls finished fourth in district and sent four girls to the Regional Track Meet. Kathy Sewell, Anne Tillman, Nancy Womack, and Debra Clayton were the first ever qualifiers in our program's history

history.

Between 1976 and 1980 the program continued to grow and sent numerous girls to the Regional Meet and in 1980 Kaye Thompson became the first ever Ozona Lady Lion to qualify for the State Track and Field Meet. Thompson finished fifth in the 800 and second in the mile.

1981 would be a historic year for the Lady Lions as they won a track a meet in Iraan, for their first win ever. The Lady Lions also won their first ever district championship that season and were coached by Pete Maldonado. In that same season, Kaye Thompson would be the first and only Lady Lion to ever win a gold medal at the State Meet. Thompson won the mile in a time of 5:19, and also had a season best of 5:12 in the mile at the Regional Meet (which is still the school record). It was also in 1981 that Lori Clayton jumped 17-feet, 3-inches to claim the Long Jump record; both records have stood for over 30 years. 1981 was also the first year the girls ever competed in Cross Country. In 1983 the girls won their first ever district championship in Cross Country.

Ida Munoz, Sherri Buckner, and Vanessa Miller were the stars of the early and mid-80s with impressive performances in the Long Jump, Hurdles, Distance Events, and Discus. Although the impressive individuals that walked the halls of OHS during that time did not win a district championship and do not hold any of the records, each has a special place in the his-

tory of Lady Lion Track and Field.

The late 1980s brought about several new stars in the program. The 1988 team, coached by David McWilliams, won the programs second district championship. Some of the stand-outs during that time included Diane Sanchez, Maria Sanchez, Lacy Miller, Regina and Bibi Cervantez, and Kelly Williams. This group of girls put up great times in the relays, hurdles, and distance events.

The early 1990s included one of the programs best high jumpers in school history, Tamel West. West was also a stand-out in the 300 Hurdles. Tricia Arnett was another Lady Lion during that time that was very successful in the Shot Put with a throw of 32-feet in 1992.

The mid-90s included two of the very best in Ozona history, Lori Sanchez and Tara Wilkins. Sanchez ran a record 11 minutes, 51.7 seconds at the Regional Track and Field Meet. Tara Wilkins ran a record 47.78 seconds in the 300 Hurdles at the District Meet that year. Both of these records have stood for nearly 20 years. Lori Sanchez, Tiffany Maldonado, Terren Marshall, and Leslie Avila held on to the mile relay record of 4 minutes, 12.06 seconds until the 2013 season.

The late-90s didn't produce any records that stuck; it was a time of growth for Lady Lion Track and Field. Amber Tarr briefly held the record in the discus (108feet, 11-inches), Stormi Sessom in the Shot Put (33-feet, 7-inches), and Kayla Turland in the 100 Hurdles (16.16 seconds). In 1999 Lori Sanchez became only the second girl in Lady Lion Track and Field History to win a medal at the State Meet. Sanchez was the bronze medalist in the 1600

with a time of 5:33.58.

The early years of the

new millennium were ushered in by Tammy Alvarez who managed a 34-feet, 7.5 seconds throw in the Shot Put. In 2002 Jordan Webster set the record in the 100 Hurdles with a 15.67 seconds at the Eldorado Track Meet.

A month later Webster helped the relay team of Heather Ybarra, Ruth Cervantez, and Casey Cervantez capture the Lady Lion record in the 400-Meter Relay with a time of 51.41 seconds. Interestingly enough, the previous record holder had been the team of Lacy Miller, Kristina Martinez, Regina Cervantez, and Bibi Cervantez in 1988. What are the chances that the record would be broken by another set of Cervantez's? The team in 2002 won the third District Title in program history and was coached by Steve Osborn.

In between about 2003 and 2007 Britney Ramos and Alexa Cervantez left their mark. Ramos as a state qualifier in the 1600 and Cervantez as the school record holder in the Discus. Ramos went to state in 2004 and 2005 in the mile and finished seventh and sixth, respectively. Cervantez tossed 116-feet, 4-inches in front of a home crowd at the Ozona Meet.

In 2008 Vanessa Rodriguez scored a trip to state in the 800 and finished seventh. However, this would not be the event where she would make her mark on Lady Lion history.

Vanessa carved her spot in history in the Triple Jump in 2010 at Colorado City, with a jump of 35-feet, 3.75 inches.

In 2013 the Lady Lions won the fourth district championship in program history. That same year they won the first ever Area Championship. The girls of 2013 set 7 of the programs 17 school records. The team was led by Senior Cynthia Garcia, who

left OHS with new records in the 200 and 400 (25.5 seconds, 58.58 seconds). Cynthia also anchored the record setting 800 Relay and 1600 Relay (1:49.22 and 4:11.86). Garcia was joined on the 800 Relay by Brianna Sanchez, Brianna Cervantez (there's that name again), and Madison Childress.

The 1600 Relay was composed of Garcia, Childress, Daisy Guerra, and Estefania Torralba. Garcia went on to become the first ever Lady Lion to medal, in a non-distance event (800-3200), in the program's history.

A flurry of freshmen contributed to the 2013 team, led by McKenna Moses. Moses became the first ever Lady Lion to qualify for the State Meet in a field event, garnering the honor of Regional Runner-Up. Moses finished fifth in state in the Pole Vault with a season best, 9-feet, 6-inches, which is also the school record.

Moses also claimed the school record in the high jump that season with a 5-feet, 3-inches jump at the Ozona Meet. Another individual record setting freshmen was Brianna Sanchez in the 100 Meter Dash with a time of 12.31 seconds at the Sonora Meet.

The Lady Lions have a history to be proud of and a future worth looking forward to. It is an honor to coach this program and these amazing kids. This year's motto is "I appreciate this opportunity!"

The girl's team will begin the 2014 season in Harper on Thursday, Feb. 20. The Lady Lions are looking forward to the upcoming season and the possibility of bringing the first back-to-back district championships to the Lady Lion Field House.

Please be sure to come out on March 1 for the Ozona Relays and support our track and field programs.

The forum is open to the public and all party candidates are invited to participate. The forum will be conducted by local Democratic Party Chair Sandy Stokes and local Republican Party Chair Heidi Williams.

In Texas, any registered voter may vote in the primary of any single party, as long as they have not voted in the primary of another party. That means when voters go to the polls they will have to choose a Democratic Primary ballot or a Republican Primary ballot. Voters cannot vote in both primaries.

The chosen primary candidate (unless a runoff election is necessary) will represent the party in the Nov. 4 General Election.

VOTER ID

Voters will need to bring an ID with them. Voters can also bring their voter registration cards, but they will still need an ID.

The ID must be current or have expired no more than 60 days when presented at the polls, and the only IDs that can be accepted are:

·Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) issued driver's license, personal ID card, concealed carry license, or election identification certificate, or

·US government issued passport, military ID, citizenship or naturalization certif-

Other photo IDs, including out-of-state driver's licenses, employer IDs, and school IDs cannot be accepted at the polls. Photo ID is not required to vote by mail except for new voters who registered without providing a driver's license or social security number.

At the polls, election officials will use the photo ID to be sure the individual asking to vote is the person registered to vote.

· If the names on the photo ID and list of registered voters match exactly, the voter should be accepted to vote a regular ballot. The addresses do not need to match.

· If the names are not exactly the same, election officials will check other information--birth date, address, and photo. If there is enough detail to determine this is the person registered to vote, the person should be accepted to vote a regular ballot and initial a box when signing into

acceptable ID, isn't current or doesn't match the voter registration, the voter should be offered a provisional ballot and will have six days after the election to present acceptable ID to the voter registrar so the ballot will be counted.

An exact match between the name on the photo ID and the list of registered voters is not required to be accepted to vote a regular ballot. If names don't match, additional information will be considered in accepting the voter.

Voters may want to know how their name will appear on the list of registered voters to see whether it compares to their photo ID. Voters can find out how their name will appear on the voter registration list at the polls by:

· Checking the name as it appears on the right side of their voter registration certificate. Voter registration cards may contain somewhat different names on the left side and on the right side; the name on the right is the way the name will appear at the polls.

BALLOT BY MAIL

Applications for ballot by mail are being accepted until Friday. Voters may call (325) 392-2022 to request that an application be mailed to them or find a copy at sos. state.tx.us/elections/forms/ pol-sub/5-15f.pdf.

Voters who are 65 or older or disabled may apply for a ballot for every election conducted in the year by checking the box labeled "Annual Application." These voters must indicate their party preference to qualify for the primary and primary runoff ballots.

Voters are not required to provide identification when voting by mail.

Some groups are sending out pre-populated applications for the primary — these are acceptable for voters who request a ballot by mail. Voters should verify that their physical address is listed in the residence space rather than a post office box.

Along with the candidates, voters in each party primary will be asked to vote on a series of referendums.



TxDOT reminds drivers 'Be Safe. Drive Smart'

"Safety is our top priority at TxDOT and we strongly encourage drivers to exercise additional caution when traveling through energy zones and other areas where they share the road with heavy trucks and equipment," said John Barton, TxDOT deputy executive director. "Being safe and driving smart could be the difference between crashing and reaching your destination."

In 2013, there were 4,371 traffic crashes in the Permian Basin region that resulted in serious injuries or fatalities. The result was 358 fatalities in the 59-county region, which covers 75,000 square miles. The number of fatalities represents an increase of 13 percent over the previous year. According to law enforcement, the leading

causes of crashes in the region were failure to control speed and driver inattention. The most dangerous times of day were around 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

To help encourage safe driving habits, TxDOT is partnering with the oil and gas industry, Texas Department of Public Safety and communities across Permian Basin. The Be Safe. Drive Smart. campaign includes billboards, gas pump advertising, newspaper ads, and TV and radio spots that feature Permian Basin residents.

SALES TAX REVENUE IS UP

State sales tax revenue in January was \$2.3 billion, up 8.3 percent compared to the previous January, state Comptroller Susan Combs said Feb. 12.

Combs said increases across all major sectors of the economy indicate "continued expansion in both consumer and business spending, and brings the growth in fiscal year-to-date collections to 4.6 percent compared with the previous year. Sales tax revenue has increased for 46 consecutive months.'

Cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts would be sent their February local sales tax allocations totaling \$802.1 million, up 8.2 percent compared to February 2013.

UT CHANCELLOR STEPS DOWN

After a five-year tenure, Chancellor Francisco G. Cigarroa announced Feb. 10 that he would step down as head of The University of Texas System but will serve until a successor is named.

Cigarroa will become the head of pediatric transplant surgery at the UT Health Science Center at San Antonio while also serving as a special liaison to the board of regents to advise on the development of the new University of Texas Rio Grande Valley and medical school.

Cigarroa served as president of the UT Health Science Center at San Antonio from 2000 to 2008 before being named the first Hispanic chancellor of the UT System in late 2008.

SEAT BELT CAMPAIGN BEGINS

Texas Department of Transportation announced Feb. 14 the launch of its annual "Teen Click It or Ticket" campaign to address the leading cause of death among teens ages 15 to 20: motor vehicle crashes.

The campaign features videos and a wrecked truck exhibit "to highlight the consequences of not wearing a seat belt, such as costly tickets, lost driving privileges, injuries or even death," TxDOT said.

Educational toolkits available to campus classrooms include posters, banners, parking lot signage, morning announcements, a school newspaper article, a parent brochure and more.

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


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ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

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


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
