Graduation policy stands

The CCCSD School Board has decided to keep the district's current graduation policy.

At the April 15 regular meeting, the board voted to keep the current policy. Board member Roland DeHoyos abstained from voting.

"I told you all that we have a good policy in place. There are still accountability standards we need to hold over these students," said Superintendent Raul Chavarria.

Four students have not met the policy's requirement in regards to attending extra tutoring and help.

OHS offered summer school and a boot camp during four Saturdays in November to help students

pass the end-of-course exams required by the state.

According to OHS Principal Ronny Clayton's information these four students did not attend either program offered.

The district's policy states a student who fail pass their EOC tests by the end of grade 11 shall "enroll in, attend, and participate in the remediation summer school session and the summer retest session, as well as in all applicable remediation courses, tutoring programs, and retesting opportunities throughout the grade 12 school year until the student has met all applicable exit-level and EOC testing requirements."

The policy also states that "teachers and counselors shall consider the

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Questions on sheriff's office handling of recent incidents

Dear Editor,

The question of the month is lazy, stupid or crooked, and it is about the Crockett County Sheriff's Department.

In the last two months the following incidents have occurred.

The incidents were treated as civil matters upon initial contact.

Number one, a juvenile

was shot at while at a Stripes Store.

The weapon was a BB Gun that missed the victim and struck a 2015 Chevrolet Pickup. No report because it was a BB gun and I have been told by a deputy that they do not take criminal mischief reports on the damage to the pickup.

State law mandates a report on the assault so a report was made. However, the victim

and his mother have not been updated on the case.

Number two, a theft of air lines from a trailer. The deputy refused to make a report and stated it was a civil matter.

Number three, a person knows he is leaking diesel and knows that it is against the law to spill diesel on roads.

The person pulls into a local motel and makes no effort

to stop the leak, or contain the leak, and let it do approximately \$15,000 worth of damage. The deputy stated that it was a civil matter.

When ask if he was familiar with the penal code, he still refused to take a report. He stated that it was not criminal mischief, but it might be reckless damage.

Reckless damage is a Class C misdemeanor with a \$200

fine. The deputy did tell the manager that if she failed to clean the parking lot that the sheriff's office would file on her. I have called the sheriff on two of these situations.

He responded to one of the calls and an assault report was taken. The damage to the pickup was left for the owner to fix.

On the second call, the sheriff was ill and sent a depu-

ty to speak with me. He failed to follow up, so I didn't even call on the third incident.

These are three incidents that I am personally aware of how many others are there? What is the Crockett County Sheriff's Office doing, besides dodging calls and not making reports.

Cyber attacks

Cybersecurity. It's the latest buzzword. Your colleagues worry about it. The talking heads on TV analyze it. Congress holds hearings about it. And when your credit card company sends you a letter about it, you wonder just how concerned you should be.

Long before the word cybersecurity was coined, governments, companies and individuals were victims of cyber breaches. For as long as there has been sensitive information available on the web, there have been bad actors trying to access it and use it in a destructive way.

But no longer are cyber attacks just about identity thieves trying to steal personal information. They have evolved into something far more insidious.

During my time in the CIA, national security was my greatest priority. And while some of my days were spent in the back alleys of foreign nations recruiting spies and stealing secrets, the increasing number of cyber attacks drew more and more of our attention and resources.

So, what's at stake? National secrets are at risk. Cyber espionage against our government and U.S. companies is a daily problem. The U.S. Government Accountability Office recently announced that flight controls on commercial flights are vulnerable to attack by passengers using the plane's wireless system. And perhaps most frightening, patients dependent on medical devices that are controlled through a wireless system are also at risk by hackers.

Cyber attacks allow micro actors to have a macro impact, disrupting the lives of individuals and potentially causing devastation at a much greater level. While we can all agree that cyber attacks are a serious threat, there's no clear agreement on how to address it. But one of the reasons I wanted to serve in Congress is to use my expertise to help shape cybersecurity policy, finding the best way to protect the lives and information of American citizens, businesses and our government, while upholding privacy rights. I know from experience that if we're going to stay a step ahead of hackers, government and businesses are going to have to work together, sharing the cyber threat indicators needed to create a strong defense.

The House's previous attempts to pass cyber and information sharing legislation have been thwarted by the President's threats to veto this legislation. But his recent announcement that cyber attacks are a national security issue give me hope that he's ready to work with Congress.

The Committee on Homeland Security, which I sit on, got the ball rolling last week with the bipartisan National Cybersecurity Protection Advancement Act, which passed out of committee unanimously. This is a pro-privacy, pro-security bill that ensures that information sharing is transparent and timely by providing liability protection to companies for the voluntary sharing of cyber threat indicators with the public and private sectors. It includes robust privacy protections by requiring the public sector to comply with all civilian laws that protect the privacy and civil liberties of American citizens.

In an effort to help small businesses, I offered an amendment to the Act which will give small and medium sized cyber firms the same access to government resources that are currently enjoyed by the large firms. These smaller companies, many of them located in San Antonio, are doing great things every day that are helping to protect other small and medium sized businesses. These groups perform at a high level and make up the bulk of the economy for this industry — they deserve the same access that a larger company has. Including them helps every company fighting this fight, large and small.

I helped build a cybersecurity firm over the last four years, so I know first-hand the threats companies face. My time in the CIA showed me the lengths to which the bad guys are willing to go. I will continue to work with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to make sure that information sharing legislation makes it all the way to the President's desk.

Count Your Blessings

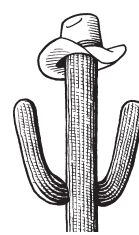

Senate passes version of 2016-2017 state budget

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate on April 14 passed its version of the 2016-2017 state budget. Because the House- and Senate-approved budgets are \$1.6 billion apart, five Senate members and five House members will be appointed to a conference committee to resolve differences.

The Senate's version of the budget totals \$211 billion in state and federal funds to pay for state services over the next two fiscal years. Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, who spearheaded the writing of the legislation, said the budget is one that "will keep our state strong, prosperous and compassionate."

Nelson pointed out that transportation funding under CSBH 1 would increase by almost \$5 billion over the current allotment. "That includes \$2.4 billion in oil and gas tax revenues approved by voters last November and \$1.3

billion from ending diversions of transportation funds to other parts of the budget. The rest of the additional money is contingent on passage of a measure that would authorize a one-time shift of motor vehicle sales tax funds to the Texas Department of Transportation."

According to Senate documents, CSBH 1 also would fund border security efforts at "unprecedented levels" by sending \$811 million to the Texas Department of Public Safety and associated agencies to pay for manpower, technology and training along the border. Nelson also said CSBH 1 devotes \$373 million to cover caseload growth in Medicaid.

SENATE PASSES CONTRACT BILL

Senate Bill 543, legislation to strengthen oversight and

management of state contracts by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, was unanimously approved by the full Senate on April 14.

"Poor management of some contracts results in inadequate delivery of goods and services and costs taxpayers millions of dollars," Zaffirini said, adding that her bill "would improve state contracting at every stage of the process, including planning, procurement, contract formation and oversight."

SB 543, Zaffirini said, is complementary to SB 20 by Senate Finance Committee Chair Nelson, passed by the Senate last month to crack down on the contracting practices of state agencies.

Both bills have come in the wake of a series of investigative stories by the Austin American-Statesman that

brought to light a \$110-million no-bid contract awarded by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

To celebrate Arbor Day, the Ozona Garden Club will plant a live oak tree in the Rodeo Park to replace one of the old dead trees.

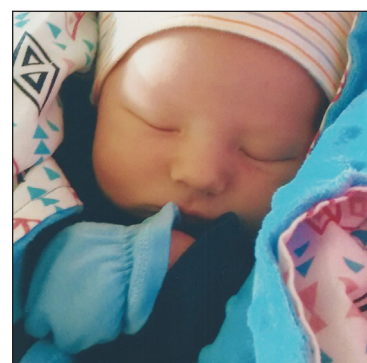

Reverend Monsignor James Alton Plagens

Reverend Monsignor James Alton Plagens, senior priest at St. Ann's Church in Midland, died Friday, April 17, 2015, following complications from lung cancer. He was 77.

A Rosary and Vigil for Msgr. Plagens was held, Sunday, April 19, 2015, at St. Ann's Church, 1906 W. Texas Ave., Midland. A Funeral Mass was held Monday, April 20, 2015, at St. Ann's Church. His body will be cremated and burial will be at the St. Lawrence Cemetery at 10:30 a.m., Monday, May 4, 2015.

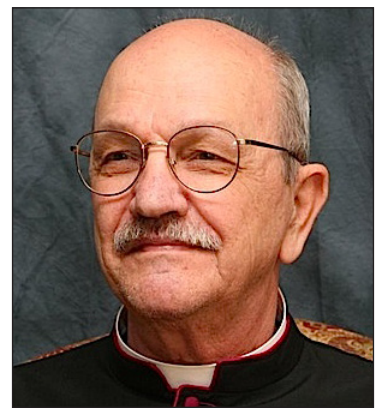
Msgr. Plagens was born on February 15, 1938, in Bryan, Texas. He was baptized at St. Joseph's Church in Bryan on March 10, 1938. After graduating from Wall High School, Msgr. Plagens earned his Associates Degree from San Angelo College in 1959. He attended seminary at St. Mary's in Lebanon, Kentucky (1959-1962), and the North American College and Gregorian University, in Rome (1962-1966). Msgr. Plagens was in Rome at the time of the Second Vatican Council and later returned upon the 50th anniversary of the council in 2013. He was honored with the title of "Monsignor" (Chaplain to His Holiness) in February 2009.

Msgr. Plagens was ordained a priest in the Diocese of San Angelo on December 18, 1965 by Bishop Francis F. Reh, at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

His first assignment was at St. Mary's Church in Odessa (assistant pastor, 1966-1970), during which time he also served Our Lady of Lourdes in Imperial and St. Isidore in Coynosa. Assignments that followed were at St. Therese in Carlsbad, Texas, and St. Paschal in Sterling City (pastor, 1970-1971); Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Ozona, (pastor, 1971-1977); St. Francis of Assisi, Abilene, (pastor, 1977-1981); St. Ambrose in Wall and Holy Family in Mereta, (pastor, 1982-1992); St. Patrick in Brady and St. Francis Xavier in Melvin, (pastor, 1992-1996); Director of Parish Leadership in the diocesan office (1996-1999); Sacred Heart and St. Thomas parishes in Big Spring (pastor, 1999-2008), and Immaculate Heart of Mary, Big Spring (parochial administrator, 2000). Msgr. Plagens served St. Ann's in Midland as Senior Priest (2008-2011). His official retirement date was December 31, 2011.

Msgr. Plagens spent two years studying at Catholic University in Washington, D.C. (1980-1982), receiving his Master of Arts in Liturgical Studies. He received two appointments as Promoter of Justice for the Diocese of San Angelo in 1991 and 1994.

Msgr. Plagens' knowledge of church liturgy ran deep. He served as chairperson for the Diocesan Liturgy Committee for many years; was a member of the board of



directors on the Southwest Liturgy Conference, and a member of the National Federation of the Diocesan Liturgy Commission. He was a member of the diocesan Senate of Priests.

A once avid downhill snow skier, he was known by parishioners for his kindness, soft-spoken compassion and love of food. Msgr. Plagens provided gentle counsel to thousands of West Texas Catholics during a vocation that spanned 49 years. His hobbies included playing and watching tennis, family genealogy, cooking (and eating!), and travel.

Msgr. Plagens is preceded in death by his mother, Victoria Opersteny Plagens, and father, Edward Plagens, Sr., both formerly of Bryan, Texas; brother Norman Plagens, formerly of Rankin, Texas; brother Clarence Plagens, formerly of Rockwall, Texas; Emory Lero, brother-in-law, formerly of Bryan, Texas, and Wanda Plagens, sister-in-law, formerly of Hamilton, Texas.

He is survived by seven of nine siblings: brother Milton Plagens and his wife, Albina, of San Angelo, Texas; sister Alice Lero, of Bryan, Texas; brother Edward Plagens Jr., and wife, Bernadette, of St. Lawrence, Texas; brother Frank Plagens and wife, Cathy, of Richardson, Texas; brother Donald Plagens and wife, Lynn, of Hamilton, Texas; brother Earl, and wife, Sheila, of Colorado City, Texas; brother Robert Plagens, and wife, Cathy, of Bryan, Texas; sister-in-law Georgia Plagens, of Midland; sister-in-law Leigh Plagens, of Rockwall, Texas, and 30 nieces and nephews.

When Msgr. Plagens was diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer, Team Plagens was formed. Four loving and caring couples from St. Ann's came forward to unite with the Plagens' family to help provide care, medical support and comfort for James. They are Ed and Terrie Martinez, Tony and Nanette Paredes, Rene and Nancy del Villar, and Torivio and Norma Duran.

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Death Tax repeal passes U.S. House

In support of the family owned ranches, farms and small businesses in his district, U.S. Rep. Will Hurd, R-San Antonio, voted in favor of the bipartisan bill that permanently repeals the Death Tax. Hurd cosponsored the Death Tax Repeal Act of 2015, originally introduced by fellow Texas Congressman, Kevin Brady, which passed the U.S. House of Representatives today 240 to 179.

"I've had enough of the hypocrites who talk about achieving the American

Dream and then support policies that punish the families who do," said Hurd.

"Family ranches, farms and small businesses across the district work hard and sacrifice to build something they can pass on to the next generation. Blindsiding a family who has just lost a loved one with a 40 percent tax bill that may cause them to lose their family business

is immoral and un-American." Total annual receipts for the Death Tax to the Federal Treasury account for less than two days of federal spending, yet the Death Tax remains the leading reason that family farms are not successfully passed down from one generation to the next.

"It is especially important in Texas, where so many of our family-owned businesses, such as farms and ranches, are asset-rich and cash-poor," said Will Newton, Texas Executive Director of the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB).

student's particular circumstances in determining appropriate opportunities, which may include, but are not limited to: individualized work, tutorial sessions, testing to verify mastery of the essential knowledge and skills and early final examinations."

The state legislature is currently dealing with this same issue. On March 17, the Texas Senate passed Senate Bill 149, which would allow panels made up of educators, counselors and parents to weigh factors like grades, college entrance exam scores and attendance to decide whether a student should graduate despite poor performance on state standardized exams. The issue is now in the Texas House for debate. The bill would affect students graduating in May.

Chavarria said since the March 25 meeting, nothing has been done in the house in regards to the bill.

Board President David McWilliams said the district is a "needs requirement district" at this time, and that if teachers are to be held accountable for these test scores they have to have some tools or some incentive.

"Personally, I have nothing

against anybody making their own choices for their family. For those students who may have a difficult time passing it, I feel like we have a good policy in place where if they (students) attend summer school and all those remediation classes that allows those students to be able to walk in commencement exercises. We have to make decisions that affect 800 kids and what's best for them," McWilliams said.

Board Vice President Orlando DeHoyos said the policy allows students who make efforts at trying to complete the tutorial program or summer school to participate in the commencement ceremony.

"If they will just make an effort that is enough for me," Orlando DeHoyos said. "Our policy allows for that. You need to show us, as far as a student, that you are concerned and what the rules are for graduation. You put all these years to get to this point."

Roland DeHoyos said his son attended a Saturday School and the teacher was not present. He said he wanted to make sure students would be held accountable for attending.

"If they made any kind of effort to get these tests done. I want them to be considered," Roland DeHoyos said.

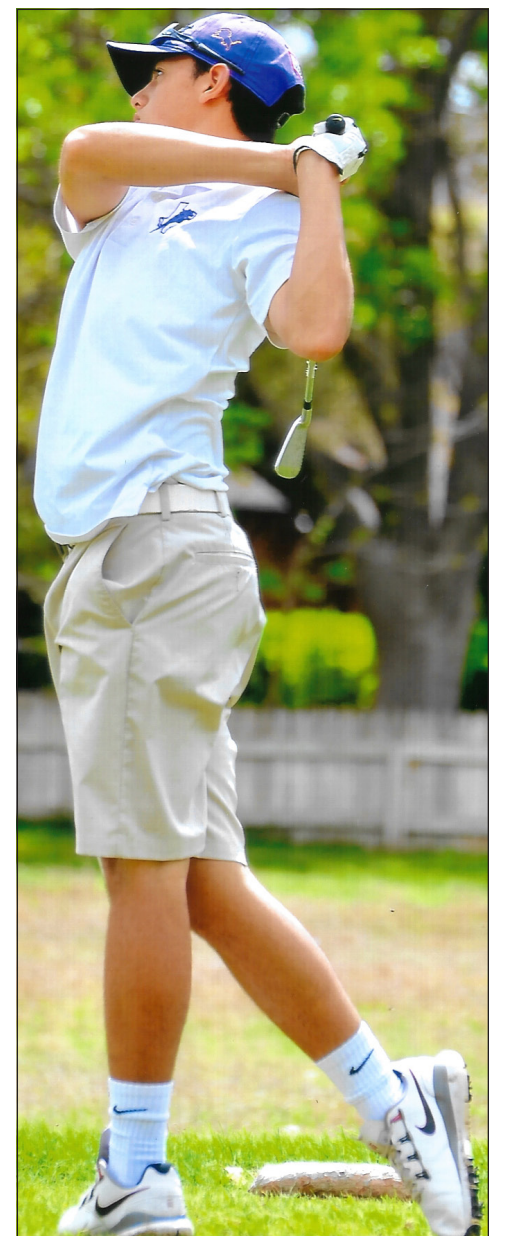
The OHS Golf Team placed sixth at the Region I-2A meet last week in Odessa.

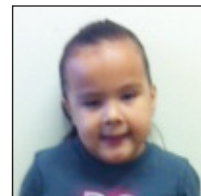

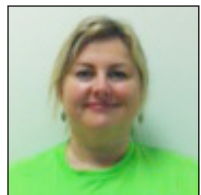

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Uresti responds to Senate passage of HB 1

The Texas Senate passed HB 1, the state budget for the 2016-2017 biennium on April 14.

Senator Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, appointed to the Senate Finance Committee for the first time, joined 29 Senators in voting aye on the budget.

Uresti spoke on the Senate floor to highlight the increase of \$41 million for Child Protective Services prevention programs. HB 1 will now go to conference committee where appointed members will negotiate differences between the House and Senate budgets.

"I've stood on this floor for many sessions to bring attention to the lack of pre-

vention dollars. Ignoring the prevention side and only addressing child abuse after it occurs has cost our state millions of dollars and countless lives. I am happy and hopeful to stand today and acknowledge the important step forward we are taking toward funding prevention and the needs of our children in this budget.

"We have a legal and moral obligation to take care of our children, and this budget helps us to accomplish that," said Uresti

HB 1 ends the diversion of funds intended for the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT), and increases spending on roads by \$5 billion.

"It has been a long road to ending these diversions. Texans are spending too much time in traffic, and it's hurting not only our businesses, but taking away time we'd rather be spending with our families. This budget will jumpstart relief in some of our congested areas," said Uresti

array along the Texas-Mexico border, was responsible for some 29,300 apprehensions and more than 44 tons of drugs seized in 2014.

Motion-detection cameras used in "Operation Drawbridge" are placed on farms and ranches near the border. According to the DPS, when a smuggling or suspicious event is detected, an alert is sent to border county sheriffs, the U.S. Border Patrol and the DPS, who work together to arrest suspects.

TRAFFIC CAMERA BILL MOVES

Senate Bill 714 by Sen. Bob Hall, R-Edgewood, legislation to ban police departments' use of red light cameras in the ticketing of motorists, was passed by the Senate Transportation Committee on April 13. The bill next will be considered by the full Senate.

Figures furnished by the state Comptroller's office suggest that banning the au-

tomated cameras statewide would result in an estimated loss of \$96.5 million in general revenue in fiscal year 2016.

JOBLESS RATE FALLS IN MARCH

Texas Workforce Commission on April 17 announced the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped to 4.2 percent in March, down from 4.3 percent in February.

According to the agency, Texas has not seen a rate this low since July 2007 and continues to trend below the national average of 5.5 percent. Notably, however, the Mining and Logging sector, which includes oil and gas employment, saw a decline in March with the loss of an estimated 2,800 jobs statewide.

HOUSE APPROVES 'CARRY' BILL

On a vote of 96-35, the House on April 17 tentatively approved CSHB 910, allowing a person who is licensed to carry a handgun to openly carry a holstered handgun. A final vote on the bill may be taken this week.

A House-Senate conference committee would have to be named so differences between the House bill and a similar bill passed earlier by the Senate could be hashed out. A final, agreed-upon version then would go before the House and Senate for a final vote.

Game Warden Field Notes

ALL PLAY AND NO WORK

Near the end of duck season, a Henderson County game warden received a call from the owner of a local gas station. The caller said a black car had pulled up to one of their dumpsters and left a trash bag full of ducks inside. When the warden arrived at the gas station, he saw footage from the station's cameras that showed the individu-

al entering the gas station and paying for several items using a "speed pass." The warden tracked down the individual using information secured from a warrant for the speed pass user's credentials. The out-of-state hunter admitted to dumping the ducks in the dumpster because he did not want to clean them.

NARCOTICS? NOPE. DEER

While executing a search warrant for narcotics, the Polk County Sheriff's Department uncovered evidence of multiple illegally taken whitetail deer. A Polk County game warden was called in to investigate. One individual confessed to taking at least four deer on his own property, though the evidence suggested other individuals took several more deer. None of the individuals had hunting licenses. The investigation concerning other deer taken on the property is ongoing.
