



# Missing girl found safe in Ozona

The alert caught the attention of a convenience store clerk more than 60 miles away in George West.

"That was such a tremendous break in all of our investigation," said Police Cmdr. Santiago Escalante during a news conference girl's relative about 4:30 Monday.

Austin Carlin, 19, was arrested late Sunday on suspicion of kidnapping after he was stopped about 15 miles west of Ozona, near mile-marker 352 on Interstate 10, by an El Paso County Department of Public Safety trooper who recognized the vehicle description, Escalante said.

# Ozona couple adopts young girls

Editor's Note: Part of this article was left out of last week's edition. We are reprinting the full article this week.

Surrounded by their friends and family, Lorena Renteria and her husband Rito celebrated the completion of their family, legally, for the first time in the eyes of the State of Texas.

Not that their family was incomplete to begin with. The couple from Ozona became foster parents about three years ago and fell in love with the two girls from Odessa that were placed in their care. On Monday, Ector County Court at Law 2 Judge Scott Layh officially signed the paperwork making the Renterias the legal guardians of the two girls.

"This is the fun stuff," Layh said to the couple.

The two girls, 5-year-old Livy and 3-year-old Ashley, were also ecstatic about the day, both hugging and kissing their newly minted parents while Ashley sang a song in the courtroom. The names used are not their real names, as officials with Buckner International asked the girls' adopted names not be used.

Bucker International is a faith-based organization that offers social service organizations, including foster care and adoptions, and has locations in Midland, Mission, Lubbock, Amarillo, and Beaumont. Their offices are based in Dallas.

Lorena Renteria said the move was a long time coming, as the couple — high school sweethearts who met at Sonora High School — tried to have children of their own, but were unsuccessful.

"Adoption had always been in our mind since we had struggled to get pregnant, but we didn't get fully into it (the adoption process) until three years ago," Lorena Renteria said.

rom kindergarten through college at Texas A&M, I'm a proud product of the Texas public education system. I was fortunate to attend schools with dedicated teachers and my parents took my education very seriously. But not every child is as lucky as I was. Many don't have the same opportunities to learn from the best, preparing them for life and the chance to move up the ladder of success in our country. This is not only a travesty for these individuals; it's bad news for our nation.

Education opportunity is a national security priority. # Governor gives lawmakers his state budget priorities

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — On Feb. 17, Gov. Greg Abbott delivered his first State of the State address during a joint session of the Texas House and Senate and released his recommendations for the two-year 2016-2017 state budget.

In his 43-page Governor's Budget document, Abbott said he aims to: "Constrain the size and growth of government. Reduce agency spending. Suspend, reduce, and eliminate unnecessary taxes and fees. Ensure government supports job creation and is accountable and transparent."

Abbott is recommending general revenue spending of \$99.4 billion for 2016-2017, slightly less than a 5 percent increase in general revenue spending compared with the current budget. "By keeping spending levels lower than the growth in population plus inflation, we can ensure that the size of government does not grow. This allows Texas to significantly reduce tax burdens," Abbott asserted, and promoted the building of the budget on the following "core principles":

- Passing a constitutional amendment to limit the growth in state spending to the historic growth in the state's population plus inflation.

- Limiting the size of government by reducing most state agency general revenue expenditures by 3 percent.

- Securing additional funding for transportation infrastructure by passing a constitutional amendment to dedicate one half of the motor vehicle sales tax to transportation needs and ending many transportation funding diversions.

- Stimulating private sector job growth by permanently decreasing the business "franchise" tax by \$2 billion, combined with comprehensive reforms.

- Providing property owners with \$2.2 billion in property tax relief.

- Using any revenue that exceeds initial estimates or a portion of any surplus cash to reduce state non-self-supporting debt.

- Preventing future overspending by passing a constitutional amendment ending the use of funds in statutorily dedicated accounts for budget certification;

- Providing the governor expanded line-item veto authority to ensure prudent and sensible spending reductions.

In a set of official proclamations released Feb. 20, Abbott named five emergency items for state lawmakers to address without delay: (1) improvements to early education; (2) higher education research initiatives; (3) transportation funding; (4) border

ics reform. The Texas Constitution requires lawmakers to take action on the governor's emergency items by March 13, the 60th day of the 140-day regular session of the 84th Texas Legislature. With the governor's wishes now expressed, committees in both houses of the Texas PLEASE SEE



A shield, a stronghold and fortress, (2 Samuel 22:2&3, Psalm 18:2, 28:7, 62:6, 144:2). We have to draw near to Him and humbly ask Him to help us. State Sen. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, filed SB 648 on Thursday that would increase the legal age to pur-

chase, possess, or consume tobacco products in Texas from 18 to 19 years of age.

"There exists support from a broad coalition of Texans for this bill, from health care professionals to Veterans. I'm proud to jointauthor this bipartisan measure with Sen. Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, a fellow Marine, and Chairwoman Joan Huffman, R-Houston, a former judge and outstanding advocate for our children. said Uresti.

Uresti — noting that tobacco use kills more people than alcohol, AIDS, car crashes, illegal drugs, mur-

ders, and suicides combined — said the state has an obligation to discourage young people from taking up a habit that is likely to shorten their lives.

"This bill recognizes and takes advantage of a simple fact. The later one tries that first cigarette, the less likely they are to become a lifetime user. By increasing the legal age to 19, we further our goal of getting tobacco out of our high schools.


"Earlier this week in the Senate Finance Committee we heard testimony on funding the M.D. Anderson cancer center from Dr. Ronald DePinho. Our state spends billions of dollars on cancer care, and I am absolutely shocked to learn that we spend more than 12 billion dollars per year due to tobacco. Tobacco will cause 20 percent of all deaths, and 30 percent of all cancer deaths, and this is tragic because 88 percent of adults who use tobacco will start using as children." said Uresti.

According to the Campaign for Tobacco Free Kids, some 24,500 adult Texans die each year from smoking, and 503,000 kids currently under the age of 18 will ultimately die prematurely from tobacco.

"Over the next 50 years world-wide, 500 million people will lose their lives due to tobacco use. We have a chance here in Texas to set an example for the rest of the country and the world, and I hope my colleagues will agree" said Uresti.

Uresti represents Senate District 19, which covers more than 35,000 square miles and contains all or part of 17 counties, including Crockett County.

Going through the training, the couple became foster parents; knowing that if they became attached to the children that came into their care, there was the chance the children could still be placed elsewhere.

"We didn't know if we could handle the heartbreak," she said.

Then the Renterias got Livy and Ashley, and said the two girls were immediately drawn to them. Though licensed to house one child, officials did not want to break the sisters up, and placed them in the couple's care.

The attraction to the girls was also immediate.

"When we first met, the oldest just gave me a hug and from there, I was like, 'OK, this is it,' "Lorena Renteria said.

Sarah Hataway of Buckner Children and Family Services in Midland said the organization helped place nine children in homes in 2014. The adoption process she said can be rigorous for some, which includes paperwork, home studies and training.

Many of the families are more than willing to open themselves up, Hataway said, and days where the adoption process is final makes it all worth it.

"This really certifies why we do this job," Hataway said.


Rito Renteria said it was "awesome" to finally be done and formally adopt the girls, and Lorena Renteria said the family plans on celebrating at home. Their first big trip, when the youngest daughter is a bit older, will be Disney World.







disappearance of the Corpus Christi girl

The girl was found safe inside the vehicle and was reunited with her parents about 1:30 a.m. Monday.

Carlin was arrested on suspicion of aggravated kidnapping, indecency with a child with sexual contact and unauthorized use of a vehicle. He remained in Nueces County Jail Monday. His bail totals \$850,000.

The Ozona Stockman does not typically name children who have been sexually abused. The newspaper's Facebook and Twitter pages had previously identified the girl in response to the alert seeking the public's help in finding her.

Carlin was taken into custody by DPS without incident, a Corpus Christi police news release states.

Detectives went to the Texas community, which is about 350 miles northwest of Corpus Christi, on Sunday to pick up Carlin, and he was booked into the City Detention Center in Corpus Christi before midnight Sunday, the release states.

# Spam emails claim to be from Texas Attorney General

AUSTIN - A malicious new spam email featuring Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton's name and an arrest threat has recently hit inboxes statewide.

The fraudulent email message, which may include the subject line, "FINAL NO-TICE", is given the false appearance of legitimacy because it is adorned with the distinctive online logo of U.S. district courts. The email's opening text informs the resident of "a PENDING law ACTION against your name and your Social Security Number." The email then cautions: "Should you ignore this communiqué, we WILL advice our CLIENT to PRO-CEED further with the LEGAL ACTION AGAINST you." The bogus paragraph claims to be from "KEN PAXTON" with the "STATE ATTORNEY OFFICE."

Texans should not respond to the sender or call any telephone numbers that appear within the message.

As with many ploys to obtain individuals' personal information, it is likely that many of these imposters are actually thousands of miles away – often in other countries and out of reach of U.S. law enforcement. This impersonation ploy is particularly effective because it causes victims to react immediately out of fear that they are facing criminal action by the Attorney General's Office, rather than taking the time to consider the claims being made and information being requested.

Legislature will continue to work on their own versions of a state budget for the next fiscal biennium. Those versions will have to be reconciled by the two bodies, and ultimately, with the governor, who has veto power.

# **COURT RULES**

**ON IMMIGRATION** On Feb. 16, a Brownsville U.S. district judge issued a preliminary injunction, pending the outcome of a multistate lawsuit, to stall an executive order President Obama issued last fall that would allow some five million undocumented immigrants to apply for work permits and avoid deportation.

In issuing the injunction, U.S. District Judge Andrew Hanen reasoned that the U.S.

Administrative Procedure Act's requirement that public notice and a public comment period did not take place before a change in U.S. immigration policy could take effect.

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton lauded the ruling and noted in a Feb. 20 news release, "Texas leads a 26-state coalition fighting the president's attempt to unilaterally grant amnesty to millions of illegal immigrants."

The Obama administration has filed a petition in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit for a stay of the district court's injunction.

### **SAME-SEX MARRIAGE IS CONDUCTED**

Austin State District Judge David Wahlberg, citing "unconstitutional prohibitions against same-sex marriage" in Texas, gave Travis County the green light to proceed with official paperwork culminating in a marriage ceremony uniting two women on Feb. 19.

Attorney General Paxton quickly obtained a stay from the Texas Supreme Court that prevents same-sex marriages. Paxton also seeks to invalidate the one marriage that was conducted. Gov. Abbott said, "Article 1,

Section 32 of the Texas Constitution defines marriage as consisting 'only of the union of one man and one woman' and was approved by more than three-quarters of Texas voters. I am committed to ensuring that the Texas Constitution is upheld and that the rule of law is maintained in the State of Texas." The constitutionality of

same-sex marriage is a matter pending before the U.S. Supreme Court. A ruling is expected by June 30.
