Bean wins race *School bond passes*

Crockett County voters spoke Tuesday during the CCCSD School Board and School Bond races.

Ryan Bean defeated incumbent Ray Don Myers, 183-57, for the District 4 School Board race.

In early voting, Bean had 120 votes to Myers' 31.

This was the only contested school board race.

The \$3 million CCCSD School Bond passed 574 votes for to 264 against.

The bond will be used in three areas, transportation, technology and maintenance.

The district will:

- Purchase four buses and two vehicles.

- Update computer labs, purchase new computers and support for all campuses.

- Update science labs and equipment for all campuses.

- Purchase teaching equipment and supplies for student use for all campuses.

- Address safety issues and update agriculture shop and woodshop.

- Update classrooms at OMS and OHS for technology.

- Replace older air conditioner units in the district.

- Update and repair existing teacher housing.

- Repair roof leaks in the district.

- Resurface the track.

- New tennis courts to address cracking issues.

As of press time the Congressional District 23 race between Democratic incumbent Pete Gallego and Republican Will Hurd was too close to call.

With 40 percent of the

pre-cincts reports, Hurd had a 1,600-vote advantage over Gallego. Hurd

won Crockett County with 485 votes to Gallego's 333.

Texas Democrats maintained their 16-year losing streak on Tuesday night, with Republicans decisively sweeping all 15 statewide races on the ballot.

Crockett County will have a new state representative with Republican Andrew Murr easily defeating Libertarians Maximilian Martin and B.W. Holk. Murr had 90 percent of the vote, Martin 9.6 percent and Holk had no votes.

Early returns showed Republicans leading by more than 20 percentage points in all of the statewide races, including governor-elect Greg Abbott.

Republican George P. Bush. Bush easily won his bid for land commissioner against Democrat John Cook, a former El Paso mayor.

Among the statewide candidates, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn had the most commanding lead after early returns, with 62 percent of the vote against Democrat David Alameef's 35 percent.

Alan Landa 43rd at 17:52.31 and Danny Posadas 61st at 18:27.54.

The Lady Lions placed third. Sundown was first and Gruver second. Stratford also qualified coming in fourth.

McKenna Moses placed second at 12:16.28.

Gabby Treto was 24th at 12:54.51; Estefania Torralba 25th at 12:54.60; Neraida Vega 33rd at 13:01.47; Madison Childress 43rd at

13:15.46; Alyssa Newlin 81st at 13:50.11 and Brenna Hale 94th at 14:01.98.

The OHS teams will run starting at 9 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 8, in Old Settlers Park at Round Rock.

"We are all so proud of our family these kids work hard for each other and to represent their community and their families, it is very humbling to get to be a part of it all," Esparza said.

Wellness center property still hangs in the balance

A decision on whether on the property for a future wellness center still hangs in the balance, even after a joint meeting with the Crockett County Commissioners' Court, CCCSD School Board and wellness center board.

The joint meeting, which took place Oct. 30 in a packed commissioners' courtroom, did bring up issues regarding other county facilities.

The property in question is located near Lion Stadium, across the street from the West Texas Rehab Center, and was once the north swimming pool.

Five years ago the commissioners passed a resolution allowing the property to be set aside for the purpose of building a wellness center for five years to allow the board to raise funds. The five years

is up Nov. 9.

During this time, the wellness center board has allowed the school district to use the property for parking.

Shirley Kirby said the group has raised around \$66,000, and still needs more time to get the funds.

"We're just here to get a yes or no on if we can continue to use the lot for purposes of raising funding," Kirby said. At the start, the school district immediately stated that they are willing to wait on the county's decision.

"We would rather wait for a decision and see what you all come up with," said Superintendent Raul Chavarria.

"We just want to leave the wellness center alone. If they want to raise the money, let them do it. I don't think we should take it away from them," added Grizz Medina, school board member. "I encourage you all to extend that

contract. I wouldn't feel right taking it away from them."

One of the issues Kirby said they are having with raising funds, including grants, is that they don't have a permanent location.

Another reason the group wants to continue to use this property is because it is close to medical facilities.

"We're kind of a laughing stock because we don't have a permanent location. When we first came to you we did not say we were going to raise all the money," Kirby said.

At the Oct. 13 commissioners' meeting, Kirby said cost for the center is around \$2 million.

Discussion at the meeting quickly spread from the wellness center property to the infrastructure of other county facilities, including the Family Health Center of Ozona.

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Texas Small Business Needs Assessment Poll

As a small business owner, have you been asked lately, "What do you need?" If not, then let me say that there is a Texas group who wants to know. The Texas Small Business Needs Assessment Poll is a partnership between the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas' Community Development Department and the Texas Small Business Development Center Network. They are looking for your input.

In reviewing the 2013 results of the Poll, 66 percent of business owners expected overall business conditions to improve.

The percentage of business expecting sales and revenue to increase was 71 percent. Most of the businesses responding were small businesses with one to five employees.

There were other results that were interesting. Respondents were

asked to select the most important changes they made to their business operations in 2013. The results showed that 63 percent cultivated new clients and new markets. When asked about the top factor affecting their businesses inability to grow; finding the right workers was number one.

Small Business elaborated on finding the right worker by identifying the skills needed the most. The number one skill - interpersonal skills. The ability to communicate, listen, negotiate, problem solve, make decisions and be assertive are some exam-

ples of this skill set. In second place was the need for employees to have skills in sales and marketing. The third skill set listed was an employee's ability to be punctual and reliable. The most interesting observation is that these same three skills were identified to be the most difficult to find workers who possess these abilities.

In the 2013 survey, financing and access to capital found that small businesses relied most heavily on their own business earnings, with credit card and personal savings rounding out the top three. A bank line

of credit was in fourth place. When small business owners were asked about how they spent their funding, most paid down their debt.

When access to capital was faced with challenges, the small business owners admitted their low credit score and uneven cash flow hampered their ability to borrow money.

I served on its Board of Trustees, and ultimately as president and later chancellor.

I had planned to write of alumnus Dr. Dan Crawford's clever remarks at the luncheon for 50th anniversary graduates, and other fun things. The kitchen mishap has caused postponement.

A story provided by new friend Dan Russo will be shared now, however. A former FBI official who served 27 years—and knew five US presidents "up close"—recounted a tale of legendary J. Edgar Hoover, the FBI's first director.

Mr. Hoover redefined eccentricity. His foibles were many and well known by others in the Bureau. Few along his trail ever crossed him, and the few who tried did so at their peril.

All FBI figures knew well that their director decreed that all correspondence sent to him must include wide margins, 1.5 inches at top, bottom and sides, to be exact. This allowed him room to make marginal notes before returning to sender.

On one occasion, the Special Agent in charge of the Dallas Field Office sent a memo, momentarily forgetting about wide margins. It was almost devoid of margins.

Hoover returned it with this single notation: "Watch the borders."

Long Live The Cow

Some market reports show bred heifers selling for \$2,700 and young pairs fetching \$3,300. And these are commercial cattle. I remember when a whole Gooseneck load of them wouldn't bring that. These prices are giving cattlemen problems they've never had before, like having to hire an accountant and paying income tax. Next thing you know the wife will want to quit one of her jobs in town.

It certainly makes one pause when preg checking. Say an old crippled cow limps into the squeeze chute, is safe in calf but looks like she could die any minute. Do you keep her and take your chances, or do you pay three grand to replace her? I know what I'd do.

I'm aware that slaughter cows are selling well and may fetch \$1,500 but you'll have to double that to replace one. And older cows are experienced, know the ranch, calve easily and have built up immunity to any pathogens on your place. Most cows are done by the time they are eight but what if you could extend that life expectancy by three or four more years? I read about a purebred Angus cow that is still in production at 17 years of age and she looks like a million dollars.

You really don't want to lose a cow like that and should want to keep her alive. Now you can.

A cow's ovaries will outlast her teeth and since cows spend 15 hours a day chewing, teeth become a cow's limiting factor. You

may have read stories about false teeth being implanted into Argentinean range cows with good results. But it's nothing new. As a kid we used to watch a television show called What's My Line? In the show a panel of four pompous washed up Hollywood stars would try to guess the occupation of a person. In August of 1959 a fellow from Colorado appeared on the show

and the panelists were not able to guess his occupation: he sold false teeth to cows! A bridge of eight stainless steel teeth cost just \$15 and extended a cow's life about three years. The guy must have been a poor salesman though because for some reason the idea never caught fire. I think it would now days.

Secretary of State posts early voting turnout numbers

AUSTIN — The Secretary of State's Elections Division on Oct. 31 posted early voting turnouts for each of the state's 15 highest-population counties: Harris, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar, Travis, Collin, Denton, El Paso, Fort Bend, Hidalgo, Montgomery, Williamson, Galveston, Nueces and Cameron.

Of the 8,978,313 registered voters in those counties, 1,715,731 voted early in person or by mail. That's a 19.11 percent cumulative early voting percentage. To compare with the last midterm election, in 2010, the cumulative early voting total for those 15 counties was 1,731,589 ballots cast out of 8,339,034 registered voters, or 20.76 percent of the total.

After polls close at 7 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 4, anyone with an Internet connection will be able to access vote tabulations posted by the Office of the Secretary of State's at the website www.sos.state.tx.us.

GOVERNOR GREET'S TOYOTA

Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 27 welcomed Toyota Motor North America Inc. to Plano, where its new headquarters will be built. The manufacturer's relocation to Plano is supported by a \$40 million investment from the business-luring Texas Enterprise Fund administered by the governor's office.

The facility, to be completed in late 2016 or early 2017, will bring nearly 4,000 jobs and more than \$300 million in capital investment to North Texas, according to Perry's Oct. 27 statement. Toyota Motor North America, combined with 21 on-site suppliers,

already supports some 6,000 jobs in San Antonio, including 2,900 from its \$2.3 billion manufacturing plant.

TXDOT ENDS GRAVEL POLICY

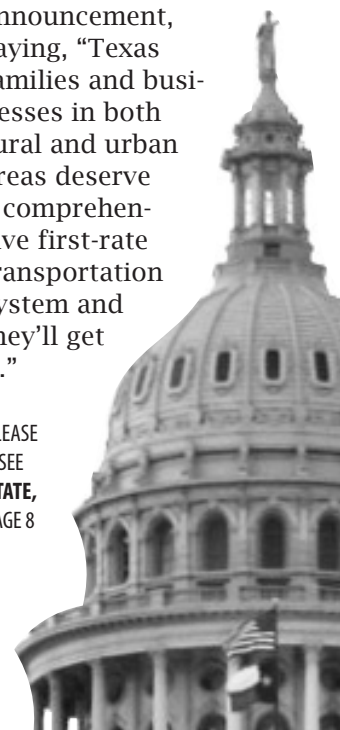
Texas Department of Transportation in the summer of 2013 announced a plan to convert 83 miles of "significantly damaged paved roads" in the Eagle Ford shale energy-producing region to gravel surface as a temporary budget-cutting measure.

In an Oct. 24 letter to the Legislative Budget Board, TXDOT announced the formal termination of its "high-end unpaved road conversion policy" and requested access to \$402 million in additional funding for Fiscal Year 2015 with half going to safety projects across the state and the remainder toward roadways

affected by the state's growing energy sector.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst praised TXDOT's announcement, saying, "Texas families and businesses in both rural and urban areas deserve a comprehensive first-rate transportation system and they'll get it."

CCCCSD Business of the Month

The Chamber of Commerce would like to recognize the Crockett County Common Consolidated School District (CCCCSD) as our Business of the Month for September.

There were no public school facilities for 10 years following the settlement of the first family in Crockett County. The county was sparsely settled, and the population was not sufficient to warrant the establishment of schools. The children of the families were needed to help establish the home, tend the stock, build fences, trap wild animals, and even help in construction of houses.

When the Crockett County Commissioner's Court met July 22, 1891, they voted to accept the lands donated by E.M. Powell for school purposes. The school was also used for County purposes until other facilities were provided. In 1908 the people of Crockett County voted for a \$75,000 bond to construct the first permanent Ozona Public School building, now part of the current day high school. A Texas Historic Landmark, made of native limestone, this structure was built between 1910-12. It was one of the first schools with a heating and ventilating system in the state. The first students, a total of three, graduated in 1913.

Today, the CCCCCSD is a 2A school system providing pre-k through 12th grade education. There are a total of 859 students among three campuses. We have a proud history in our school system and our County Commissioners and School Board are committed to our students and the facilities that serve our educational purposes.

"Our current facilities do present a challenge. Unlike other districts, we are unable to host certain events like district track meets, One Act Play competitions, and other academic events due to our restrictive facilities and services," said Superintendent Raul Chavarria. "While we continue to look at improving our existing facilities through bond elections, what we are in need of is 'land' to be able to expand our facilities. That will in turn allow us to broaden our programs and curriculum and student opportunities.

"Our Founding Fathers laid the groundwork in providing outstanding facilities for our students and community to be proud of.

The CCCCCSD is only one of three common school districts in the state. The school district receives county tax dollars, which means the decisions for the school district are shared between the CCCCCSD Board of Directors and the County Commissioner's Court. "We are fortunate to have a good working relationship between the Commissioners Court and our School Board. The county is very supportive and assists us in terms of needed equipment and labor."

"The teachers are the back-bone of the district. We have 151 total employees, including all staff. While we have a strong foundation, there is no replacement for parental involvement. It is one of our greatest challenges, and having a parent take an interest will only contribute to the success of their child's education and future," said Chavarria.

The CCCCCSD is continually working to stay ahead in terms of academics. "The one constant is reading. Watching a student transition from learning to read to reading to learn, is exciting. Students all develop at a different age."

The CCCCCSD is looking for parents or people who will volunteer to listen to kids read, or to read to kids. There are a number of ways someone can volunteer their services.

Chavarria stated the state is moving towards a paperless system where students will reference their study books online. However, an onsite library of texts will always be available for student reference.

According to Superintendent Chavarria, teacher state certification for vocational courses has become harder. "We would like to strengthen our welding, Ag, wood shop programs, and add nursing and more to our vocational curriculum. These

are vocations that would allow students to give back to an economy that is sorely in need of these types of skills and professions. In addition, this provides an opportunity for students who may not be able to attend college. We also would like to have a technology department and lab classrooms that have the best equipment so that we can provide our students with the most up-to-date curriculum."

"Something that I've noticed is that the local kids of Ozona do not want for anything! The school district is very appreciative of such a giving community. The band, the cheerleaders and scholarship programs, and more are all supported," said the Superintendent.

"The CCCCCSD appreciates the recognition of Business of the Month from the Chamber of Commerce. We seek to provide a comfortable and appealing learning environment that instills both student and community pride. The outside of the facilities is a reflection of the learning on the inside. We want to have the ability to attract the best teachers and offer a pay that is competitive with other districts. We want to provide our students with the best possible opportunities. We thank Ozona for their support and look forward to a continued community partnership that will allow us to provide the best public education possible," said Chavarria.

Honoring two Crockett County Pioneers, newly restored portraits of Mary and Robert Massie will soon be hanging in the Crockett County Public Library.

During a meeting Monday night, San Angelo Photographer Jim Bean spoke about the process he used to restore the photos.

Bean said it was searched, and he was not able to find the originals, but he did find a copy of the portrait of Robert Massie and used the faded one of Mary Massie, along with a photograph of the Massie home in San Angelo and Miss Clubhouse, a portrait of a calf used at fund-raiser auction.

"Little did I know what a treasure hunt this could be," said Librarian Louise Ledoux.

"It's a challenge to make sure you do something a majority of people will agree with," Bean added.

In 1966, the Puckett and Powell families donated funds in memory of the Massies to create an adult room at the high school library for the public.

In the library, the meeting room table, a side table and the grandfather clock came from the Massies.

Robert Massie helped establish Crockett County, including founding Ozona National Bank, Wool Growers and the Robert and Mary Massie Foundation helped build the Ozona Community Center.

"The portraits will hang in our meeting room and continue the history of the library," Ledoux said.

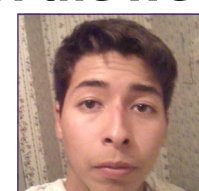

"Look at the infrastructure. I dare anybody to tell me it's near the top, it's near the bottom. The school is not opposed to a wellness center at all. If not now, when. We've got to be careful with every dollar we spend, but we need to rebuild our infrastructure," said Orlando DeHoyos, school board member.

"Eldorado built a new hospital and care center. Their hospital district's taxes are now the same amount as our county taxes," added County Judge Fred Deaton.

Commissioner Eligio Martinez gave a suggested waiting to hear from official at Shannon Medical Center, who recently talked to the Care Center, Health and Emergency Officials Board about a new Ozona clinic.

Shannon is proposing if the county builds a new clinic, Shannon will furnish all the equipment.

The Care Center, Health and Emergency Board have not approached the commissioners yet with the plan. Cost for the clinic would be around \$3 million.

"We've got a jail, the school with their bond, we didn't think it was a good time due to pending business," said John L. Henderson, board president. "Dr. (Marcus) Sims would like to go forth with this clinic. It sounds like it's time for us to start talking again."

Martinez suggested the property where the clinic,

care center and rehab center are located could all be used to build a new clinic and incorporate the wellness center.

"I don't think we should commit to anything until we hear what Shannon has to offer us," Martinez said.

Commissioner Randy Branch said people need to keep in mind the oil and gas economy in Crockett County, which pays the majority of taxes.

"The price of oil has declined 26 percent. The oil companies could move out and go up to Big Lake. We've been trying to sack back that money. We have to build up our fund balance because when the oil goes we lose 20 percent of our values. We have a year's worth of funding in the fund balance. Our fire department wants something really bad. Our road department burned down, and we haven't received the money from the insurance company yet. We're going to have to use some of our fund balance right away," Branch said. "I don't see the monetary support for a wellness center."

Kirby reminded the commissioners that they had wanted the meeting for an answer on the property.

"We have not come to you tonight asking for a bond issue. We have just come asking for a yes or no on the property. We just want to be close to the medical facilities. If you don't give us the use of this lot please gives us some place," Kirby said.

School board member Dwight Childress suggest-

ed the county put a waiver into the agreement stating the county would provide property if the property being discussed is not suitable in the future.

County Judge Fred Deaton made the motion to allow the health and wellness center board another five years on the property.

The motion failed 2-3 with Branch, Martinez and Commissioner Pleas Childress voting against because of wanting the waiver in the motion.

Branch said he was willing for them to use the property with a waiver included, and made a motion to that effect. That motion died for a lack of a second.

Deaton said the care center, health and emergency officials board meets the week before the next commissioners' court. He said they could discuss the new clinic and bring information to the next commissioners' court meeting on Monday, Nov. 10, where the property discussion will resume.

"This shows the need for a town meeting. We need to prepare to be able to state what our tax base is. Certainly we found out tonight that a simple item like this is tied into a lot of areas," Deaton said.

The Crockett County Care Center, Health and Emergency Officials Board meeting is at 7 p.m. tonight (Nov. 5) at the EMS Building.

The next regular commissioners' court meeting is 9 a.m. Monday, Nov. 10, at the courthouse annex.

Both meetings are open to the public.

NURSE RECOVERS FROM EBOLA

Texas Department of State Health Services Commissioner Dr. David Lakey on Oct. 28 expressed relief when Amber Vinson, a nurse with Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Dallas, was declared free of the Ebola virus last week.

She was in isolation and receiving treatment at Emory University Hospital in Atlanta.

"We are so pleased that Amber Vinson has been declared free of Ebola. She is one of the health care workers who bravely provided care to the first Ebola patient diagnosed in the United States. Through excellent health care and her own courage, she beat the disease. Based on the clinical and

lab findings, people are not at risk of getting the disease from her, and she has been completely cleared. We wish her the best as she transitions back to a normal life, and we welcome her back home to Texas," Lakey said in an official statement.

SUMMIT FOCUSES ON BULLYING

"Bullying remains one of the most prevalent and widely discussed topics pertaining to school safety and security," Texas Education Agency announced during Texas Safe Schools Week, Oct. 19-25.

During the week, Texas School Safety Center at Texas State University in San Marcos and the Texas Education Agency spotlighted resources available to help school districts and charters address and combat bullying and cyber-bullying on campuses.

Also, Texas School Safety Center presented the 2nd Annual Texas Bully Prevention Summit

on Oct. 30 in San Marcos.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS PERSIST

Gov. Perry on Oct. 28 announced the renewal of the emergency disaster proclamation the governor originally he signed in July 2011, certifying that exceptional drought conditions posed a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas.

This month, the proclamation applies to 98 of the state's 254 counties.

In contrast, the proclamation applied to 113 specified counties last month.

The drought proclamation directs that "all necessary measures, both public and private" as authorized by state law "be implemented to meet that threat" and "all rules and regulations that may inhibit or prevent prompt response to this threat are suspended for the duration of the state of disaster."
