## A new school year begins

It was an upbeat and smooth start to the school year Monday for Ozona students, teachers and staff.

Enrollment for the district was 850 on the first day. This is an increase of 29 students from this time last year.

Ozona Elementary had 470 students, which is 38 students more than last year. Breakdown by grade: EE 2; Pre-K 59; Kindergarten 61; First Grade 81; Second 66; Third 74; Fourth 58 and Fifth 69.

OES had an enrollment of 446 at the end of the 2013-2014 school year.

Superintendent Raul Chavarria said they are going to try and keep classes to 22 students to one teacher.

"You never know until they get here. It's a great problem to have," Chavarria said. "We knew there was going to be a big class of first and second grade and it may still grow."

OES Principal Janina Savala said they also welcomed a large group of pre-k and kindergarten students to the campus.

"It was great seeing our returning students as they were all ready to meet their teachers. There was a lot of excitement in the hallways and I would like to extend a welcoming invitation to all our parents throughout the year," Savala said.

Chavarria said OES had a full house at the first day parent meeting.

"We got off to a great start on all three campuses. I believe that we had more

nervous and anxious parents than we did kids," Chavarria said. "It is a blessing to see all of the parent involvement, and we would like to continue that positive relationship."

New release times for OES are pre-k at 2:45 p.m., kindergarten and first grade at 3 p.m. and second, third, fourth and fifth at 3:15 p.m.

OMS had 171 students, 13 more than last year.

OMS Principal Tammy McWilliams said the campus celebrated their great test scores from last year and are looking ahead to doing even better this year.

"We are all undefeated today - perfect attendance and straight A's. The teachers and staff have prepared lessons and class rooms for our students, they are ready to help in any way they can. The students are set-up for success and we are here to help them achieve great things in

the 2014-2015 school year," McWilliams said. "We want to remind parents that attendance is important to student success, dress for success each day and keep cell phones turned off. We are ready for a great year."

OHS had 209, 22 less than last year.

At OHS students started the day with an assembly in the auditorium.

"I thought it went pretty smooth. Students and staff were great," said OHS Principal Ronny Clayton.

## Ice bucket challenge, a genius idea

This weekend I added my name to very long list of people who have taken the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge.

For me, it was a no-brainer when two of my friends challenged me. Millions of people, including celebrities, politicians and people in your hometown have participated in this event.

In case you are living under a rock, the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge to raise awareness for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), the lethal neurodegenerative disorder also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. The original idea was that when the gauntlet was thrown down in the ice bucket challenge, you either need to give \$100 to ALS or dump ice water on your head. Most people seem to be opting to both donate and get soaked, posting the videos on social media.

Dumping cold water on your head for a good cause is not something new. Earlier this year, The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation popularized the "Cold Water Challenge" to raise funds.

The ALS phenomenon was originally started by friends of former Boston College baseball player Peter Frates. Peter is 29 years old and living with ALS. He spends his days in a wheelchair with a machine helping him communicate with his wife and family.

According to the ALS Association, as many as 30,000 Americans have the disease at any given time. Once diagnosed, the average ALS patient lives between two and five years.

When Peter's friends started dumping ice and cold water on their heads for ALS, and posting it to social media, then it started to catch on.

Peter's Facebook page is full of people who have taken the challenge. You can even watch Peter take the challenge.

In Ozona, I have seen my friends, school teachers, elected officials and whole companies take the challenge. Some of them are on the Stockman Facebook page, including mine.

Along with success, come those that criticize. I have seen people on Facebook complaining that people are doing the challenge and don't realize what ALS is, or they are not donating. Pro-life supporters are

criticizing the ALS Association because it uses embryonic stem cells in their research. Celebrity Pamela Anderson has refused to take part because of the use of animal experimentation in ALS research. There are also those who have been hurt

doing to challenge. I believe that the ALS Association did not intend the challenge to be one that is harmful to people. What's so great about this challenge is that anyone can participate. All you need is a cell phone with a video recorder, a friend to record you and a bucket of water. My dad videoed mine and mom dumped me with water, not too hard.

It also gets people thinking about donating to charity. As of Monday, Aug. 25, the ALS Association has received \$79.7 million in donations compared to \$2.5 million during the same time period last year (July 29-Aug. 25). These donations have come from existing donors and 1.7 million new donors to the association.

Wow! That's a lot of money for nothing more than dumping ice and water on your head and clicking on the ALS website to donate. To me the challenge just shows how powerful social media is and how the world is changing in where we get news and information.

I think the idea is genius. I agree with a friend of mine that it's no different than the West Texas Rehab Telethon, American Cancer Society's Relay for Life, Race for the Cure, Jump Rope for Heart, Trick or Treat for UNICEF or the million other charity fundraisers that are out there. Those organizations could take a lesson from this.

For people living with ALS, the number of donations coming in gives them hope. Hope that eventually there will be a cure.

So, if you're challenged and don't feel like dumping ice or water on your head, then make a donation. All you have to do is go to www.ALSA.org.

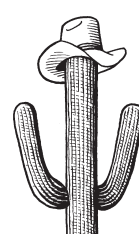

Although he'd much prefer that you call him an "American Doctor" because he was born in this country and has never owed his allegiance to anywhere else on earth but the good old USA. He'd be the first to tell you, there's no better place.

He's a great person, an even better surgeon, and has saved more American lives than filter-tipped cigarettes. He has few vices, the worst of which is baseball. He's crazy about the game and can often be seen wearing a baseball cap on crooked and a Cubs jacket over the green scrubs he wears for surgery. ## County processes governor after felony indictment

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry on Aug. 20 walked the block and a half from the Governor's Mansion to the Travis County Courthouse, presented himself for arraignment by a state district judge and routine booking procedures, spoke at a five-minute press conference and left.

Perry was indicted on Aug. 15 by a Travis County grand jury on felony charges of abuse of official capacity and coercion of a public servant. Perry entered a plea of not guilty to either charge.

The charges stem from the governor's veto of the Public Integrity Unit's 2014-2015 budget in June 2013. The 35-employee unit, which serves as the state's ethics-investigating body, is the direction of Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmburg. Perry said he would veto the agency's budget unless Lehmburg resigned from her elected office.

Lehmburg was arrested in Austin for drunken driving in April 2013. Photographs and video recordings of her condition immediately before, during and after her arrest were widely disseminated. She served a short jail sentence, publicly apologized, underwent counseling, returned to her post, and contrary to the governor's wishes, refused to resign. Perry reacted with a line-item veto of legislatively approved funding for the Public Integrity Unit (\$7.5 million) in the state's 2014-2015 general appropriations act.

Perry assembled a legal defense team and called the charges baseless. Concerns about the cost of a taxpayer-funded defense soon arose and Perry supporters said private donations were being raised in lieu of public funding.

### DWI PATROLS TO INCREASE

Texas Department of Public Safety on Aug. 15 announced the planned increase of DWI patrols through Sept. 2. Labor Day is Monday, Sept. 1.

DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. Enhanced patrols targeting impaired drivers are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation.

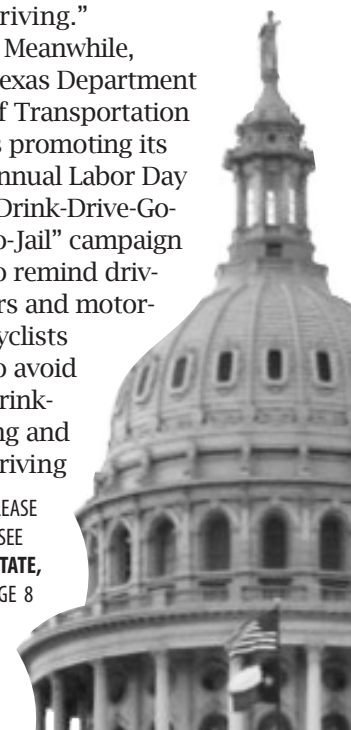
During the Labor Day enforcement effort last year, DPS troopers made 1,682 DWI arrests, 24,443 speeding citations, 3,541 seat belt/child safety seat citations, 1,223 fugitive arrests and 977 felony arrests.

DPS Director Steven McCraw said, "The Department urges all drivers to do their part this

Labor Day holiday and every day by obeying traffic laws and not drinking and driving."

Meanwhile, Texas Department of Transportation is promoting its annual Labor Day "Drink-Drive-Go-to-Jail" campaign to remind drivers and motorcyclists to avoid drinking and driving

### Lunch & Learn Series: Social Media Marketing

Making social media work for businesses can be easy and free.

Last week, Andy Allen, with Chaos Marketing in San Angelo, spoke about the various social media networks and gave insight as to how people can use them for their businesses.

Allen's talk was part of the "Lunch & Learn" series with the Ozona and Sonora Chambers of Commerce and the ASU Small Business Development Center.

"Social media is huge right now," Allen said. "It's the next form of media where people are getting their news and finding out information. It's your job to sift through all the garbage and get to the story." Allen spoke about all the major social media networks, but spent much of his presentation focusing on Facebook due to it being the most popular network right now.

Allen said Facebook is the number one website in the world and the number one social media site.

In his presentation, Allen showed the audience how they can create a commercial Facebook page for their business, which is separate from a personal page.

"Your business page is to showcase what you do and have. Your personal page is where you tell everyone what you had for lunch today," Allen said.

When setting up a business Facebook page, Allen said it is best to do the set up from a desktop or laptop computer. He also said what looks good on the computer screen may not transfer well to a mobile phone or tablet.

"You want to keep things simple. You are putting yourself out there and branding yourself to social media," he said.

Most people will not go directly to the business's page, but instead will see the business's post in their Facebook newsfeed, Allen said. In order to get noticed, the business needs to make sure their thumbnail photo is recognizable, and is similar on all other social media networks.

Allen said it's best to make the thumbnail photo similar to the business's website.

While Facebook is free and

popular, Allen said businesses still need to have a website.

"Your website is your online business card. People go there to see what you offer. Facebook and Twitter are for people to see what you do on a day to day basis," Allen said. "Social media is good for immediate, real time information."

Pictures are also big on social media, as well as showing what the behind-the-scenes of the business, Allen said.

Twitter and Facebook accounts can be linked together, enabling the business to post on one social media and reach both of them, he said.

Instagram and Pinterest are very big in using photos. Instagram is mainly used by teenagers and young adults, while Pinterest's main audience is women.

"A lot depends on the nature of your business which social media you want to use," he said.

Allen said businesses should keep their posts friendly, fun and informative. He also said it is important to reply to any comments or questions on the page within 24 hours, and to have two Facebook posts every day.

He showed the audience how easy it is to schedule the posts on Facebook.

Allen also showed a little bit about how to advertise on Facebook, post videos and touched on other social media like Google Plus, YouTube and LinkedIn.

He also said all social media networks can be accessed on cellphones.

"There's a lot out there. It takes time and you have to work at it," he said. "It's important to get the information

out there and do as much of it as you possibly can."

The next "Lunch & Learn" series events will be "Social Media Advertising" with Penny Larsen from the San Angelo Standard-Times on Sept. 18, followed by "Is Your Website Working for You?" with Jody Gentry of MediaJaw Website Design on Oct. 23. Both will be held at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

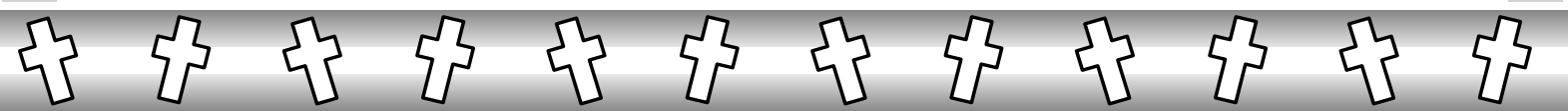

ger our children, and DPS officers will not tolerate drivers who break the law and put others in harm's way." One of the most dangerous times of a student's trip on a school bus is when they are entering or exiting the bus. Drivers are urged to slow down and pay attention in school zones since children may step into a roadway without checking for oncom-

ing traffic. State law requires that approaching drivers stop when a bus is stopped and operating a visual signal - either red flashing lights or a stop sign. Drivers should not proceed until the school bus resumes motion; the driver is signaled by the bus driver to proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated. A driver does not have to stop for a school bus if it is on a highway with roadways separated by an intervening

space or physical barrier. (If a highway is divided only by a left-turning lane, the roadways are not considered separated, and drivers must stop for school buses.) Drivers who illegally pass school buses face fines up to \$1,250 for a first offense. For individuals convicted of this offense more than once, the law allows DPS to suspend the driver license for up to six months. (A ticket for illegally passing a school bus cannot be dismissed through defensive driving.)

The Lions started the season ranked first in the Class 2A state cross-country poll, coming off their state championship last year. The Lady Lions are also ranked at fourth.

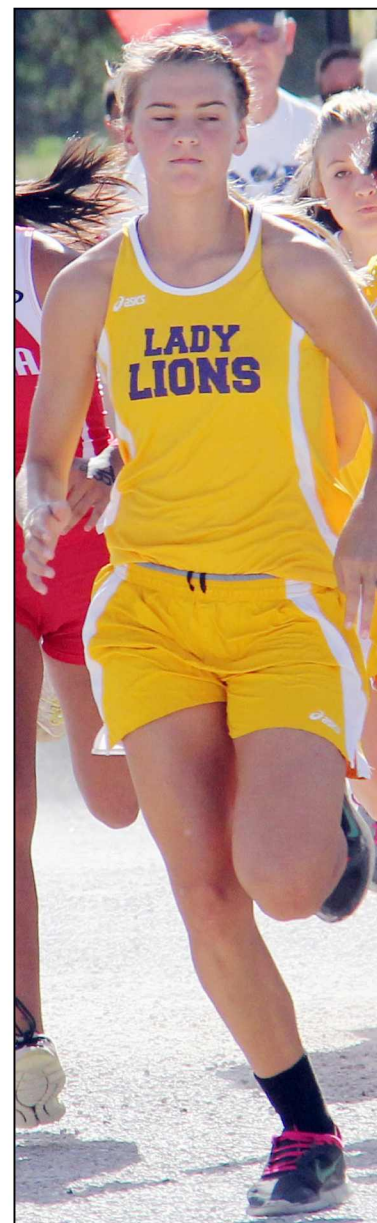

# Commissioners discuss new fire tanker

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court held a public hearing Monday night for the 2014 proposed tax rate and budget workshop.

No one spoke at the tax hearing. A second hearing will be held at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 2, at the courthouse annex. The hearing is open to the public.

During the budget workshop, Fire Department Officers Jordan De La Rosa and Joe Bradford spoke to the commissioners about increasing the \$50,000 currently in the 2015 proposed budget to \$125,000 for this year and \$125,000 for next year for a new tanker truck.

De La Rosa said the current tanker is out of commission and listed a number of problems with the vehicle.

Bradford said the National Fire Protection Association has also issued a warning about departments using refurbished oilfield trucks as

fire trucks citing that they are dangerous.

The current tanker is a former oilfield truck.

Bradford also said the department has applied for a Texas Forest Service grant for a new tanker, but that they don't believe they will get the grant.

Bradford said the department has applied for the grant for four years.

Commissioner Randy Branch said the county should wait to decide on the truck, and that the fire department should produce in writing why the grant is being refused.

The 2015 proposed budget also includes an \$1,800 yearly raise for each employee and \$938,380 budgeted for building projects.

County Judge Fred Deaton said those funds will go to a new county road barn.

The commissioners will approve the final tax rate and budget at their regular meeting at 9 a.m. Sept. 8 at the courthouse annex. The meeting is open to the public.

# Hunting, Fishing Licenses on sale

AUSTIN - New licenses for the 2014-15 hunting and fishing seasons are currently on sale.

The current year Texas hunting and fishing licenses (except year-to-date fishing licenses) will expire Aug. 31.

Every year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issues about 2.5 million hunting and fishing licenses through the agency's 28 field offices, more than 50 state parks and at over 1,700 retailers across the state. Licenses may also be purchased online through the TPWD website at [www.tpwd.state.tx.us/buy](http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/buy) or by phone at 1-800-895-4248. Call center hours are Monday

through Friday, 8 p.m. to 5 p.m. and there is a required \$5 convenience fee for each phone or online transaction. The online transaction system is available 24/7. For online and phone orders, a physical license will be mailed within three business days. During that time period, a transaction receipt will be provided via email that will be sufficient proof of hunting license that can be used for dove hunting, though it will not be allowed for the take of fish or wildlife that require a tag.

Hunting and fishing regulations for the new season can be found in the 2014-2015 Outdoor Annual, available at license retailers August 15 and online at [www.txoutdoorannual.com](http://www.txoutdoorannual.com). Starting this fall, it'll be easier than ever for hunters and anglers to take the Outdoor Annual with them in the field or on the water via a new app available by the end of August for free download on iPhone and Android platforms.

In addition to a hunting license, anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training course or purchase a one-time deferral good for one license year in order to hunt legally in Texas. The certification is valid for life and is honored in all other states and provinces.

Hunters who need hunter education certification now have expanded contemporary options including a streamlined, one-day basic course and an option for anyone 17 years of age or older to take the hunting safety training completely online. A combination online home study and 4 to 5 hour skills field day course is also offered. ### CNG, LNG SALES REPORTED

Sales of natural gas motor fuel in Texas has exceeded expectations for fiscal year 2014, Texas Railroad Commissioner David Porter announced Aug. 19.

As of July 31, fiscal 2014 tax revenue from sales of compressed natural gas (CNG) and liquefied natural gas (LNG) motor fuel totaled \$2,178,199, according to the state Comptroller's office.

"These collections are more than double the estimated amount," Porter said. "At 15 cents per gallon equivalent,

\$2,178,199 of motor fuel tax equals sales of 14,521,326 gallon equivalents of natural gas." A gallon equivalent is the amount of CNG or LNG with the same energy content as a gallon of gasoline or diesel fuel, Porter explained.

**PROP. 1 TO BE ON BALLOT**  
Texas Secretary of State Nandita Berry on Aug. 20 announced a proposed amendment to the Texas Constitution related to transportation will appear on the Nov. 4 statewide election ballot as Proposition 1.

Prop. 1 provides for the use and dedication of certain money transferred to the state highway fund to assist in the completion of transportation construction, maintenance and rehabilitation projects, not to include toll roads.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office (325) 392-2661 and the Fire Chief (325) 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of the landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand. This Order does NOT prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times. In accordance with the Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.
