





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County oil and gas values take a hit

Crockett County Commissioners received grim news at their first budget workshop on May 23.

Officials from the Crockett County Appraisal District, presented the commissioners will estimate tax values for 2016.

With the drop in oil and gas production, Crockett County is facing a 40 percent drop. This means a \$2 million to \$2.5 million decrease in revenue, said County Judge Fred Deaton.

The sudden drop in production in 2015 has led to a 65-70 percent drop in natural gas and a 55-60 percent drop in oil production, said Janet Thompson with the appraisal district.

In 2015, Crockett County generated around \$2.1 billion in oil and gas revenues. Officials are estimating the county will generate \$1.3 billion in 2016.

In 2015, one cent generated \$214,553 for the county. In 2016, it is estimated that one cent will



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Limiting mosquito population big step to preventing Zika virus cases

Our mild winter this year and the recent Spring rains are expected to make for a record year for mosquitos. In addition to the itchy bites and buzzing irritation, mosquitos also pose a significant public health threat. Fortunately, there are steps we can take now to reduce the mosquito populations around our own homes and businesses.

This year, a tropical mosquito-borne virus known as Zika has spread throughout parts of Latin America and is causing concern in Texas and the

United States. The Center for Disease Control has recently discovered a causal link between prenatal exposure to a virus known as Zika and babies born with various birth defects, including microcephaly. And while Texas has yet to have a

case of Zika from a locally-acquired mosquito bite, the state has had 28 known cases from individuals who had recently traveled to areas with active outbreaks. Zika is passed from person to person by mosquitos after feeding on an actively infected individual. Because of the links to microcephaly and birth defects, pregnant women and those who may become pregnant during peak mosquito season need to be especially vigilant about preventing bites.

Despite all of the recent headlines about Zika, mosquito-borne illnesses are not new in Texas, and proper vigilance can help to prevent the transmission of other diseases such as Chikungunya and Dengue. The Texas Department of State Health Services recommends individuals use EPA-registered insect repellents when working or playing outside, limit outdoor activity during peak mosquito times (early mornings and evenings), and wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants.

Because the type of mosquito most likely to carry Zika and Dengue in Texas doesn't travel very far, taking a few hours to clean out areas around your home or business will have a direct impact on the number of disease-carrying mosquitos. Local health departments recommend pouring out any standing water, draining areas where water tends to accumulate, cleaning gutters and piles of leaves and brush, and keeping lids or covers on trash cans, rain barrels, and water tanks. Don't forget to drain flower pots and check around air conditioning units for pools of condensation.

The Department of State Health Services is working with local health departments to make sure that everyone has a plan for mosquito control this year, and I encourage you to check in with your local leaders to find out what their plan is for your community.

When you begin to think about the courage, dedication and sacrifice represented by each name etched in stone, it becomes overwhelming.

Visiting the Vietnam War Memorial Wall is also a deeply moving experience.

There are 57,939 names inscribed on the dark granite wall, each one representing someone's

spouse, parent, child or friend. It's not unusual to see someone standing solemnly with their hand reaching out to touch the name of

their departed love one, tears streaming down their face.

The POW/MIA flag that waves quietly overhead is a stark reminder that some of those names represent families who are still wondering what ultimately happened to their soldier, sailor, airman or marine.

It is impossible to not be grateful when you visit these sacred places. Tears sting your eyes as you walk past the haunting faces of the soldier statues at the Korean War Memorial.

A lump forms in your throat as you gaze at the reflections of long-dead, brave men and women etched into the long stretch of that wall.

At one end of that memorial is written a powerful reminder - Freedom Is Not Free. The price is dear and painful to bear, especially for the families left behind.

Many of us spend Memorial Day honoring our fallen at one of the many memorials located in our district. But let's determine to keep their sacrifice in our thoughts every day of the year not only by thanking those service members we meet, but by taking a moment to think how we can give back to a community of men, women, and families that have already given so much on our behalf.

It's not enough to just occasionally remember - we must never forget.

10 states join Texas AG in lawsuit over school bathrooms

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 25 filed a lawsuit against the heads of the federal Department of Education, Department of Justice, Department of Labor, Equal Opportunity Commission and other entities for issuing directives that would require public schools to open up restrooms and locker rooms to both sexes.

Joining Texas in the lawsuit are the states of Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Maine, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Utah, West Virginia and Wisconsin. Plaintiffs also include a diverse coalition of top state officials and local school districts, including the Harrold (Texas) Independent School District.

"Defendants have conspired to turn workplaces and educational settings across the country into laboratories for a massive social experiment, flouting the democratic process and running roughshod

over commonsense policies protecting children and basic privacy rights," Paxton said in the complaint.

In a long list of reliefs sought, the plaintiffs are asking the court for "a declaration that the defendants' new rules, regulations, guidance and interpretations are unlawful and must be set aside as actions taken 'without observance of procedure required by law' under the federal Administrative Procedure Act."

The lawsuit was filed in the U.S. District Court, Northern District of Texas, Wichita Falls Division.

COURT HEARS VOTER ID CASE

The Texas Attorney General's Office on May 24 defended the state's Voter ID law before the U.S. Court of

Appeals for the Fifth Circuit in New Orleans. The case was heard en banc, that is, all 15 of the court's judges.

Texas' voter ID law was passed by the Legislature in 2011. It requires voters to present a valid driver license or one of several other accepted forms of official photo identification, in addition to their voter registration. Plaintiffs say the law has discriminatory effects that violate the U.S. Voting Rights Act.

At a previous hearing, the U.S. Supreme Court ordered the Fifth Circuit to decide the case by July 20.

The Office of the Secretary of State posted May 24 election night returns for the 2016 Republican and Democratic parties' primary runoffs. In statewide contests:

— Wayne Christian of Center, a former state representative, won the Republican Party runoff against Gary Gates of Rosenberg for a seat on the three-member Texas Railroad Commission;

— Grady Yarbrough of San Antonio won the Democratic Party

Are the benefits of dietary fiber all hype?

According to the American Heart Association (AHA), "Dietary fiber from whole grains, as part of an overall healthy diet, may help improve blood cholesterol levels, and lower risk of heart disease, stroke, obesity and type 2 diabetes."

Conversely, we already know that cholesterol levels are not an indicator of heart health, that low cholesterol levels are linked to a greater risk of stroke and carbohydrates (sugar, flour, grains and starches) are responsible for the present colorectal cancer (CRC), type 2 diabetes and obesity pandemics. It makes one wonder, with whose interests are the AHA concerned?

"Dietary fiber in food and supplements is broadly promoted for the prevention of heart disease because, allegedly, it lowers cholesterol. Actually, this is a lie — not only does fiber not prevent heart disease, it also increases your risk of atherosclerosis, heart attack, sudden cardiac arrest, and stroke by reducing HDL ("good") cholesterol and blocking the assimilation of essential nutrients," says Konstantin Monastyrsky, a medical writer, performance

hydrate on cholesterol levels showed a huge reduction in LDL cholesterol (then called "bad cholesterol") of about 30 percent.

It is for this reason why fiber was promoted as "heart healthy." However, we now know that high cholesterol is not a viable indicator of heart disease and that low cholesterol levels are actually linked to an increased risk of stroke. In a nut shell, we need to eat a low glycemic index plant-based foods, or a low-carbohydrate diet to improve heart and brain health.

In regard to the question, "Do high-fiber diets help with weight loss?" No.

Most studies show little to no weight reduction benefit. However, most of the studies' results were mixed and

many were poorly designed. According to Nutrition Reviews, "the limited number of clinical trials comparing high-fiber foods with low-fiber foods have not provided consistent data indicating that these diets are more efficacious for weight loss than low-fiber control diets."

Konstantin Monastyrsky offers his opinion the validity of how fiber was first introduced into our diet as, "... if you believe that the introduction of fiber into the American diet came about as a result of thorough academic research, methodical clinical investigation, and penetrating peer reviews, I'm sorry to disappoint you, but it didn't. 


In her Valedictory address Estefania Torralba told her classmates spoke about her parents would push her to do her best.

30th annual Sixth Grade Field Day

On May 18, Crockett County Soil & Water Conservation District & NRCS hosted the 30th annual field day for the sixth-graders. The all-day event was held at Jack Baggett's ranch, 10 miles south of Ozona. We had 81 that attended.

The weather had us scrambling to make some last minute schedule changes and although it was a bit misty and drizzly, by noon it had stopped and the big rain held off until that evening so we were able to have a full day. We had seven presenters and a time keeper this year. They are very interactive with the students as they present their specific topic regarding conservation of our natural resources. The students were divided into three groups and they rotated between the stations. I have to say, the students are very well behaved and participate well. We can be proud of these kids and their teachers. They were able to see, learn and participate in educational, yet fun, presentations.

Some things the students were able to enjoy were an observation beehive and a sample of the beekeeper's honey. They also got to make rivers in a water trailer to see how the shape of a river or canal affects erosion. They were shown different types of wool, how it was separated into individual fibers and then how different lengths were used to make different items. There was a rainfall simulator that was a vivid demonstration of runoff, erosion, and how much water went back to our groundwater supply, depending on the plants and use of the soil. The kids were also able to see and mix soil samples and learned how to identify which soils are stable, which ones indicate water, which would be stable and good support for building on and which wouldn't. They enjoyed a game learning about wildlife habitats and why wildlife management is beneficial. Another activity they enjoyed was a GPS Scavenger hunt. The students were

sent home with a goodie bag that contained written material to share with their family to help promote further awareness of conservation of our natural resources, wildflower seed packets so they can plant a butterfly garden in their yard, ice cream tokens from Dairy Queen, lip balm and some gum to satisfy their sweet tooth. We encourage their parents to help them plant the flower seeds. It will be a fun family activity and beneficial to the pollinators as well.

Their posters from earlier this year about pollination were put up in the barn and during lunch everyone enjoyed seeing the displayed artwork. Lunch was cooked by the Soil and Water Directors James Owens, Pleas Childress, Ira Childress and Jack Baggett. Thanks guys! The burgers were delicious as always.

Graham reelected to State Soil & Water Conservation Board

TEMPLE — Marty H. Graham of Rocksprings, Texas, was reelected May 6 to serve a successive term on the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB).
Graham represents TSSWCB State District II, which consists of 51 counties in the western to Trans-Pecos region of Texas. State District II encompasses 43 Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD).
With its state office headquartered in Temple, Texas, the TSSWCB is the lead agency for the state of Texas in addressing agricultural and silvicultural forms of nonpoint source pollution. The TSSWCB also offers a technical assistance program for the state's 216 Soil and Water Conservation Districts for the planning, management and abatement of agricultural and silvicultural nonpoint source pollution. The TSSWCB maintains regional offices in strategic locations in the state to help carry out the agency's water quality responsibilities.
The TSSWCB board of directors consists of five elected members and two gubernatorial appointees who must be actively engaged in farming or ranching. The five TSSWCB members are chosen in a convention type election by SWCD directors in the State District in which the TSSWCB member represents.
Graham is a former member on the board of directors of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts (ATSWCD). He is also a past president of the Hill Country Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.
Graham has been a director on the Upper Nueces-Frio Soil and Water Conservation District since 1988 where he

currently serves as chairman of the District Board. The Upper Nueces-Frio SWCD is headquartered in Rocksprings.
In other areas of agricultural leadership Graham is currently a director with the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and a director on the Mohair Council of America.
Graham, who started ranching in 1982, raises cattle and goats in Edwards County. His ranching operation also includes a white-tail deer, turkey and exotics hunting program.
Graham lives on the family ranch north of Rocksprings in Edwards County with his wife Joyce, and son, Grayson. "The whole family is involved in ranching and conservation", said Graham.

generate \$127,071, Thompson said.
Representatives from Pritchard & Abbott, Inc. said the county will be generating the same amount of revenue they generated in 2004.
In 2004, the county generated around \$1.3 billion. Since 2004, the oil and gas values have increased hitting a peak at \$2.6 billion in 2014. Mineral, utility and industrial accounts are appraised for the district by Pritchard & Abbott Inc. in Fort Worth.
Thompson said with Crockett County reliant on oil and gas, the county is taking a double hit.
"It's like a husband and wife working with two new cars and two kids in college. Then the husband or wife loses their job, so you only have one income. We've lost 42 percent of our budget," Deaton said. "It's happened to almost everyone in the county."
The commissioners looked over their first copy of the 2017 budget prepared by the county auditor's office.
Salaries and the number of personnel remained the same, but every department saw some form of cuts.

This is just the first budget to be presented to the commissioners. More meetings will be held before anything is finalized.

Commissioner Eligio Martinez asked to look through the county's bills and find items to be cut, such as the satellite television.
Deaton said by their next meeting he will try to do a graph comparing 2004 to now and what departments have increased the most.
"We have lots of things to think about. I expect to have more meetings to figure out what we want to do and where we want to be," Deaton said.

ZIKA NUMBERS REPORTED
The Texas Department of State Health Services on May 20 announced that Texas has reported to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control one confirmed case of Zika in a pregnant woman who traveled abroad to an area with Zika transmission.
There have been 12 additional pregnancies in Texas with laboratory evidence of Zika infection since tracking and testing for Zika began, but all of those 12 have come back inconclusive.
The agency said that in order to be reported as a Zika pregnancy case, a pregnant woman must exhibit a rash or fever plus at least one other symptom, and also have a positive Zika-specified test result.

Crockett County Animal Control has had two confirmed cases of rabies in a skunk reported last month. Both cases were in town around dogs and in residential areas.
If you haven't had your pets vaccinated for rabies, it's time to do it now. The rabies virus takes 10 days after an animal has been bitten or exposed to begin to show symptoms and anyone who came in contact with that animal should be treated for rabies.
Rabies is spread through the saliva of the infected animal. The rabies virus kills any animal or human 100 percent of the time if left untreated or caught too late. When an animal contracts rabies they may act in two different ways.
One is the furious type where the animal is highly excited and aggressive and will try to bite something or someone. The other is the paralytic or "dumb" type where the animal seems quiet and unaware of its surroundings. Regardless of where you live in Ozona, we all still live in the middle of a pasture.
Please take the proper precautions to protect your pets and loved ones. This is the main reason the State of Texas created and Crockett County follows and enforces the restraint and vaccination laws. To try to prevent cases of rabies in our domesticated animals.
