ELDORADO - The Ozona Lions easily got their second district victory, 35-0, over Eldorado Friday night.

"We are happy about the progress we have made so far. Getting the first shutout we have had in three seasons is an important step. We are playing more physical ball with confidence," said Coach Kyle Freeman.

Junior Kobe Rodriguez was once again all over the field for the Lions scoring three touchdowns. Rodriguez had 205 yards rushing and nine yards receiving on six carries.

Tommy Fay rushed for 82 yards and one touchdown. Chance Johnson had 15 yards rushing and one touchdown.

Quarterback Jadon Perez also rushed for 79 yards.

Freshman Sebastian De La Cruz had 47 yards rushing.

Defensively, the Lions stopped the Eagles at every opportunity.

Brandon Meza had eight tackles, Rodriguez had seven, Edgar Damian, Alec Lara and Caleb Martinez each had six, Fay, Mark Ybarra and Aiden Fierro each had five.

Johnson had two sacks and Lara had one.

Fay had three interceptions and one forced fumble.

The win puts Ozona at 4-3 overall and 2-0 in district play heading into this week's game against Christoval.

Chavarria said district enrollment continues to remain steady for this year.

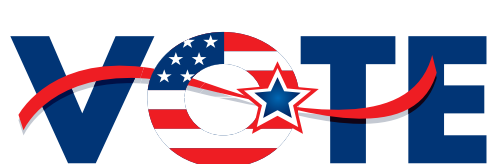
As of the meeting, OES had 421 students, OMS 161 and OHS 209 for a district total of 791.

Board in partnership with ACT National Career Readiness Certificate (ACT NCRC). Tom Green County is the second county in Texas to pursue Work Ready Community Certification. Many other States (28) are currently participating in this National Certification program.

As a business in Tom Green County, you can participate by signing up to either recognize or recommend the NCRC.

When your company is ready to hire, an analysis of the job requirements (ACT JobPro database) will determine which of

four graduated levels of foundational workplace skills is required. Ask for the National Career Readiness Skills Certificate of your applicants. Workforce Solutions will assess applicants free of charge under a grant from the Texas Workforce Commission, until funds are exhausted.

The applicants, having participated in ACT WorkKeys testing prior to applying or as a condition of applying, will understand what skills employers want. This in turn helps educators prepare students for success. Christoval ISD is a part-

ner in this initiative and tests its students for work readiness. The certificate levels are Platinum, Gold, Silver and Bronze. Platinum level requires that the examinee demonstrates foundational skills associated with approximately 99 percent of jobs in the ACT JobPro database. Gold level requires 93 percent, Silver 69 percent and Bronze 17 percent.

The local Workforce Board piloted this program with its contractor at Workforce Solutions several years ago, seeking a solution to turnover greater than 50 percent in one department.

The results decreased turnover to less than 12 percent for all departments, which saved over \$7,000 per person in re-training costs. It's Saturday morning and I can hear my 10-month-old stirring in his crib. His little "ooos" and "cues" and babbles let me know that he's awake, which means it's time for me to be awake.

I roll over and look at the clock. I then do a little happy dance in the bed when I see that it says 8:07 a.m.

Yes! Our baby slept all night and didn't wake up until after 8 a.m.

Yeakley suffered severe burns all over his body, had to go through painful rehabilitation and had moments when his family didn't know if he would make it.

While going through his rehab and therapy, his family had a saying, "it's our new normal."

I turned to my husband and said "I like that. That fits us."

For the past year, we have learned all about

Would I trade it? Would I do anything different? Not really.

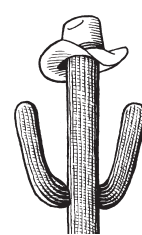
As I count down the days to our baby girl's February due date, I do have overwhelming thoughts of "how am I going to do all this with two of them?"

In De Fence

I've got the scars to prove that I've spent a good chunk of my life fixing and installing fence. Those fences could be sorted one of two ways: they were either defensive or offensive fences.

The word "fence" is derived from the word "defense" and an example of a defensive fence is a nine-wire electrified barbed wire fence with concertina wire on top. You'll find such fences around maximum security prisons and in neighborhoods where a neighbor has Trichy bulls.

A good example of an offensive fence is like the one I saw that was made out of old cars buried in the ground. It was offensive to the senses because all the neighbors got to see was the bottom of wrecks showing their mufflers and rusted undercarriage, while the owner of the fence got to see nicely painted hoods, fenders and roofs.

Such barriers are known as "spite fences" because they were built to offend a neighbor who mistreated you in some fashion.

The first fences in this country were of the zigzag split rail fence variety that were so crooked a hog could crawl through the fence and still be on the same side he started out on. We don't see a plethora of these old fences any more because during the Civil War soldiers were allowed to take the top rail of someone's split rail fence if they needed it for a fire. The next bunch of freezing soldiers who came along saw the same fence and took the top rail and... well, you get the picture.

I wish I'd taken photos of all the funny

fences I've seen in 40 years of traveling. It would have made a great coffee table book. I've seen everything from grow-your-own fences made from hedges, boysenberry bushes and poplar trees to fences made from crates and pallets. The latter won't last near as long as the living fences when the termites stop holding hands.

I remember one fence in west Texas that appeared to have been made from the contents of the house it surrounded. The fence was made from bedsprings, old doors, headboards, washers and dryers. I can only theorize that the lady of the house finally divorced her worthless husband, got all new furniture and appliances, and didn't want to pay someone to haul her old stuff away, so she made a fence with it.

I've seen fences made from bicycles, license plates, hubcaps, wagon wheels, rusty road graders, logging chain welded together, and surfboards and skis entangled in an embrace as if the owner was expecting itty-bitty snowboards as a result of the union. Rural fence builders are very creative and are also environmentally aware as I've seen fences made from recycled wine barrels and old Coors beer bottles used like bricks

with mortar in between. Of course, you couldn't fence the King Ranch with such materials, and even if you could you'd end up with a fence crew suffering from cirrhosis of the liver and desperately in need of an AA intervention.

One would assume that environmentalists would applaud this reuse of materials but I had a greenie neighbor once who threatened to turn me in to the authorities because I'd made a fence out of the old tires we used to keep the tarps down on the hay stack. I took the fence down every year right before the rainy season.

In the Northwest, where it's really rocky, they build their post holes instead of digging them by forming a small enclosure of woven wire and filling it with rocks. These are called rock jacks and they serve two purposes: as corner posts and as visual warning signs, saying to tourists from California, "You aren't tough enough to live here so don't even think about it."

In the Midwest it seems to be fashionable to hang things from barb wire fences including boots, bras and jugs. The message they seem to be conveying to passing motorists is, "a drunken cowboy lives here with his liberated wife."

Yes, I've seen all kinds of fences in my day to keep the pigs out of the posies and the cows out of the corn and I still think the best fence ever built is a snarling vicious dog and good green grass on both sides of a property line.

Judge reaffirms, expands reach of injunction against bathroom directive

AUSTIN — Fort Worth-based U.S. District Judge Reed O'Connor has reaffirmed his Aug. 21 injunction placing a temporary hold on federal guidelines for accommodating transgender students in the use of public school bathrooms and locker rooms.

In his order last week, O'Connor also denied a request by the Obama administration to limit the injunction to Texas and 12 other states that signed on as plaintiffs. The administration asked that the injunction not apply to states that did not sue for relief. In his order, O'Connor wrote, "A nationwide injunction is necessary because the alleged violation extends nationwide. Defendants are a group of agencies and administrators capable of enforcing their Guidelines nationwide, affecting numerous state and school district facilities across the country."

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton, in an Oct. 19 news

release, said, "I am proud to lead a coalition of 13 states against the Obama Administration's latest illegal federal overreach. The court's reaffirmation of a nationwide injunction should send a clear message to the president that Texas won't sit idly by as he continues to ignore the Constitution. The president cannot rewrite the laws enacted by the elected representatives of the people and then threaten to take away funding from schools to force them to fall in line."

Background: On May 13, 2016, the U.S. Departments of Education and Justice released joint guidance "to help provide educators the information they need to ensure that all students, including transgender students, can attend school in an environment free from discrimination based on sex." The two

federal agencies said that under Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, schools receiving federal money may not discriminate based on a student's sex, including a student's transgender status.

On Oct. 20, the Obama administration appealed O'Connor's Oct. 18 order to the New Orleans-based U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

STATE ECONOMY ADDS JOBS

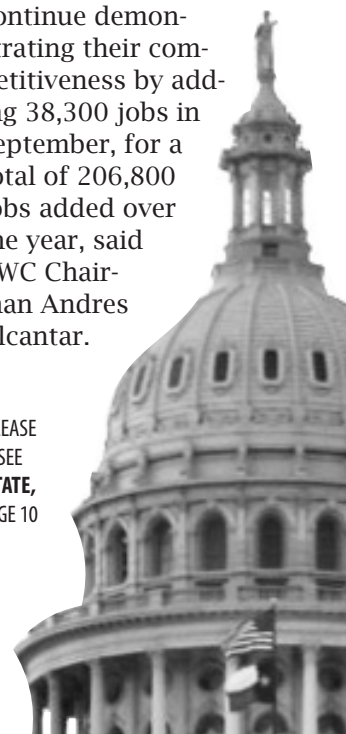
Texas' job force grew by an estimated 38,300 non-farm jobs in September, the Texas Workforce Commission announced Oct. 21.

Also, according to the commission, Texas has added jobs in 17 of the last 18 months and the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the Lone Star State increased to 4.8 percent in September, up slightly from 4.7 percent

in August. Meanwhile, the national unemployment rate was tabulated at 5.0 percent over the same period.

Texas employers continue demonstrating their competitiveness by adding 38,300 jobs in September, for a total of 206,800 jobs added over the year, said TWC Chairman Andres Alcantar.

"The special tour will allow visitors to imagine what it must have been like to live and work at Fort Lancaster during the mid-1800s" said Jefferson Spilman, Fort Lancaster Site Manager.

Upon arrival, a soldier will greet visitors and serve as their tour guide.

Visitors can walk the trails around the ruins of Fort Lancaster learning about the site's fascinating history and stories. The tour begins

at the Visitor's Center at 2 p.m., visitors are asked to arrive a few minutes early. Admission is \$4 for adults and \$3 per child.

Fort Lancaster State Historic Site, a Texas Historical Commission property, spans 82 acres and commemorates the remnants of a fort built in the 1850s to protect the road between San Antonio and El Paso.

The site recently completed a two-year renovation that includes a new Visitors Center with a substantial new gallery exhibit on the north side.

The new exhibit presents the story of Fort Lancaster through artifacts, images, scale models, a life-sized camel replica, and introduc-

How "fasting well, feeding well" is a pathway to health

and educator.

Osborn adds, "The human organism also has a fasting instinct, just like that of other animals. Evolutionary adaptation has made our bodies very efficient at storing energy reserves, and drawing upon them when food supplies are scarce."

Samuel Clemens (aka; Mark Twain) vehemently recommended fasting as the cure for "any ordinary ailment" in an article which appeared in the August 1898 issue of Cosmopolitan, entitled "At the Appetite-Cure."

There are three main extended fasts that range from 24 hours to 40+ days. They are the Water Fast, Dry Fast and the Hard Dry Fast. A "Water Fast" allows water and non-caloric tea or coffee at will, normal electrolyte and dietary vitamins and supplements, but requires a zero-caloric intake. The water fast is the most popular and tenable to endure. The Dry fast, as you may presume requires nothing by mouth throughout the fast and a Hard Dry Fast has the additional restriction of one's exposure to water; no skin contact with water or anything else whatsoever. Dry Fasts will be discussed in more depth, in a later article.

The length of time one can fast on water is a personal decision that can change even before the intended amount of time has expired. If one's normal way of eating includes more than 30 to 50 grams of carbohydrate daily, they will experience pseudo-hunger and anxiety

(or withdrawal from carbs) by the end of first day. By the second or third day the body usually slips into ketosis by burning stored fat for energy and the anxiety and pangs of pseudo-hunger will stop.

The end of a water fast will be unmistakable when true-hunger signals the body, "it's chow time." I have yet to experience this manner of hunger, even after five days of water fasting. I am in the fourth-day of a five to seven-day water fast as I write this. It is my fifth fast in the last two months ranging from 3 to five days each, as research for this series of articles. This many water fasts, in such a short duration is not recommended.

I have nutritionally prepared myself for fasting and, thus have experienced neither hunger or anxiety, even from the beginning. My only problem is what to do with my extra time. There's no food to buy, no meals to prepare and no dishes to wash; for myself anyway. Not to fear, I still care and cook for my wife and divide the rest of my time between health coaching, writing, research and helping administrate a 10k-member ketogenic-way-of-eating group on Facebook.

Fasting is not a big deal, as many people believe but should be done responsibly. It is another path we may take in our personal journey toward optimum health.

The "fast well, feast well" pathway is made more profound when the fast is followed by feeding that provides all the healthy nutrients our body needs to repair, rebuild and heal itself. This is just another way we become a-tuned to our body and follow its lead in conducting our safe and rewarding journey toward good health and well-being.

Here's to your health.

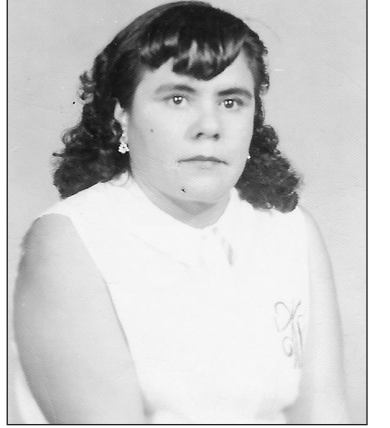

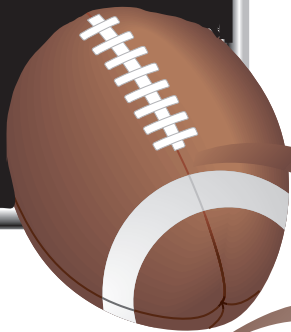

Election and one for the CCCC-SD School Board Election.

The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is Friday, Oct. 28. Crockett County Voters can request ballots by mail through the Crockett County Clerk's Office, also located in the courthouse annex.

For more information, call (325) 392-2022.

The Office of the Texas Secretary of State reminds voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain a form of approved photo ID that they now have additional options when voting in person.

Currently, Texas voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID have additional options when casting their bal-

lots. As provided by court order, if a voter does not possess and is not reasonably able to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, the voter may vote by (1) signing a declaration at the polls explaining why the voter is reasonably unable to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, and (2) providing one of various forms of supporting documentation.

Supporting documentation can be a certified birth certificate (must be an original), a valid voter registration certificate, a copy or original of one of the following: current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck, or other government document that shows the voter's name and an address, although government documents which include a photo must be original and

cannot be copies. If a voter meets these requirements and is otherwise eligible to vote, the voter will be able to cast a regular ballot in the election.

The seven forms of approved photo ID are:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas license to carry a handgun issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the approved photo ID must be current or have expired no

more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place.

Voters with a disability may continue to apply with the county registrar for a permanent exemption to showing approved photo ID (which now may be expired no more than four years) at the polls. Also, voters who (1) have a consistent religious objections to being photographed or (2) do not present one of the seven forms of approved photo ID because of certain natural disasters as declared by the President of the United States or the Texas Governor, may continue apply for a temporary exemption to showing approved photo ID at the polls.

goal is always 97.5 percent."

STATE LEGISLATURE

Chavarria spoke to the board about the upcoming State Legislative session and funding of public schools.

Chavarria thanked State Rep. Andrew Murr, R-Junction, for his work in the past legislative session and emphasized to the board that they need to get to Austin during this session.

CCCCSD is a Chapter 41 property wealthy district, which means the district must send around 64 percent of its budget to the state to be redistributed to property poor districts.

In the past three years, the district has sent \$40 million to the state.

When the "Robin Hood" plan was created in the mid-1990s, the state funded 70 percent of public schools and local entities funded 30 percent, Chavarria said.

Today, the roles have reversed. Now, 70 percent of the school district's funding is local while 30 percent comes from the state.

"The state needs to hold to that commitment to educate our kids. Through our votes and our voice, we need to let our state officials know we need to fund our public schools," Chavarria said. "There's so much money that we send back that we handicap our taxpayers and a lot of people don't see that. The most precious resource we have is our kids, and the greatest gift we give them is the right to a free public education."

The board members stated they all need to go to Austin and meet with officials, as well as pass resolutions to send to state officials.

"We need to go down there and raise all kinds of cane in Austin. It's not right," said Dwight Childress, board member.

"We people do complain, explain to them how frustrating it is to try and keep taxes low because of this," said Amy Newton, board member.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

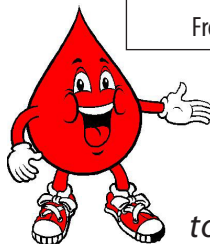
