Webb, Bean win runoff

Karen Webb won the Crockett County Treasurer's Race Monday in the Democratic Primary Runoff.



Webb, the incumbent, defeated Annette DeHoyos. Webb had

511 votes,

had 248. Webb had 274 votes in early voting. DeHoyos had 114.

Webb had 45 votes for Precinct 1 on Tuesday's election day. She had 74 in Precinct 2, 78 in Precinct 3 and 40 in Precinct 4.

DeHoyos had 58 votes in Precinct 1, 23 in Precinct 2. 17 in Precinct 3 and 36 in Precinct 4.

Webb is unopposed in the November Gener-

al Election. In the Crockett County Commissioner Pre-

cinct 3 race, Wesley Bean won a tight race over Max Schroeder in the Democratic Primarv. Bean had 136 total

votes. Schroeder had 115. Bean will face Republican candidate Weldon Nicks in the November General Election.

Bean had 85 votes in early voting and 51 in Tuesday's voting.

Schroeder had votes in early voting and 43 Tuesday.

3 states seek clarity on federal transgender guidelines

AUSTIN — The current method devised by the Texas Legislature in 2011 to fund public education does not violate the state constitution, the Texas Supreme Court unanimously ruled May 13.

The lawsuit challenging the state's educationfunding method originally was brought in 2011 by more than 600 school districts identifying themselves collectively as the Texas Taxpayer and Student Fairness Coalition. Lawyers for the coalition argued that the state falls short of the constitution's imperative of equitable funding by failing to provide enough money for school districts' classroom instruction, maintenance and operation and other critical budget areas.

Article 7 of the constitution says: "A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the

people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

In a 100-page ruling, the court said the current system ensures that "all Texas children have access to a quality education that enables them to achieve their potential and fully participate now and in the future in the social, economic, and educational opportunities of our state and nation." The court agreed that the current funding system, while imperfect, is "good enough" to satisfy the constitutional mandate, and going forward, it is up to the Legislature, not the courts, to amend the funding formula.

Gov. Greg Abbott called the ruling "a victory for Texas

taxpayers and the Texas Constitution." Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, House Speaker Joe Straus, Attorney General Ken Paxton and many Republican lawmakers joined the governor in welcoming the ruling. Paxton echoed the ruling in saying school finance "must be debated and shaped by the Texas Legislature, not through decades' worth of ongoing litigation in the court system."

In contrast, organizations such as the Texas Association of School Boards, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund, the Texas Democratic Party and a number of Democratic lawmakers expressed disappointment over the ninemember, all-Republican court's ruling.

Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, said, "The Texas Supreme

Court's ruling held that the state's school funding system met 'minimum constitutional requirements,' turning a cold shoulder to at least twothirds of Texas school districts that were desperately seeking relief from an inequitable, inefficient and unsustainable school PLEASE STATE, PAGE 12

Dacie has a goal of be-







Need more fiber in your diet? I don't think so

What we call dietary fiber is extracted from the seeds and cell walls of plants. It lends shape and strength to the plant.

Animals do not have fiber. Instead, we use bone. cartilage and connective tissues to support our bodies and, contrary to what many health authorities advise, fiber cannot be beneficially processed by the human digestive tract.

Boston psychiatrist, Georgia Ede, MD explains why experts believe fiber is essential for health; "It is a simple misunderstanding of the research. Well-meaning, intelligent scientists looked at all the data and came to the wrong conclusion by making a single, critically flawed assumption that led them in the wrong direction... About 150 years ago, the world was populated by two kinds of people: people who were still eating 'traditional' diets of various types, and people who were starting to eat a 'modern' diet."

There are two types of dietary fiber, that which is soluble in water and that which is not.

Plants contain a combination of both soluble and insoluble fiber in varying amounts.

We have been advised that soluble fiber is good because it slows the glycemic impact of fructose in the small intestine and insoluble fiber helps speed up the elimination of food in the colon.

While soluble fiber forms gels that help us feel full and retard the absorption of sugars in the small intestine, it comes at the cost of the body having to also deal with plant compounds such as arabinoxylan, dextrin, inulin, waxes, chitins, pectin, beta-glucan and others.



Does dietary fiber shield the colon from cancer, constipation, and other colorectal diseases? Not in the least.

In the 2007 issue of World Journal of Gastroenterology, Doctors Tan and Seow-Choen published a review of medical studies conducted over the previous 35 years about fiber and colon health and concluded that, "A strong case cannot be made for a protective effect of dietary fiber against colorectal polyp or cancer. Neither has fiber been found to be useful in chronic constipation and irritable bowel syndrome. It is also not useful in the treatment of perianal conditions. The fiber deficit-diverticulosis theory should also be challenged... we often choose to believe a lie, as a lie repeated often enough by enough people becomes accepted as the truth. We urge clinicians to keep an open mind. Myths about fiber must be debunked and truth installed."

In defense of dietary fiber, the bacteria in our colons love it. We may not be able digest it, but the microbes and bacteria in our colons do, or rather they ferment them.

Some of the exogenous gasses we breathe in - oxygen, nitrogen, and carbon dioxide find their way into our colon.

But it's the hydrogen, methane and sulfides produced by our gut flora's fermentation process that combines with the exogenous gases and makes you unpopular at parties, cause uncomfortable cramping and bloating, and create a feeling of fullness.

Undigested dietary fiber in the colon attracts huge numbers of microbes and bacteria and 15 grams daily should keep them microscopic buggers fat and sassy.

The 35 grams recommended by most health authorities can cause fermented matter to grow so bulky it lodges in the colon - constipation, which leads to Irritated Bowel Syndrome (IBS), Inflamed Bowel Disease (IBD) and Crohn's Disease.

On the other hand, animal protein and fat are comfortably and efficiently processed by the colon with virtually no gases produced.

We were not meant to swallow and digest plant fiber exclusively, nor was it ordained to become a primary food source. We were designed to eat whole foods.

We evolved out of a symbiotic relationship with the Earth and the universe. We evolved out of a system where it takes life to sustain life and learned to prosper from the life and resources available to us.

We are here and have long survived by the grace of our respected, fellow animals and our seasonal, juicy and appealing, unadulterated fruits and vegetables. Here's to your health.

Meadows talked about the history of his family and their love of Crockett County and Fort Lancaster. Family members were also on hand for the ceremony.

"We are very pleased our parents had the opportunity to donate this land," Meadows said.

The Texas Historical Commission completed a two-year renovation that includes a new visitor's center built from the original building, with a substantial new gallery exhibit on the north side.

The new exhibit presents the story of Fort Lancaster through artifacts, images, scale models, a life-sized camel replica, and an introductory video.

To increase visitor comfort, a large outdoor canopy was built facing the fort ruins. This project marks the first major site improvement since the 1970s, and reflects the THC's commitment to protecting cultural resources while providing enjoyable educational opportunities for the public.

The center also contains a small table dedicated to Joshua Meadows and his service in the U.S. Marine Corps.

"Fort Lancaster is preserved because of the Meadows Family and all their work to make sure this land is preserved. All around this country places that get preserved are preserved because care about them. Look at the land around us and it looks like it did in the 1800s because the family maintains the land like that. We are aware of that and we thank you," added Jefferson Spilman, site manager. "We sacrifice and we give back to the history of

this place." Texas Historical Commissioner Pete Peterson and Mark Wolfe, executive director of the THC, spoke on how authentic the fort grounds

"Very few places in Texas where you have the landscape and you can say to your-

self 'I'm standing right where they stood and it looked like this.' This is pretty remarkable place," Wolfe said. "It's through the exceptional generosity of these families that we have the opportunity to stand, or sit here, today in our ancestor's shoes and see the land the way they saw it."

Crockett County Judge Fred Deaton spoke about the county's continued support of the fort.

"Our commissioners' court is certainly very proud of this. This is pre-history of Crockett County. It's very important to us. It's given us a lot of our landmarks and landmark names," Deaton said.

With the end of the U.S. war with Mexico in 1848 and the discovery of gold in California, thousands of people journeyed west. One of the routes stretched from San Antonio to San Diego. Known in Texas as the Lower Road, it passed through Apache and Comanche lands. The U.S. Army protected the route, which required soldiers and forts. Fort Lancaster played an important role in westward expansion by providing escorts for mail carriers, wagon trains, and settlers on the Lower Road.

Fort Lancaster was the only Army post in Texas attacked by Native Americans.

Fort Lancaster is the only fort owned and operated by the State of Texas that once hosted military camels. Camels made an appearance at Saturday's event.

The fort also hosted 270 schoolchildren from Ozona and Iraan on Friday as part of the weekend's events.

Spanning 82 acres and surrounded by the wideopen spaces of West Texas, Fort Lancaster State Historic Site is located between Sheffield and Ozona in Crockett County. It commemorates the vestiges of one of the forts established in the 1850s to protect the route between San Antonio and El Paso.

The fort is located at 629 Fort Lancaster Road in Sheffield. Take exit 343 off of Interstate- 10.

Grand jury indictments

A Crockett County grand substance, namely methjury handed down indictments on April 14.

According to the indictment, Wagnon allegedly hit two local EMS officials while they were trying to transport him by ambulance to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo. The incident occurred Dec. 13, 2015.

Uriel Gudino, 17, was indicted for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, state jail felony.

According to the indictment, Gudino allegedly operated an automobile without consent of the owner on Jan. 28.

Albert Escalante Ramos Jr., 20, was indicted on possession of a controlled substance, first-degree felony, possession of a controlled substance, state jail felony and attempted tampering with physical evidence, state jail felony.

According to the indictment, Ramos allegedly knowingly possessed, with intent to deliver, a controlled substance, namely methamphetamine, in an amount four grams or more but less than 200 grams on Nov. 12, 2015.

He also, allegedly, knowingly possessed a controlled substance, namely, methamphetamine, in an amount of less than one gram, and placed a container of methamphetamine into the toilet and cause the toilet to flush.

Brenda Rodriguez, 44, was indicted on possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver, firstdegree felony and attempted tampering with physical evidence, state jail felony. According to the indict-

ment, Rodriguez, allegedly, knowingly possessed, with intent to deliver, a controlled

amphetamine, in an amount of four grams or more but less than 200 grams on Nov. 12, 2015. She also, allegedly, placed a container of methamphetamine into the toilet and cause the toilet to flush. Andres Trevino Jr., 47,

was indicted on injury to a child, state jail felony.

According to the indictment, Trevino, allegedly, caused bodily injury to a child 14 years old or younger by placing the child's hands on the child's neck and applied pressure to the child's throat on June 15, 2015.

Carl Nolen Thacker, 37, was indicted on possession of a controlled substance, third-degree felony.

According to the indictment, Thacker, allegedly, knowingly possessed a controlled substance, namely, methamphetamine, in an amount of one gram or more but less than four grams on June 28, 2015.

Following is a glossary of legal terms in the records.

Indictment: To bring an indictment the Grand Jury will not find guilt, but only the probability that a crime was committed, that the accused person did it and that he/she should be tried.

- Source: Black's Law Dictionary

Punishments: State Jail Felony - shall be punished by confinement in a state jail for any term of not more than two years or less than 180 days and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Third-degree Felony shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for any term of not more than 10 years or less than 2 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Second-degree Felony shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for any term of not more than 20 years or less than 2 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

First-degree Felony shall be punished by imprisonment in the institutional division for life or for any term of not more than 99 years or less than 5 years and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

finance system that Texas courts had previously labeled unconstitutional.'

Rep. Carol Alvarado, D-Houston, said, "Our children deserve more than a minimal education and the Legislature should do all they can to ensure we repair this broken system. Over five million public school students are counting on us."

Speaker Straus acknowledged "there is ample room for improvement" in school funding and said the Texas House "will continue working to deliver value for taxpayers and provide an outstanding education for our students.'

REVENUE IS UP SLIGHTLY

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 11 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$767.7 million in local sales tax allocations for May.

The total was based on sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly, plus sales made in January, February and March by quarterly filers. It is 1.1 percent more than allocated in May 2015.

"The cities of Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso and Fort Worth saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "Energy-centric cities such as Houston, Odessa and Midland continue to see decreases in sales tax allocations."

BLAZE RULED INTENTIONAL

The U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms on May 11 announced its research laboratory's finding that the April 17, 2013, fire at the West Fertilizer Company plant in the town of West Texas, was intentionally set.

Fifteen people died and some 160 were injured in the fire and explosion.

"We will gladly assist in any way possible in the days ahead to expose the criminals behind this heinous crime," said David Maxwell, director of law enforcement for the Texas attorney general's office.
