

## Filing deadline Monday for March **Primary**

The filing deadline to run in the 2016 March Primary is 6 p.m. Monday, Dec. 14.

As of press time Tuesday, Robert F. "Bob" Rodriguez has filed for re-election as Crockett County Sheriff. He has currently drawn two opponents, Jose Gutierrez and Emilio Tambunga have also filed.

Wesley Bean, Mike Preddy and Max Schroeder have all filed for Commissioner Precinct 3.

Incumbent Randy Branch said he will not be seeking another term as commissioner.

Incumbent Webb and Shelly Childress have both filed for county treasurer. The treasurer's seat is up for election due to it being an unexpired term.

Incumbent Michelle Medley has filed for tax assessor-collector, cumbent Jody Upham has filed for county attorney and incumbent Raymond P. (Bear) Borrego has filed for county constable.

So far all local officials have filed to be on the Democratic ballot.

Other local offices up for election include Commissioner Precinct 1, currently held by Frank Tambunga.

## Paxton amends approach to resettlement of refugees

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Dec. 4 withdrew his request for a temporary restraining order to put a hold on the federal government's plan to relocate Syrian refugee families in Texas.

Paxton, as the state's chief law enforcement officer, initiated the court action on behalf of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, the state agency potentially most involved with the resettlement process. In an explanation of his reasoning, Paxton cited the U.S. Refugee Act of 1980, a law requiring that the federal government consult with state authorities in advance of such relocations.

relocations.

Paxton said, in effect, that his request for the restraining order prompted the federal government to provide information that he said would help resolve security concerns about the first group of refugees set to arrive in Texas.

Still, however, Texas con-

tinues to seek a federal court injunction requiring the federal government to consult with state authorities before resettling refugees.

According to the state attorney general's office, Texas takes in roughly 10 percent of the refugees resettled in the United States, partnering with local volunteer agencies to help refugees transition to the state and pay associated costs.

"Texas shouldn't have to go to court to require Washington to comply with federal law regarding its duties to consult with Texas in advance," Paxton commented. "Our state will continue legal proceedings to ensure we get the information necessary to adequately protect the safety of Texas residents. While we remain concerned about the federal government's overall

refugee vetting process, we must ensure that Texas has the seat at the table that the Refugee Act requires."

## BORDER SECURITY PANEL MEETS

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick acknowledged "strong pleas for state assistance" after a Dec. 3 Senate interim committee hearing on border security.

Patrick said he is "committed to work with the Senate, both during this interim and the remainder of my term in office, to make sure that assistance is provided."

During the hearing, Texas Department of Public Safety Director Steven McCraw testified that over the last four years more than 174,000 undocumented individuals had been arrested and booked into Texas jails.

A.J. Louderback of Texas

Sheriffs' Association also testified, saying PEP — the Priority Enforcement Program of ICE, the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency, "significantly weakens how we protect the state." Under PEP, ICE seeks the transfer of a removable individual when that PLEASE





Worldwide, Whooping Cough results in about 300,000 deaths a year and leaves many children with brain damage.

Serious complications such as bleeding into the nose, eyes or brain, pneumonia, and hernias may also occur.

Whooping cough, aka. Pertussis, is a contagious disease caused by the Bordetella pertussis bacteria that affects the lungs. It can resemble the common cold with runny nose or congestion, sneezing, mild coughing or mild fever.

Severe coughing can begin after a couple of weeks and coughing fits and pauses in breathing can continue and be violent for several weeks afterward. The disease got its name from the loud "whooping" sound sometimes made when inhaling air during a coughing fit.

It can be milder than the typical "whoop" or absent in adolescents and adults previously vaccinated. A blood test is advised to determine causation. In infants less than 3 months of age; it may be a minimal cough or a pause in breathing may be the only symptom shown but it can be serious; even fatal.

Person-to-person communication occurs when someone coughs or sneezes in close proximity to another, who breathes in the bacteria present in the airborne molecules. If the receiving person's immune system is weak or they have not been vaccinated, the bacteria incubates and results in Pertussis.

It is very important to diagnose and treat Whooping Cough early to render the infection less severe and prevent the spread of the bacteria to close contacts. Treatment usually consists of a round of antibiotics, if they can be administered early. After three weeks, antibiotics usually cannot help because the Bordetella Pertussis will have already done its damage and left your body.

A vaccine called Tdap can

According to DoctorYourself.com (@ http://www. doctoryourself.com/whoop. html): "Whooping cough responds quickly (12-48)hours) to absolute saturation therapy with ascorbic acid vitamin C. Vitamin C must be given every 10 to 15 minutes that the patient is awake in sufficient quantity to produce "bowel tolerance" (near-diarrhea).
