# Muleshoe First National Bank Chartered

## Second Financial Institution Will Open Soon With Capital Stock \$200,000

The bank will occupy temporary quarters until their permanent home is completed.

Application for charter for the First National Bank of Muleshoe was approved by federal and state banking authorities Friday, June 10. The directors met for the first time after receiving this word Monday afternoon in the office of Karl Lovelady to begin laying plans that will put the bank into operation sometime in the near future.

W. T. Andrews, of Spur will be president of Muleshoe's second financial institution, and M. D. Gunstream, formerly with the First National Bank of Memphis, Texas, will be vice-president and cashier.

Composed almost entirely of local business men the directorate includes E. O. Baker, James B.

Glaze, Ray Griffiths, J. E. Hicks, W. M. Oliver, Lee R. Pool, L. L. St. Clair, Vernie Towns, and Roy Riddel of Lubbock.

Capital stock will be \$200,000 with a surplus of \$50,000 and undivided profits equaling the same amount.

In the near future the contract will be let for a building, which will house the institution. The bank has purchased property for the building located northeast of the square on West First Street at Avenue C. Some outstanding features of the building will be a drive-in teller's window, night depository, and a paved parking lot for customers.

While awaiting the completion of the new building the bank plans to open in temporary quarters here. It is believed that construction will take from three to four months once the contract is in the builder's hands.

Walter Harrison, who farms five miles west of Muleshoe, arrived at the Muleshoe Elevator with the first load of wheat harvested in Bailey County at 4:30 p. m. yesterday.

Harrison had 5670 pounds on his truck. The wheat had 15% moisture and tested 58 pounds to the bushel. This year's crop made 20 bushels to the acre.

T. L. Gleason of the Lardville community delivered a load weighing 17,590 pounds to the S. E. Cone Grain and Seed Co. here only half an hour after Harrison pulled into town. His wheat measured 14% moisture and weighed 61½ pounds to the bushel. This year's load was eight days later than last year's first.

## Copy Of The Journal Goes In Sealed Vault - To Be Opened June 18, 2055

A copy of the Muleshoe Journal with over 405 other newspapers carrying the Babson Column is today being buried at the base of the World's Largest Revolving Globe at Babson Park, Wellesley, Mass. These newspapers are in a sealed concrete vault with instructions to open June 18, 2055.



WORLD'S LARGEST GLOBE Grounds of Babson Institute and Publishers Financial Bureau

The Globe, proposed by Roger Babson Webber, a gift of Mr. Roger W. Babson and family, is a great steel ball, 28 feet in diameter, supporting a map of the world on a scale of 24 miles to the inch in 29 different colors (fused glass on thin steel plates).

Every country in the world is represented, with the capitals and cities having a population of a million or more indicated by stars or circles. This tremendous globe, weighing 25 tons, is mounted on a 22-inch diameter 6-ton hollow shaft, representing the axis of the earth, set at an angle of 23.5 degrees from the

vertical. It is so devised as to rotate about its axis simulating the earth's rotation once each day of 24 hours. The shaft, in turn, is supported by a 10-ton triangular carriage revolving on a circular steel track 20 feet in diameter simulating the revolution of the earth about the sun once each year to show the passage of the seasons.

Among the features shown on the Map are 25 of the major mountain peaks of the world, 25 major mountain ranges, 100 principal rivers, innumerable lakes, islands and groups of islands, the depths of the ocean in three different shades of blue, the heights of the mountain ranges in two different shades of brown, the poles (both actual and magnetic), and the Tropics of Capricorn and Cancer, the Equator, and International Date Line, with the Meridians of Latitude and Longitude. As a tool to visualize the various economic and political tensions and relationships existing in this troubled world, the Babson World Globe is unequalled.

## Farm Magazine Features CROP Effort in Texas

A story on CROP (Christain Rural Overseas Program) in Texas appears in the July issue of The Progressive Farmer Magazine.

The article "CROP — Christianity in Action" tells how hundreds of Texans are sharing their crops and livestock with the needy of the world.

CROP had its beginning in Texas in 1948. The Rev. Walter O. Parr, Fort Worth, has been director of the program since 1951, and under his guidance it has steadily grown in the state. Last years total receipts were \$210,029.92.

One of the biggest projects of Texas CROP has been the Texas Friendship for Korea ship to be dedicated at Houston on June 20. The ship will be loaded with livestock and supplies for church missions and the 4-H clubs in Korea.

On July 4, a second ship will leave from Corpus Christi carrying 150 heifers from Texas for refugees in Germany. A third project of the Texas CROP in 1955 is a shipment of two freight cars of food and medical supplies to Arabs in Jerusalem.

Money and contributions for CROP comes from all ages and groups. Youngfolks over the state raised \$32,677.64 for milk for hungry children of the world in their "trick or treat" program last year.

Contributions range from \$200 given by a small boy on up to farmer who gave in carloads. All are raised by Texas Christians wanting to demonstrate brotherly love for the hungry and needy of the world.

## Wheat Marketing Quotas For 1956 To Be Decided By June 25 Referendum

COLLEGE STATION, June 11—The final decision on whether or not marketing quota controls will apply to wheat produced in 1956 will be made by wheat growers on June 25.

According to the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, if two-thirds vote "yes", the support for the 1956 crop will probably be between 75 and 82 percent of parity — the extent level will be announced before the referendum. If more than one-third vote "no", the support will be 50 percent of parity. In any case, points out the committee, support will be available in the commercial wheat states only to those farmers who stay within their farm's wheat acreage allotment. Texas is a commercial wheat state.

If, points out the committee, the vote is favorable, market quotas will be in effect and growers who exceed their farm acreage allotment will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45 per cent of parity on their excess wheat. If the vote is unfavorable, there will be no market-

Acreage allotments will be in effect for price support purposes even if marketing quotas are disapproved. The national acreage allotment for 1956 is 55 million acres — same as for 1955 — which is the minimum established by law.

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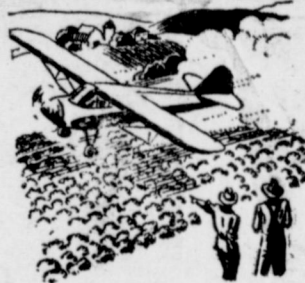

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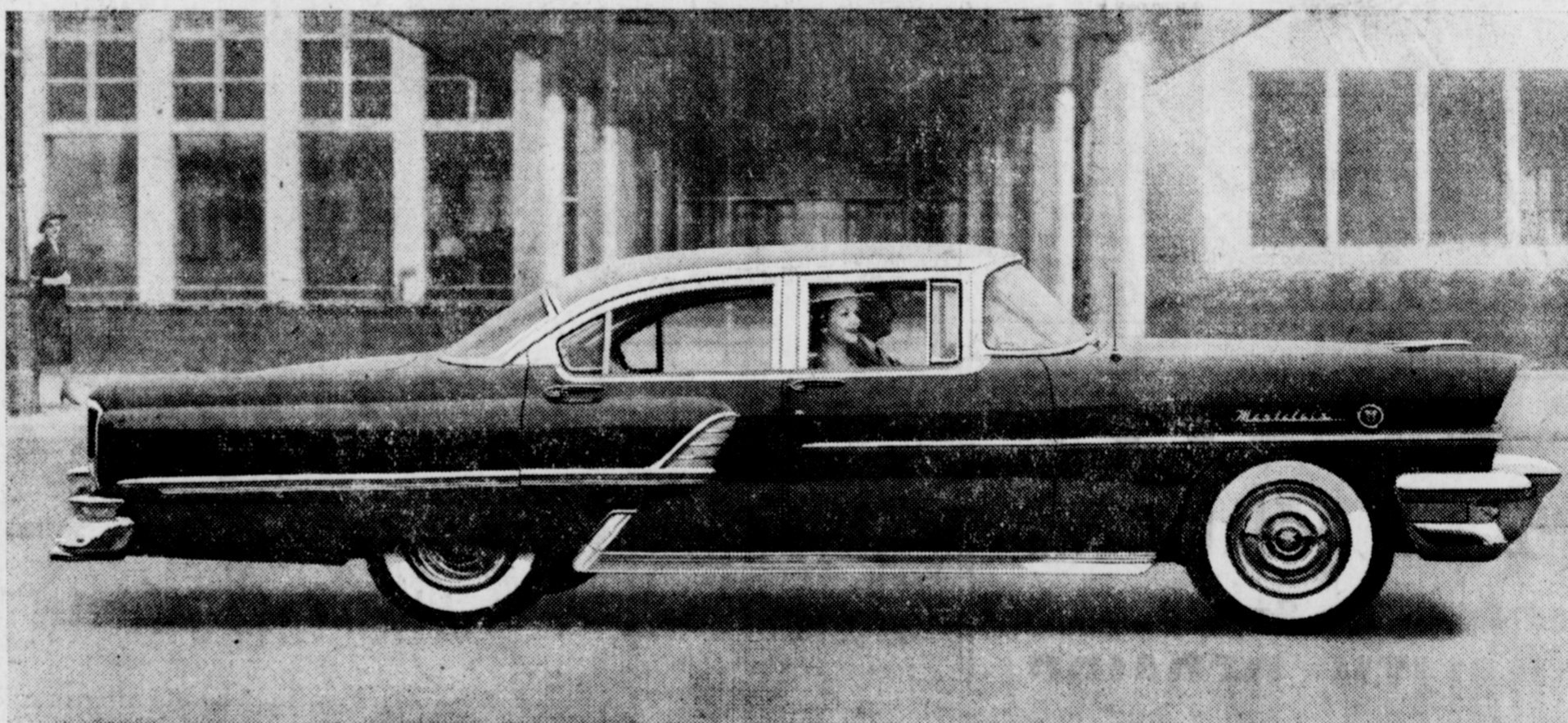

**FARM PRICE — COST SQUEEZE**

Texas farmers, plagued by a continuous downward trend in farm prices, are being confronted with still another economic obstacle: higher production costs.

Misleading reports of stabilizing farm prices fail to justify inevitable increases in farm equipment prices brought about by higher city wages and higher manufacturing costs.

Farm prices do, of course, show signs of more steadiness, but with present prices running about five per cent below those of a year ago and higher costs on the horizon, any gain the farmer might expect to make is rapidly being cancelled out.

Some of this added cost can be avoided by careful spending and planning equipment purchases and on-farm construction ahead of time. Increased steel prices are bound to signify higher costs for finished farm equipment — probably by fall.

Thus, our farmers might do well to plan purchases now of plows and other heavy machinery, building materials, wire, fencing, and like products which may be subjected to increases

later in the year.

An anticipated congressional boot in the national minimum wage might turn out to be a paradox to the farmer, who will probably notice an increased demand for his products on one hand and higher prices for things he must buy on the other.

This further tightening of the farm price-cost squeeze will not be comfortably relaxed until we are assured of fair parity prices to give the farmer a return for his commodities in proportion to his costs for equipment and production.

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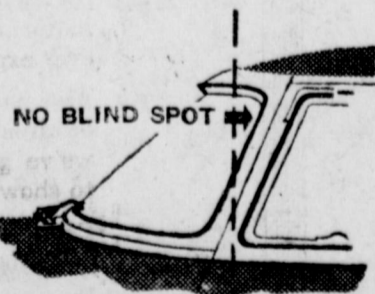

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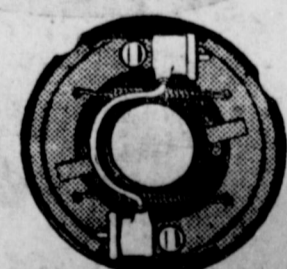

**BABSON DISCUSSES—  
Chiang Kai-shek, Formosa and  
Business Outlook**

Babson Park, Mass., June 16—So many readers are worrying about Formosa and China that at this time, when the "World's Biggest World" is being dedicated here, I take the liberty of discussing Asiatic problems. First, let me say that I have never met Chiang Kai-shek, but I have known Madame Chiang, who attended Wellesley College, which is only two miles from the Babson Great Globe and Institute. She is a remarkable woman of the highest character and keenest insight; she has great influence with him. He was a poor boy when he married her; but a determined type like the late Henry Ford and a very great man.

**HISTORY OF FORMOSA**  
When forecasting the future of any country, it is well to recognize the history as well as the present status. Formosa is a large island, about the size of Massachusetts and Connecticut, lying 100 miles east of China. A mountain range runs north and south, with fertile plains to the west. A combination of heat and moisture gives it marvelous crops: it produces gold, silver, copper, oil, coal, and uranium. Population is about 9,000,000, mostly of old Chinese descent. This great island was originally settled by the Dutch who were expelled by the Chinese during the seventeenth century. It was taken by the Japanese in 1895, who held it until the close of World War II, when, in 1945, it was ceded back to China. Whatever our opinion as to the

government of China — whether Nationalistic under Chiang Kai-shek, or Communist under Chou and his gangsters — we must realize that Formosa inherently is a part of China. Whether the Communists want to "liberate" it or "enslave" it is debatable. From a strategic viewpoint, the United States and Japan should not allow Formosa to get into the clutches of Communist China.

**IMPORTANCE OF PATIENCE**

One of the chief lessons I have learned from Madame Chiang Kai-shek is the importance of patience and of avoiding giving ultimatums. Human nature is the same on both sides of a conflict, and if "the ball can be kept in the air" long enough most problems will solve themselves. Many serious problems are solved by leaders becoming older and finally dying. (Today's Bible reading is Psalms, 49th Chapter, which has given me the inspiration to write this column.) To apply the above philosophy to the Formosa problem—it may be impossible to get a satisfactory settlement as long as Chiang Kai-shek is in the saddle. If, however, he should be removed by death or become incapacitated (he is about 70, and has had a hard life), I forecast that President Eisenhower could bring about a settlement which would both insure our position and "save face" for the Peking Government.

All the above means that our defense program may gradually be curtailed and this Federal money be used for the building of roads, hospitals, schools, and especially the new industry of Urban Redevelopment. Uranium oxide is being found almost everywhere, and could also help stave off the so-called "inevitable" depression. I still believe in the business cycle; but its duration is now determined by politics. Therefore, let us forget the troubles which we read so much about. Let us concentrate in our own business and make better products for less money and sell them all over the world. This is the most practical kind of patriotic service we can render.

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**Thousands In SS  
Benefits Being  
Lost Each Year**

Thousands of dollars in social security insurance benefits are being lost yearly, John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office said today.

According to Hutton, many persons who are at least age 72 and still operating their business are not aware of the problems in the law which allows eligible persons age 72 or older to receive their benefits without retirement. Persons of this age who have made profits in covered self-employment of over \$400 in at least two of the four years self-employment has been covered, undoubtedly have fulfilled the requirements for retirement but the Social Security Administration cannot start your payments until a claim is filed.

"There are also many self-employed persons," says Hutton, "who are over 65 and whose net earnings in their business is less than \$1200 per year, which would permit them to receive benefits if they qualified, even though still working."

Persons between age 65 and 72 whose net earnings from self-employment are between \$1200 and \$2080 per year may draw benefits for some months of the year based on a scale of one month's deduction for each \$80

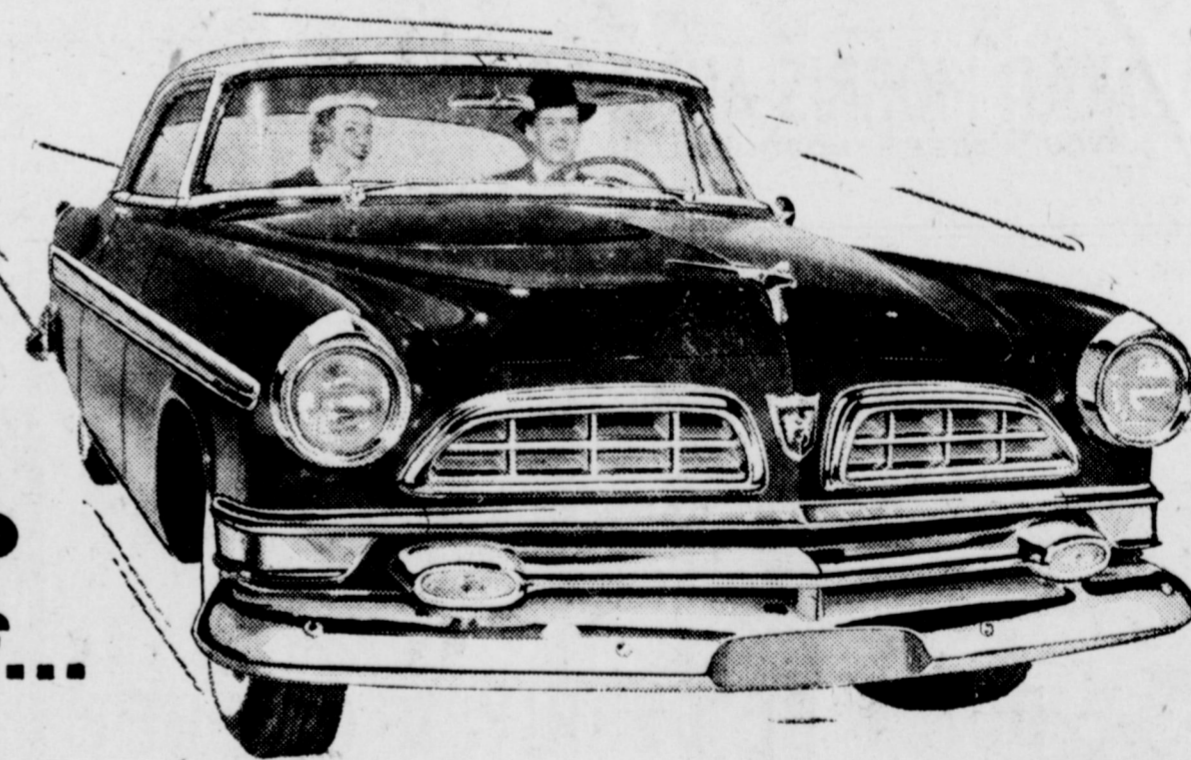

Insufficient and poor quality lighting often may be the cause of nervousness, irritability and headaches, according to home management specialists.

Homemakers spend many hours in the kitchen and work with many automatic and electrical appliances that must be handled correctly.

Each of the kitchen areas needs a certain type and amount of light fitted to the job in that area. The old lighting arrangement of one ceiling fixture and a single, unshielded bulb over the sink does not do a good job.

For even a bare minimum of good lighting in your kitchen, three requirements must be met. First, a general lighting fixture is needed for room-wide illumination. This is usually an indirect center ceiling light.

Next, plan local lighting units for the sink and stove areas. These can be wall brackets or ceiling fixtures.

The third lighting area to be considered is under your wall cabinets. This lights up the work area on top of the counters. Safety is one of the biggest reasons for the right amount of light in this area as most electrical appliances are used on the counters.

Following the close of the business session, members went in a body to the high school auditorium to view the Bible film showing. After this they returned to Miss Harden's home where refreshments were enjoyed.

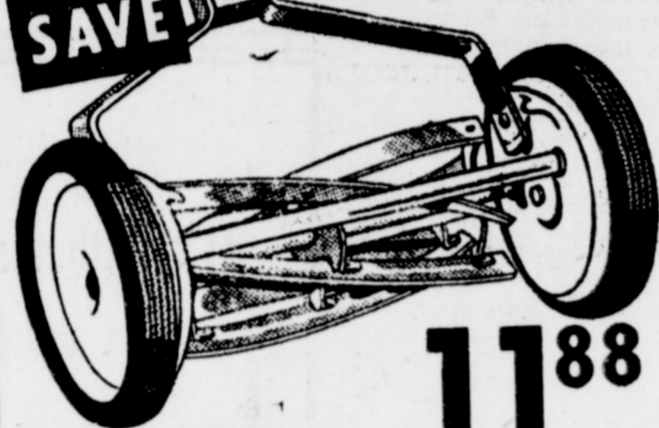

**PARMER COUNTY Farm Bureau News**

By RAYMOND EULER

We don't know the outcome of the bill to levy the three cent ad valorem tax for water development program. We're afraid it became law, but Senator Gilmer Corbin of Lubbock and Andy Rogers of Childress made concerted efforts to defeat it.

The two senators mentioned above also worked hand in hand with Farm Bureau in fighting the two cent increase in the gasoline tax. They were successful in forcing a change to one cent, which was well worth the effort.

One basic reason for Farm Bureau people insisting on some reasonable tax on natural gas leaving Texas, instead of the increase in gasoline tax is this fact. Highway gasoline tax amounts to about 83 per cent in Texas, paid mostly by Texans. The tax on natural gas, which leaves the state in vast quantities is only 9 per cent. We believe that when enough people know these facts, a united front can be established that will finally place the tax where it belongs.

Your Texas Farm Bureau has served you successfully and well during the legislative session just ended. Nineteen bills supported by Farm Bureau were approved by the legislature.

One bill of particular interest to farmers of this area is HB 485, related to control of noxious weed seed in planting seed. The principle interest in this bill came from those interested in eliminating bind weed.

Parmer County's weed com-

mittee, originated by your farm bureau directors at your request, has received wide publicity for its work. A. R. McCutchan, Les Bruns went to Morton last week, upon invitation to relate workings of the committee and its program. It is highly probable that this movement, started early, will avoid great economic loss due to spread of bind weed that would have otherwise occurred in Parmer County.

Your directors will welcome any suggestions you may have for resolutions to be presented to County members in October. Remember that Farm Bureau is the only farm organization that maintains a staff in Austin at legislative sessions. Consequently, it is the only farm organiza-
