Malone Fire contained, cause linked to burning trash

A week after it started, the Malone Fire on the Val Verde and Crockett County line sits at 100 percent containment.

The Texas Forest Service said the fire, which has burned more than 15,000 acres, was started by a landowner burning trash. Both Crockett and Val Verde counties are under

Ozona Volunteer Fire Department responded to a call stating there was a grass fire on County Road 409 Sunday evening. Firefighters drove County Road 409 and checked the area. No fire was found.

Firefighters said there was smoke and a haze from the Malone Fire heading north from the south.

On their Facebook page, the Ozona Fire Department posted that the haze or light smoke can be expected over the next couple of days, but to also notify the fire department if anyone suspects a fire.

Val Verde Emergency Management posted on their Facebook page that assistance

County gets \$2 million in road funding

Crockett County is set to receive around \$2 million to help repair county roads from the County Transportation Infrastructure Fund grant program.

The program, which was created by the 83rd Legislature in Senate Bill 1747, is to help counties repair roads affected by the oil and gas industry.

All 254 counties in the state were eligible for the grant, but only 191 applied, leaving an additional \$22 million to be re-allocated.

The Texas Department of Transportation administers the fund.

Crockett County was originally estimated to receive around \$1.9 mil-



Don't feed the neighborhood or the wild animals

With the retirement of Chief Deputy Emilio Tambunga, the sheriff appointed Jose L. Gutierrez as the new chief deputy.

in a drought situation, and we are having lots of animals wandering into town due to lack of food availability.

These wild animals, and in some cases wild cats, are in our neighborhoods. If you are one of those people with bowls or piles of cat food in your yard, you are encouraging these wild animals into your neighborhood to share space with our domestic pets.

This is not a wise practice and needs to stop. If you have a cat of your own, you can take a few minutes and

feed them once or twice a day, then move their food inside if you make them eat outside.

We are in a perfect situation to have a rabies catastrophe, and it could probably be avoided or at least be less likely if we did not have the invited wild animals in town sharing space, food, and being encouraged to be within biting distance of us and our pets.

Needless to say, if your pets are not current on their vaccinations, make sure they are brought up to date.

If you know a neighbor who is carelessly putting out food to

whatever in your neighborhood, you may want to keep a close watch on your yard and pets. We have a neighbor in my neighborhood that puts out food, but does not have any area to care for a cat, so they sleep under my shop or in my neighbor's yard.

Most of the time, these people are feeding cats that are parasite-ridden, (internal and external parasites) not vaccinated, many have ringworm, and are untamed health hazards. These folks somehow convince themselves that they are doing the animals a favor.

These same cats are multiplying in the neighbor's yards. And since the cats do not actually stay at their feeder's house due to no accommodations, the neighbors are the ones with all the fleas.

Please, feel free to call Animal Control and complain if you have a neighbor that is unconcerned about wild animals in your neighborhood and is indiscriminately feeding. The number is 392-2662.

Toyota picks Plano for North America headquarters

AUSTIN — Toyota Motor Corporation on April 28 announced its decision to locate the headquarters of Toyota Motor North America head-

quarters to Plano.

Toyota said the move is

"designed to better serve customers and position Toyota
for sustainable, long-term
growth."

Within the next three years, Toyota's three separate North American headquarters for manufacturing, sales and marketing and corporate operations will relocate to a single, state-of-the-art campus in Plano, just north of Dallas. Toyota's North American finance arm also plans to move its headquarters to this new, shared campus. Altogether, these moves will affect about 4,000 employees, Toyota said.

Gov. Rick Perry said Toyota is making a \$300 million capital investment in the move and the state has offered Toyota an incentive of

ad- Enterprise Fund.

"We're proud that both the Tundra and Tacoma bear the words 'Made in Texas' and we're excited our state will be the nexus for Toyota's North American operations moving forward," Perry said, adding that Toyota's Texas operations presently include its \$2.3 billion manufacturing facility in San Antonio that supports 2,900 jobs, and combined with its 21 on-site suppliers, Toyota supports 6,000 jobs in San Antonio.

GRAND JURY PROBE BEGINS

A Travis County grand jury assigned with a special prosecutor convened in mid-April to examine Gov. Rick Perry's veto last year of legislation to fund the state's Public Integrity Unit, a division of the Travis County district attorney's

office tasked with investigating public corruption.

Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg, who heads the Public Integrity Unit, was arrested for drunken driving in April 2013, pleaded guilty, served half of a 45-day jail sentence and was released. Perry asked for Lehmberg's resignation, but Lehmberg chose to continue in office. Perry then vetoed the Public Integrity Unit's budget. Travis County, however, came up with money from its own budget to maintain the entity's functions.

DECISION SETS COAL BACK

Texas Railroad Commission, the state agency that regulates energy-producing industries, lamented the U.S. Supreme Court's 6-2 decision on April 29 to uphold the U.S. Environmental Protection

Agency's Cross-State Air Pol-

lution Rule. "By upholding the EPAwritten Cross-State Air Pollution Rule and overturning a lower court decision, the Supreme Court has made it increasingly difficult to burn coal to produce electricity," according to a Railroad Commission statement **PLEASE** SEE STATE, PAGE 10





VOTE: Reminder Texans need a valid ID

The Primary Runoff Election is getting closer.

Early voting for the runoff will be May 19-23 at the courthouse annex. Runoff Election Day is May 27 at the Crockett County Courthouse.

"If you voted in a party primary or participated in a convention, you can only vote in that same party's runoff" said Secretary of State Nandita Berry. "If you did not vote in the March 4 Primary you may still vote and can vote in the runoff election for either party.'

The Democratic Primary Ballot includes David M. Alameel and Kesha Rogers for U.S. Senator and Jim Hogan and Richard "Kinky" Friedman for Commissioner of Ag-

riculture. The Republican Primary Ballot includes Andrew Murr and Rob Henneke for State Representative of District 53; Francisco "Quico" Canseco and Will Hurd for U.S. Representative District 23; Dan Patrick and David Dewhurt for Lieutenant Governor; Dan Branch and Ken Paxton for Attorney General; Sid Miller and Tommy Merritt for Commissioner of Agriculture and Ryan Sitton and Wayne Christian for Rail-

road Commissioner. The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans in advance of the upcoming primary runoff election that Election Identification Certificates (EIC) are available at all Texas driver license offices for individuals in need of proper identification required to vote in elections in Texas.

Most residents already have an acceptable form of photo identification needed for voting and will not need or qualify for an EIC. If an applicant already has any of the following documents, they are not eligible to receive an EIC:

 Texas driver license unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

· Texas personal identification card - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

· U.S. passport book or card - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

 Texas concealed handgun license - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

 U.S. Military identification with photo - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

· U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo

To apply for an EIC, applicants must visit a driver license office and complete an Application for Texas Election Certificate (DL-14C).

To qualify for an EIC, an applicant must:

Bring documentation to verify U.S. citizenship and

· Be eligible to vote in Texas (Bring a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application through the Texas Department of Public Safety)

Be a Texas resident

• Be 17 years and 10 months or older

To avoid delays or complications, DPS urges potential applicants to make sure they have the necessary documentation before arriving at the office.

The EIC receipt an individual receives will include their photo and can be used for voting until the permanent card is delivered by mail.


The EIC is free of charge to qualifying applicants and is valid for six years. There is no expiration date for an EIC for citizens 70 years of age or older. The EIC can only be used for the purpose of voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification.



from the USDA Farm Service Agency has been requested for those with livestock and agriculture losses.

Most of the structures in the area were saved and two minor injuries were reported, according to Val Verde Emergency Management.

The fire started as a small brush fire on April 25 in the northern part of Val Verde County, around one mile from the Crockett County line near Crockett County Road 107 and Farm-to-Market Road 1024.

By April 27, the fire grew significantly due to low humidity, gusty winds and hot temperatures. Local and area fire departments, including Ozona, fought the fire. The Texas Forest Service arrived on April 28.

Comstock, Pandale and Juno were the main areas affected by the fire, and FM 1024 was blocked at Comstock due to the number of emergency vehicles traveling

By Friday, May 2, the fire was around 80 percent contained.

The National Weather Service in San Angelo is predicting hot weather this week with temperatures in the upper 80s to lower 90s. A 20-30 percent chance of rain is forecasted for Ozona tonight (May 7).

The weather service also

reported that this January through April has been one of the driest for both Abilene and San Angelo.

Abilene in the fourth driest with 1.77 inches, while normal is 5.67 inches.

San Angelo has only 0.52 inches, the second driest, while normal is 5.20 inches. That means that San Angelo has only 10 percent of normal in the first third of the

The automated weather station in Ozona reported 0.16 inches for the same period. The co-op observer 22 miles southwest of Ozona had 0.26 inches, and another co-op observer 24 miles south southwest had 0.79 inches. Another remote station just south of the Irion/Crockett had 0.59 inches. The normal amount for Ozona is 5.34 inches, according to the NWS in San Angelo.

NWS officials said each vear is different, and the wetter months of May and June and August to October are still ahead of us. The officials also said there is quite a bit of uncertainty in the precipitation outlooks from the Climate Prediction Center for the next 30 days (May) and 90 days (May through July).

The latest U.S. Drough Monitor has 74 percent of the state in moderate to exceptional drought.

Crockett County ranges

from severe to extreme. The seasonal outlook from the National Weather Service's Monthly Drought

Outlook states that the drought will persists or intensify through July.

"With vegetation dryness increasing around the state, we want residents to know ways they can prevent wildfires from starting and how they can protect themselves and their property," said Melanie Spradling, TFS wildland urban interface specialist.

·Do not burn trash or debris when conditions are dry or windy. Unsafe burning of leaves, brush, household trash and other debris is the No. 1 cause of wildfires in Texas.

·The most common cause of wildfires is humans: Careless debris burning, unattended campfires, dumping hot charcoal or hot ashes, parking or driving in dry grass, dragging chains on the road, and welding can all cause fires.





Stripes parent company sells for \$1.8 billion

Susser Holdings Corp, the Corpus Christi. Texas based company that owns Stripes convenience stores and gasoline distribution network, was bought last week by Energy Transfer Partners, L.P. in a deal involving the exchange of stock and cash totaling \$1.8 billion.

The deal, represents a major move by ETP, an east coast natural gas pipeline company, into the Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma markets where Stripes operates 630 convenience stores, including four in Ozona.

In 2012, the company paid more than \$5 billion for approximately 5,000 gas stations owned by Sunoco.

A statement released by both companies stated that the addition of Susser to the Sunoco network broadens Sunoco's geographic footprint by giving it an exceptional base in Texas and the surrounding states.

E.V. "Chip" Bonner Jr., Susser's executive vice president and general counsel, said Stripes customers would see very little change; its service stations still will sell madeto-order Laredo Taco Co. food and also will continue to carry the Stripes name.

What remains unclear is if the sale will result in staff reductions or if Susser's headquarters in Corpus Christi will relocate. A transition team of representatives from Susser, Energy Transfer and Sunoco will work out those and other details in coming months, Bonner said.

published the day the court rendered its decision. "Going forward, natural gas, renewables and nuclear energy must shoulder an even bigger load in order to 'keep the lights on' cheaply and reliably in Texas, and throughout America," the agency further stated, adding, "As a result of today's holding, some coal-fired power plants may be forced to limit or shut down operations."

Supreme Court Justices Antonin Scalia and Clarence Thomas cast the dissenting votes in the 6-2 decision.

The U.S. Clean Air Act requires the EPA to write rules to enforce laws passed by Congress. The Cross-State Air Pollution Rule requires Texas, as an "upwind" state, to reduce sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxide emissions that cross state lines. Such pollutants react in the atmosphere to form fine particles and ground-level ozone and are transported long distances, making it difficult for other states to achieve air quality standards, according to the EPA.

GRADUATION RATE IS NEAR BEST

According to the National Center for Education Statistics "First Look" report released in late April, for the class of 2012, Texas posted a graduation rate of 88 percent, tying with three other states for second highest. Iowa posted a graduation rate of 89 percent while the national average was 80 percent. Texas Education Commis-

sioner Michael Williams lauded the report and noted that Texas' overall graduation rate exceeded the national averages release in both 2011 and 2012.

Williams also pointed out the Texas class of 2012 had the highest graduation rate in the country among African-American students and tied for the highest graduation rates for white and economically disadvantaged students.

ENFORCEMENT RESULT COMES IN

Texas Department of Public Safety on April 28 announced state troopers arrested some 1,374 motorists for driving while intoxicated during the agency's March 7 to March 23 spring break enforcement period.

A Texas Department of Transportation grant allowed increased patrols in high-risk locations during the times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. Furthermore, the DPS re-

ported, stops made during the enforcement period resulted in 18,826 speeding citations, 3,266 seat belt/child safety seat tickets and more than 23,400 other citations, plus 848 fugitive arrests and 713 felony arrests.



ORDER RESTRICTING

This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
