## 3 states seek clarity on federal transgender guidelines

AUSTIN - The current method devised by the Texas public education does not violate the state constitution, the Texas Supreme Court unanimously ruled May 13 The lawsuit challenging the state's education-
funding method originally was brought in 2011 by tricts identifying themselves collectively as the Texas Taxpayer and Student Fairness Coalition. Lawyers for the coalition argued that the state falls short of the constitution's imperative of o provide enough money for school districts' classroom instruction, maintenance and operation and other critical budget areas. Article 7 of the constitution says: "A general diffusion of to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the

people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to stablish and make suitable and maintenance of an ef ficient system of public free schools." In a 100-page ruling, the court said the current system ensures that "all Texas children have access to a quality achieve their potential and fully participate now and uly participate now and economic, and educational opportunities of our state and nation." The court agreed that the current funding system, while imperfect, is good enough" to satisfy the onstitutional mandate, and going forward, it is up to the mend the funding formula Gov. Greg Abbott formula. ruling "a victory for Texas
taxpayers and the Texas Constitution." Lt. Gov. Dan Stratck, House Speaker Joe Straus, Attorney General Ken Paxton and many Republican lawmakers joined the governor in welcoming the ruling. Paxton echoed the ruling in saying school finance "must be debated and shaped by through decades' worth of through decades worth of court system."
In contrast, organizations such as the Texas Association of School Boards, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund, the Texas Democratic Party and a number of Democratic lawmakers expressed disappointment over the ninecourt's ruling.
Sen. Royce West, D- Dallas said, "The Texas Supreme

What we call dietary fiber is extracted from the seeds and cell walls of plants. It the plant.
Animals do not have fiber. Instead, we use bone cartilage and connective tis-
sues to support sues to support our bodies
and, contrary to what many health authorities advise fiber cannot be beneficially processed by the human digestive tract.
Boston psychiatrist,
Georgia Ede, MD Georgia Ede, MD explains why experts believe fiber is
essential for health. "It is essential for health; simple misunderstanding of the research. Well-meaning intelligent scientists looked at all the data and came to the wrong conclusion by making a single, critically flawed assumption that led them in the wrong direction... About 150 years ago the world was populated by two kinds of people: people who were still eating 'tradi-
tional' diets of various types tiond people who were start ing to eat a 'modern' diet"' There are two types dietary fiber, that which is soluble in water and that which is not.

Plants contain a combination of both soluble and insoluble fiber in varying amounts.
We have been advised that soluble fiber is good because it slows the glyce-
mic impact of fructose in the small intestine and insolu ble fiber helps speed up th elimination of food in the colon.
While soluble fiber forms gels that help us feel full and retard the absorption of sugars in the small intestine, it comes at the cost of the body having to also dea with plant compounds such as arabinoxylan, dextrin, inulin, waxes, chitins, pectin, Additionally, many studies show little to no

Does dietary fiber shield the colon from cancer, constipation, and other colorectal diseases? Not in the least. In the 2007 issue of World Journal of Gastroenterology, Doctors Tan and Seow-Choen published a review of medical studies conducted over the previous 35 years about fiber and colon health and concluded be made for a protective effect of dietary fiber against colorectal polyp or cancer. Neither has fiber been found to be useful in chronic constipation and irritable bowel syndrome. It is also not useful in the treatment of perianal conditions. On the other hand, animal protein and fat are comfortably and efficiently processed by the colon with virtually no gases produced. We were not meant to swallow and digest plant fiber exclusively, nor was it ordained to become a primary food source.
