Homemakers & Homemaking IN BAILEY COUNTY By MOLLIE STINSON Home Demonstration Agent

From all reports, the girls and leader who attended the 4-H Roundup last week had a wonderful time. I hope that the group can spread their enthusiasm to the rest of the 4-H workers and members in the county. Mrs. Totsy Lemons, Mary Carney and Gracie Lou Altman represented Bailey County Girls 4-H work at the state meeting.

Right now plans are underway for the Girls District II Camp to be held in Lubbock June 21. 22 and 23. Those delegates going for sure include Peggy Howell, Muleshoe 5th and 6th grade. Kathy Pollard, Three Way Club and Jay Carney, Muleshoe High Club, Shirley Cherry, Muleshoe 7th and 8th. Mrs. Carney is planning on going along as adult leader with the group. I thought that the dress review held by the county home demonstration clubs was a success. It will be a challenge to the 4-H girls to meet the quality of garments displayed by the women. I believe that they can outdo the women on quantity easily, but quality of work will be the main goal. After all it is the first dress review that the women have had in some time.

Insufficient and poor quality lighting often may be the cause of nervousness, irritability and headaches, according to home management specialists.

Homemakers spend many hours in the kitchen and work with many automatic and electrical appliances that must be handled correctly.

Each of the kitchen areas needs a certain type and amount of light fitted to the job in that area. The old lighting arrangement of one ceiling fixture and a single, unshielded bulb over the

sink does not do a good job. For even a bare minimum of good lighting in your kitchen, three requirements must be met.



First, a general lighting fixture is needed for room-wide illumination. This is usually an indirect center ceiling light. Next, plan local lighting units

for the sink and stove areas. These can be wall brackets or ceiling fixtures.

The third lighting area to be considered is under your wall cabinets. This lights up the work area on top of the counters. Safety is one of the biggest reasons for the right amount of light in this area as most electrical appliances are used on the counters.
