

Age and condition are no excuse for crime, Ignorance and self-will are the causes of most violations of law. Even poverty does not justify a man or woman to rob, or to enterinto unlawful commerce.

It never pays, even to violate an unreasonable law, Such laws are not done away with by that method. Enlightenment brings about better conditions, ignorance and crime never. 

PASTURING GEESE ON CLEAN RANGE

As General Rule Fowls Are that should appeal to every editor Given Freedom of Field.

The raising of geese has not been specialized like duck raising, for reason that geese secure most of their feed by grazing. For this State, we are just as much Texans reason, geese are raised on most farms in comparatively small flocks. rate of 60 head to an acre, but, as a general rule they are given free range. This is satisfactory so long as they are not numerous. How ever, if a large flock of geese is pastured on the regular pasture the live stock will not relish the pasture on account of the goose manure on the grass. Ordinarily, a number of geese raised on any one farm are not numerous enough to cause any trouble from this source.

Geese do not require a great deal of attention. After the first two weeks they are able to look after themselves if given a good range. The principal food of geese is grass, supplemented by insects and other If suitlow forms of animal life. able range is not accessible it is not advisable to go into geese rais-

Houses that will protect the geese from rains in summer and from snow, cold winds and dampness in winter are the only essentials from the housing standpoint. Low, open front sheds are often used for this purpose. Care should be taken to see that the interior of the house is dry at all times. Geese like to should have dry places to roost or they will contract rheumatism. The floor of such houses should be of earth. They should be covered with straw and renewed often enough so that it will be dry. A thin coating of sand often proves helpful in

keeping the house dry.

This is more true of the females than of Occasionally yearling geese will produce fertile eggs, but they cannot be depended upon. Small, undersized geese should not be used for breeding purposes. On the other hand, extra large, coarse geese are not as satisfactory as those of full development, but not so coarse. With most breeds the gander will mate from three to four geese.

Ohio Station Advocates

All-Mash Chick Ration

The rearing of chicks to maturity on all-mash ration is a rather new venture in poultry keeping. and we shall have to take the word of those who have tried it as to its This system has been developed and advocated by the Ohio agricultural experiment station, at the method successful on their experimental farm and equally so in the hands of other poultrymen of the state. Some other stations, where it has been tried, discount these claims somewhat. There is no question as to the attractiveness of the plan and the results at the Ohio station should be sufficient to

give warrant for trying it out. Those who have followed the teaching of poultry experts over a considerable period of years have learned that there is little that can be considered as absolutely fixed, even in the seeming fundamental principles of feeding and care. Revolutionary findings are apt at any time to upset long accepted prac-The all-mash ration should not have scratch grains added to it. since it combines in itself both the scratch and the mash and the addition of more scratch grain would unbalance it. That is, it would change the proportion of protein foods to the other ingredients and presumably lessen its value. An all-mash should be more coursely ground than other mashes, to make it more palatable.

Electric Brooders Are

Clean and Convenient The New York experiment station found electric brooders very satisfactory except in extremely cold weather, when this type of heat did not warm up the space in the house away from the brooder. Like electric incubators, brooders heated by electricity are clean, easy

to regulate and very convenient.

Individual farm light plants ex tend the advantages of this electrical equipment to farms which are not located on an electric "high line." Because many farm plants are equipped with both generator and battery power, the supply of current for the incubator or brooder is constant and reliable.

In Case of Roup

Should any of your flock begin to show symptoms of roup, no time should be lost in starting measures to prevent further spread. houses, pens and runs should be thoroughly cleaned and sprayed with a strong solution of a good coal tar dip and disinfectant. 



Various Good Things

WHEN possible to obtain it, buy the unpolished rice, it is much more wholesome and better flavored. The wild rice grown in our northern marshes is an especial delicacy, but its price is pro-hibitive for general use.

Rice Delight.-Take one cupful of cooled rice, mix with one cupful of sugar. Drain a can of sliced or cubed pineapple from the liquor, using one cupful, add the rice with a little salt and fold in one cup ful of heavy cream, whipped, sweetened and flavored. Garnish with strips of pineapple or the cubes rolled in chopped mint leaves.

Old-Fashioned Sponge Cake.—

Take eight eggs, separate the whites and yolks. Beat the yolks 25 min-utes, add one cupful of sugar, beat ing constantly, the grated rind of half a lemon with its juice, then fold in two cupfuls of flour sifted five times before measuring; fold the stiffly beaten whites into the dough and bake in a moderate oven.

Strawberry Pic.—Bake a rich pas-try shell on the bottom of a pan. Cool and fill with sliced strawberries well mixed with sugar and one-fourth cupful of orange juice, all well chilled before filling the pie. Top with whipped cream.

Snowballs.—Take one cupful each

of sugar and butter, add one cupful of pasteurized cheese grated, one egg, two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice and four teaspoonfuls of bak-ing powder with three and one haif supfuls of flour. Roll in balls the size of a wainut and bake in a slow oven (300 degrees) for fifteen minutes. Dip into leing and
