# Lions under new leadership

### Team aiming for district title and beyond

The Ozona Lions are gearing up for another football season.

Under new Athletic Director and Head Coach Kyle Freeman, the Lions are aiming to reach a district title and beyond.

Monday's first day of workouts did see players who did not play last year and some new students to the district, Freeman said.

"Overall we are very upbeat with a good attitude. We accomplished what we wanted to do on day one," he said. Freeman said he runs a

multiple base offense out of the I, but is starting off things slowly.

"It's kind of vanilla right now. Over the next few weeks, we will get more advance,' Freeman said.

Defensively, Freeman takes pride when his players are able 'outhit" their opponents.

"We are capable of more. We need to be more physical than the people we play. Our goal is not be outhit," he said.

Freeman comes to Ozona from Bruni High School, located 45 miles east of Laredo.

During his two years at Bruni, Freeman was 22-5 and led the Badgers to the state quarterfinals both years, losing to state champion Bremond this past season.

Prior to Freeman, Bruni had only won about three playoff games.

Filing for the November 2016 CCCCSD School Board election is currently under-

There are three single member district seats and the at-large seat up this year. Those seats include: At-Large currently held by David Mc-Williams; SMD 1 currently held by Orlando DeHoyos; SMD 2 currently held by Grizz Medina and SMD 6 currently held by Amy Newton.

DeHoyos filed for re-election Monday.

Filing runs through Aug. 22. Election Day is Nov. 8.

Prospective candidates must meet certain eligibility requirements. They must have lived in Texas for at least a year and in the school district for at least six months before the filing deadline.

They must be at least 18 years old and registered to vote at the time of election.

Anyone interested in filing for a position on the school board, can pick up a packet at the CCCCSD Administration Building at 797 Avenue D.

Registered voters can apply for a ballot by mail until

The last day to register to vote in the November election is Oct. 11. Early voting will take place Oct. 24-Nov. 4.

### Commissioners approve first payment on new clinic

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court approved the first interest payment for the new clinic during a special called meeting

Monday. At the meeting, the commissioners approved a payment of \$25,962.42 to be moved from the building and maintenance fund to the new interest and sinking fund for the clinic.

The budget for the new clinic is \$3 million. It will be located across from Lion Stadium. Shannon Medical Center will provide \$275,000 worth of new equipment.

The commissioners issued \$2 million tax notes for the clinic, along with \$1.1 million from the county's money

market account in December 2015. A tax note can be issued by the county for projects to be financed for seven years or less. The clinic project has been estimated to be paid back within five years.

The new clinic, which is currently under construction, is around 10,000 square-feet, and will have 11 exam rooms that will be used by local physicians and specialists from San Angelo.

The commissioners also approved National Incident-Based Reporting System Soft-

The software is part of a grant through the Texas Governor's Office.

The next regular commissioners' court meeting will be 9 a.m. Monday, Aug. 8, at the courthouse annex. The meeting is open to the public.

### Kari's Law to make 911 calls easier

A new law this fall will require hotels and businesses to eliminate the need to dial an extra number when making 911 emergency calls.

Senate Bill 788, also known as Kari's law, goes into effect Sept. 1, 2016. The bill calls for hotels and other businesses to eliminate the need to dial an extra number to reach an outside line when making emergency 911 calls. Governor Greg Abbott signed the bill on May 15, 2015.

### State rolls out revised women's health program

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — A women's health program is in effect and ready to deliver more care to more women statewide who are 15 to 44 years old and whose income is up to 200 percent of federal poverty guidelines.

Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, and Texas Health and Human Services Executive Commissioner Charles Smith, in a joint announcement on July 25, said they expect the "new and improved" Healthy Texas Women program to serve some 300,000 women, while earlier programs served 270,000 women. Participation for minors will require parental consent.

Nelson, current chair of the state Senate Finance Committee and former chair of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, said the program combines and streamlines two of the state's previous women's health programs to provide a full range of women's health services,

- including:- Pregnancy testing and counseling;
- Family planning;
- Immunizations;
- Breast and cervical cancer screenings;
- Screenings and treatment for diabetes, hypertension, and high cholesterol; and more.

"State funding for women's health services has reached an all-time high," said Sen. Nelson. "We have expanded our provider network to the largest it has ever been and will continue working to make sure women all over the state can access family planning and other preventative health services."

"We place a high priority on helping all Texas women access the comprehensive healthcare services they need," Smith said, "and we're committed to helping ensure more women know what benefits are available to help them take charge of their health."



### The pancreas: out of sight, out of mind

Most people aren't even aware they have a pancreas, let alone its function or location. That is... until they encounter pancreatitis, diabetes or blood sugar issues.

The pancreas is a long, flat organ situated in the digestive tract behind the stomach and under the liver. It controls the body's glucose levels in the blood stream and secrets a "pancreatic juice" of digestive enzymes into the duodenum, by way of the pancreatic duct to break down carbohydrates, proteins, and lipids in the chyme. The duodenum is the first structure of the small intestine coming from the stomach.

Actually two glands in one, the pancreas controls the passage of nutrients between the exocrine cells (the digestive track) and the endocrine cells (inside the body) that interact with the blood supply.

"Classically, these are divided into an "endocrine" role, relating to the secretion of insulin and other substances within pancreatic islets and helping control blood sugar levels and metabolism within the body, and an "exocrine" role, relating to the secretion of enzymes involved in digesting substances from outside of the body." From Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia.

As with all or body's organs, the pancreas is relatively unchanged genetically in its development over the most resent 30,000 years. Unfortunately, our food supply took a more accelerated path between 5 and 10 thousand years ago and shifted from an animal based diet to an agrarian one, rich in carbohydrate.

Along with the most recent changes came our "western (or mix-matched) diseases"; Diabetes Mellitus, heart disease, dementia, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), the various cancers and obesity; just to mention a few. These conditions evolve out of our nutritional intake or, more accurately, malnutrition.

The pancreas, as with all our organs, is simply being bombarded by levels of macronutrients with which they lack both the capability and purpose to process. Half of the world's population is impacted by one or more by the illnesses and conditions listed above and these pandemics are not improving with time.

Our very survival is in question and we are the purveyor of the poor quality of life to come.

Pancreas conditions include; type 1 diabetes, where the body's immune system destroys the pancreas' insulin-producing cells; type 2 diabetes, where the pancreas loses its ability to produce and release insulin as intended; cystic fibrosis, a disorder that affects multiple body systems including the lungs; pancreatic cancer, which is usually far too advanced by the time it is discovered

because of the organ's location. Then there is pancreatitis, where it is inflamed and damaged by its own digestive chemicals; islet cell tumor, where the hormone-producing cells of the pancreas multiply abnormally, creating a benign or cancerous tumor; or an enlarged pancreas, which may mean other problems that require treatment.

Treatments and solutions will vary... from simple dietary elimination to oral enzyme medications... to pancreatic transplantation of the entire organ or any of its various parts. Still, prevention is the best solution for the pancreas, as with any malady affecting our wellbeing or the quality of our lives.

Since most illness and disease is nutritionally based, our education and familiarity with what is generally and individually causing our diseases is imperative. Refined sweeteners and grains (like flour, cereals, pastas and the like), and high glycemic fruits and vegetables should be seriously scrutinized. Their inclusion or exclusion in whatever we decide is to be our healthy way of eating lies in the balance.

Each of us has but one body, one life and one chance to get it right. We may seek the advice and skill of our medical authorities and take the counsel in their knowledge. But, do you believe it is a good idea to frivolously relinquish its daily control to someone who does not suffer its disease or benefit from its wellbeing?

Kari Hunt who was stabbed to death in a Marshall, Texas motel room by her estranged husband while her 9-year-old daughter unsuccessfully tried dialing 911, according to an article from the Longview News-

The child did not know she was required to first dial 9 to reach an outside line, the article stated.

Brad Dunn was found guilty of fatally stabbing Hunt and was sentenced to 99 years in prison in March, the article stated.

Kari's Law applies to all businesses with outside lines. The law is supported by hotel chains and profession-

The law also requires all capable multi-line telephone system background to be programmed to send notification of a 911 call to a central location on the premises of the site a 911 call is placed.

Under Kari's Law, if a multi-line system cannot meet these requirements without substantial cost, a one-year wavier of these requirements may be granted.

If a wavier is granted, an instructional sticker must be placed adjacent to all noncompliant, outbound capable telephones that the phone is unable to directly access 911 without first requiring a prefix.

### Rainwater harvesting takes center stage Aug. 11 in Eldorado

ELDORADO - As tripledigit heat and dry weather return to West Texas, the importance of rainwater harvesting will take center stage during a special workshop from 9 a.m.-noon Aug. 11 in Eldorado.

The Rainwater Harvesting program, conducted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices in Schleicher and Irion counties, will be held at the Eldorado Community Center located a mile south of Eldorado on U.S. Highway 277.

The "Texas Food Establishment Rules (TFER)" was revised and updated and will be effective Oct. 11, 2015.

A major change in the revision now requires all food employees to complete an accredited food handlers training program within 60 days of employment, effective Sept. 16, 2016.

This 1-2-hour course will now be required for all food service employees to help promote the service of safe food.

The certificate is good for 2 years and is valid anywhere in the State of Texas. The course is a basic overview of food safety practices that are necessary to ensure that safe food is served at your establishment.

Practices discussed include good personal hygiene, cross contamination, and

#### **HURRICANE SEASON CONTINUES**

The Texas Department of Public Safety on July 26 encouraged Texans to evaluate their emergency plans and monitor weather forecasts for potential hurricanes and tropical storms. Hurricane season began June 1 and continues through Nov. 30.

### PANEL GETS BUDGET **INPUT**

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar expects the state economy tocontinue to grow, but at a slower rate than in recent years, when the oil and gas industry provided added stimulus. Hegar, in testimony before

Texas' 10-member Legislative

Budget Board on July 25, said other oil- and gas-producing states have been similarly affected. The board's job is to de-

velop budget and policy recommendations for legislative appropriations, to analyze proposed legislation for its fiscal consequences and to evaluate and review the efficiency and performance of state and local governmental operations.

Tom Currah, chief revenue estimator for the Office of the Comptroller, told the panel he anticipates \$5 billion less than the current revenue projection of \$113 billion for general spending in the next budget. The estimate, a critical component of the budget-writing process, is delivered at the beginning of each legislative session.

#### **NEW AREA CODE IS ADDED** The Public Utility Commis-

sion of Texas on July 21 announced the North American Numbering Plan Administrator has assigned 726 as the overlay area code within the 210 Area Code.

This action includes almost all of Bexar County and small portions of Atascosa, Comal, Guadalupe, Medina and Wilson Counties. The new area code is needed to handle regional growth combined with added demand for wireless phone numbers and business landlines, the PUC said.

The overlay means current 210 area code customers will get to keep their 210 numbers.

New customers could be assigned either the 210 or 726 area code. All customers will be required to dial 10 digits for all local calls and 11 digits for long distance. the PUC said.
