NOTICE! TO PARENTS of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1: 1956, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in the census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

2. Call in person at the School Tax office and get a census blank and fill it

If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six years old who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and the taxpayers extra money. Some people may consider this progress, but until they develop a hybrid dollar to double as fast as production of crops, they ought to soft-peddle these new discoveries. They're giving

the prizes to the wrong man.

What science ought to be turning its mind to is the development of perishable wheat, cotton, corn, maize, rice, etc., or else get to work on a hybrid dollar.


