Murr wins primary runoff

drew Murr was the winner in the May 27 Republican **Primary** Runoff



Election for the State Rep. District 53 race.

Murr won with 63.9 percent of the vote to Rob Henneke's 36.1 percent. In Crockett County, Murr won with 77 votes to Henneke's one vote. Murr faces Libertarian B.W. Holk in the November General Election.

Will Hurd won the U.S. House, District 23, race over Francisco "Quico" Canseco. Hurd had 59.2 percent to Canseco's 40.8. Locally, Hurd had 51 votes and Canseco had 19. Hurd faces Democrat incumbent Pete Gallego in November.

In other Republican races, Dan Patrick defeated incumbent David Dewhurst for the Lieutenant Governor's race. Patrick had 63.8 percent to Dewhurst's 36.2 percent. In Crockett County, Dewhurst won with 47 votes to Patrick's 22 votes. Patrick faces Democrat Leticia Van de Putte in November.

Ken Paxton ed Dan Branch for Attorney General, 63.2 percent to 36.8 percent. In Crockett County, Paxton had 33 votes to Branch's 19. Paxton faces Democrat Sam Houston in November.

The Agriculture Commissioner's race, between Sid Miller and Tommy Merritt was too close to call at press time with Miller at 53.5 percent and Merritt at 46.5 percent with half of the precincts reporting. Locally, Miller had 39 votes and Meritt 21.

Ryan Sitton defeated Wayne Christian in the Railroad Commissioner's race for Place 2. Sitton had 59.8 percent and Christian had 40.2 percent. Locally, Christian had 29 and Sitton had 21. Sitton faces Democrat Steve Brown in November.

In the Democratic Primary, David Alameel, 72.3 percent, defeated Kesha Rogers, 27.7 percent, for U.S. Senate. Alameel had 15 votes and Rogers had 12 in Crockett County. Alameel will face Republican incumbent, John Cornyn in November.

Richard "Kinky" Friedman lost to Jim Hogan for Agriculture Commissioner. Friedman had 44.5 percent and Hogan had 55.5 percent. In Crockett County, Friedman had 13 votes and Hogan had 22.

Rain falls on Crockett County

Prayers have been answered, for now.

Crockett County and most of West Texas received much needed rain over the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Rainfall totals for Crockett County varied with nearly 5 inches at Crockett Heights, 4 inches in Ozona and 1-4 inches around the county. Ozona Airport received 4.57 inches.

For the month of May, the NWS in San Angelo stated that Ozona has received 3-5 inches of rain, with the northern part of Crockett County receiving 8-9 inches in areas.

Prior to May, Ozona had

received less than an inch of rainfall for the year. The normal for Ozona from January-April is 5.34 inches.

"May and June are our big months for rain," said Joel Dunn, meteorologist at the National Weather Service of San Angelo. "You have warm

We must also make sure older Americans have means of communication and reliable transportation to medical appointments, the grocery store, a friend's house or church. For more helpful tips, or for questions surrounding elderly care, visit your local Area Agency on Aging Office by visiting www.eldercare.gov or by calling (800) 677-1116.

In Washington, we have much the same type of obligation to our older Americans. Ensuring seniors have access to healthcare, social security,

and other programs is a priority of mine. I will never agree to degradation of services to older Americans. Never.

Congress' obligation to our older Americans is to work together, in bipartisan manner, to meet the commitments our government has made to them. I take this responsibility seriously, and I continue to fight for older Americans in the 23rd District of Texas. If you know of an older constituent in need of assistance with a federal agency, please have them call one of the district offices. In San Antonio,

they can call (210) 927-4592. In Del Rio and Eagle Pass, they can call (830) 488-6600. In El Paso, they can call (915) 872-1066. Recently, the offices helped secure over \$2.5 million in benefits owed to constituents of the district.

During this month, let's all do our part to better enrich the lives of older Americans and keep them and their contributions around for years to come. After all, they've earned it - and we owe it to them.

Big posts at stake in primary election runoffs

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Early voting ended May 23 and Tuesday, May 27, was state primary election runoff day.

Voting records available to the public at the Office of the Secretary of State show that turnout is historically low for mid-term primaries and even lower for primary runoff elections. But what's different about this set of runoffs — and something that should stimulate voter turnout — were the powerful offices at stake.

Tops in that regard was the race for lieutenant governor, the state's second-highestranking executive post. Three of the lieutenant governor's many important duties are picking committee chairs and members, controlling the flow of legislation and shepherding the state budget as a member of the Legislative Budget Board.

Republicans voting in the runoff for lieutenant governor chose between incumbent Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst of Houston and challenger Dan Patrick, a state senator representing northwest Houston. Dewhurst, as lieutenant governor, has presided over the Senate since 2003. Patrick, first elected in 2007, served as chair of the Senate Committee on Education in the 2013 regular session of the Legislature.

The winner will face Leticia Van de Putte of San Antonio, a state senator who ran unopposed in the March Democratic primary. Van de Putte served as a member of the Texas House of Representatives from 1990 to 1999 and has been a member of the Senate since 1999. She joins fellow state Sen. Wendy R. Davis, candidate for governor, on the Democratic ticket. Davis will face Republican

candidate for governor Greg Abbott, current Texas attorney general, in November.

In the Republican runoff for attorney general, the choices were lawyer-legislators Dan Branch of Dallas, a state representative, and Ken Paxton of McKinney, a state senator.

For agriculture commissioner, Republicans chose between former state representatives Sid Miller of Stephenville and Tommy Merritt of Longview.

And, in the race for railroad commissioner, GOP voters chose between former State Rep. Wayne Christian of Center and Ryan Sitton, a Pasadena oil, gas and petrochemical industry consultant.

Democratic voters chose between runoff opponents Dr. David M. Alameel of Dallas and Kesha Rogers of Houston, who are vying to

face incumbent U.S. Sen. John Cornyn on the November ballot. And, for agriculture commissioner, Democrats chose between author-musicianhumorist Richard S. "Kinky" Friedman of Medina and farmer-rancher-insurance agent Jim Hogan of Cleburne. PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 8



As a young boy I could hardly wait for vacation time. Every summer we would go camping and fishing for one to two weeks. We did what many these days call "roughing it" by staying in an old canvas tent! Of course as a young boy I thought I was in paradise. The adventure of it all just consumed me and my brother as well. The funny thing was that even though we enjoyed that tent, when the vacation time was up, we were ready to go home! Why? The tent was only a temporary dwelling place and was never intended to be a permanent home.

In the Great Depression, many families were forced to live in tents for lack of better accommodations. My dad and his family could be included in that group. He would tell me how his mother would sprinkle water on the dirt floor to keep down the dust until it eventually became so hard packed it was like concrete! She would sweep and clean this tent as if it were the grandest home in the world, but even though they took care of it and appreciated the shelter it provided, that tent was never more than a temporary dwelling place.

In his second letter to the church at Corinth, Paul spoke

tentmaker as well. In Chapter five Paul makes the comparison between a tent and our earthly bodies. He speaks of how these earthly bodies we now live in were never intended to be a home, but only a temporary dwelling place, because these tents we call bodies will wear out and die.

Over the last several months this comparison has really hit home with me in a personal way. My sister has been struggling with congestive heart failure and her body is slowly deteriorating. For some this would be a very sorrowful time, but for my family, while we are saddened by her condition, we "...do not sorrow as those who have no hope" (1 Thessalonians 4:13), because we know that God has an eternal home for her prepared especially by Jesus Christ. (John 14:2) How is this possible? My sister has made her reservations!

Jesus said in John 14 that He was going to prepare a place for us and that he would come again and take those who knew the way with Him. What is the Way? Well, Jesus went on to tell us in that same passage that He is the Way. My sister made her reservations when she came to know the Way, by putting her faith in Jesus Christ! So I know that even though she may soon move out of her tent, she will receive an eternal dwelling place that will never "...spoil or fade..." (1 Peter 1:4)

My question for you is; have you made your reservations? Is your new permanent home being prepared for the day your tent wears out? If not, you can make your reservations if you "...openly say, 'Jesus is Lord', and if you believe in your heart that God raised Jesus from death, you will be saved." (Romans 10:9) The sooner you make your reservations the better, because there is going to come a day when the reservations window will close and the Lord will return and only those with reservations will be allowed into God's mansions!

Williams, Crockett County pioneers. Of their six children, she was the only daughter. Her spirit of independence and keen curiosity about the world was evident at an early age as she anxiously awaited summer's barefoot weather and hours outside playing under oak trees with her brothers and friends. She roamed the hills in spring looking for anemones, little wind flowers, their bright colors the first sign of winter's end.

Her wonder about nature brought her pleasure throughout her life. With patient and careful observations, she taught and encouraged many others to enjoy and learn about plants, birds and animals. When Halley's comet was making its appearance, or meteor showers were predicted, she drove into the countryside to find a dark, high hill so as not to miss the show.

As a journalism student in high school, she wrote the news from Ozona for the Standard Times and enjoyed a trip to the Texas Centennial in 1936 with newspaper passes. Later she enjoyed using her writing ability in historical research and wrote many articles for the Crockett County History Book in 1976.

In 1937 Mary graduated as valedictorian of her class at Ozona High School. Later that year, she began her happy marriage of 66 years to Joe L. Clayton and became a ranch wife and later a mother. Like many ranch wives, she developed varied skills: learning to cook on a diesel stove at the Sierra Blanca ranch to feed a trapper and her family, caring for orphaned animals, participating in ranch business, as well as managing a household and children.

One highlight of fun in the late 30's was an occasional overnight train trip from San Angelo to Dallas to dance to Big Band music on the roof top of the Baker Hotel. Music was always a part of her life with many years of piano study, family sing-a-longs, and listening to recordings of the 30's and 40"s and Pete Fountain's jazz. She enjoyed traveling over much of North America, especially to National Parks, by car with her family. In retirement years, she and her husband spent winters in southern Texas where she frequented the many wildlife refuges and sharpened her birding skills. Mary loved the land. She enjoyed hours spent at the ranch, alone and with others. She delighted many older friends by bringing them to see abundant wildflowers in spring. Gardening was also a great pleasure, and many enjoyed her yard's beauty.

She gave her talents, time, and resources to help her community, family, and friends. She and her husband aided several families in acquiring their own homes. Mary led Girl Scout troops for ten-year-olds for several years and brought the girls to the country to enjoy and learn about nature. She helped nieces and nephews research term papers, spent time serving on numerous boards and committees in the community while also caring for her immediate and extended families. With her husband, she encouraged travel and the enjoyment of art, music, and reading for many young people and generously supported educational pursuits. The couple established a scholarship fund at West Texas Boys Ranch to encourage students to pursue college or trade school. We remember with gratitude that she showed us to stay aware and curious and see the wonders of nature in each day. Mary Clayton leaves us with the memory of a kind, intelligent, loving and generous woman who showed us by her example and principles how to treat others and how to live our lives.

She is survived by her two children, Joe Clayton, Jr. and wife, Margaret of Mills County; Cheryl Clayton of Crockett County; two grandchildren, Catherine Prince, and husband Tim, and their two children, Caroline and Lauren of Birmingham, Alabama, and Christopher and Cindie Clayton of Brownwood and their two children, Ali and Claire; a sister-in-law, Jeanie Williams; and numerous nieces and nephews, cousins and friends.

In lieu of flowers, the family requests memorials be sent to the Joe Clayton Scholarship Fund at West Texas Boy's Ranch or a charity of choice.





A committee is being sought to review the CCCC-SD Drug Testing Policy.

At the May 21 school board meeting, Superintendent Raul Chavarria said the district is looking to form a committee to review the district's current drug testing policy and update the policy.

Board members said the committee would consist of teachers, administrators, county officials, parents, juvenile probation officials and sheriff's department officials.

Chavarria said the committee would explore options with drug testing, which may include testing all students.

Currently, the district's policy requires random drug testing of any student in grades 7-12 who chose to participate in any school-sponsored extracurricular activity.

Random tests are conducted on as many as 20 dates throughout the school year, with no less than 10 percent and no more than 20 percent of the students participating in the program selected for each random test date.

"I really want us to bear down. We need to send a message to all students. We all agree that if we have a drug situation going on, we need to make our best efforts to stamp this out as soon as possible," said Orlando DeHoyos, board vice president. "If we're going to do this, whatever kid violates whatever policy we set,

it doesn't matter. Board member Roland DeHoyos said he had talked with parents in Ozona and received unanimous recommendations of all students taking drug tests.

"We need to get to the bottom of this and we need to start it here. We don't need this," said Roland De-Hoyos. "The parents I have talked to said 'we don't want it, we don't need it, do whatever you have to do.'

Chavarria said there are options the committee can explore, such as issuing parking permits and requiring student that park to be drug tested.

He also said the committee will review the policy if a student tests positive, and what measures can be taken to help those students that have issues.

"Peer pressure is huge. Our goal is to give as many students that opportunity to say no," Chavarria said.

RESIGNATIONS AND **NEW TEACHERS HIRED**

The board unanimously approved the resignations of teachers Alison and Erik Thormaehlen, as well as the retirement of Mary Anne Deaton and Nina Martinez.

The board also unanimously approved the hiring of Kim Davis as pre-k and PPCD teacher and Daphnee Peterson for seventh grade English.

Davis is a University of Texas at the Permian Basin graduate and has done her student teaching in Ozona.

Peterson is from Boerne and a graduate from Texas A&M University.

SHOP SAFETY Chavarria told the board that he is still in discussion on the career and technology shop safety.

At last month's meeting, Donnie Lee spoke to the board about his son being injured in an accident in the OHS shop class. Chavarria said he has

talked further with Lee, and that Lee is willing to assist on seeking donations for better or newer equipment.

Chavarria also said he is looking at having a safety inspector come in to make the shop safer.

One of the other issues with the shop class has been overcrowding.

Chavarria said school

Missing Cibolo man dies in vehicle accident

A man family members and New Braunfels police have been searching for nearly a week died Friday, May 23, in a fatal crash between Big Lake and Ozona, officials said.

William Patrick Abel, 39, died at the scene of a crash on Texas Highway 137 after his 2004 Chevrolet Silverado hit a Peterbilt semi-truck head-on about 20 miles south of Big Lake around 2:30 p.m. Friday, an official with the Texas Department of Public Safety said.

Abel, a Cibolo resident. had been southbound on the highway when his truck crossed the center line while driving around a slight curve. The driver of the semi-truck was not injured, DPS said.

Police had been searching for Abel since May 17 after he failed to show up for his daughter's wedding in New



DUNCAN IS TECH'S FINALIST

Texas Tech Board of Regents on May 19 announced state Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, as the sole finalist for chancellor of the Texas Tech University System. He is expected to resign from the Texas Senate and start in his new capacity on July 1.

As chancellor, Duncan will serve as chief executive officer and will report to the system's board of regents. Current Chancellor Kent Hance reportedly will become chancellor emeritus at that time.

Duncan, 60, was born in Lubbock, grew up in Vernon, and earned his bachelor's degree and law degree from Texas Tech. He was elected to the House in 1992 and in 1996 won a special election to the Senate.

PERRY WRITES TO PRESIDENT

Gov. Rick Perry, who ran for president in 2012 and may run for president again in 2016, on May 19 posted an 873-word letter he signed and sent to President Obama about energy and the econo-

"You reassured the Ameri-

ment to an all-of-the-above energy strategy to bring our nation closer to energy independence while creating needed jobs," Perry wrote, and then suggested that the president take a "Texas approach" to create jobs and stimulate the nation's economy by switching to a less-regulated strategy. That strategy would include such actions as stepping up coal-burning power plant capacities, opening the Keystone XL pipeline and increasing oil and gas operations on land and offshore.







ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

The Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Crockett County, Texas, that outdoor burning is restricted in Crockett County for 30 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statues. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting or agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, Natural Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station, or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
