Ozona man dies in crash

An Ozona man died last week in a multiple car a crash



five SAMMY GOODLOE miles south of Barnhart on State Highway 163.

Sammy Lee Goodloe, 36, was pronounced dead at the scene by Crockett County Justice of the Peace Evelyn Lozano, according to a report from the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Goodloe was traveling north on State Highway 163 when his 2014 Dodge Ram Pickup crossed into the southbound lane and struck a 2006 International Truck Tractor pulling a Semi-Trailer full of sand, the report stated.

The driver of the 18-wheeler, Carlos D. Calvillo, 31, of Austin, attempted to steer right to avoid the oncoming truck driven by Goodloe, but was unable to avoid the crash, the report stated.

Goodloe's truck came to rest on the road, while the 18-wheeler continued south and came to rest just off the west side of State Highway 163.

The semi-trailer, full of sand, came to rest in the southbound lane. A short time later a third vehicle, traveling south on the highway, struck the trailer causing a second crash.

Calvillo and the driver of the third vehi-

Texas seen as 'electoral wasteland'

oter turnout in Texas is indisputably awful. The March primaries drew 1.9 million, with only 560,033 voting in the Democratic contest and the rest voting in the more competitive Republican races. According to the Texas secretary of state's office, there were 18.9 million adults in the state in March, and 13.6 million of them were registered to vote.

Texans did even worse in the runoff last month. Only 951,461 voted — 201,008 in the Democratic primary.

"It is kind of an electoral wasteland — not a lot of competition, not a lot of motivation for the parties to get out and mobilize," said Michael P. Mc-Donald, associate professor of government and politics at George Mason University. "If there is no battle, they just sit back and become

weak and flabby." In years when voters are not driven to the polls by presidential races - those always inflate the numbers - Texas is one of the worst places in the country for vot-

er turnout and engagement. In 2010, 32.1 percent of the state's eligible adults vot ed in the general election, according to the United States Elections Project maintained by McDonald. Only one place was worst: the District of Columbia, with 28.9 percent. The national rate was 41 percent - still lousy, but much better than in Texas. Minnesota was at the head of the class that year, turning out 55.4 percent of its eligible

population. By the Elections Project's calculation, 15.5 million Texans were eligible to vote that year. Fewer were registered to vote, but the state had that many adults who were both citizens and non-felons (along with nearly three million adults who were not eligible). Most of them could have voted if they had wanted to vote.

Competition motivates voters, McDonald said: "They will think their votes matter, and the campaigns will work hard to get people to vote."

While the numbers change a little bit in presidential years, Texas is still at the back of the pack. In 2012, 49.7 percent of its eligible adults turned out. The national rate was 58.2 percent. Those Minnesota voters maintained their bragging rights, with 75.7 percent of eligible adults casting ballots. Texas was not at the bottom, but it was in the vicinity of the worst, leading only Hawaii,

the primaries — in which the turnout has been much lower than in the general election. Most races have been decided by the time the November vot-

ers tune in. Redistricting is one reason. Most districts are drawn to favor one party or another, meaning that the winner of the Democratic or Republican primary will win in November unless they make a terrible mistake and also have an opponent on the general election ballot. Texas has 36 congressional seats. In seven of them, the Republican candidate has no Democratic opponent. In six, the Democratic candidate has no Republican opponent. Only one of the remaining seats the 23rd Congress nal District (which includes Crockett County), is considered winnable by either major party in November. The overall level of competition is similar in the 31-member Texas Senate and in the

150-member Texas House. Statewide, the problem also has to do with the Republican Party's long winning streak in Texas. Like a long spell of anything rain, San Antonio Spurs wins, drought - it becomes more and more difficult to imagine a different result. It begins to feel as if only one outcome is possible.

That is also hard to sell to an unmotivated voter, but it is possible. Look at the jump in turnout in presidential years, with their wallto-wall news coverage and advertising. It looks like a battle, and a close one, and

it draws people to the polls. It might not change the results. The Republican ticket featuring Mitt Romney and Paul Ryan received 57.2 percent of the vote in Texas in 2012. Republican Gov. Rick Perry got 55.1 percent in his re-election bid in 2010. That presidential race - the noisier of the two - drew an extra three million Texans to

the polls. It looked like a race.

Magic Words

At the tender age of 21 I was hired to be a field editor for a livestock paper and part of my job was to sell and write ad copy, even though I'd never written as much as a classified ad before in my life. It was like asking a butcher to do brain surgery. These days, when everything is a commercial, there are people who make a living studying bold letters, reverses and borders and their impact on consumers. When I was cutting my advertising teeth I had no idea what any of these things were. I thought Geneva and Helvetica were cities in Switzerland. I didn't know a typeface from a whiteface.

Writing ads was good training to become a writer and I quickly learned how one little word could make a BIG difference, such as the time I wrote "loves with" instead of "lives with" in referring to one man's cattle.

I learned through trial and error and the memos I got from the publisher. He told me the six things you need in every ad but I never could remember what they were. That's why some of my bull sale ads failed to mention where the sale was, and I may have even left off the sale date a time or two. I recall one stinging memo chastising me for failing to mention the breed being sold, which was a big deal in 1973 because cattlemen were experimenting with some two dozen different breeds at the time. But I thought the fact the picture in the offending ad was a Hereford and the name of the ranch was Peterson

some other big firm and to my knowledge none of them ever got sued. Because we've made so much genetic progress ads are very different now than they were 40 years ago. Today in ads you'll see the same great bulls used artificially with their photo and pertinent statistics. Back when I began writing ads a typical ad might feature some real "famous" herd sire you never heard of that was bought out of an all breed bull sale, bred in the

These days many of the big outfits hire agencies to compose their ads but 40 years ago only pharmaceutical firms could afford that luxury. I'm still amazed how many bull breeders stole slogans copyrighted by Ford, Pepsi, Pillsbury, or

his "complete herd dispersal" every year. You never know what will attract buyers and so I often asked ranchers why they showed up to a particular sale. I asked one volume buyer how he ended up buying 20 of the worst bulls ever. "Was it the ad copy, the photos, or the records of the bulls?' "No," he said as he rubbed his belly, one used-up old herd sire, purchased out

wasn't enough to bring him back because he never showed his face at that seller's auction again. Reminding us all that sometimes a good ad will only make a bad product fail faster.

Senate panel addresses slowness of VA care

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — On June 12, the state Senate Committee on Veteran Affairs and Military Installations met in Pasadena, Texas, to get input from military veterans in the wake of the records falsification scandal at U.S. Veterans Affairs-run facilities.

Also on June 12, Gov. Rick Perry recommended that slow service at VA facilities be remedied by allowing veterans to get health care needs met at non-VA facilities. Several health care provider groups responded, expressing interest in expanding health care options to veterans, the governor's office stated.

Sen. Leticia Van de Putte, D-San Antonio, who chairs the Senate committee, has recommended the creation of a hotline "to help Texas veterans deal with long wait times and VA bureaucracy."

After the hearing in Pasadena, Van de Putte stated, "While our reality is that the VA is a federally run and funded agency that serves Texas residents, that does not mean that Texas cannot ensure our veterans are taken care of in the honorable way they deserve and have earned. Ultimately, Washington needs to fix the VA's problems, but in the meantime, Texas will focus on the immediate crisis: Getting medical care to our heroes."

EPA PLAN TO BE REVIEWED

Federal carbon emissions rules proposed last month will be reviewed by the Texas House Committee on Environmental Regulation, Speaker Joe Straus said June 11.

The Obama administration's plan, to be administered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, would reduce greenhouse gas emissions nationally by 30 percent, as compared to 2005 levels,

by 2030. Because individual states may have to reduce more than 30 percent in order for the country as a whole to meet that threshold, Texas faces a reduction of 39 per-

cent, Straus said. "It's important for legislators to understand the potential impact of this federal mandate, not only on the cost and availability of electricity, but also on the broader Texas economy," Straus said. "The committee's work will guide the House's approach to this issue in next year's legislative session and the seriousness of these proposed rules demands that we start working on that approach soon."

"The House will work with a range of stakeholders to make sure that Texas responds to these regulations in a prudent and responsible way," Straus added.






Local media named to honor roll

In CD-23, advantages are seen for both Gallego and Hurd

EL PASO — A San Antonio native and former CIA agent is trying to break through in the only region in this Republican state where congressional Democrats hold a steady grip: Texas' border with Mexico.

But predicting whether Will Hurd, who lost a Republican primary bid for the same seat four years ago, will prevail against U.S. Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, is as tasking as guessing where someone in this sprawling tossup district resides.

The 23rd Congressional District includes almost 25 percent of the Lone Star State's land, all or a part of 29 counties (including Crockett County), two time zones, about 800 miles of border and two major population centers: El Paso and Bexar counties. It is also a seat that has changed hands twice in two general election contests, and it is one of only nine congressional districts in which voters favored Mitt Romney over President Obama in 2012 but elected a Democrat to Congress.

"I learned long ago you run unopposed or you run scared," said Gallego, 52, who is in his first term in Congress after serving 11 terms in the Texas House. He added, "By the nature of the district, it is a competitive race."

A campaign spokesman for Hurd, 36, said that the candidate was not available for an interview. But Hurd has said that the district is tired of career politicians and that the House could benefit from his credentials. "There is nobody in the 435 members with my experience in intelligence and national security," Hurd told The Big Bend Sentinel in May.

Hurd lost the 2010 primary election to Francisco "Quico" Canseco, who then defeated U.S. Rep. Ciro Rodriguez. a Democrat, by about 5 percentage points. Canseco lost to Gallego in the 2012 general election by a similar margin. In a rematch, Hurd upended Canseco in the May runoff.

Colin Strother, a Democratic strategist who worked for U.S. Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-Laredo, in the district before its boundaries were redrawn, said that Hurd's positions align with Tea Party values. Though that could be a benefit for Republicans in most of the state, it would work against Hurd in his congressional bid, Strother said. He cited Gallego's membership in the Blue Dog Coalition, which bills itself as representing the center of the U.S. House.

"Pete has been very supportive of pro-economic policies, the oil and gas industry in particular, which provides a lot of jobs in that district," he said. "The current political environment with the current anti-Hispanic, anti-immigrant — be they legal or undocumented — rhetoric from the Republican Party, combined with who the Tea Party chose to face him, is really advantageous for Pete."

Hurd, according to his campaign website, does not stray far on similar issues, however. He also supports "decreasing the regulatory burdens facing those creating and expanding businesses" and "protecting our economic future by balancing our budget and simplifying our tax code."

Matt Mackowiak, a Republican strategist worked as a press secretary for Kay Bailey Hutchison, a former U.S. senator, said what Hurd had in his corner was the lack of faith voters have in their elected officials in Washington.

"Gallego is an incumbent, and being an incumbent at this time when congressional approval ratings are so low in

a district like this, it's a dangerous place to be in," he said.

Strother said the state Republican Party's newly adopted platform could hurt Hurd in the border district, though Strother added it might not be easy for Democrats to directly tie Hurd to it. That platform favors eliminating in-state tuition rates for undocumented immigrants and banning so-called sanctuary cities, local governments that prevent local law enforcement from enforcing federal immigration laws. It also eliminated a call for a national guestworker program.

Mackowiak said labeling every Republican as an extremist is an easy plot for Democrats seeking to persuade Hispanics to vote for a

Hurd "probably had no role in how the platform was developed. It was developed by activists," Mackowiak said. an oversimplification in that Republicans are going back to Tea Party and hardline."

Although the platform is nonbinding, Gallego said that he believed district voters may expect Hurd to distance himself from his Republican colleagues who supported the immigration plank.

"That platform is a statement of principles that its candidates are expected to abide by," he said. "I think it becomes incumbent upon a candidate to essentially disavow some of the things that are in that party platform.

Otherwise I think the assumption is that you are a true believer." On his site, Hurd talks about "making border security, countering drug traffickers and fighting cyber criminals a national intelligence priority."

Mackowiak said a party platform could be "a headache" but added that it has never decided a race. Instead, Hurd's success could hinge on how successful he is in reaching out to potential voters.

"The question is going to be: Are the Republicans going to come in for Hurd?" Mackowiak said. "He's less well-"I think there is a little bit of known and wasn't expected to win his primary. It's going to take some time to reintroduce do about his ethnicity. himself."

Another issue is that Gallego can use his Hispanic heritage in the border district as an advantage.

Republicans have made a concerted effort to attract Hispanics, who have traditionally voted for Democrats, and convince them that the Republican Party's positions on abortion and taxes are in step with their own beliefs. The district is about 69 percent Hispanic, according to the Texas Legislative Council's 2012 data.

"I am sure he's going to do a number of 'wink, wink, he's not Hispanic' efforts, but we'll see how that plays out," Mackowiak said, adding that Hurd can win those independent voters over with some effort. "If you get to meet Will, you see he's an impressive young guy, he's got good experience, he's very genuine, he wants to listen."

Gallego said he does not know how that will play into his strategy, if at all. But he joked that there was nothing he could

UIL adopts cross-country rule, adds cheerleading, may move state basketball

The University Interscholastic League, which governs public-school athletic competition in Texas, adopted a new state-qualifying format for cross country at its annual Legislative Council meeting that began June 10 in Austin.

The top four teams in each of the four regions, and within each of the six classifications, will advance to the UIL Cross Country State Championships held annually in Round Rock.

Before the rule change, implemented through a referendum ballot of Texas superintendents, only the top three regional finishers qualified for the state meet.

The UIL rejected proposals for adding bowling and water polo as sanctioned sports, and shot down a mercy rule in 11-man football.

The UIL took no action on a proposal for instant replay in football, meaning it was at least somewhat open to the idea.

"There wasn't an indication that we're ready to do that yet," UIL spokesperson Kate Hector said. "We're going to keep an eye on it."

The UIL Legislative Council cleared the way June 11 for officials to work on a deal to move the boys' and girls' basketball championships to the Alamodome in San Antonio next year.

UIL officials have been concerned in recent years about the growth of the South By Southwest festival, making it difficult to hold the tournament events on consecutive weekends in

early March.

"It's a bittersweet feeling having to move it," said Hector, relaying the sentiment expressed by UIL executive director Charles Breithaupt. "We were faced with the option of changing dates or changing locations to provide some relief for fans and schools and providing the best event we can for them."

The first state championship was held in Austin in 1921, when El Paso beat San Antonio for the boys' title. The first girls' tournament was in 1951.

There are now 48 teams - four in each of six divisions for boys and girls. The event has been held on the home court of the Texas Longhorns.

The council also voted to create competitive cheerleading as a pilot program in 2015-16. Any continuation of the pilot program will require another vote.

A UIL committee approved a pilot program that would give district champions in Class 6A, the state's highest classification, a home game in the first round of the playoffs.

According to the proposal on the UIL website, the Texas Medical Association asked the UIL to add cheerleading in an attempt to increase safety training and awareness within the activity.

If approved in October, the plan would be in effect for the 2015 season.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service graduates lifetime leaders

COLLEGE STATION -Lawyers, farmers, bankers, ranchers and agriculture-related industry representatives banded together for two years with one aim: learn to be leaders. Their intensive study of agriculture worldwide culminated this month when their Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership XIII class graduated at a ceremony in College Station.

"The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service administers the program known as TALL, which focuses on local, state, national and international issues to help ensure effective understanding and encourage positive action that will advance the agriculture industry," said Dr. Jim Mazurkiewicz, program director.

This class, the 13th since

the program started, traveled extensively, including a trip to Brazil to learn about the impact of agriculture worldwide.

"TALL creates leaders in agriculture by exposing participants to all segments of the industry – locally, nationally and internationally. We develop a network with other participants and those who generously host us during visits to realize opportunities where we can positively affect how we, as agriculturalists, will feed and clothe the world," said Kelley Sulli-

van of Houston. 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

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
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

The influx of child immigrants has so overwhelmed the U.S. Border Patrol that federal agents are devoting time and resources to the humanitarian aspects of the influx, and are not available to secure the border and successfully stop criminal activity," Abbott stated in a news release.

A sentence in the letter explains: "The \$30 million requested is only two percent of the amount of aid the President is asking Congress to appropriate in temporary aid to deal with the consequences of the porous border."

DROUGHT STATUS IS RENEWED

Gov. Perry on June 9 extended by 30 days the emergency disaster proclamation he initiated on July 5, 2011. The proclamation certifies that exceptional drought conditions pose a threat of imminent disaster in 166 of the state's 254 counties. "All rules and regulations that may inhibit or prevent prompt response to this threat are suspended for the duration of the state of disaster," as stated in the

SALES TAX REVENUE

GOES UP State sales tax revenue in May was \$2.45 billion, up 8.5 percent compared to May 2013, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced June 11.

Retail and wholesale trade sectors, the oil and natural gas mining sector and the services sector led the growth, Combs said. The comptroller will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their June local sales tax allocations totaling \$621.5 million, up 11.6 percent compared to June 2013.

"This marks the 50th consecutive month of increased state sales tax revenues, and brings the fiscal year-to-date growth to 5.4 percent," she noted.

TOLL BILLING CHANGES TO COME

TxTag billing services will have "new and improved account access and payment options" for toll road users, Texas Department of Transportation announced June 9. "The new system is expected to be fully implemented by mid-summer," TxDOT stated.

Texans can use online driver license services, mega centers this summer

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is encouraging residents to beat the summer rush at driver license offices across the state by renewing their license or identification

card early or online. The summer months are typically one of the busiest times of year at driver license offices, and many eligible Texans can skip the trip to the office completely via online renewal of their license. identification card or change of address at Texas.gov.

"With students and families out of school or off work, Texas driver license offices tend to be especially busy during the summer months," said DPS Director Steven Mc-Craw. "Many Texans are eligible to take advantage of our customer-convenient options for online and phone renewal of licenses and identification cards, and are encouraged to visit high-capacity driver license mega centers in metropolitan areas if needed."

If a trip to a driver license office is necessary, customers in the major metro areas should visit mega centers in their area.

Located in the Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio metropolitan areas, driver license mega centers offer high-capacity facilities and technology designed to improve efficiency and customer service.

Mega centers feature an innovative queuing system that offers customers the convenient option to reserve a spot in line before going to the office.

Customers can virtually enter the line via cell phone, online or using a land line.

To be eligible to renew online, the card holder must be a U.S. citizen and the expiration date on the card must be within one year.

When the card is renewed, the expiration date on the new card will be six years after the current card's expiration date, whether customers renew early or not.

Additionally, in order to renew online, the card cannot have been expired for more

than two years. Requirements for renewing online are available at Texas.gov, the official web-

site of the State of Texas. Customers can also renew by phone at 1-866-357-3639. The eligibility requirements for phone renewal are the same as for online renewal. The fee is the same for online, in-person and telephone

renewals. Licenses must be renewed in person every 12 years, so an updated photo can be taken and eyesight can be tested.

If residents need to come into the office to renew, they can do so within one year prior to the expiration date, which means they can pick a time that is convenient for their schedule.

Customers may obtain a replacement driver license or identification card online if they are able to provide the 20 character code on the front of their current license or card.

Visit the DPS website to make sure you have the proper paperwork (including documents needed for residency requirements) before making the trip to the office: http:// www.dps.texas.gov/DriverLicense/ApplyforLicense.htm.

Many offices require online scheduling in order to obtain an appointment for a driving test. To see if an office near you offers online scheduling, visit www.dps. texas.gov/administration/ driver_licensing_control/ rolodex/search.asp.


