Texas still has a long way on voter registration

The voter registra-  
tion deadline in  
Texas has passed  
and counties and  
cities across the  
state are reporting big  
numbers. Travis County  
reached a new milestone,  
registering a whopping 90  
percent of the county's  
voting-age population.  
Harris County also cele-  
brated a surge of new vot-  
ers, particularly those with  
Spanish surnames.

Unfortunately, this year's  
successes in voter registra-  
tion came in spite of our  
state's archaic and outdated  
voter registration system,  
not because of it. In election  
after election, Texas contin-  
ues to remain at the bottom  
of voter registration num-  
bers and turnout. Until we  
address systemic barriers  
to registration, we'll remain  
a national outlier.

To date, a little over 15  
million people are counted  
on the voter registration  
rolls of an estimated citizen  
voting-age population of  
more than 17 million. But  
this number masks a dif-  
ferent truth. Research from  
the Pew Charitable Trust  
found that, nationally, one  
in eight voter registrations  
is inaccurate or invalid.  
Texas' rolls are at least as  
bad as the national aver-  
age (and probably worse),  
meaning that at least 1.8  
million existing records are  
likely unreliable.

Combined with the gap  
between registrants and eli-  
gible voters, it's safe to as-  
sume that almost 4 million  
Texans are effectively shut  
out of this year's presiden-  
tial election. That's more  
than the population of 23  
states and Washington, D.C.

We must take steps to  
bring all eligible Texans  
onto the rolls and ensure  
that those on the rolls can  
cast a ballot that will count.

First, Texas must adopt  
online voter registration.  
At least 39 states currently  
or will soon offer online  
voter registration. Online  
voter registration systems  
are much cheaper than the  
paper system. In Arizona,  
the old paper system cost  
the state approximately 83  
cents to process each form,  
as opposed to just 3 cents  
for each online voter reg-  
istration. It also empowers  
Texans to directly update  
their own voter information  
instead of relying on clerks  
for manual data entry. In  
many of the states with on-  
line voter registration sys-  
tems, it is by far the most  
popular option for people,

2016, the Texas Civil Rights  
Project sued the state for  
refusing to register eligible  
voters who update their  
information through the  
Department of Public Safety  
website, a practice that vi-  
olates the U.S. Constitution  
and the 1993 "motor voter"  
law. Because of the state's  
noncompliance, many  
thousands of voters who  
mistakenly believed to be  
registered to vote have been  
unable to cast regular bal-  
lots during recent elections.

Finally, we must stop  
criminalizing voter reg-  
istration drives. Texas is  
the only state where it is  
a crime to register your  
neighbor to vote without  
completing a cumbersome,  
county-by-county certifica-  
tion process to become a  
volunteer deputy registrar.  
Plus, only certain people are  
eligible to volunteer — the  
law excludes non-citizens,  
non-residents (such as  
many college students),  
anyone serving any part of  
a felony conviction and mi-  
norors. These arbitrary rules  
chill grassroots voter reg-  
istration efforts and, in turn,  
harm communities of color  
that disproportionately rely  
on voter registration drives  
to register.

Many volunteers and  
dedicated public servants  
have given their time and  
enormous effort to register  
people to vote. We should  
expect the same from our  
representatives in Austin,  
who should be doing ev-  
erything in their power to  
modernize our registration  
system in the upcoming  
legislative session, ensuring  
that voter registration is fair  
and accessible to all Texans.  
Until we address these chal-  
lenges, as a state, we will  
continue to be at the bottom  
of national lists for voter  
registration and turnout.

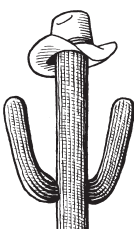

Officials urge state's high court not to expand same-sex marriage ruling

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Ab-  
bott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick  
and Texas Attorney General  
Ken Paxton last week filed a  
friend-of-the-court brief with  
the Texas Supreme Court  
over issues they say were not  
addressed in a landmark U.S.  
Supreme Court case declaring  
same-sex marriage a funda-  
mental right.

The three officials asked  
the Texas Supreme Court  
to accept their view that  
Obergefell v. Hodges, the U.S.  
Supreme Court's June 2015  
decision recognizing a right  
to same-sex marriage "does  
not resolve all constitutional  
issues relating same-sex mar-  
riage." The brief points to  
Parker v. Pigeon and related  
cases involving a Houston  
mayor's extending benefits to  
same-sex spouses of city em-  
ployees, and asks that a lower  
court's temporary injunction  
preventing the extension of  
those benefits be reinstated.

Appeals for the Fifth Circuit  
made clear that Obergefell left  
a host of issues unresolved,"  
Abbott, Patrick and Paxton as-  
serted. They maintained that  
"the traditional, Texas defini-  
tion of marriage" is still in  
force because "a federal dis-  
trict court judgment against  
state officials does not amend  
the Texas Constitution or the  
Texas Family Code."

Referenced in the brief is  
Texas Family Code Section  
6.204 paragraph (c), subpara-  
graph (2), which says "The  
state or an agency or politi-  
cal subdivision of the state  
may not give effect to a right  
or claim to any legal protec-  
tion, benefit, or responsibil-  
ity asserted as a result of a  
marriage between persons of  
the same sex or a civil union  
in this state or in any other  
jurisdiction." That section of  
the law took effect on Sept. 1,  
2003.

WORKGROUP IS APPOINTED

State Senate Finance Com-  
mittee Chair Jane Nelson,  
R-Flower Mound, on Oct. 27  
appointed a Senate Finance  
Workgroup on Child Protec-  
tion to evaluate funding to  
address the ongoing crisis at  
Child Protective Services.

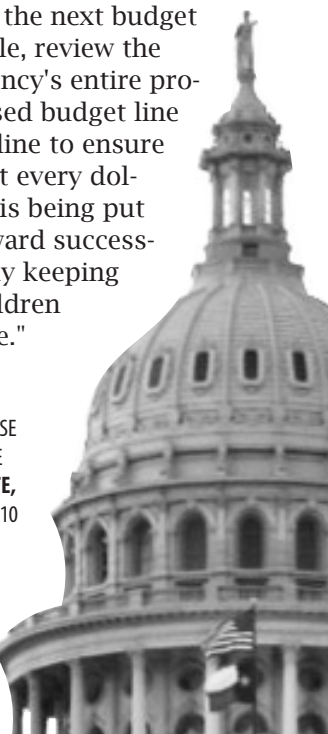
This followed an interim  
hearing of the committee, in  
which members heard tes-  
timony on unmet needs for  
children under the care of the  
state, and calls for the hiring  
of more full-time employees  
to meet those needs.

Nelson appointed as mem-  
bers of the workgroup Sen.  
Charles Schwertner, R-  
Georgetown, chair; Sen. Brian  
Birdwell, R-Granbury; Sen.  
Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham;  
Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin;  
and Sen. John Whitmire, D-  
Houston.

"We need a plan that keeps  
children safe. There is no

issue of greater importance,"  
Nelson said. "This workgroup  
will review the agency's re-  
quest for immediate funding  
and, in preparation  
for the next budget  
cycle, review the  
agency's entire pro-  
posed budget line  
by line to ensure  
that every dol-  
lar is being put  
toward success-  
fully keeping  
children  
safe."





How to 'live life in the fast lane'

Fasting and starvation are often confused with one another. While many believe starvation occurs when one depletes the nutrients from the last eaten meal, this is a misnomer. Starvation begins after the body has depleted all available stored nutrient reserves, or they become dangerously low. Until then, the body is said to be in a state of "fasting", occurring about 12 hours after last meal.

Generally, the body will not experience hunger during a fast because it is in a state of ketosis and consuming the nutrients we ate during the past weeks and months and converted to body fat. Many will experience the initial withdrawal pangs they call hunger and the anxiety of the lack of carbohydrate (as with addictive drugs) during the first 48 hours of abstinence from food but, if the body is already fat adapted (in ketosis) this is not the case.

Being fat adapted or in ketosis, the body converts consumed and stored fat into ketones to produce energy. Therefore, the impact of the transition into an extended fast is lessened since there are no excessive amounts of glucose in the blood to halt ketosis and the fast. If one does experience hunger however, it is minimal and disappears during the first twelve hours of the fasted state.

The actual duration of a fast will vary individually but a person of average weight will have enough body fat to nourish themselves for 40 or more days.


Men's Health Magazine referred to an article reported by the United Press International in 1966... "Under the headline "Stout Scot Peels Off 293 Pounds," it told the story of 26-year-old Angus Barbieri eating breakfast. In his case, it was literally a broken fast, one that had begun more than a year before.

"Apart from feeling a wee bit weak, I feel no ill effects," he told a reporter.

"The doctor who supervised Barbieri's 382-day fast published a case report in 1973, describing not only his 276-pound weight loss—from 456 to 180 pounds—but also the many vitamins and minerals they used to keep him alive, and the fact his patient went "37 to 48 days between stools."

It should be noted the above was conducted as a water fast. The difference between a water and a dry fast is very elementary... during a water fast; drink water, take vitamins and electrolytes but no caloric intake. A "Dry Fast" requires absolute abstinence from food and water (no vitamins or electrolytes).

Per a popular raw food website, "Beautiful On Raw", there is yet another level of fasting, "There is one more level of dry fasting called

Absolute Dry Fasting. Some suggest to reach the deepest level and realize the full benefits of dry fasting, it's better not to let any water come in contact with the body through

the skin or mucous membranes. You heard that right: no showers, no swimming, no brushing teeth while dry fasting."

While either type of fast will prompt the body to revert to stored nutrients and processes that optimize its function, during a dry fast it functions on endogenous (self-generated), metabolic water produced by its own cells. "It literally erases any negative information imprint which the body had before the fast, allowing cells to experience a kind of a rebirth, as a result." - Beautiful on Raw.

"Under dry fasting conditions, even the skin changes its function, from being an organ of elimination to serving as an organ of absorption, taking in any available water from the air and supplying it to healthy cells. Besides water, the body during a dry fast absorbs atmospheric carbon dioxide and nitrogen to manufacture its own amino acids. Since there is no water to flush out the endogenous toxins, these are eliminated by means of a unique mechanism, dormant during less rigorous modes of fasting: Each cell, in effect, becomes the furnace that burns up its own waste."

Like the clean-up after a storm, a fast rids the body of impurities and microscopic debris from all the neglect and abuses heaped upon it during the "storm," daily living conditions. The period of rebuilding with proper nutrients afterward is 'the rest of the story' that puts recovery in motion and sets up the 'happy ending' we all seek.

In her article, An Introduction to Dry Fasting, Esmeé La Fleur explains, "Dry fasting itself is not a "cure," but it provides the right conditions to allow the body to activate all of its own, God-given, healing powers."

As I have said, time and time again, given half a chance and the proper nutrients, the human body can heal itself.

Fasting is just one of the many tools we have been imbued within our blueprint by nature to realize our full potential and take responsibility of our own health and well-being. Here's to your health.

# Kimble County roundup nets alleged drug dealers

In the early morning hours of Thursday, Oct. 27, local people were awakened to the sound of two helicopters and one fixed-wing airplane operating above the city of Junction.

These aircraft were assisting Kimble County Sheriff Hilario Cantu's Office in a massive roundup of alleged drug dealers in the community. Preparation for Operation Red Ribbon Roundup have been eight months in the making.

Cantu has been working with District Attorney Tonya Ahlschwede to collect the evidence that will help her make strong cases against those who supply methamphetamine to adults and children of this community.

With grand jury indictments for "delivery of a controlled substance" warrants in hand, teams of law enforcement personnel from several agencies were dispatched to houses where alleged dealers/users are known to live and sell. As of this writing, 26 men and women have been arrested as a part of Operation Red Ribbon Roundup and there are outstanding warrants and active searches ongoing for others.

Individuals arrested were: Jessica Perez, 35, of Kerrville, for a Kerr County warrant for delivery of a controlled substance; Sheila Townsend, 43, of Junction, for delivery of a controlled substance; Terry Wools, 50, of Junction, for delivery of a controlled substance; Trevor Wiseman, 20, of Junction, for delivery of a controlled substance; Randy Zeigler, 55, of Junction, for delivery of a controlled substance; Lisa Lombrana, 43, of Junction, for robbery; Timothy Rios, 29, of Junction, for delivery of a controlled substance and assault with a deadly weapon; Ashley Williams, 26, of Junction, for robbery; Lesa Meador, 32,

The women arrested were delivered to a jail facility in Burnet County. The local jail population had already been moved to correctional facilities in other towns to make room for those caught in Thursday's roundup. Child Protective Service personnel were present to take custody of the children living in some of the homes that were raided.

Involved in support of the KC Sheriff's Office's operation were personnel from the sheriff's offices from Schleicher and Menard counties, Texas Rangers, Department of Public Safety State Troopers, DPS Criminal Investigation Division, local Adult Probation, Texas Parks

and Wildlife State Police, Junction Police Department and Customs and Border Protection Agency.

The aircraft from Uvalde and San Angelo were provided by Homeland Security Federal Agency.

A longtime friend of Sheriff Cantu's time working narcotics undercover came from Val Verde County to assist.

County Judge Delbert Roberts told Sheriff Cantu, regarding the expense of housing those arrested, "You're not going to have someone come off the interstate to get our kids on drugs. It's going to be the guy down the street."

According to Cantu, the people who observe and report suspicious activity to his office are extremely helpful.

# Junction meth lab busted

On Sunday, Oct. 30, Kimble County Sheriff Deputies Steve Brown, Kelby Brown, and Arthur Leistikow were called to a residence in the northern part of Kimble County in reference to a 911 call.

Sheriff Hilario Cantu, Deputy Travis Brown and Texas Department of Public Safety - Criminal Investigation Division agent John Cox were later called to assist.

There were indications of illegal drug activity taking place, so permission to search the property was obtained from the owner.

The search of the prop-

erty led to the discovery of methamphetamine, marijuana, paraphernalia and a methamphetamine lab in a building behind the residence.

During the search at the home, investigators discovered a combination of ingredients that are used to manufacture methamphetamine, and evidence that methamphetamine was being produced at the location.

James Wayne Leslie, age 42, of Kimble County was arrested for Possession of Certain Chemicals with intent to Manufacture Controlled Substance, possession of methamphetamine, possession of marijuana.

only one team (Grape Creek) to score an offensive touchdown.

That changed when Ozona quickly took control of the ball rushing for 387 yards. The Lions also had 117 yards passing for a total of 504 total yards.

Senior Tommy Fay and Junior Kobe Rodriguez both had over 100 yards rushing for the Lions.

Playing his final game in Lion Stadium, Fay scored two touchdowns, had 179 yards rushing on 10 carries and one catch for 38 yards.

Rodriguez scored three times, had 124 yards rushing on 20 carries and one pass completion for 45 yards.

Senior Chance Johnson had 19 yards on five carries. Senior Edgar Damien had 30 yards on four carries and one reception for 20 yards.

Senior Quarterback Jadon Perez had 26 yards rushing, a

pass reception for 45 yards and threw for 82 yards and one touchdown. He also had three completions on seven attempts.

Junior Jacob Schroeder had a catch for 14 yards.

"Offensively, we controlled the pace of the game and took advantage of what they gave us. Our backs ran hard and fought for every yard," Freeman said.

The Lions now must make the 367-mile trip to face the Wildcats. Anthony (7-2, 2-1) is coming off an open week. Their only district loss has been a 15-13 nail-biter against Christoval.

"We are where we thought we would be at this point in the season with our destiny in our own hands," Freeman said. "We have continued to improve week to week and have become more diverse. We have come a long way from the beginning of the season."

# OVFD battles grass fire over the weekend

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department responded to a grass fire off of County Road 403 Saturday.

Multiple area fire departments also responded for mutual aid.

The fire was quickly contained and extinguished by Saturday evening.

Crockett County is not currently under a burn ban.

According to an article in the San Angelo Standard-Times, area officials are concerned with the amount of grass that has built up in the area, especially along the bar ditches.

The Texas Department of Transportation is responsible for maintaining the bar ditches because of right-of-way designation.

The department is responsible for maintaining state roads and the areas around them.

Steve Mild, emergency management coordinator for the county and the city of San Angelo, agreed that the situation is scary.

"The thing that really scares me about it is exactly what you're talking about right there," said Mild, who tracks fire trends. "The fuel load we have out there ... we're actually set up for a worse fire season statewide than what we had in 2011."

Tom Johnston, director of operations in the San Angelo district of TxDOT,

said the state does two rural mowings take care of it (the weeds) perfect," he said. "The weeds are taller right now than normal. We don't want that dry grass sitting there, so the contractors will start mowing about mid November whether first frost happens or not."

According to the Keetch-Byram Drought Index, Crockett County is currently under potential for wildfire intensity to begin to increase significantly. This means wildfires will readily burn and larger fuels could burn or smolder for several days.

Texas A&M Forest Service encourages vigilance and preventative measures against human-caused wildfires.

Postpone outdoor burning until conditions im-

prove.

With high fire danger, caution should be used when involved with an outdoor activity that has the ability to cause spark. It only takes one spark to start a wildfire.

Dispose of smoking materials properly. Extinguish them in an ash tray. Don't throw them out of a window.

Avoid parking and idling in tall, dry grass. Catalytic converters can get hot enough to ignite the grass under a vehicle.

Avoid sitting hot chainsaws or other hot, gas-powered equipment in dry grass.

Wildfires burning in grass can spread and grow extremely fast. It is important that if you spot a wildfire you report it immediately to local authorities. A quick response can help save lives and property.

- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas license to carry a handgun issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the approved photo ID must be current or have expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place.

Voters with a disability may continue to apply with the county registrar for a permanent exemption to showing approved photo ID (which now may be expired no more than four years) at the polls. Also, voters who (1) have a consistent religious objections to being photographed

or (2) do not present one of the seven forms of approved photo ID because of certain natural disasters as declared by the President of the United States or the Texas Governor, may continue apply for a temporary exemption to showing approved photo ID at the polls.

Texas law bars the use of any "wireless communication device" or "any mechanical or electronic means of recording images or sound" within 100 feet of a voting station, with exceptions for election officer duties." In short: Taking photos, audio or video inside or near a voting booth is generally illegal.

Texas law, however, does not set out criminal penalties for those who take ballot selfies or otherwise violate the ban on such recording devices. "The presiding judge may require a person who violates this section to turn off the device or to leave the polling place," the state Election Code says.

And Texans who vote by mail are in luck. State law does not prohibit #AbsenteeBallotSelfies, though Alicia Pierce, a spokeswoman for Texas Secretary of State Carlos Cascos, cautions that "voters should be careful not to share any information they don't want public."

Also, voters could be turned away if they are sporting campaign gear.

According to Texas law, a person "may not electioneer for or against any candidate, measure, political party" within 100 feet of the voting site during early voting or on Election Day.

Eminent domain big concern for landowners

Although laws have been passed to improve the use of eminent domain in the Lone Star State, many landowners still experience abuses by the entities that exercise this extreme power, according to a news release from Fort Worth-based Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

A voter-approved amendment to the Texas Constitution in 2009 prohibited the taking of private property for economic development, and Senate Bill 18 in 2011 made changes to the condemnation process, but eminent domain remains at the forefront of concerns for Texas landowners.

Owners continue to struggle with an unbalanced set of laws that are at odds with a state known for private-property rights. Despite past efforts, condemning entities continue to hold an unfair advantage over landowners, who are forced to sell their property without truly being compensated thereafter.

"Landowners feel they're not getting a fair shake and that their rights are being ignored," Texas Farm Bureau President Russell Boening told a recent hearing of the Senate Committee on State Affairs.

He said high-stakes negotiations and lowball offers occur too often during eminent-domain proceedings in Texas. The current law favors for-profit companies, giving landowners few options in a fight for their property.

About 95 percent of land in Texas is privately owned, which places the needs of the public in direct conflict with the rights of Texas property owners. When conflicts arise, there are no willing-buyer and willing-seller transactions, and events often play out in expensive, time-consuming, stressful and unfair situations, resulting in bad outcomes for the property owners.

The state population is on the fast track with rapid growth; therefore, there is an increasing need for more property to build infrastructure for the utilization of natural resources and to address transportation needs. While property owners recognize these demands, they also realize that their property rights must be better protected, Boening said.

"Our family has had more than one experience where an entity condemned our property and did not act in good faith to take our land," said TSCRA director Leslie Kinsel.

"In one case, a court awarded compensation that was over 600 percent more than the condemning entity's first offer. In another, the condemning entity settled for approximately 10 times its first offer, but only after we had incurred tens of thousands of dollars in legal expenses to challenge the taking," Kinsel said.

In Austin last week, TSCRA was joined by 14 other Texas-based organizations to form Texans for Property Rights, a coalition focused on a grass roots initiative for meaningful reform to state eminent domain laws.

The coalition comprises TSCRA, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Wildlife Association, Texas Forestry Association, South Texans' Property Rights Association, Texas Poultry Association, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, Independent Cattlemen's Association, Texas Grain Sorghum Association, Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Corn Producers Association of Texas, Riverside & Landowners Protection Coalition, Texas Land & Mineral Owners Association, Texas Association of Dairymen and Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

Property rights are the cornerstone of Texas' freedom, and they are worth the fight. It is for this reason these grass roots organizations have formed the Texans for Property Rights coalition, Boening said.

"I am very concerned about the welfare and safety of the 511 children we discussed at our hearing, and I am asking for daily updates until that number reaches zero," Nelson added.

SCHOOL RATINGS RELEASED

The Texas Education Agency on Oct. 24 released final financial accountability ratings for more than 1,200 school districts and charters across the state.

Some 97 percent of all Texas school districts and charters earned a successful final rating for 2015-2016.

The Texas Education Agency said its rating system encourages public schools "to better manage their financial resources to provide the maximum allocation possible for direct instructional purposes."

Based on submitted information, a school district or charter is assigned one of four possible letter grades (A, B, C or F) and a financial management rating of Superior, Above Standard Achievement, Meets Standard or Sub-standard Achievement.

According to the Texas Education Agency, all school districts and charters are required to report information and financial accountability

ratings to parents and taxpayers.

In addition, districts and charters must hold a public discussion or hearing regarding its financial report. The Texas Education Agency formally notified school districts and charters of their preliminary rating in August.

PAXTON CAUTIONS CONSUMERS

Texas Attorney General Paxton on Oct. 26 cautioned consumers about the dangers of wearing decorative contact lenses for costume or cosmetic reasons.

"The decorative lenses, also marketed as costume, fashion or colored lenses, pose potential serious risks to eye health, including infections and loss of vision," Paxton said in a news release.

The Office of the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division recommends that consumers:

- Always visit a licensed optometrist or ophthalmologist for proper fitting of cosmetic contact lenses;
- Never buy contact lenses without a prescription;
- Buy contact lenses from a seller that requires you to provide a prescription, whether you purchase in person or online; and
- Avoid buying lenses from street vendors, convenience and dollar stores, flea markets and novelty stores.
