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New clinic location approved

A location for the new clinic has been approved.

At Monday's regular meeting, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved locating the proposed new health clinic at First Street and Avenue H, the former location of the north swimming pool

across from Lion Stadium.

This location had previously been set aside to build a new wellness center. The commissioners chose not to renew the agreement last year.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga voted against the motion. Tambunga has said in previous meetings that he doesn't like the location because it is not next to the Crockett Coun-

ty Care Center, and that the ing, Stacey Asbill, clinical dicenter's residents would have rector and physical therapist to be transported across the street for medical care.

"I am for a new clinic, but, in my opinion, we still need to keep it in its original location. That's just me. Everybody's got their own opinion. We take a vote and go with it," Tambunga said.

A 21 year-old Ozona woman was killed in a vehicle accident Monday morning north of Ozona.

Khushbu Bhakta was pronounced dead at the scene by Crockett County Justice of Peace Evelyn Lozano, according to a report from the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Her sister, Avni Bhakta, 19, was aken to Shannon Medical Center by Crockett County EMS where she is listed with serious injuries, the report stated. The report stated that the 2009 Toyota Camry, driven by Khushbu Bhakta, ran off the east side of the roadway and overturned. Road conditions were listed as foggy and wet. The accident occurred around 8:05 a.m. 16 miles north of Ozona on State Highway 163.



Keep public notices in print

ax rates, elections, public meetings. public auctions, abandoned vehicles, oil and gas fluid injections, all of these require notice to be printed in a newspaper, for now.

There are those in the state legislature that would like to see these notices disappear from the printed page and place them on to the web.

This legislative session, there are six bills that would take away public notices from printed newspapers. In each of these bills, the notices would be placed onto a website, such as the State Comptroller's website or the city's or county's or school's site. Some do include newspaper websites, but leave that print requirement as an option.

Printing public notices in a newspaper should not be an option. We believe lawmakers do not realize that the word "public" pertains to everyone.

How does this affect you the reader? Do you want to know what your tax rates are going to be next year? What oil and gas wells are doing in our county? Where to go vote in the next election? When's the next public hearing? All these questions are

public notices are the best. These bills also give local governments an excuse to hide information from the public easily on their own websites.

If you want to find public notices online, they are already there. Thanks to the Texas Press Association, Texas newspapers not only publish public notices on print and on their websites, but they combine all their notices into a free, searchable statewide website. Readers can even sign up for email notifications whenever a notice is filed regarding an area of interest to them. All this is at no extra charge to the governmental entity. You can find them at www.txlegalnotices.com.

"Discovering" a public notice in the newspaper may be how a citizen first hears of governmental plans that have an important impact on him — actions such as annexations, zoning changes, school attendance zone revisions, tax increases, bond issues, large governmental purchases, or planned projects with environmental or quality-of-life impacts such as landfills and oil and gas wells. The elderly, the poor, minorities and rural residents are statistically less likely to have internet access than other groups. Eliminating print notice would effectively disenfranchise these citizens from civic involvement. Not everyone has access to the Internet, even in today's world of smart phones and iPads. Fortunately, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court and the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District have passed resolutions stating they want to keep public notices in newspapers. At The Stockman we have also assisted the county and school district in publishing public notices. We encourage other newspapers to do the same. By doing so, we can send a message to state officials that public notices in newspapers still matter.

answered in public notices. The representatives and

state senators who have filed these bills have justified their reasons by stating that the local governments need to cut spending and by eliminating printed public notices they will save taxpayer money.

To the contrary, taxpayers will be robbed of access to information, while the local government saves less than 1 percent of their budget.

One particular bill, House Bill 1019 by Dan Flynn, R-Canton, and Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio. would require newspapers to post the notice only on the website, and removes the print requirement.

Flynn's argument for this is that it would "allow local governments who choose the online option to save a great deal of taxpayer money as they struggle to keep taxes low and continue to provide services.³

He also states that this bill "allows local governments to decide how best to notify its citizenry" and "allows citizens to provide input to their local governments on what works best for that area instead of the current system that requires print notices where that is not the best option."

If citizens are allowed to provide input to their local governments on what works best for them, we believe they would say printed

Newspapers provide an objective, trusted source for public notice advertising.

Texas taxpayers have the right to be informed about the activities of their governing bodies, whether it is on the state, county or school board level.

While saving taxpayer money is important, we ask that public notices remain in newspapers. Passage of these bills would be a step backward for open government.

Texas Senate bills set stage for tax, debt relief

AUSTIN — A trio of powerful state senators, along with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, on March 5 jointly announced the filing of legislation they coauthored to cut taxes and pay off state debt.

Patrick, who presides over the 31-member Senate, Senate Finance Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound; Senate Business & Commerce Chair Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler; and Senate Finance Vice Chair Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, each delivered brief statements.

Patrick said the state constitution limits spending to no more than the growth of the Texas economy and appropriations intended to cut taxes or reduce state debt also count against the spending cap. The legislation, in the form of a bill and a joint resolution, if passed and signed into law, would allow voters to decide whether or not to exempt tax cuts and debt payments from the state's constitutional spending limit.

"Debts today become taxes tomorrow," Hinojosa explained. "As Texans we pride ourselves as a pay-as-you-gostate, but in the past 12 years our state and local debt has skyrocketed. As responsible stewards of taxpayer dollars we need to rein in our dependence on debt and get serious about paying off our current outstanding debt. Exempting appropriations for tax relief and debt relief from the spending cap will free up more dollars for critical areas like education and infrastructure in the state budget without busting the constitutional spending cap."

The legislation has been sent to the Senate Finance Committee for consideration, and companion bills have been filed in the House by state Rep. Jim Keffer, R-Eastland.

TRANSPORTATION BILLS PASS

On votes of 28-2, the Senate tentatively approved two measures intended to increase transportation funding.

Committee Substitute Senate Bill 5 and Senate Joint Resolution 5 by Transportation Committee Chair Robert Nichols, R-Jacksonville, would let voters decide whether to approve a split in the state motor vehicle sales tax. The bills have moved to the House for consideration.

As CSSB 5 is presently worded, the first \$2.5 billion in that class of revenue would go into general revenue and the next \$2.5 billion would be dedicated to the Texas Department of Transportation. Further revenue collected by the state would be split so the comptroller would deposit 50 percent to the State

Highway Fund, 30 percent to the general revenue fund and 20 percent to the Available School Fund.

Sens. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, and Kirk Watson, D-Austin, cast votes in opposition. In an excerpt from a longer statement explaining his vote, Ellis said, "Dedicated funds are poor public





Betty moved to town and as long as her health lasted, she traveled to see things she had never been able to see. One day she decided to register as



a resident at Crockett County Care Center. The most comforting influence while a resident were the visits of Art Roan, Les Hale, and her soul mate Nancy Smith. She became a dominant influence in the lives of not only other residents but also workers and staff. She had a special relationship with Benny. She was greatly loved by them. She shared with them her intimate desires as to what her preference were in living and in dying. The care center staff donated her burial clothes and helped Kerbow funeral home in the cosmetic details.

Betty deeply loved her care takers. Because they treated Betty so honorably and graciously, all memorial gifts would be a deserving "Thank You" if sent to Crockett County Care Center in Honor of Betty Jo Beckett Harrell.

by a committee composed of judges from around the state provides a competent and pragmatic approach in supervising a necessary infrastructure to maintain important ethics laws and transparency in our state government.'

In 2013, Governor Perry questioned the confidence he had in the Travis County District Attorney following her arrest and conviction for DWI.

He subsequently vetoed state funding for the unit. Since then, the unit has remained partially funded using Travis County taxpayer dollars. The Texas House of Representatives' base budget includes funding for the Public Integrity Unit, contingent upon its relocation away from the DA's office.

Murr, after meeting with representatives of the Governor's office, Speaker's office and the Office of Court Administration, filed HB 2222. Governor Abbott, in his State of the State address, proclaimed ethics legislation as one of five emergency items that he asked the Legislature to give expedited attention.

Murr said, "The public has an expectation that Texas have ethics laws in place to ensure that we operate state government in a transparent manner and hold those who do not follow our laws accountable for their conduct. At the same time, we do not want a system where politics and personalities inject distrust and skepticism into any prosecution. With all the media attention surrounding the current status of the Public Integrity Unit, I want to make sure there is a viable and thought-out plan in place to restore integrity in this process."

"At the time all this was proposed by Shannon, the lot was not available. We all know the rehab is a true blessing. We would never consider doing anything less for them than what they've got now," said John L. Henderson, Care Center Board President.

Commissioners Eligio Martinez and Pleas Childress III both said the lot was the best place for the new clinic to be located.

"I've since the beginning I don't want to do anything to disturb the rehab. To know it down, that would be a shame," Martinez said.

The county is aiming to place the proposed clinic, along with a proposed new jail, as a bond in the November election.

The commissioners also approved to select DRG Architects, PLLC, for the proposed jail, and O'Connell Robertson, for the new jail, as architects, and authorized County Judge Fred Deaton and recently hired attorneys Bickerstaff Heath Delgado Acosta LLP to negotiate the contracts.

The firm of Specialized Public Finance Inc. was also approved by the commissioners. This is the same firm that CCCCSD used for their \$3 million bond.

FIRE DEPARTMENT AGREEMENT

The commissioners and members of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department discussed the interlocal agreement between the county and the fire department.

County Attorney Jody Upham said the agreement states



The commissioners and the fire department have to approve the final agreement. Upham said anything

that the agreement does not mention, state law takes over. A couple of items that were addressed included the fire department's county budget.

Both entities agreed that the county will set a budget each year, and that if the fire department has an expense that will cause their budget to go over it needs to be brought to commissioners' court.

"We've treated the fire department the same as we've treated any other county department in dealing with budget. If something is really big we do like to know about it, especially if it's going to bust the budget later in the year," Deaton said.

Both groups also agreed that if gross negligence is involved in using the fire department equipment owned by the county, the fire department will be responsible for the expense.

"Accidents happen and those are okay. I just want to be sure, since I represent the county, that the county is protected," Upham said.

Normally, gross negligence would be determined by the court, Deaton said.

Upham said she would fix changes made to the agreement. The commissioners said they would call a special meeting to approve when the agreement is ready.

The commissioners also



approved to allow Road Department Supervisor Jeffrey Stuart to hire contractor and oversee the job on repairing the fire department building.

CARE CENTER

Care Center Administrator Robert Stecher said the center recently received a visit from three state agencies.

Stecher said on the health care side, the center did not receive any deficiencies.

For maintenance, Stecher said the center had eight tags. Most of the items have already been fixed, or can be fixed easily.


With the center's documentation, Stecher said he is expecting to state to come back with a report on some problems.







OVFD receives new thermal imaging camera

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department purchased a new thermal imaging camera thanks to a \$15,000 grant awarded by Texas A&M Forest Service through the Rural VFD Assistance Program.

The camera will assist volunteers on the scene of a fire during search and rescue.

"The camera we had before was old and outdated," Fire Chief Brian Morrow stated. "We needed the grant funding to be able to afford this new camera."

The new camera comes with many updated features that help expedite the process of search and rescue.

"It shows temperatures and records video with a color screen compared to the old camera that used black and white and allows you to see deeper into the heat source," Morrow said. "The throttle control can discount the heat emitted by the light bulb, so
