Commissioners approve raise for county employees

Crockett County Employees will see an increase in their paychecks next year.

At a special called meeting Monday, the Crockett County Commissioners' Court unanimously approved to give all county employees a raise of

\$100 a month.

The commissioners discussed several raise options, including a percentage increase and giving a year-end bonus similar to the school district.

"This is a little bit more like a raise," said Commissioner Randy Branch, who made the motion for the ap-

proved raise.

Also on the agenda, the commissioners approved for the county to clean up property belonging to Lety Lozano Sanchez and Alicia Lozano Sanchez on Secretariat Street.

Commissioner Eligio Martinez said the trailer house on the property burned in April and he has been working with

the property owners since then to have the lot cleaned.

Martinez said the neighbors are complaining because the weeds have grown tall.

Martinez also said he has sent an abatement letter through the county attorney's office two months ago, but nothing has been done.

"It's just getting worse,"

Martinez said. "I invited her to come to the meeting. I know she's in a rock and hard place, but she's had ample time to do it."

The commissioners also approved for land owners authorization to manage wildlife or exotic animals by aircraft.

County Judge Fred Deaton said this was part of the coun-

ty's animal damage control program that would allow all land owners tied in with the program to authorize a helicopter to fly over their property and hunt feral hogs, coyotes or other varmints.

Land owners still have to give permission before a helicopter can hunt on their property, Deaton said.

OVFD fights multiple grass fires throughout county

Ozona Firefighters fought multiple grass fires last week and this past weekend throughout Crockett County.

As of Tuesday morning, the Clegg Fire, off of Pandale Road, is at 700 acres and 90 percent contained; the Sutton-Sewell Fire, 11 miles east of Sheffield, is 700 acres and 90 percent contained; the Lancaster Hill Fire, off of State Highway 290, is 80 acres and 90 percent contained; the Marley Fire, around 11 miles northwest of Juno, is 3,000 acres and 50 percent contained.

Monday night Ozona Firefighters were called back out to the Cox Ranch Fire. Tuesday morning, the Texas For-

est Service reported that fire, which is 19 miles west of Ozona, is a 432.80 acres and 90 percent contained. One home was threatened in this fire.

Texas Forest Service firefighters are continuing to work and clean up on these fires, said Fire Marshal Steve Kenley.

Kenley said the majority of the grass fires were started by lightning.

Firefighters also fought two small fires last week north of Ozona started by lightning. Fortunately, rain showers managed to help extinguish those.

Small rain showers also helped with the major grass fires.

Kenley said one fire was started when the landowner was trying to burn grass

around his deer feeder. This fire was five miles south in Val Verde County.

Both Val Verde and Crockett Counties are currently under burn bans.

Along with the Texas Forest Service, Ozona firefighters had assistance from Northeast Midland Fire, Sheffield Fire, Iraan Fire, Eldorado Fire and Val Verde County Fire.

"We want to thank Ozona for all of the monetary donations, as well as for the drinks, snacks and foods brought to the fire station this past week and weekend. We were able to keep our firefighters and those helping, hydrated and full, while out in this heat fighting so many fires. Without your help, none

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Factors in marketing a service business

Therefore, it is important in marketing to highlight the benefits received by the customer from the end result. This intangible factor is why using customer testimonials can be so powerful. This helps make your service more tangible in your customer's eyes. Employees and the business

are inseparable - In marketing services, it is important to remember your employees are inseparable from the business itself. As stated before, instead of selling products, they are selling their ability to produce results for the customer. For this reason, the quality, skills, training, and performance of service employees is critical to customer satisfaction.

Services are variable - Services are variable because different employees are producing the service with different cus-

tomers and usually under different conditions. Training to standards is the key to ensure the end result of your service or "product" meets or exceeds your customer's expectations.

The key to conservation may lie in our language

Here in West Texas, a land of drought and unpredictable rainfall, we haven't prioritized water planning and conservation enough to ensure we can weather future droughts.

While the rainstorms and almost spring-like temperatures across much of the state in May and June may have seemed a little strange, West Texas is known for its extreme droughts punctuated by wet years.

Even under the best conditions, without the effects of climate change or over-pumping of underground aquifers, water is fickle in West Texas.

So why has water conservation been slow to move to the forefront of dialogue and decision-making in the Panhandle and West Texas? As a rhetorician, I believe much of the answer can be found by studying the way people talk about water. Over the last decade, I've interviewed farmers and landowners, attended water policy hearings, and read novels and other literature from Texas as well as dozens of journal articles about water. I've found five impediments that we must address if we want to make water conservation a higher priority.

Underground water sources like the Ogallala Aquifer were originally seen as mysterious, so they weren't easily regulated or allocated. In the early 20th century, the Texas Supreme Court grappled with regulation concerning the Ogallala Aquifer. Without the technology and knowledge we have today, aquifers were viewed as hidden, occult phenomena. Even with the development of advanced mapping and research, these views have persisted in water policy hearings today.

The "rule of capture" law discouraged conservation — and still does. In 1904, in one of the biggest court decisions in Texas water history, the state Supreme Court decided that groundwater on private land belongs to the landowner. Under this "rule of capture," landowners can pump as much or as little as they want. If you've been taught and believe that the water in your well is as boundless as the sky above your head, would you have an incentive to conserve it?

Commonplace arguments prevent cooperation. Rhetoricians have a term called "commonplaces," which are recurring patterns that underlie many arguments. At

live in if we don't keep up the economy."

We have a David and Goliath story. In addition to the commonplace arguments that arise at water policy hearings, public testimonies often follow a familiar narrative of the hero against the monster. Landowners cast themselves as heroes, while a government seeking regulation takes on the role of the monster, exposing a deep-seated suspicion of regulation in the name of the environment.

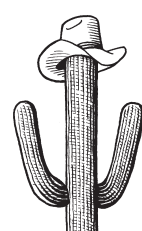
Policymakers have been slow to embrace the cultural and religious heritage of people living in West Texas. European-Americans are particularly steeped in Judeo-Christian narratives and a pioneering history, which holds that hard work and faith form a covenant with God that will be rewarded — just as the people were rewarded with water from the rock when Moses led them through the desert wilderness. Regulations from policymakers whose allegiances are seen to lie outside the covenant group are often suspect.

West Texans' perceptions of and relationships with water are grounded in culture and history, passed on from generation to generation. Such views may seem rife with paradoxes, streaked with stubborn individualism. Still, we cannot ignore or fail to respect those attitudes.

To overcome these obstacles in the face of climate change, we must directly address and include these long-standing perceptions of water in our effort to develop adequate conservation strategies. And we must overcome the "monster" story line and accept that any covenant with a higher power must also involve the wisdom of conservation.

If you don't think kids today are smart just go to any county fair and take a big whiff, filling your senses with the sights and sounds of the fair. Amongst the sounds of barkers hustling their games and the organic sound of the merry-go-round, you'll hear the distinct sound of squealing pigs. In addition to the smells of deep fried Twinkies, beer battered cheese curds, egg rolls, and cinnamon buns, you'll be overwhelmed by a distinct smell you'll remember for the rest of your life and that will be retained in your clothes longer than that.

You can't escape the swineish smell at the top of the Ferris Wheel, in the rodeo arena or in the most distant parking lot. When I was a kid the beef barn was packed with steers and the sheep and swine shared a ramshackle barn on the outskirts of the fairgrounds. That's as it should be. Beef had top billing and I figured that the sheep and swine deserved each other.

Any kid who chose to show a pig was, how should I delicately put this so that my swinish brethren will not be offended? To be blunt, pig showmen were "different". In my FFA chapter typically we had five steer exhibitors and one pork showman and we didn't mix or fraternize. Now hogs outnumber the steers by 20 to 1 and I think that's a perfect example of how far we've fallen as a country.

My sister showed a hog and for months while I was exercising, bathing, and groom-

ing my steer she was not doing anything because you had to own a steer for six months but a hog was a quick turnaround project.

No wonder many pig persons don't cry when they kiss their pigs goodbye. They hardly knew them.

What kids these days have figured out, that my generation didn't, is that pigs have a better CIAHW than steers. (That's cash income for amount of hours worked.) Pig showmen don't select hogs because of their sense of humor, intelligence or pork chops but because hogs have a better ROI (return on investment). Intelligent pig exhibitors are willing to live in shame just as long as they don't have to halter break anything or invest much money. It makes you wonder if they're all going to end up working for the Post Office.

Pigs also have a lower barrier to entry. With a steer to be competitive you'll need a fitting chute, fan, cold box for growing hair, halters and ropes, a showbox full of bovine beauty products and a trailer to haul it in.

Whereas I've seen pigs arrive on the fairgrounds in the back seat of a Ford Fairlane. You don't need a team of show jocks either

to fit your hog as I've yet to hear a judge say, "Look at the hair on that hog!"

The winner of hog showmanship is usually the person who does the best job of falling his or her hog around the ring wherever the hog wants to go, while the showman tried to make it look like it was his or her idea. And if a pig steps on your toes you may not even notice while I still walk with a limp from the time my steer stepped on mine.

Junior livestock auction buyers have figured it out too. One year my wife and I partnered with friends on a fat show steer and before the first steak was eaten we were no longer friends.

We ran out of freezer space and had a big fight over the sweetbreads. And I don't even know what they are. I woke up at night in a cold sweat wondering if I got too much flank steak and not enough filet mignon.

The proliferation of hogs has gotten so bad I'd almost rather go hear a fair concert of some old rock band with no original members than to sit through a swine show. Who wants to have their senses assaulted, be run over by a Duroc, or get smelly sticky stuff on your shoes that you can't get off with a sandblaster?

The time has come to put fair pigs in their place and that's in a segregated barn far far away, in the pig races or in chicken fried bacon on a stick.

University president says Davis statue to be moved

AUSTIN — A bronze statue of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America, will be moved from the Main Mall of the University of Texas at Austin campus to UT's Center for American History for interior display, in accordance with a decision made last week by UT President Gregory Fenves.

Fenves said he appointed a task force in June, shortly after he became president, "to identify options for the statues along the Main Mall that have long been a source of discussion, debate and more recently, controversy." The task force reported its findings to Fenves on Aug. 10.

"While every historical figure leaves a mixed legacy, I believe Jefferson Davis is in a separate category, and that it is not in the university's best interest to continue commemorating him on our Main Mall. Davis had few ties to Texas; he played a unique role

in the history of the American South that is best explained and understood through an educational exhibit," Fenves said in a news release.

"The Briscoe Center is the logical location for the Davis statue and can provide a well-curated, scholarly context for its permanent display. As the home of one of the nation's largest collections of Southern history, and as the keeper of UT Austin's own history — including the papers of George W. Littlefield, a former regent and major benefactor responsible for the statues and fountain, and sculptor Pompeo Coppini — the Briscoe Center will bring a scholarly depth that enhances the educational value of the Davis statue. The Briscoe Center has long planned a renovation of its facility, including new exhibit space, and my office

will help raise the remaining funds needed for its completion," Fenves added.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans filed a request for a restraining order ahead of the statue's Aug. 15 move date. A Travis County state district court is expected to review the matter this week.

SUSPECT ARRESTED IN IOWA

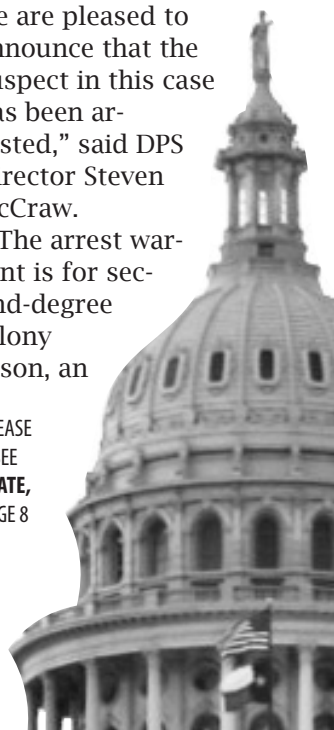

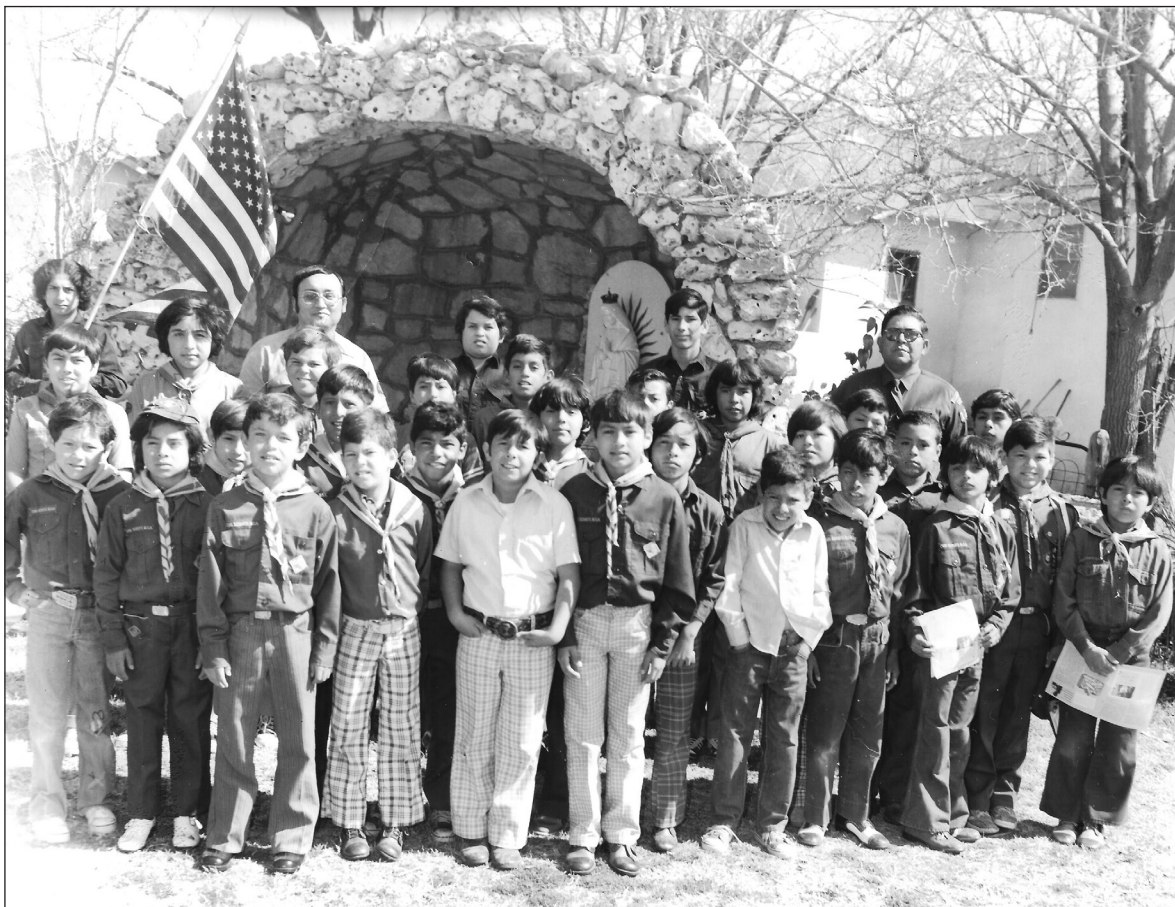

of this would have been possible. We always try to keep supplies and foods stocked, replenished, and ready to go. We are a volunteer fire department, with a tight budget, especially during a major fire season. Everything you do for us goes a long way," said Fire Chief Brian Morrow.

Other grass fires in the area included the Brown Ranch Complex in Edwards County, around 12 miles west of Rocksprings.

As of Monday morning, the Texas Forest Service reported this fire as being contained. It has burned 17,831 acres. A total of three homes were lost in the fire, with numerous other homes saved.

The Head of the River Ranch Fire in Tom Green County, around 7 miles south of Christoval, was reported Tuesday morning as being 90 percent contained. This fire

burned 5,240 acres. There were 25 homes threatened and an evacuation notice was issued.

Schleicher County also had a grass fire Friday evening. Ozona firefighters also responded to this fire.

The Christoval and Schleicher County fires were started by lightning.

Heavy spring and early summer rains created substantial plant growth, which a streak of 100-degree days over the past two weeks turned into perfect fuel, according to an article in the San Angelo Standard-Times.

A front coming through Wednesday afternoon will bring relatively cooler temperatures, according to the National Weather Service in San Angelo. The area continues to experience summer weather patterns, and by the end of August and September weather average will be in the lower 90s, according to the weather service.

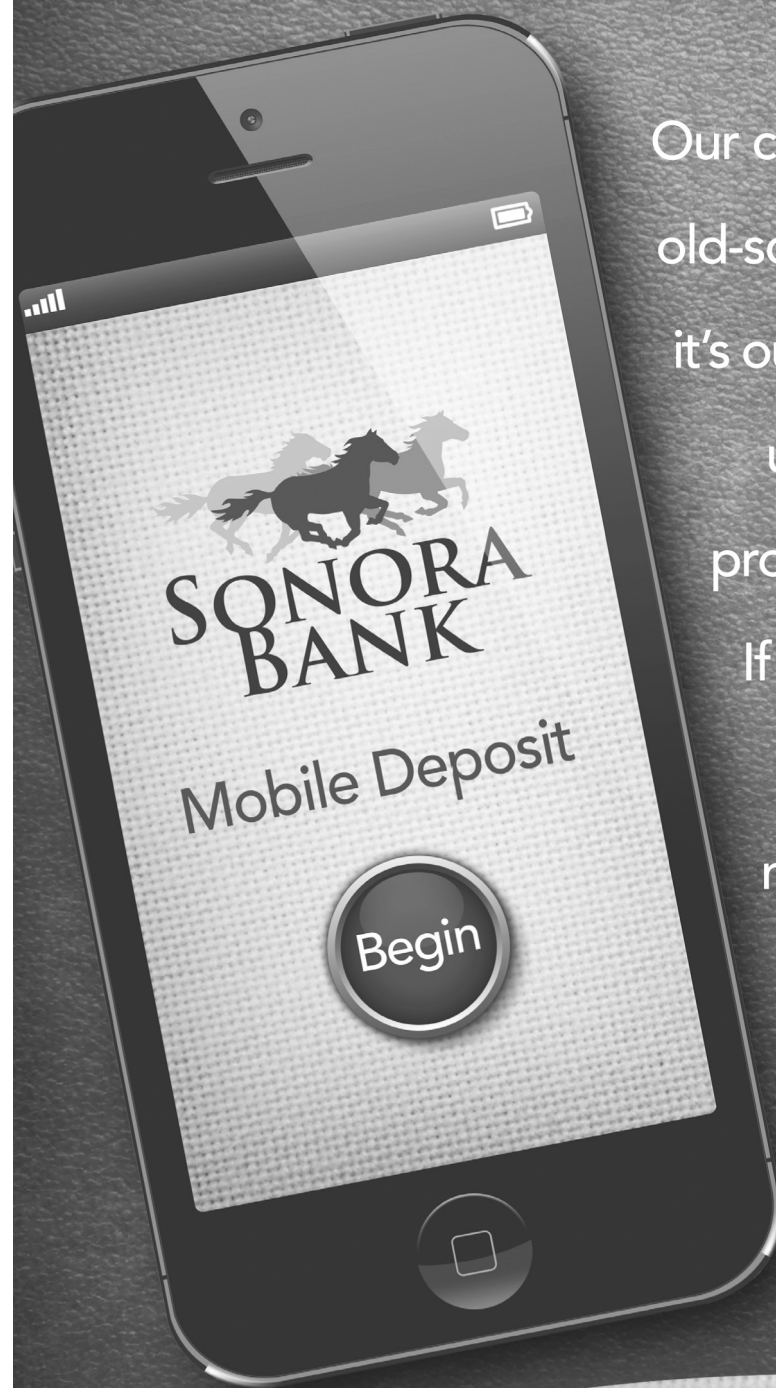

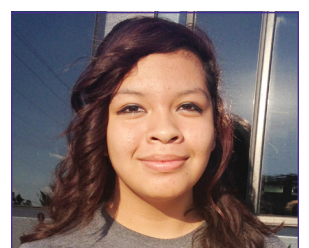

Sheffield boy dies in crash, driver charged

A 4-year-old Sheffield boy died in a one-vehicle accident in which troopers reported the vehicle crashed into a home.

According to a Texas Department of Public Safety news release, 4-year-old Jonah Stille was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident at 11:15 p.m. Saturday in Sheffield.

Aaron Craig Hinman, 24 years old of Fort Worth, was driving a 2014 Ford F-150 on Highway 349 going northbound, according to the release.

Hinman was driving at a high rate of speed, according to the release, and traveled across a traffic island before crashing into a residence.

According to the release, Hinman was transported to Iraan General Hospital. A call

to request his status was not immediately returned.

On Monday, officials with the Pecos County Jail said Hinman was charged with intoxication manslaughter as well as injury to a child.

He was being held Monday at the Pecos County Jail on a \$50,000 bond.

An account for monetary donations for Jonah Stille has been set up at gofundme.com.

The account states "though the Stilles have not lived in Sheffield long, they have become a part of the community and are loved by many. Jonah leaves behind his parents and five brothers, one of whom is his twin. The family will travel to Illinois to lay their boy to rest."

The account has already raised \$17,920.

Hunting, fishing licenses on sale

Sportsmen gearing up for the upcoming fall hunting seasons are reminded to renew their licenses for 2015-16. The current year Texas hunting and fishing licenses (except year-to-date fishing licenses) will expire Aug. 31.

Every year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issues about 2.5 million hunting and fishing licenses through the agency's 28 field offices, more than 50 state parks and at over 1,700 retailers across the state.

Licenses may also be purchased online through the TPWD website at www.tpwd.texas.gov/buy or by phone at 1-800-895-4248. Call center hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Please note that here is a required \$5 administrative fee for each phone or online transaction but multiple items can be purchased during a single transaction occasion for the \$5 fee.

The online transaction system is available 24/7. For online and phone orders, a physical license will be mailed within three business days.

During that time period, a transaction receipt will be provided via email that will be sufficient proof of hunting license that can be used for dove hunting, though it will not be allowed for the take of fish or wildlife that require a tag.

Hunting and fishing regulations for the new season can be found in the 2015-2016 Outdoor Annual, available in booklet form at license retailers and digitally online at www.outdoorannual.com.

Hunters and anglers can also download the free 2015-2016 Outdoor Annual mobile app on their Apple or Android devices.

In addition to a hunting license, anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training course or purchase a one-time deferral good for one license year in order to hunt legally in Texas. The certification is valid for life and is honored in all other states and provinces.

offense that carries a possible sentence of two to 20 years in state prison and a possible fine of up to \$10,000.

RECORDS FORMS TO CHANGE
Texas Department of State Health Services on Aug. 13 announced its review of vital events forms and all vital

event areas and records that may be affected by a U.S. Supreme Court decision and a U.S. district court decision reached earlier this summer that require state and local governments to recognize same-sex marriage.

"As a result, DSHS is implementing revised policies and procedures and also will amend certain vital events forms and records related to vital-events records to recognize married, same-sex couples," the agency stated in a news release.

Those records include birth certificates, death certificates, supplementary birth certificates (for adoptions) and birth certificates resulting from gestational agreements (surrogacy).

Local registrars or other entities that may file vital information such as hospital and funeral homes will receive revised forms and instructions when they become available.
