

Early voting ends Friday, **Election Day Tuesday**

Early voting in the Crockett County proposed jail and wellness center bonds, and the state constitutional amendment election, ends Friday, Oct. 30.

Crockett County voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at the courthouse annex.

Election Day voting on Tuesday, Nov. 3, will be from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Poll locations are: Precinct 1 - Crockett County Courthouse; Precinct 2 - Crockett County Senior Center; Precinct 3 - Crockett County Civic Center; Precinct 4 -Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

A \$6 million bond proposal, along with a \$4 million bond proposal for a new wellness center, are on the Nov. 3 election ballot. The two bonds are separate items on the ballot.

Also on the ballot are seven proposed state constitutional amendments.

Texas now requires voters to show an acceptable photo ID at the polls. The only acceptable photo IDs are: driver's license, personal identification card, concealed handgun license, election identification certificate, passport, military identification card or citizenship certificate or naturalization certificate with photograph.

New health clinic may break ground in January

The new clinic is almost

ready to break ground. During a special meeting on Oct. 21, the Crockett County Care Center, Health and Emergency Services Board of Directors met with Rick Burnight, architect of O'Connell Robertson out of Austin, about finalized exterior and interior plans of the new Family Health Cen-

ter of Ozona. Burnight said his firm is 90 percent done with the engineering and architecture on the clinic. If the commis-

sioners approve to advertise for bids next month, and bids are approved by the end of the year, construction could start in January.

The board is aiming to have a joint meeting with the Crockett County Commissioners' Court next month, as well as officials from Shannon Medical Center, to discuss the final plans and approve to advertise for bids.

Estimated cost for the 9,800 square-foot building is \$3.15 million with Shannon Medical Center providing

The world has changed, so should our energy policy

S. energy policy is about far more than jobs and the economy. It is a critical component of our foreign policy. Secretary of State John Kerry has repeatedly claimed that our European allies are poised to abandon us if we do not approve the administration's short-sighted and ultimately dangerous nuclear deal with Iran.

It is because Germany and France want to buy energy from Iran.

Instead of continuing to be the only country that has a self-imposed ban on exporting crude oil and enabling Iran to generate additional income to support their largest export - terrorism, I have a much better idea. We sell American energy to Europe instead.

The ban that keeps the United States from selling crude oil on the world market may have made sense four decades ago. It no longer does, the outdated oncy does not reflect our 21st century production capabilities resulting from innovation in the American energy industry. It is well documented that selling our crude on the global market will create American jobs and galvanize our economy. Exporting American crude has the additional benefit of pressuring two resurgence adversaries - Russia and Iran.

Though President Obama has come out against Congressional efforts to lift this ban and allow American companies to sell on the world market, he seems to have no problem with Iran's ability to sell energy to our allies. If Europe is buying from America instead of Iran that is less money going to the state-sponsored terror we know Iran will continue to support.

Russia's economy is dependent on selling oil to Europe. Since the global slump of oil prices, coupled with economic sanctions resulting from their invasion of Crimea, their economy has been struggling. Russia's faltering economy opens the door to diplomatic solutions to these conflicts, and leveraging our energy abundance will force them to reevaluate their behavior in places like Syria.

Arab leaders know that the brutal dictator Bashar al-Asad must go. The Unit-

ed Nations that resolving the problems in Syria will only happen when Asad is gone, yet Russia is using their Air Force to destroy Syr-

ian targets

Asad. Many

of those targets are rebel groups in opposition to Asad and that have been trained by the U.S. The Russians are demonstrating they are willing to support their allies even in the face of international opposition. Our partners are learning that America

doesn't have their back. ISIS is a product of the conflict in Syria and the only way we are going to solve this threat is through cooperation with local forces on the ground. The model we should be pursuing in Syria is the Afghanistan model perfected by Ambassador Hank Crump ton when he was the head of the CIA's Counterterrorism Center Special Operations Division (CTC/SO). In late December 2001, following the terrorist attacks of $9/\overline{11}$, the southern Afghanistan city of Qandahar fell. It was the capital city of the Taliban and when it fell we had killed two-thirds of al-Qa'ida leadership and pushed the Taliban out of Afghanistan. These objectives were achieved with four hundred Americans on the ground - three hundred Special Forces and one hundred CIA officers. We were able to do this because of the greatest Air Force the world had ever seen and cooperation with local forces like the Northern Alliance and Pashtun tribal militias.

A very similar formula of success can work in Syria, but our allies need to know they have our support. That means severely limiting Russian activity in the region.

The historic vote by the U.S. House of Representatives to lift this obsolete ban could be the turning point in a disappointing economic recovery and a faltering foreign policy that continues to degrade. Let's use our economic power to restore our standing in the world.

State says funding to Planned Parenthood will be cut

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — The state Health and Human Services Commission notified Planned Parenthood affiliates in Texas on Oct. 19 that state funding they have been receiving through the Medicaid program would be cut.

The letter from the HHSC's inspector general's office said the termination of all Planned Parenthood affiliates would not affect access to care "because there are thousands of alternate providers in Texas including federally qualified health centers, Medicaid-certified rural health clinics and other health care providers across the state that participate in the Texas Women's Health Program and Medicaid.'

According to the governor's office, the action is based on evidence of Medicaid program violations. Citing widely publicized videos reportedly exposing the harvesting and sale of fetal body parts by abortion providers, Gov.

Greg Abbott said, "Texas has stepped forward and shown its unyielding commitment to both protecting life and providing women's health services."

Abbott said the action is consistent with his LIFE initiative that calls for changing laws to stiffen penalties against abortion providers, improve availability of adoption services, eliminate funding to abortion providers and eliminate and criminalize any sale or transaction involving fetal tissue by an abortion clinic.

On Oct. 22, HHSC's inspector general agents, acting on subpoenas, seized records at Planned Parenthood-affiliated clinics in Dallas and other cities. Planned Parenthood national headquarters posted the following statement on social media: "We will not be

bullied by Texas extremists (and) we won't stop fighting. Take note: Planned Parenthood is not going anywhere."

Planned Parenthood has one month to deliver a legal response.

EMERGENCY FORCES LINED UP

Just before Hurricane Patricia hit the west coast of Mexico and headed north toward Texas, Gov. Abbott on Oct. 23 announced the activation of the Texas State Operations Center.

Abbott also approved the use of state resources for rapid deployment as needed to assist local officials "during this significant weather event."

"The State of Texas stands ready to provide support to communities as needed," he said.

The State Operations Center coordinates emergency responses with the Texas Department of Transportation, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Texas A&M Forest Service, Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service/Texas Task Force 1 and Texas Military Forces. PLEASE STATE, PAGE 8

"Bailey Headquarters was homesteaded in 1895 by John R. and Roberta Bailey. The original land deed is signed in 1901 by both of my great-great-grandfathers, John R. Bailey, landowner and Charles E. Davidson, the County Judge, upon purchase of the land in full. To my knowledge the young Bailey couple rolled the little house that I also grew up in, using mules and timber to the present site. It is located on the Edwards Plateau of Crockett County with Schleicher County being the eastern border. My greatgreat-grandparents cattle, goats and sheep, along with four wonderful children. The ranch has sustained five generations and grows continually. No matter the situation, good or bad, the land remains steadfast, Oglesby said.

"Presently the Oglesby Ranch, established 1987, is running hair sheep, Spanish goats, and cattle and pursuing ecotourism interests. I am the sole proprietor at this time, but look forward to having my children take the reins when I can no longer manage. Our ranch heritage is very important and being the original envi-

ronmentalists is always at the forefront of thought. I am currently teaching high school government, economics and world geography. \$275,000 worth of new equipment.

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court is looking at issuing a tax note for the clinic, instead of a bond election. A tax note can be issued by the county for projects to be financed for seven years or less. The clinic project has been estimated to be paid back within five years. A \$3 million tax note would raise county taxes around \$.03.

Care Center Board President John L. Henderson said he wants to stay at \$3 million.

"We want the best of the best as long as we don't jump our budget. We want to use \$3 million the best way we possibly can," Henderson said. "I feel good that \$3 million is still feasible. If that means me over there doing the site work for nothing I will."

The new clinic will have 11 exam rooms that will be

used by local physicians and specialists from San Angelo.

EMS will have an urgent care entrance on one side of the building, with the driveway going around the back of the building. The lobby area is larger

in both the clinic and urgent care areas.







Can you remember when bacon and eggs was replaced by a bowl of cereal, low-fat milk, dry toast and a glass of orange juice in the Standard American Diet (SAD) as the classic version of a "healthy breakfast?"

I do. It was a "sad" day, indeed (pun intended). That was the day our way of eating became fodder for a political agenda. The Standard American Diet advised we eat less fat and more "healthy" carbohydrates to curb a misconceived pandemic of heart disease in the mid 1980s.

Gary Taubes wrote in his New York Times article entitled, "What If It's All Been a Big Fat Lie," on July 7, 2002: "...a Senate committee led by George McGovern published its 'Dietary Goals for the United States,' advising that Americans significantly curb their fat intake to abate an epidemic of 'killer diseases' supposedly sweeping the country. It peaked in late 1984, when the National Institutes of Health officially recommended that all Americans over the age of 2 eat less fat.

By that time, fat had become 'this greasy killer' in the memorable words of the Center for Science in the Public Interest, and the model American breakfast of eggs and bacon was well on its way to becoming a bowl of Special K with low-fat

Never mind that we have been agrarian for only about 10,000 years, learning to cultivate and genetically alter our fruits, grains and vegetables for taste and greater sugar content.

Never mind that our bodies are carbon-copies of our ancestors' 25,000 years ago, and we have yet to develop the nutritional processes for beneficially assimilating these very new nutrients in our way of eating.

Now, the rate of people around the world dying of heart disease increases and accelerates annually. One in three people in the United States alone is, at best, pre-diabetic. This generation is not

Trillions of dollars are spent annually on our disease management and on the cures for the conditions and syndromes that plague us. We are more valuable to the institutions we set up to heal and protect us by being sick than we are by being healthy and productive.

The solutions are more than likely simple, 'in-yourface' remedies, that carried us for so long during our evolution. Cholesterol is no longer considered a viable factor linked to heart disease and some scientists warn it is probably more harmful if it's too low. I know from personal experience that heart disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), type-2 diabetes, obesity and hypertension are curable and preventable. Bacon and eggs are not on my political agenda, they are back in my plate, on my table of nutritional elements and permanent fodder in my way of eating.

School project discussed at board meeting

Superintendent Raul Chavarria spoke to the CCCCSD School Board about several projects in the district during the Oct. 21 regular meeting.

In his report, Chavarria said the elementary school roof is leaking and that he has called Garland Roofing Company to come and a fix the problem.

"This is a minor repair that requires the caps on the metal roof to be refastened," Chavarria said.

However, there is a second OES roof issue involving a flat roof above the office area of the building.

"The air conditioning units sit on top of the roof and area holding water that should be draining, and it's not," Chavarria said. "This issue will require us to secure the services of an engineer to study how to correct."

Chavarria said there was a recent incident of vandalism at the OHS Baseball Field. He said the people involved have been identified and charges have been filed with the Crockett County Sheriff's

Damage was done to the dugout and to a tree with a baseball bat, Chavarria said.

Chavarria also contacted County Judge Fred Deaton and County Attorney Jody Upham about filing an eviction notice to the individual that has used school property adjacent to OES as a "personal junkyard.

"This has been an issue that has been addressed in the past. It is time for this individual to respect property that is not his and clean up the area," Chavarria said.

The district has also been working on having utility poles relocated and a transformer removed at the property next to the OMS Gymnasium, so that the property can be cleared to be made into a parking lot.

"We are currently waiting for the poles to be removed so that demolition can be done," Chavarria said.

ENROLLMENT and ATTENDANCE

FIRST SIX WEEKS

In his report, OHS Principal Ronny Clayton said they had 90 students with perfect attendance and only 12 students with failures. This number is down from years past. In 2013-2014, OHS had 39 students fail the first six weeks and in 2014-2015 the school had 20.

Clayton said the school has Pride Time, or tutorials, in the afternoon. All students attend with the exception of seniors who have passed their end-of-course exams, and are passing their classes.

Monday through Thursday students attend Pride Time working on homework, getting tutoring, working on UIL events and preparing for tests such as the ACT, SAT, ASVAB, PSAT and TSI.

Athletic Director Edward Perez stated in his report that the varsity, JV and OMS football teams all had a 100 percent passing rate, as well as the cross-country teams.

STAAR STANDARDS

The Texas Education Agency announced earlier this month that they will increase the level that students have to master to pass the STAAR test for elementary and middle school.

Last year it was 60 percent. OMS and OES Principal Tammy McWilliams said they expect it to be around 65 percent this year.

Also, the math scores will count this year, McWilliams

"In order to be certain that we meet requirements, we will have to track student performance very closely," McWilliams said.

Some of the plans McWilliams said will be implemented include tutors for grades first through fifth, a Count Down to STAAR program during STAAR Blast and having math and reading tutorials.

She also said they will be tracking student's understanding of instruction in both OMS and OES.

"Our hope is that we can six months to a year of growth in our students by the end of the first semester," McWilliams said.

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



U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Judith A. Canales reminds agricultural producers that FSA provides a receipt to customers who request or receive assistance or information on FSA programs.

"If you visit our office, you'll receive documentation of services requested and provided," said Canales. "It's part of our mission to provide enhanced customer service for producers. From December through June, FSA issued more than 327,000 electronic receipts."

The 2014 Farm Bill requires a receipt to be issued for any agricultural program assistance requested from FSA, the National Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Rural Development (RD). Receipts include the date, summary of the visit and any agricultural information, program and/or loan assistance provided to an individual or

In some cases, a form or document - such as a completed and signed program enrollment form -serve as the customer receipt instead of a printed or electronic re-

A service is any information, program or loan assistance provided whether through a visit, email, fax or letter.

This announcement was made possible through the 2014 Farm Bill.

The Farm Bill builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past six years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for the tax-

TEXAS JOINS SUIT TO STOP EPA A U.S. Environmental Pro-

tection Agency rule to reduce carbon emissions from electric-generating plants by 32 percent below 2005 levels by 2030 is the target of a lawsuit filed in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit by 24 states, including Texas. Under the rule, Section

111(d) of the Clean Air Act, the EPA establishes guidelines and states design programs that fit in those guidelines to reduce air pollution. Texas Attorney General

Ken Paxton on Oct. 23 said "to achieve these reductions, EPA will require states to shut down coal plants prematurely and invest billions of dollars in new renewable generation."

Paxton maintains that the EPA doesn't have authority to enforce the rule, and said the goal of the lawsuit is "to prevent massive increases in electric bills that would hurt

hard-working families, the elderly and the poor."

HIGHER ED GETS NEW CHIEF

Gov. Abbott on Oct. 21 appointed Bobby Jenkins of Austin as chairman of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Jenkins, president of ABC Home and Commercial Services, has served as vice chairman of the coordinating board since September 2013. He succeeds Chairman Raymund A. Paredes of El Paso as chairman. Paredes was appointed by then-governor Rick Perry in 2004.

The agency's mission is "to promote access, affordability, quality, success, and cost efficiency in the state's institutions of higher education."

WEEK'S FOCUS: STUDENT SAFETY

Safe Schools Week was observed in Texas, Oct. 18-24.

Under state law, each school district is required to adopt a multi-hazard emergency operations plan.

"Every student in Texas should be confident that they are being provided an education in a safe environment," Texas Education Commissioner Michael Williams said on Oct. 19. "Safe Schools Week is an annual reminder to everyone in education of our need to plan and prepare for whatever potential situation might arise on school campuses," he added.

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
