

County appraisal values take a dip

County appraisal values took a dip this year.

At Monday's special commissioners' court meeting, County Judge Fred Deaton said values are down 16 percent. The discussion was part of the commissioners' budget workshop.

County Auditor Janie Chandler presented the commissioners with two sets of proposed revenues. If the commissioners go with a lower tax rate that raises \$9.5 million in tax revenue, the county would be short \$93,520 compared to last year.

County Judge Fred Deaton said that would mean budget cuts.

"It's a volatile oil and gas field out there," Deaton said. "You can cut your budget where you can't operate your county."

The proposed effective tax rate for 2015 is \$.59811 per \$100 evaluation. This is around 10 cents higher than last year's rate.

If the commissioners go with the effective tax rate that would raise \$10.5 million in tax revenue, the county would have \$906,480 in extra revenue.

"The extra money may allow for new roofs on the care center and annex buildings," said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The commissioners will have another budget workshop at their Aug. 10 regular meeting, and then again at the end of August. The tax rate will be set at their September meeting.

HORSE BARNS and ARENA

David McGuire, the new Horse Stall and Arena Manager, gave an update to the commissioners.

McGuire said he has 12-14 more horse stalls rented and that everybody is paid up. He also said brought in a vet to get everyone caught up on coggins and vaccinations.

People are also staring to clean their pens, he said.

He also had a bunch of old trailers hauled off, some of which didn't even have tags on them.

"I would still like to make the big barn a little bit more horse friendly. When it was first built, it was built for sheep or pigs," McGuire said. "I know you wanted that horse problem taken care of and it's basically taken care of. I only have two, maybe three stalls left. I'm hoping to try and get a 4-H horse program started, so I'm leaving those open to see if that happens."

McGuire also said he would like to improve the arena to host more play days, rodeos, bull ridings or other events.

"We need to fix it where it's a better facility for all of Ozona. It's really an awesome facility. I'm just trying to make it user friendly and draw people," he said.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga asked McGuire to review the rules of the facilities and come to the commissioners' with any

Lion Stadium may receive new name

CCCCSD School Board discusses honoring the late Coach Sewell

The CCCCSD School Board discussed renaming Lion Stadium in honor of Coach L.T. "Rip" Sewell Monday night.

During a special called meeting, Board Vice President Orlando DeHoyos brought up the item for discussion.

Sewell, who died on July 4, coached in Ozona from 1968-1989. While coaching at Ozona High School, his football teams won several district championships going several rounds into the playoffs. He also coached track and golf, taking teams to the state meets.

Sewell was selected by his peers to the Texas High School Coaches' Association's Hall of Honor in 1986. "He was here for a long time and he was invaluable for his service," DeHoyos said.

DeHoyos said if the board does decide to rename the stadium, he suggests doing an official dedication at the Sept. 25 homecoming game.

"One of the things our administrative staff is working on is the pride of our community, and this might be one place to start," said Board President David McWilliams.

Board Secretary Grizz Medina suggested maybe naming a section of the stadium after Sewell.

The board decided to table the item until their Aug. 19 regular meeting so they could have time for more feedback.

NEW HIRES and RESIGNATIONS

After meeting in executive/closed session for two hours, the board approved the hiring of David Porter for fifth grade social studies, Dena Porter for third grade, Jackie Martinez for Pre-K and Hillary Rodriguez for kindergarten.

They also approved resignations from Justina Saunders, Guy Barnett and Patricia Sutton.

BUDGET WORKSHOP

Superintendent Raul Chavarria told the board that a decision on the increase in the district's health insurance will need to be made by the Aug. 19 meeting.

The district's increase is about \$50 per month for each employee.

Currently, the district contributes \$454, the state contributes \$75 and district employees contribute \$26 per month.

In order to keep the con-

tribution the same, the district would have to make up the difference of \$50, Chavarria said.

Chavarria said he will get options to the board members for consideration later this week.

HOUSING BIDS

The board decided to table approving the bids for housing renovations due to needing clarification on one of the bids.

TSCRA reflects on 84th Texas Legislative Session

This year started off on a busy note as the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) tracked legislation and worked with state elected officials and staff during the 84th Texas Legislative Session, which convened Jan. 13 through June 1.

Over 6,400 pieces of legislation were filed by state legislators and TSCRA leaders and staff tracked over 600 bills and resolutions of interest to ranchers and landowners.

We were actively involved with more bills this session

than ever, proving there are a growing number of issues impacting our members. This is why it is extremely crucial for us to keep these important matters on the radar of elected officials whom we have worked

maintain relationships with over the years.

As we expected, a central topic for TSCRA this session was water. We aggressively monitored and weighed-in on numerous pieces of legislation related to groundwater rights and ownership issues. TSCRA played an active role in opposing legislation that would have infringed on Texans' constitutionally protected groundwater rights. Thankfully, we succeeded in preventing bills from passing that would have ultimately threatened or tak-

en away local management of groundwater.

Additionally, TSCRA represented private property owners this session by being directly involved in many discussions associated with eminent domain legislation. We successfully worked with other landowner groups to block legislation that would have allowed certain entities to misuse the power of eminent domain to drill allocation oil and gas wells on land that many have worked tirelessly and sacrificed to own.

Further, I was proud to see

a balanced budget pass to provide necessary funding for some very important needs in Texas.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) received a 52 percent increase in general revenue funds as a result of Proposition 1 passage in November 2014. Texans will have another opportunity to vote on an additional constitutional amendment this November, which could add another \$2.5 billion toward transportation needs in Texas. We have supported these efforts as

our state continues working to meet growing mobility needs. TSCRA will work to ensure that rural Texas gets its fair share of these dollars.

Also, the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) received a 27 percent increase in general revenue funds and 27 new full-time employees focused on border disease issues and feral swine disease response. These additional resources are crucial to protect the cattle industry from devas-

Congress should reject Iran deal

he pursuit of a nuclear program by Iran is not about energy or weapons; it's about power. Secretary of State John Kerry should have used the recent missed deadline in the nuclear negotiation between Iran and major world powers as an excuse to walk away. He could have finally heeded the advice and guidance of our partners in the region and dealt with Iran as the belligerent exporter of terrorism that it is. By agreeing to a bad deal, they are enabling Iran to use delay tactics to continue its nuclear program to flip the balance of power in the region.

An Iran under the pressure of financial sanctions is dangerous; an Iran without those restrictions and flush with cash is even more dangerous. Under various forms of financial sanctions since 1979, the Iranian government has for the past four decades funded Hezbollah, responsible for numerous terror attacks, including against the Marine barracks in Beirut, the Khobar Towers and U.S. embassies. Now, with Iran set to recover up to \$150 billion from foreign bank accounts frozen due to nuclear sanctions, the Iranians will be well-capitalized to conduct the same types of attacks they are known for while biding their time on nuclear weapons construction.

Lifting the ban on selling traditional arms to Iran is a brazen attempt to further strengthen Iranian military might in the Middle East. Recently, Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov had the audacity to claim, "Lifting the arms embargo would help Iran to advance its efficiency in fighting terrorism." While I understand Foreign Minister Lavrov's interest in ultimately selling weapons to Iran, the exact opposite will happen if this embargo is lifted.

Despite sanctions, the Iranian government has provided small arms and explosives toboth the Taliban and Iraqi militias, which were used to produce IEDs used against coalition forces. Over the past few years, despite sanctions, the Iranian security apparatus has put itself in a position to brag about being in control of four Arab capitals — Baghdad, Damascus, Beirut, and Sanaa.

and Sanaa.
Additionally, as Fred Kagan of the American Enterprise Institute outlines in a recent report, the size and scope of Iran's offensive cyber capabilities has grown significantly in the last few

years and is a very dangerous cyberthreat to U.S. critical infrastructure.

Supporters of Iran are quick to highlight Iranian efforts to fight ISIS in Iraq and Syria. Iran recognizes the threat to

its strategic interest by ISIS, but as the prime minister of Israel, Benjamin Netanyahu, remarked during his March speech to a joint session of Congress, "The enemy of your enemy is still sometimes your enemy."

We don't have to conjecture on what the Iranians believe. Their own words reveal their true intentions. In the midst of the recent negotiations, the Supreme Leader of Iran Ayatollah Ali Khamenei announced last week that the U.S. was an "arrogant power which must be resisted even after a deal."

Having spent almost a decade as an undercover officer in the CIA chasing bad guys, I learned firsthand that previous actions are indicative of future behavior. Iran's bad behavior has been a special focus of the United Nations nuclear watchdog, the International Atomic Energy Agency, or IAEA. The U.S. Institute of Peace outlines that between June 2003 and September 2010, the IAEA issued 30 reports on Iran's nuclear program and its covert activities dating to the 1980s. Tehran initially cooperated with the IAEA, but eventually the agency secured four rounds of sanctions against Iran after finding the Iranians hiding a wide range of strategic nuclear work.

To think the leaders of Iran have changed and won't do this again under a new deal is pure naiveté.

The alternative to walking away from a nuclear deal with Iran is not war. It is additional sanctions that prevent Iran from strengthening its control of the Middle East. The current agreement is indeed historic in the fact that it will only enable Iran to increase its power over the Middle East.

I urge my colleagues in the House and Senate to prevent President Barack Obama from empowering a known enemy. Vote against approving this deal.

never get rid of them, especially now that the feds have outlawed horse slaughter. If you buy one of these elder care horses you have to promise not to sell the horse for export to France and oh, by the way, someone will be by once a week to check on the old flea bag. After much looking I did find one excellent kid's horse that was dog gentle, loaded in a trailer and ate table scraps. But the girl didn't like the horse's name.

I responded to one ad that offered a horse for "\$600, or best offer." The spoiled old plug was so "gentle" I could not raise a pulse. He was a little long in the tooth, and I do mean tooth.(Not in the plural sense).

Naturally, the girl fell in love with the horse at first sight. They had what the father called "obvious chemistry." With visions of blue ribbons running though her head the young girl anxiously asked the owner, "Will I be able to race him in the 4-H horse show?"

"Sure you will," said the owner. "And I have no doubt you will beat him." It was an old, well worn joke but in this case, absolutely true.

Three weeks after the girl got the horse home he went to the big glue factory in the sky and my ex-friends had to pay \$150 for Buzzard Bill to haul his hollow carcass away.

Now there is only one kid's horse left in aptivity.

Governor says family of dead woman deserves answers

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on July 22 issued a statement regarding the arrest and death of Sandra Bland, a 28-year-old Illinois resident who had driven to Hempstead in response to a job offer from Prairie View A&M University. On July 10, Bland was pulled over by a state trooper, arrested and placed in the Waller County jail in Hempstead. Three days later Bland was found dead in her jail cell. Local authorities conducted an autopsy and reported suicide as the cause of death. Bland's family ordered an independent autopsy. "Our hearts and prayers remain with the Bland family for their tragic loss. The family deserves answers. The Texas Rangers, working in coordination with the FBI, will conduct a full and thorough investigation that will deliver those answers and work toward the ultimate goal of ensuring justice in this case," Abbott

wrote. On July 21, Texas Department of Public Safety officials briefed state leaders on the investigation. "DPS has been working closely with the family of Ms. Bland during this investigation and the department extends our sincere condolences for their tragic loss," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "It is important that her family has confidence in the efficacy of this investigation, which is why the Waller County Sheriff's Office and District Attorney originally requested investigative assistance from the Texas Rangers; and it's also why DPS requested the FBI assist in this investigation." The DPS posted on its website the state trooper's dash camera video from the traffic stop. Also, video footage showing activity in the jail at the time

of the discovery of the body

was widely broadcast.

COURT DISMISSES COERCION CHARGE

Texas' 3rd Court of Appeals on July 24 dismissed one count of a two-count felony indictment handed down in August 2014 by a Travis County grand jury against Rick Perry for actions he took as governor in 2013. The court threw out the count of official coercion against Perry for demanding the resignation of the head of the state's Public Integrity Unit, Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg, in the spring of 2013 after she was arrested and jailed for drunken driving. Lehmberg apologized for her actions but refused to resign. Perry then vetoed the unit's \$7.5 million in state funding. Texans for Public Justice, an Austin-

based government watchdog organization, filed the original criminal complaints against Perry. The other count, alleging abuse of power, remains pending and could be set for a court date

Sales Tax **Holiday** is Aug.

This year's Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 7 - 9. As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.

All sales of qualifying items made during the holiday period qualify for the exemption, including items sold online, or by telephone or mail. Lay-away plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax holiday.

The dates for the sales tax holiday are set by the Legislature.

Dress Code Reminders

At CCCCSD we believe that we should "dress for success". Clothes matter a lot to everyone. They affect how we feel about ourselves and how well we can function at school.

We had a lot of violations of dress code this last year at CCCCSD, and so we want to before school begins.

Here are some guidelines from our handbook, as well as, a copy of the dress code section from our handbook, so parents and students can make good clothing choices.

SHORTS

We have had some short, shorts last year at CCCCSD, and so we are giving our school kids a rule – "shorts and skirts of modest length" is the statement in the handbook and for our kids "modest length" is either 2 inches below the fingertips OR 3 inches above the knee that is the "Target Modest Zone" at CCCCSD!

OUR DRESS CODE ALSO STATES THAT:

- "shirts or tops with spaghetti straps and tank tops are not permitted"
- "shirts or tops which expose the midriff are not permitted"

· "hair styles (such as Mohawks, they are not appropriate at OES and OMS)

- · accessories, clothing or lack of clothing that are extreme or disrupt, distract or interfere with the learning process will not be permitted" for us at CCCCSD this means:
- that any shirt you wear clearly set the boundaries up must have a shoulder panel of at least 3 fingers wide,
 - no exposed shoulders or shoulder blades,
 - no exposed undergarments of any kind.
 - If a student wears leggings, then the shirt over the leggings must be of "modest length" which is either 2 inches below the fingertips OR 3 inches above the knee
 - this also means that if your shirt shows any cleavage you will be made to change into a T-shirt from the office until the end of the day or until another shirt is brought to you from home
 - this also means NO HOLES, frays, rips, or tears above the knee in your pants - NONE, not patches, no leggings underneath, NONE means NONE!

Our handbook finally says that "Principals retain final discretion and authority in determining dress code violations"; it



also states that the principal can (and will) confiscate clothing that is in violation of dress code for up to one week. We want to be very clear with students, staff and parents as to what we consider to be appropriate, so students and parents can make decisions about student clothing.

Students will be expected to follow these dress code guidelines at all school events: band concerts, awards ceremonies, dances, and any other school activity.

- Special Assistance Program Participants—Children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), are eligible for free meals.



While this year's session has ended, our work continues as many state agencies focus on implementation of the new policies signed into law by Governor Greg Abbott. made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service in late June lifted a ban on the importation of beef from Northern Argentina and 14 of Brazil's 27 states. Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller recently spoke out against the federal agency's action because, he said, those areas have a known history of foot-and-mouth disease.

"The U.S. has not suffered from a case of foot-and-

mouth disease since 1929, in part because of our nation's bans against animal and meat imports from countries dealing with the disease," Miller stated in a July 21 news re-

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE **DECREASES**

Texas Workforce Commission on July 17 announced Texas marked its third straight month of seasonally adjusted job growth with the addition of 16,700 nonagricultural jobs in June. And, the state has added jobs in 56 of the last 57 months, including a total of 53,600 positions in the first half of 2015. Over the year, Texas has seen an increase of 269,900 jobs. Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 4.2 percent in June, down from 4.3 percent in May, the lowest rate of unemployment for the state since July 2007, according to the agency.

GROWTH TREND CONTINUES Texas Secretary of State

Carlos Cascos on July 16 reported continued growth in new business formations for the first half of 2015. Some 83,235 certificates of formation were filed between Jan. 1 and June 30 with the secretary of state's office to form new Texas for-profit corporations, professional corporations, professional associations, limited liability companies and limited partnerships. This is an almost 4 percent increase from the 80,039 certificates of formation filed Jan. 1 to June 30 of 2014, Cascos pointed out.




