Early voting ends Friday, Election Day Tuesday

Early voting for the 2014 General Election ends Friday, Oct. 31.

Crockett County voters can cast ballots from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m., including the lunch hour, from Monday-Thursday and 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Fridays at the courthouse annex.

For those wanting to vote on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 4, polls will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Voting loca-



tions are: Precinct 1 - Crockett County Courthouse; Precinct 2 - Crockett County Senior Center; Precinct 3 - Crockett County Civic Center and Precinct 4 -

Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

In order to vote, the person must have one of the seven acceptable forms of photo ID:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS. These are available for free from any DPS driver's license office, including the Ozona office.

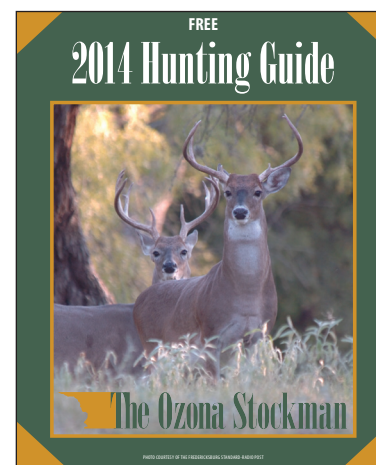
HUNTING SEASON

Prospects good for Texas Deer Season

AUSTIN - If early field reports by bow hunters and those hunting on Managed Lands Deer Permit properties are a sign of things to come, Texas hunters should see deer in good condition and above average numbers of mature bucks when the general season kicks off Saturday, Nov. 1, statewide.

"I had a report of a bow hunter in Walker County connecting on a buck that scored 163 B&C (Boone & Crockett scoring system)," said Alan Cain, Texas Parks

and Wildlife Department White-tailed Deer Program Leader. "It turns out it was the hunter's first time to bow

hunt. I got another report of a 183 B&C buck harvested in Atascosa County on a low-fenced MLD property."

Cain noted he's received several reports indicating decent antler quality this year so hunters should be in for a nice surprise with the quality of bucks they are seeing.

The general season runs through Jan. 4, 2015 in the 209 counties that comprise the North Zone and through Jan. 18, 2015 in the 30 counties of the South Zone. For county specific regulations, check the

Ownership of groundwater an issue, challenge

In 1904, the Texas Supreme Court ruled that landowners could pump all of the groundwater they want from under their land without being held liable to others for drainage. This ruling confirmed the "rule of capture" and established that landowners have an ownership interest in the groundwater beneath their land. After all, how could landowners have an unlimited right to produce something that wasn't solely theirs to begin with? Unfortunately, since 1904, ownership of groundwater has continued to be an issue and ul-

timately challenged. The regulation and management of groundwater has increased as the Texas Legislature and local landowners in many areas of Texas have created groundwater conservation districts. These

districts were designed to ensure that landowners' ownership interests in groundwater are protected at the local level. These districts were not created and should not be used to take property rights away from landowners. Similar to groundwater conservation districts, groundwater is also regulated and managed by groups like the Edwards Aquifer Authority (EAA). In these regulated areas, the "rule of capture" has in effect been modified. Although there is an exemption for domestic and livestock use, everyone

else wishing to drill a well and pump groundwater must get a permit from their local district or authority. Local control versus regional or state control of groundwater continues to be a debate. Like many other property right issues, when property rights meet regulation, there needs to be a balance or else the constitutional rights afforded to landowners can be taken without compensation. Case in point: Mr. Burrell Day and Mr. Joel McDaniel needed a permit from the EAA for their agriculture operation and ap-

plied for a permit. After years of delay the permit was granted, but only for a minuscule amount of the groundwater needed. The EAA argued that they could regulate however they wanted because Day and McDaniel did not have any ownership interest in the groundwater. Day and McDaniel filed a takings claim against the EAA in court. In 2010, the case of the EAA v. Burrell Day and Joel McDaniel was argued in front of the Texas Supreme Court. The Day/McDaniel case was of great concern to the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers As-

sociation (TSCRA), so we joined with other landowner groups to submit a brief in the case. Further, our landowner group coalition helped to craft what would become Senate Bill 332, which affirmed that groundwater is the real property of the landowner. This legislation passed during the 2011 session of the Texas Legislature and was signed by the Governor. It was a major victory for landowners. In 2012, the Texas Supreme Court referred to Senate Bill

What will keep unfounded Ebola reports from 'going viral?'

So how scared should we be about the worldwide Ebola virus crisis? For nearly all of us, the answer to that question will come through what we see, hear and read in the news media and in the U.S. that places a unique burden on those free to print, broadcast or post stories as they wish about efforts to control the spread of the virus.

But how much can we rely on our news media? From grim images and statistics about deaths in West Africa, to reports about flaws in attempts to isolate or track those exposed, news media accounts can inform or inflame, promote protection or pump up panic, and discount or display the inevitable crackpot theories on how and why the epidemic came to be.

Mike Cavender, executive director of the Radio Television Digital News Association, said "largely, what I have seen has been very responsible" reporting. While some have criticized as unnecessarily frightening the news reports that a Dallas hospital apparently botched some protocols on handling the first Ebola-stricken patient, who later died, "... not to have reported what happened at the hospital would have been irresponsible," Cavender said.

The news media also should be less concerned "about the politics and politicization" that has crept into public discussion, he said. "This has more to do with reporting the response on the health front."

Online news media may well face the biggest challenge, since their reporting is intertwined with comments, postings and reports from a vast audience — which can include hoaxers, profiteers and rumormongers.

Still, social media and online news "hasn't created anything new. It's just made it easier to see the conversations already there," said Joshua Hatch, a journalist who chairs the legal committee of the Online News Association.

Even efforts to refute misinformation can backfire, Hatch said, citing a study that shows "by repeating the error and trying to knock it down, you give it credibility ... and people believe it more."

Hatch noted, "the online community is so dynamic, there will be many (new companies) that will have to go through" such incidents a first time before develop-

ing their own internal sets of controls. In a media-saturated world of 24/7 news, with the voracious talk-show appetite for chatter,

we're already seeing questions about what has been presented. On Oct. 13, Fox News Channel's Shepard Smith was critical of much of what he's seen: "You would think 4 million people in America have Ebola, wouldn't you?" he said.

A CNN interview with an author of a 30-year old best-seller about a fictional Ebola outbreak raised concern that the virus might mutate to an easily-spread type — a theory discounted by virtually every scientist studying the disease.

A widely seen video of a doctor walking in a protective suit through Atlanta's airport wearing a sign reading "CDC is lying" led to interviews in newspapers and a TV station — taking a publicity stunt to new levels.

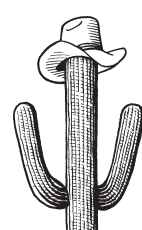
Not all the news about the "new" news media is grim. Tom Risen, technology writer for the now-digital magazine U.S. News and World Report, wrote recently that "... mobile networks and the Internet are helping doctors reach and treat people who may have come in contact with the lethal disease."

The American Psychological Association is telling health officials not to spare the public needed information and specific details. An Oct. 8 post on its website said "... people want easy-to-comprehend information and access to more information if they want it. The news media will play a critical role if a health emergency occurs. Information flow to the public about very bad news should not be controlled in the name of trying to avoid an outbreak of mass panic."

The APA post ends with this advice, which could be added right after the actual 45 words of the First Amendment: "The public should be armed with information."

Campaigns in final push as election day approaches

AUSTIN — Polls continued to show Republican candidates ahead in top-of-ballot races as Texas moved closer to the Oct. 31 early voting deadline before Election Day, Nov. 4.

Political campaigns continued to work feverishly across Texas, knocking on doors, holding rallies, robocalling, planting signs, flooding mailboxes and barraging e-mail accounts.

Gubernatorial candidates state Sen. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, and Republican state Attorney General Greg Abbott, with their multi-million dollar advertising budgets, redoubled their appeals to television viewers. Abbott, ahead in the fundraising competition to fuel their respective campaigns in the closing days, reported more than \$50 million cash on hand while Davis reported more than \$30 million cash on hand.

Notably, Leticia Van de Putte, a San Antonio state senator and Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor,

notched endorsements from daily newspapers, such as the Austin American-Statesman, Beaumont Enterprise, Corpus Christi Caller-Times, Dallas Morning News, El Paso Times, Fort Worth Star-Telegram, Houston Chronicle, Longview News-Journal, San Antonio Express-News and Wichita Falls Times Record News, and groups such as the AFL-CIO, Emily's List, Annie's List and Texas PharmPAC; and by actress Eva Longoria.

Also notably, Van de Putte's opponent, fellow state Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston, has been endorsed by political action groups such as the Tea Party, National Rifle Association, Home School PAC, Concerned Women for America, National Federation of Independent Business, Texas Oil and Gas Association, Texas Association of Business, Texas

Association of Realtors, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Cattle Feeders Association and Texas Medical Association.

As of Oct. 24, the midpoint in early voting, the Secretary of State's Elections Division had posted daily and cumulative figures for Texas' 15 largest population counties. The figures show that of the nearly 9 million registered voters in those counties, more than 726,000 (or 8 percent) cast a ballot in the first five days of early voting.

GROUP DECLARED EBOLA-FREE

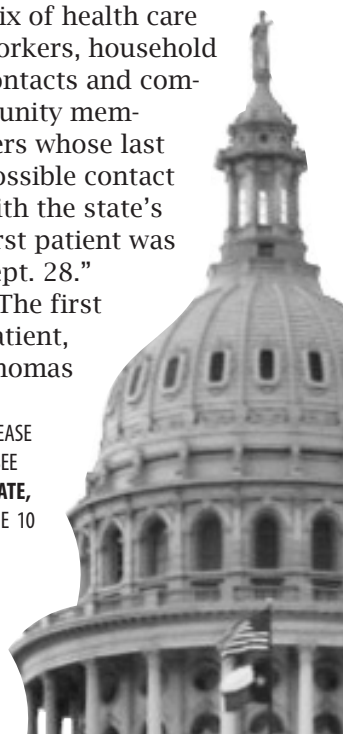
Texas Department of State Health Services on Oct. 20 announced "A group of 43 people in Texas who had contact with the state's first Ebola patient have been cleared from twice-daily monitoring after reaching the 21-day mark, the

longest incubation period for the disease."

The group, the state health agency said, "is a mix of health care workers, household contacts and community members whose last possible contact with the state's first patient was Sept. 28."

The first patient, Thomas

Websites are still essential for businesses

While social media is all the rage, having a website for your business is still a priority.

Jody Gentry, with Mediajaw out of San Angelo, spoke last week about the importance of website design and what all should be on a website.

Gentry's presentation was the final in the Lunch & Learn series presented by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, the Sonora Chamber of Commerce and the ASU Small Business Development Center.

Gentry presented several tips and suggestions that businesses need to have on their websites.

He spoke a lot about search engine optimization (SEO), which means making the site so that it will pop up on search engines like Google.

One way to accomplish this is by having well developed content on the site.

"Content is king," Gentry said. "The more pages you have talking about your business the more likely it is to show up on a search engine."

He also said to watch out for companies who try to market SEO scams.

"It's best if you do it yourself," he said.

The domain name is also important, and sometimes it is not always beneficial to use the businesses' name.

Also, the Title Tag, or the first thing the search engine sees, is also important.

Starting a newsletter, just a simple one, is good to send customers or subscribers.

"When you make additions to your website, don't assume people will see it.

Use a newsletter," he said.

As far as blogs go, Gentry said he was not a fan because don't always maintain them.

"If you start it, you need to be willing to do it," he said.

In terms of social media, Gentry recommended Add This, a free program that allows social media buttons, like Facebook, Twitter and Pinterest, to be added to a website.

That way people can share the website's content on social media.

He also said to take advantage of a website designer.

"Talk to them, ask them questions, ask them about new changes," he said.

With e-mail, Gentry said personal e-mails should not be used for business. When a domain name is purchased, often free e-mail comes with the domain.

He also said a signature with the person's name, phone number, e-mail and website is also essential.

If someone works for a major company and can't have access to their website, he said creating a social me-

dia account, starting a newsletter or blog and advertising in the local newspaper is a great way to get the word out.

"People still like print. I am a big believer in print," he said.

When getting started in designing a website, Gentry said it is best to turn to a professional.

He also said to think about creating a separate mobile site, especially in West Texas where cell service isn't always the best.

Many websites are just responsive, meaning they shrink down to mobile size. With a separate mobile site, they are easier to upload and to navigate on a smartphone.

Larger fonts, continuously scrolling one page sites and having a flat design are the latest trends in website design, Gentry said.

"For a lot of places now, your website is the first, and only, impression people get from you," he said.

p.m. there is a hot game of Mexican Train going.

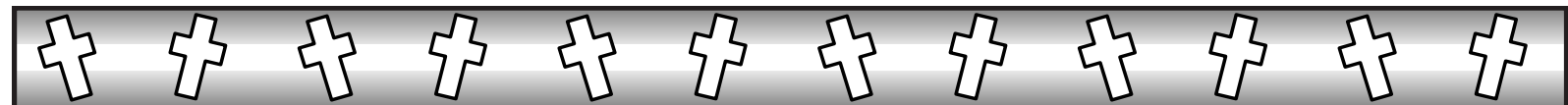

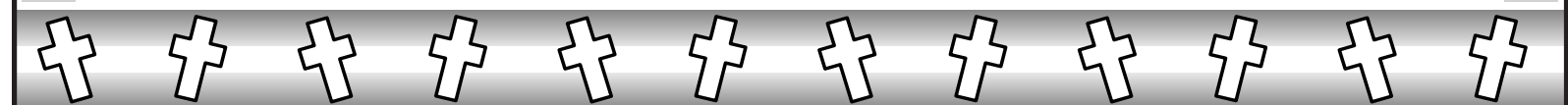

Lancaster Hill repairs to begin in spring

The portion of State Highway 290 in Crockett County, locally known as Lancaster Hill, will receive a face-lift early next year.

Heavy rainfall over the Memorial Day weekend caused structural damage to a portion of the retaining wall and fractured the road surface closest to the wall.

The historic retaining wall dates back to 1933 when the original highway was built.

TxDOT has been working with its Bridge Division engineers and with the Texas Historical Commission to develop a comprehensive rehabilitation plan.

In the meanwhile, TxDOT

closed the outside lane in this 200 foot portion of the hill to traffic after the damage was discovered.

Traffic has been one lane/yield to oncoming traffic since early June.

A project to stabilize the retaining wall and repair the road surface will likely go out for bids in January of 2015.

The process is specialized and unique due to the historic nature of the wall, the terrain adjacent to the wall, and limited access to the rock face.

TxDOT engineers estimate the cost to repair the damage will be around \$650,000 and take five months to complete.

"2014-15 Outdoor Annual - Texas Hunting and Fishing Regulations" available at hunting license sales outlets, online at www.tpwd.state.tx.us and as a free mobile app download on iOS and Android platforms at www.txoutdoorannual.com/app.

When it comes to deer, wildlife biologists use rainfall as a barometer for gauging hunting season because of the direct correlation between rainfall and impacts to habitat during certain times of the year (primarily as it relates to nutrition and cover deer need). Rainfall or a lack thereof can significantly impact deer body condition, antler quality and fawn production - the end results are what hunters see each fall.

According to Cain, most crops (acorns, mesquite beans, etc.) that provide a good forage resource to help deer meet the demands of raising fawns and growing antlers during the stressful part of the summer have been in good supply this year. Those native food sources appear to be carrying over into the fall, which means some hunters may have to contend with native food sources competing with artificial feeders early in the season.

"Precipitation has greened up vegetation around much of the state in the last month and with

green conditions deer aren't utilizing feeders as much," Cain added. "The green vegetation and warm temperatures in October have made hunting a little tough, but there are a few folks having some luck."

Texas whitetail population estimates have remained fairly stable over the last few decades at around 4 million deer. Hunters can expect to see about the same number of deer as in 2013. Bottom line from a hunter perspective is there will be plenty of animals to pursue.

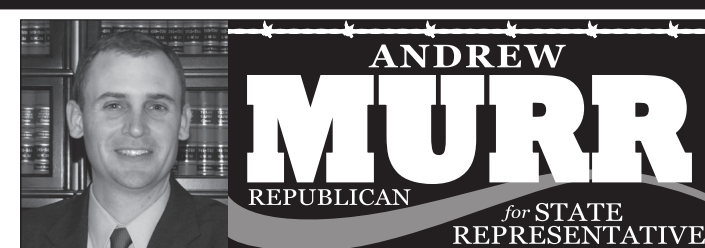

- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

Election officials will now be required by State law to determine whether the voter's name on the identification provided matches the name on the official list of registered voters ("OLRV").

After a voter presents their ID, the election worker will compare it to the OLRV. If the name on the ID matches the name on the list of registered voters, the voter will follow the regular procedures for voting.

If the name does not match exactly but is "substantially similar" to the name on the OLRV, the voter will be permitted to vote as long as the voter signs an affidavit stating that the voter is the same person on the list of registered voters.

If a voter does not have proper identification, the voter will still be permitted to vote provisionally. The voter will have six days to present proper identification to the county voter registrar, or the voter's ballot will be rejected.

Voters with a disability may apply with the county voter registrar for a permanent exemption. The application must contain written documentation from either the U.S. Social Security Administration evidencing he or she has been determined to have a disability, or from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs evincing a disability rating of at least 50 percent.

In addition, the applicant must state that he or she has no valid form of photo identification. Those who obtain a disability exemption will be allowed to vote by presenting a voter registration certificate reflecting the exemption. For more information, call the Crockett County Tax Office at 392-2674.

Voters who have a consistent religious objection to being photographed and voters who do not have any valid form of photo identification as a result of certain natural disasters as declared by the President of the United States or the Texas Governor, may vote a provisional ballot, appear at the voter registrar's office within six calendar days after election day, and sign an affidavit swearing to the religious objection or natural disaster, in order for your ballot to be counted. For more information, call the Crockett County Tax Office at 392-2674.

Some of the items on the ballot include a heavily watched race between Democratic incumbent Pete Gallego and Republican challenger Will Hurd for the District 23 Congressional seat. Crockett County will also have a new state representative after this election. Republican Andrew Murr is facing Libertarian Maximilian Martin for the State Rep. District 53 seat. Locally, none of the county races are contested and only one CCCSD School Board race is contested. For District 4 voters will have to decide between incumbent Ray Don Myers and Ryan Bean.

The CCCSD School Board also has a proposed \$3 million bond. The proposed bond will be used in three areas, transportation, technology and maintenance.

The district will:
 • Purchase four buses and two vehicles.
 • Update computer labs, purchase new computers and support for all campuses.
 • Update science labs and equipment for all campuses.
 • Purchase teaching equipment and supplies for student use for all campuses.
 • Address safety issues and update agriculture shop and woodshop.
 • Update classrooms at OMS and OHS for technology.
 • Replace older air conditioner units in the district.
 • Update and repair existing teacher housing.
 • Repair roof leaks in the district.
 • Resurface the track.
 • New tennis courts to address cracking issues.

School board elections and the school bond will be on separate ballots from the main general election ballot.

The state also has a proposed constitutional amendment on the general election ballot that will move, if passed, will infuse an estimated \$1.7 billion in revenue to the State Highway Fund in 2015 alone, without raising taxes, creating toll roads or adding fees.

The measure authorizes additional Texas transportation funding that can only be used for construction, maintenance, rehabilitation, and acquiring right-of-way for public roads. These funds cannot be used for toll roads.

332 when they issued their opinion in favor of the landowners in the Day/McDaniel case. They stated that "groundwater rights are property rights subject to constitutional protection, whatever difficulties may lie in determining adequate compensation for a taking." As the population in Texas continues to grow at a fast pace, many are looking to tap into a new source of groundwater that is brackish. Brackish groundwater is generally not potable. However, with desalination

technology, this groundwater could help meet the growing water needs of our state. TSCRA supports these efforts. But, some want to legislatively create a permitting system for brackish groundwater that is separate from fresh groundwater. TSCRA does not support this and believes it only complicates the groundwater ownership rights that are already in place and creates many unnecessary legal issues. TSCRA stands by the fact that groundwater is groundwater. If a water resource lies beneath a landowner's property- they own the water, regardless of whether it is fresh

or brackish. The Texas Constitution and now more than 100 years of case law support this position, including the clear opinion that the Texas Supreme Court issued in 2012. TSCRA will continue to be active in groundwater ownership issues, especially as the Texas Legislature begins to meet in January 2015. TSCRA has worked hard to protect landowners' private property rights for over 137 years, and will continue to do so for future generations.
