Teacher housing renovations continue BY MELISSA PERNER THE OZONA STOCKMAN

The school district is continuing with their school housing renovations.

At the July 20 regular board meeting, Superintendent Raul Chavarria said the district has completely refurbished 13 school houses. The project is being completed with money from the \$3 million bond Crockett County Voters passed in November


"School housing has been a tremendous asset to the school district, especially this year in our hiring process. We've been able to attract families," Chavarria said.

Some of the updates have included gutting the entire home down to the studs, adding insulation to the entire house, adding ventilation in the restroom to avoid mold buildup, updating the electrical wires that were brittle and outdated and adding a utility room for water heater, washer and dryer to be indoors or out of the kitchen.

Other updates include adding an eating bar to the kitchen area, since space is too small for a table, and expanding the living room area by about 20 square-feet in the five units by Ozona Middle

In the eight units on Avenue G, Houston and Jones Streets, the units are now three bedrooms, two bathrooms with the addition of a restroom and bedroom.

Commissioners look at tax rates, budget

The Crockett County Commissioners discussed tax rates and the 2017 county

ing Monday night. County Judge Fred Deaton presented the commissioners with figures of possible tax rates to be considered.

budget during a special meet-

With a 38 percent decrease in appraisal values, along with cuts already made to the 2017 county budget and two bonds, the commissioners will have to consider going with the maximum tax rate of \$.80 per \$100 valuation.

Deaton said the county tax rate would need to be \$.62 to generate \$8.6 million for the county. The bond rate is \$.18. That will generate the \$2.5 million payment for the new jail and wellness center bonds.

That gives the county a tax rate of \$.80.

Last year's general tax rate was \$.50509.

Deaton said \$8.6 million in revenue minus the \$7.8 million in budgeted county expenses would give the county around \$250,000 left.

"That's what we are dealwith on the general budget. We've made steep cuts, we've made hard cuts. We've made every cut we could make without bleeding out," Deaton said.

The proposed 2017 budget does include funding for the new jail and wellness center.

Crockett County Voters approved in November 2015 a \$6 million bond for a new jail and a \$4 million for a wellness center.

"A whole lot of this is the bonds. Most of these items people should know about because they voted on them. The oilfield hit us just as hard as it hit everyone else. It's a hard pill to swallow," Deaton

For the county road and bridge tax, Deaton said the county will have to go with \$.11 or higher in order to raise \$1.5 million in revenue. Expenditures budgeted so far is around \$2 million. Last year's tax rate was \$.09302.

"We have made real stiff cuts to the road department," Deaton said.

Overall, the county is proposing \$1.36 million in cuts in the general budget and \$693,200 cuts in the road and bridge budget for 2017.

Deaton also presented figures that showed property valued at \$100,000 without exemptions would see a \$394 increase in 2017.

Property valued at \$100,000 with homestead exemption would see a \$297.83 increase in 2017.

Also in the budget, the commissioners approved transferring \$8,000 from the district court budget to the sheriff's department budget for bailiff since the sheriff's office is now providing the bailiff for district court.

The commissioners also approved moving \$4,000 from the county court budget to the constable's budget for bailiff.

The commissioners also approved Cop Sync Software Contract for the sheriff's department, as well as entering into a certain finance contract by and between the county and Governmental Capital Corporation for the purpose of purchasing and financing Cop Sync. The county desires to designate the finance contract as a "Qualified Tax Exempt Obligation" of the county for the purposes of the Internal Revenue Code.

The paper received second place for feature and editorial writing, third place for community service and fourth place for news photo and page design.

There are three single member district seats and the at-large seat up this year. Those seats include: At-Large currently held by David Mc-Williams; SMD 1 currently held by Orlando DeHoyos; SMD 2 currently held by Grizz Medina and SMD 6 currently held by Amy Newton.

Filing runs through Aug. 22. Election Day is Nov. 8.

Prospective candidates must meet certain eligibility requirements. They must have lived in Texas for at least a year and in the school district for at least six months before the filing deadline.

They must be at least 18 years old and registered to vote at the time of election.

Anyone interested in filing for a position on the school board, can pick up a packet at the CCCCSD Administration Building at 797 Ave-

Registered voters can apply for a ballot by mail until Oct. 28.

The last day to register to vote in the November election is Oct. 11. Early voting will take place Oct. 24-Nov. 4.

Struggling with cash flow, look at industry averages

Many small businesses struggle with cash flow problems. How cash moves or "flows" from the time the business pays for the expense of cost of goods or service (cash out) until the time it is collected by the business from the customer (cash

in). The length of this process can determine the extent of the problem a business has with its cash flow. The longer the period of time from expense to collection, the larger the cash flow problems the business may have. The longer it takes the more cash a business will require to cover cash needs.

Your cash may be tied up in your customer's "pockets" through aging of accounts receivable or tied up in inventory that is not moving fast enough. In addition, your prices may be too low causing your gross profit dollars

to be less than they should.

Gross profit dollars are used to cover overhead expenses. Finally, your overhead expenses may be too high.

A business must have cash to pay its bills. If it runs short of cash, they must borrow funds or inject outside sources of cash, which may be difficult in both cases if the business is struggling. A business short of cash may be able to stall venders and lenders for a bit, but payroll and taxes are due on time. For this reason, a business has to make sure it has adequate cash on hand, and flowing in, to pay expenses and obligations. Lack of adequate cash can cause various problems.

Have someone run an industry financial analysis for your industry. This information will tell you what the average business in your industry looks like in terms of accounts receivable turnover, inventory turnover, overhead expense percentage, gross profit percentage, etc. You can compare your numbers to industry averages and see where you are off the mark. If your inventory is too high, then you can look at your purchasing process and come up with ways of selling the overstock

inventory and turning it into cash. If you are below average with accounts receivable, then you can look at your credit and collection process to make sure future customers are credit worthy and also ensuring you have a good system of collecting what is due. If your gross profit percentage is below average, you can review your pricing and look at ways of lowering the cost of goods through better buying of goods or materials related to sales. Finally, review overhead expenses to see how you compare to your industry average. Reduction of un-

necessary expenses will lead to more cash available. As you can guess, this is a good exercise to do even if you are not in a cash crunch in order to avoid one from happening. The ASU Small Business Development Center can help you by running an industry average report, analyze your situation and help you recover from cash flow problems.

Allow the FBI to track terrorists online


little longer than a year ago, two Islamic State-inspired terrorists, clad in body armor and armed with assault rifles and 1,500 rounds of ammunition, drove up to the Curtis Culwell Center in Garland to kill as many people as possible. Fortunately, law enforcement immediately took action and the terrorists were killed before they could step foot inside and open fire on the estimated 150 people there.

Dallas, and our state, avoided what could have been a real tragedy that day. But in the months since then, we've seen more and more cases of people becoming self-radicalized here in the United States. Omar Mateen, the Orlando terrorist, serves as the most recent example of an American citizen turned ex-

In today's interconnected world, terrorists abroad don't have to come to the United States to wreak havoc. Videos, tweets and social media posts quickly become the gasoline that can fuel Americans to radicalize and carry out deadly attacks. In other words, the battle is being waged at home and over the internet just as it is being waged in places like Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan.

The rise of home-grown terrorism, and the massive online terrorist networks that facilitate it, poses a clear and present danger to the United States. Law enforcement officers don't have speedy access to critical pieces of information they need to identify, investigate and prosecute terrorists here at home. And because of that, they're not able to collect the dots to connect the dots to investigate and lock up suspected

Today, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has the authority to get the financial and telephone records of suspected terrorists using a subpoena called a national security letter. But because of a drafting error in the law, the FBI can't readily access the same information on these new techniques the Islamic State uses to recruit and radicalize violent extremists online. An amendment to a government funding bill I recently supported would correct this error and give the FBI the ability to collect and analyze the records of potential terrorists' electronic communications. Put another way, the legislation would help the FBI track down terrorists, and it would do so

cans. This amendment would not grant the government access to the content of Americans' online activity. It would simply give investigators a chance to review the internet metadata of suspected terrorists, like who they talked to and where they went online. Law enforcement would still need a search warrant from a judge to learn the contents of a message.

The measure has broad bipartisan support in the Senate. James Comey, the director of the FBI, has called it a top legislative priority. President Barack Obama supports it too and wants this legislation passed. In other words, this is a bipartisan priority that has united a lot of people who usually hold very different views.

The foiled attack in Garland serves as an example of homegrown terrorists thwarted in their mission to attack our communities. We don't know what the FBI would have discovered about the terrorists in Orlando or San Bernardino if they had this authority. But we should do all we can to help our public servants collect what they need to do their jobs, defend our homeland and better guard against future terrorist attacks.

Appellate court strikes down Texas voter ID law

AUSTIN — Texas' voter photo identification law is racially discriminatory, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit ruled July 20.

In striking down the law passed by the Texas Legislature in 2011, the Fifth Circuit said it disproportionately and negatively affects African-American and Hispanic citizens' right to vote.

Gov. Greg Abbott decried the ruling in Veasey et al. v. Abbott et al., saying: "The Fifth Circuit ... wrongly concluded the law had a discriminatory effect. Voter fraud is real and it undermines the integrity of the election process."

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton also reacted, saying: "Preventing voter fraud is essential to accurately reflecting the will of Texas voters during elections and it is unfortunate that this common-sense law, providing protections against fraud, was not upheld

in its entirety."

SB 14 required voters to present government-issued photo identification when voting at the polls. Acceptable forms of photo ID, as specified in the legislation, included: Texas driver license, Texas election identification certificate, Texas personal ID card, Texas concealed handgun license, U.S. military ID card, U.S. citizenship certificate and U.S. passport. Prior to the implementation of SB 14, a Texas voter could cast a ballot in person by presenting a registration certificate, a document mailed to voters upon registration.

The Fifth Circuit sent the case back to the federal district court in Corpus Christi and ordered the court to find an "appropriate remedy" to the discriminatory effects of SB 14 in time for the impending general election in Novem-

ABBOTT PROPOSES LEGISLATION

Gov. Abbott on July 18 asked the Texas Legislature to pass the Police Protection Act in the 2017 session commenc-


ing in January. "At a time when law enforcement officers increasingly come under assault simply because of the job they hold, Texas must send a resolute message that the state will stand by the men and women who serve and protect our communities," Abbott said in proposing the legislation.

Abbott said that if enacted, the Police Protection Act would:

- Extend hate crime protections to law enforcement officers;

- Increase criminal penalties

for any crime in which the victim is a law enforcement officer, whether or not the crime qualifies as a hate crime; and

Meet the amazing human liver

The liver is an amazing vital organ. Among the estimated several hundred functions performed by the liver are detoxification, cholesterol generation, hormone production, plasma protein synthesis, the regulation of glycogen storage and the decomposition of red blood

"The liver's highly specialized tissue consisting of mostly hepatocytes regulates a wide variety of highvolume biochemical reactions, including the synthesis and breakdown of small and complex molecules, many of which are necessary for normal vital functions. Estimates regarding the organ's total number of functions vary, but textbooks generally cite it being around 500." From Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia.

Rather than the Latin, it is the Greek translation of liver, "hepar" that is used in combined forms by the medical industry; like hepatic, hepatitis and heparin (an anticoagulant for preventing the formation of blood clots).

Bile acids are synthesized in the liver from cholesterol and are secreted into the duodenum and stored temporarily in the gallbladder (30 to 60 ml at any given time) to breakdown dietary fat in the digestive tract. More than 90% of the bile acids are then recycled back to the liver, with very little being excreted with the waste. To make up for the loss and meet other body requirements, the liver will excrete 1500-2000 mg of newly synthesized cholesterol daily.

Storing about 100 grams of glycogen from blood glucose, the liver plays several roles in carbohydrate regulation.

It supports protein metabolism and plays roles in the production of red blood cells and regulating clotting issues.

Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia offers, "The liver is responsible for the mainstay of protein metabolism, synthesis as well as degradation. It is also responsible for a large part of amino acid synthesis. The liver plays a role in the production of clotting factors as well as red blood cell production. Some of the proteins synthesized by the liver include coagulation factors I (fibrinogen), II (prothrombin), V, VII, VIII, IX, X, XI, XIII, as well as protein C, protein S and antithrombin."

In lipid (fat) metabolism, the liver performs the excretion of cholesterol (mentioned above), lipogenesis, produces triglycerides and synthesizes the lion's share of the body's lipoproteins.

The liver can fall victim to numerous health prob-

it is designed to destroy remain trapped in the body to exact their toll.

That said, don't be deceived by the commercially available "liver cleanses". They are a scam and can actually do further harm to the liver, digestive tract and the body. Sugar, grains (refined or not), processed foods and oils, and high glycemic carbohydrates cause inflammation and deposit toxins throughout the body that are ushered to the liver for disposal. If the liver is not functioning as it should; guess what.





Also, a wall was removed in the kitchen and an eating bar was added to accommodate room to seat five in these units.

There are nine units left to be complete. Chavarria said the plan is to finish twothree units a vear until all of the units are finished.

Currently, three houses will be left empty this school year so that we can finish them without having to move families around, Chavarria

The work is being done by Lopez Construction, of

"Some of the work, such as demolition, insulating and painting can be done by our own maintenance crew in order to save money," Chavarria said.

Board member Grizz Medina asked who got the new houses, new teachers or ones that have been with the district.

Chavarria said if a teacher has children then they are given priority, whether they are new to the district or now.

"I feel that I owe it to the ones that have families to not pack them in," he said.

"You also owe it to the ones who have been here longer," Medina added.

Medina also said while the houses are looking nice, the upkeep of the yards "are looking terrible.'

"These are our property and our tenants are not taking care of their end. We are putting taxpayer money into this. They should be considerate enough to take care of their yard," Medina said.

She also said that the houses should be maintained and kept clean, and suggested a bigger deposit if people have pets.

"We've discussed periodical walkthroughs. We have worked extremely hard to get these houses where they're at and we expect them to take care of them. There are options we can explore. I will send out an email and remind them of the yards and care." Chavarria said.

Board Vice President Orlando DeHoyos said he has been approached about which houses are being down

"We can't address all the units at the same time. We're still on target to go ahead and refurbish them. My concern is the public understand we are going to get to all the units," DeHoyos said.

BOND ISSUE REPORT

Chavarria presented an update on the spending of the \$3 million bond. The bond was approved by Crockett County Voters in November 2014.

The district has spent \$774,205 in transportation for one chartered bus, two activity buses, two small yellow route buses and one small 14-passenger bus. The district was \$3,795 under budget for these items.

In technology, the district budgeted \$400,000 on new computers for the OES Computer Lab, replacing teacher laptops, district network and wiring and updating and furnishing the OHS Heritage Building Computer Lab. Total amount spent so far has been \$337,019.

For the \$882,000 budgeted in maintenance, the district has set aside money to replace air conditioning and heating units as needed, resurface the track, repair roofing leaks and is currently updating the teacher houses. Total amount spent so far

has been \$467,638. Also budgeted is \$1 million for new eight new tennis

courts.

Chavarria said with the tennis courts it is a matter of finding the right place. He also said there might be discussion with the Crockett County Commissioners' Court on a land trade in the future on possibly putting the courts by the OHS Baseball and Softball Fields.

"Land is a premium. Where they are currently at, there is not any room to build a proper facility to make it usable for our kids and a viewing area for the parents and the public. I haven't explored all the possibilities like we need to, but I do want to make sure we choose the right location. I want to put a lot of thought into providing something that needs to be useable and that we can host district events here," Chavarria said.

Medina said she doesn't like the idea of the tennis courts being by the baseball field.

"I think the baseball field should be a baseball field. Just shop around," she said.

BUDGET UPDATES

During the update for the 2016-2017 budget, Medina asked if the district would be replacing the two employees that retired from the cafeteria staff.

Chavarria said Food Services Manager Ludy Vargas was going to try it without rehiring the two. If it becomes too much of a burden then the district will hire one, he

"I don't want the program to hurt just because we didn't hire. I just don't want her (Vargas) to fall behind on any reports or guidelines," Medina said.

Vargas will be assisting the cafeteria staff with whatever duty is needed, Chavarria said.

"She's going to be more hands on. She can also move personnel around," Chavarria said.

Also in the budget, Chavarria said the district's total overall salary will be less due to teachers that retired.

He also said administrators are looking to reduce, not cut.

"We are not cutting any programs. There are areas we can reduce and not affect the instruction of our kids,"

Chavarria said.

NEW HIRES AND RESIGNATIONS

After meeting in executive/closed session for about 90 minutes, the board approved the hiring of Lucinda Gallegos to assist in technology and teach OHS science, Deborah Ramon for OHS math, Tamara Farley as district diagnostician, Justin Doiron as OES PE Teacher, Elisa Gregonis for OHS English, Farran Morris to assist district Nurse Karen Huffman and teach the nursing program at OHS, Whitney Brockman for life skills special programs and Jody Moore for OMS Sixth Grade.

The board also approved the resignations of Lyle Lofland, Ashley Allen, Ray Talamantez, Tiffany Talamantez, Tisha Harrison and Todd Harrison.

DRUG TESTING POLICY **UPDATE**

The board also discussed updating the district's mandatory drug testing policy.

"One thing I would like to consider is making this policy more proactive and more stringent," Chavarria said.

Chavarria's suggestions were to add mandatory testing to students who get a school parking permit and students who work for the district.

Chavarria said he also wants to add drug counseling from a certified drug counselor for students that violate the policy.

He said the district would help pay for the counseling and that it would be mandatory. The students would have 40 days to complete the counseling.

Chavarria said he is researching the cost.

"We do want to get those kids help," Chavarria said.


He also suggested to increase the number of times and the number students that get tested, adding a fourth offense and changing the policy to read 15 calendar days if the student violates the policy instead of 15 school days.

The board was given copies of the policy to review before their next meeting.

Chavarria said the district's lawyer and Texas Association of School Board officials will also review the policy before it is brought to the board for approval at the Aug. 17 regular meeting.

Board members Dwight Childress and Roland De-Hoyos were absent from the meeting.

The next regular school board meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 17 at the Administration Building, 797 Avenue D. The meeting is open to the



Dress Code Reminders

At CCCCSD we believe that we should "dress for success". Clothes matter a lot to everyone. They affect how we feel about ourselves and how well we can function at school.

We had a lot of violations of dress code this last year at CCCCSD, and so we want to clearly set the boundaries up before school begins.

Here are some guidelines from our handbook, as well as, a copy of the dress code section from our handbook, so parents and students can make good clothing choices.

SHORTS

We have had some short, shorts last year at CCCCSD, and so we are giving our school kids a rule – "shorts and skirts of modest length" is the statement in the handbook and for our kids "modest length" is either 2 inches below the fingertips OR 3 inches above the knee that is the "Target Modest Zone" at CCCCSD!

OUR DRESS CODE ALSO STATES THAT:

- "shirts or tops with spaghetti straps and tank tops are not permitted"
- "shirts or tops which expose the midriff are not permitted"

- "hair styles (such as Mohawks, they are not appropriate at OES and OMS)
- · accessories, clothing or lack of clothing that are extreme or disrupt, distract or interfere with the learning process will not be permitted' for us at CCCCSD this means:
- · that any shirt you wear must have a shoulder panel of at least 3 fingers wide,
- no exposed shoulders or shoulder blades,
- no exposed undergarments of any kind.
- If a student wears leggings, then the shirt over the leggings must be of "modest length" which is either 2 inches below the fingertips OR 3 inches above the knee
- this also means that if your shirt shows any cleavage you will be made to change into a T-shirt from the office until the end of the day or until another shirt is brought to you from home
- this also means NO HOLES, frays, rips, or tears above the knee in your pants - NONE, not patches, no leggings underneath, NONE means NONE!

Our handbook finally says that "Principals retain final discretion and authority in determining dress code violations"; it



also states that the principal can (and will) confiscate clothing that is in violation of dress code for up to one week. We want to be very clear with students, staff and parents as to what we consider to be appropriate, so students and parents can make decisions about student clothing.

Students will be expected to follow these dress code guidelines at all school events: band concerts, awards ceremonies, dances, and any other school activity.

Who Can Get Free Meals?

- Income—Children can get free or reduced-price meals if a household's gross income is within the limits described in the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- Special Assistance Program Participants—Children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program for Households on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), are eligible for free meals.
- Foster—Foster children who are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Head Start, Early Head Start, and Even Start—Children participating in these programs are eligible for free meals.
- Homeless, Runaway, and Migrant—Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told about a child's status as homeless, runaway, or migrant or you feel a child may qualify for one of these programs, please call or email Janina Savala at 325/392-5501 or janina.savala@ozonaschools.net.
- WIC Recipient—Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

- 2. My Child's Application Was Approved Last Year. Do I Need To Fill Out A New One? Yes. An application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. Send in a new application unless the school has told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 3. If I Don't Qualify Now, May I Apply Later? Yes. Apply at any time during the school year. A child with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced-price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- 4. What If My Income Is Not Always the Same? List the amount normally received. If a household member lost a job or had hours/wages reduced, use current income.
- 5. We Are in The Military. Do We Report Our Income Differently? Basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. "Food Safety: It's In Your Hands" will be 9-11 a.m. and 5-7 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 23, at the Crockett County Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, 1301 Avenue AA, in Ozona.

The "Texas Food Establishment Rules (TFER)" was revised and updated and will be effective Oct. 11, 2015.

A major change in the revision now requires all food employees to complete an accredited food handlers training program within 60 days of employment, effective Sept. 16, 2016.

This 1-2-hour course will now be required for all food service employees to help promote the service of safe food.

The certificate is good for 2 years and is valid anywhere in the State of Texas. The course is a basic overview of food safety practices that are necessary to ensure that safe food is served at your establishment.

Practices discussed include good personal hygiene, cross contamination, and

time and temperature abuse. To register for the course, call the Crockett County Extension Office at (325) 392-2721.

The cost is \$20 per person and must be paid in full before the course begins.

Individual with disabilities who require auxiliary aide service or accommodation in order to participate in the event are encouraged to contact our office within five working days prior to the program.

their communities.

"The recent (July 7) shooting in Dallas is not the first time law enforcement officers in Texas have been targeted. Our goal is to do everything possible to make it the last," added Abbott.

Court blocks haze rule

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit on July 19 ruled against the Environmental Protection Agency's "regional haze" air pollution abatement rule.

The rule, Attorney General Paxton said, would have imposed \$2 billion in costs "without achieving any visibility changes in the time period included in the Federal Implementation Plan." Those costs, Paxton added, included "costly, unnecessary upgrades."

SALES TAX HOLIDAY IS SET

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on July 18 promoted the state's Aug. 5-7 sales tax holiday, during which shoppers will save an estimated \$92 million in state and local sales taxes.

The law providing for the annual tax holiday exempts

clothing, footwear, most school supplies and backpacks priced below \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend over that weekend. Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found at TexasTaxHoliday.org.

TEXAS ADDS JOBS IN JUNE

Texas added an estimated 171,100 seasonally adjusted jobs over the past year with the addition of 7.200 nonfarm jobs in June, the Texas Workforce Commission announced on July 22.

Also, Texas has added jobs in 14 of the last 15 months. and, while the state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased to 4.5 percent in June, up slightly from 4.4 percent in May, it remained below the national average of 4.9 percent.

The Amarillo and Austin-Round Rock Metropolitan Statistical Areas recorded the month's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 3.3 percent, followed by the Sherman-Denison and Lubbock MSAs each with rates of 3.9 percent in June.

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
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
