Bond projects presented to school board

The \$3 million school bond money will be used for transportation, technology, maintenance and tennis courts.

During the May 20 regular meeting, CCCCSD Superintendent Raul Chavarria presented the school board with a priority list for the bond funds. Crockett County Voters passed the bond in November 2014.

In transportation, the district is allocating around \$777,225. That includes one charter bus, two activity buses, two small yellow route buses and 1 small 14-passenger bus.

The two activity buses

are being paid for as part of a settlement agreement between Blue Star Sales and the district, after the district had previously purchased buses that kept breaking down and needing repairs.

Chavarria said the activity buses should arrive before school starts in the fall, and that the two yellow route buses have been ordered.

Chavarria also said he is recommending that every two years the district budget for a new bus and every three years budget for a new activity bus.

bunga led the event, which included remembering local veterans and active military service men and women.

On technology, the district has already spent \$325,406, which includes new computers for the elementary school labs, re-

placing teacher laptops, new network management system and hardware and updating wiring and installing wireless technology for all campuses.

The district allocated \$400,000 for technology. Chavarria said the \$74,000 left will be for emergency use.

Abbott, Patrick, Straus announce tax relief compromise

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Joe Straus on May 21 jointly announced a \$3.8 billion tax relief package for Texas businesses and homeowners.

According to the announcement, the agreement reached by Patrick and Straus on a tax proposal, along with additional legislation, includes:

1. A 25 percent permanent reduction in the business margins tax;

2. A \$10,000 increase in the homestead exemption, beginning in 2015, subject to passage of a constitutional amendment adopted in the November election; and

3. SB 1760, legislation requiring a 60 percent vote of the governing body of any taxing unit wishing to adopt an increase in property taxes that exceeds the effective tax rate.

"Texas leaders have come together to advance conservative principles that will improve the lives of Texans and continue to make Texas the model for doing business," Abbott said. "Every dollar businesses and homeowners pay in taxes is a dollar that could be invested in new jobs, higher wages and stimulating the Texas economy."

Meanwhile, the passage of a state budget for fiscal years 2016 and 2017, the Legislature's primary task, is in its final stages. The buzz around the Capitol before Memorial Day weekend was that with tax relief resolved, an agreement on the budget that will satisfy the governor's expectations will soon follow.

UNEMPLOYMENT NUMBERS REPORTED

Texas Workforce Commission on May 22 reported Texas has added an estimated 287,000 seasonally adjusted

jobs over the past year including a modest gain in April with the addition of 1,200 positions during the month.

The state unemployment rate remained steady at 4.2 percent in April, down a full percentage point from 5.2 percent a year ago. Texas continues to trend well below the national unemployment rate of 5.4 percent.

Job gains for April were led by the Leisure and Hospitality industry, which added 6,900 positions. The Information industry enjoyed its largest monthly gain for the industry since June 2000 with the addition of 3,400 jobs in April. Other Services gained 2,800 jobs during the month followed by Trade, Transportation and Utilities, which expanded by 2,100 positions.

"We know that there are still folks who are looking for good-paying jobs in our state and we encourage them to take advantage of the many resources made available through Texas Workforce Solutions," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. 

In maintenance, the district is allocating \$822,775 for replacing old air conditioning and heating units, resurfacing the track, repairing roof leaks at the middle school, addressing safety issues in the vocational ag classroom and updating and repairing teacher housing.

Chavarria said the track does not need resurfacing now, but they will put up the money for when the time

Board member Dwight Childress asked about getting a cost estimate to add an eighth lane to the current track.

"Every year we get this same complaint that we can't have a district track meet because we have seven lanes," Childress said.

On the school housing, Lopez Construction is currently working on upgrading and renovating the houses. New electrical wiring, additional rooms and space, new floor tiles and other upgrades are being done.

"This is going to take time," Chavarria said. "We want to expand and create more room in the houses for families."

The final item on the list is \$1 million allocated for new tennis courts.

"We have not spent any bond money other than what is listed," Chavarria said. "We have not strayed from what we intended."

Chavarria said the board will discuss the items further in budget workshops this summer.

TEACHER SALARIES

Chavarria also presented the board with information comparing teacher salaries in Ozona to the state pay scale.

Ozona has always advertised that the district pays \$6,000 about the state rate, but after doing the comparison Ozona actually pays \$7,600 above the state rate, Chavarria said.

"That's a feather in the cap of this board working to do that. We are one of the better paying district's in this entire region," Chavarria said.

Ozona also pays for health insurance and provides school housing.

"There's not that many districts in this entire region that pay insurance for their employees," Chavarria said. "That said that doesn't put a stop to any discussion to take care of our teachers. That is a commitment of our board to make sure we remain competitive and to explore this year by year."

BASEBALL FIELD

Chavarria also commended the board and the county for working together on the recent renovations of the OHS Baseball Field.

Total cost of the project was \$288,150. The county paid \$100,000 with the rest paid by the school district.

"We have a class A facility, in conjunction with the county, that our kids can use for many years to come," Chavarria said.

Ozona hosted a playoff game this month at the field between Harper and Kenedy.

"Word has gotten out that our facility is available and what a great facility it is," Chavarria said.

GRADUATION BILL

The board approved a resolution to approve immediate implementation of State Senate Bill 149.

Gov. Greg Abbott signed the bill into law on May 11. The bill states that panels made up of educators, counselors and parents will weigh factors such as grades, college entrance exam scores and attendance to decide whether a high school student should earn a diploma despite poor performance on



strictions and the penalty for selling e-cigarettes to minors would be a fine of up to \$500, the same as selling tobacco products to a minor. If Gov. Abbott signs the bill into law, it will take effect on Oct. 1.

E-cigarettes vaporize a liquid containing nicotine that is inhaled by the user. Hinojosa expressed concern that use of "vaping" products is growing among younger Texans, saying, "We now have many minors using e-cigs in school because they think that it is a way to avoid smoking tobacco cigarettes."

A 2014 survey by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Federal Drug Administration shows e-cigarette use increasing from 4.5 percent to 13.4 percent of high school students and 1.1 percent to 3.9 percent of middle school students in a single year.

TPW Commission renames portion of Devils River State Natural Area

TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE

AUSTIN - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Thursday authorized the renaming of the Big Satan Unit of the Devils River State Natural Area. The new Dan A. Hughes Unit honors the role of its namesake in helping the state acquire this unique property.

Hughes, father of TPW Commission chairman Dan A. Hughes Jr., is a well-known South Texas oil and gas businessman, outdoors enthusiast and conservationist. In 2010, Hughes led a key group of individuals in raising more than \$10 million in private donations toward the purchase of 17,000 acres along the Devils River in Val Verde County. The donations also helped cover initial operating expenses as well as development of a master plan for joint pub-

lic use of the property and the 20,000-acre Del Norte Unit of the Devils River State Natural Area about 13 miles upstream.


"The acquisition of this culturally and environmentally unique piece of Texas likely could not have happened without Mr. Hughes' spirit of generosity and leadership," said Carter Smith, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department executive director. "The Department today took an important step to thank an individual who has given so much in the name of conservation and our great outdoors. Thanks to all the donors who made this possible, future generations of Texans will forever be able to see firsthand why Mr. Hughes was so passionate about protecting this Unit and this most pristine of rivers for the enjoyment of all."

The Dan A. Hughes Unit has 10 miles of frontage on the Devils River and Amistad Reservoir with spectacular views from mesas and canyons, and a variety of wildlife habitats.

At Del Norte, visitors can enjoy day hiking, primitive camping, nature viewing, mountain biking, horseback riding, swimming, and fishing. There is also a Group Barracks that holds up to 10 people. The Dan A. Hughes Unit is not yet open to the public.

The Devils River complex is classified as a state natural area instead of a state park. This designation emphasizes the conservation of the properties' unique cultural and natural resources, particularly the spring-fed river considered by scientists to be the most pristine in all the state. Educational and recreational opportunities are being planned that will preserve these special attributes, while at the same time allowing limited, resources-compatible public access and use of these ecologically fragile properties.
