# Bean, Davidson, Morris win local races

Crockett County Voters elected a new commissioner and two new school board members Tuesday night.

Wesley Bean defeated Weldon Nicks, 268 votes to 156, to become the new commissioner of Precinct 3.

Bean will replace incumbent Randy Branch who chose not to run for another term. Bean will be sworn into office in Jan-

In the two contested CCCCSD School Board races, Travis Davidson defeated Butch Gonzalez and Dean Fierro for the At Large District. Davidson had 529 votes, Gonzalez 450 and Fierro 253.

In the CCCCSD Single Member District 2 race, Justin Morris defeated Jerry Cantu 95

votes to 70. School board candidates are elected by plurality (the person with the most votes wins, despite the number of candidates), according to the Texas Election Code. School districts, including CCCCSD, that elect trustees by plurality do not have runoff elections.

Unlike the federal, county and state officials, school board candidates begin their new terms immediately, instead of having to wait until January.

The next regular school board meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 21 at the Administration Building. During this meeting, school board candidates that won Tuesday's election will be sworn in. The meeting is open to the public.

In state races, Will Hurd, R-San Antonio, and Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, were in a dead heat for the U.S. House District 23 race.

As of press time, Hurd, the incumbent, had 49.1 percent, Gallego had 46.2 percent and Libertarian Ruben S. Corvalan had 4.7 percent with 74.8 percent of the precincts reporting.

Hurd won Crockett County with 875

votes. Gallego had 462 and Corvalan had 28. The Ozona Stockman will report final results on our Facebook and Twitter pages, as well as in next week's edition.

Incumbent State Senator Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, kept his District 19 seat with a 55.9 percent victory over Republican challenger Peter P. Flores. Libertarian Maximilian Martin received 3.6 percent.

In Crockett County, Flores won with 807 votes. Uresti had 468 and Martin had 33.

State Rep. Andrew Murr, R-Junction, kept his incumbent Texas House Seat for District 53 easily beating Democratic Challenger Stephanie Lochte Ertel with 76.6 percent to 20.5 percent. Libertarian Brian Holk had 2.9 percent.

Murr easily won Crockett County with 967 votes. Ertel had

342 and Holk had 28. On the Presidential Race, Crockett County Voters selected Donald Trump with 980 votes. Hillary Clinton had 372, Gary Johnson 39, Jill Stein 4 and 5 write in votes.

Also in Crockett County, 331 votes cast straight Republican Party Ballots, 224 votes cast straight Democratic Party Ballots, 10 voters cast straight Libertarian Party Ballots and 7 voters cast straight Green Party Ballots.

Crockett County had 2,552 registered voters for the 2016 General Election. That is 160 more registered voters than the 2012 General Election. Voter turnout was around 56 percent with 1,430 ballots cast in the General Election. Early voting had

the biggest turnout with 919 ballots cast in the General Election. In the CCCCSD School Board races, 1,260 ballots were cast.

# Stealing My Own Money

Years ago I owned a livestock newspaper and a purebred breeder owed us a lot of money for advertising he purchased in advance of his bull sale. I paid all my own expenses to go work ring at his bull sale which was two states away from my house. Months passed after the sale and still no check was in the mail. Then I started hearing rumors the purebred breeder was in trouble and sure enough, the bank announced his complete dispersal.

The sale manager for the dispersal called and tried to place a big budget of advertising but there was no way I was going to go work the sale or give the breeder one inch of advertising until his bill was paid in full. The sale manager begged and begged, probably because all the other periodicals the breeder owed money to wouldn't "sell" him any ad space either. After several calls I came up with a brilliant bit of cowboy capitalism: my repayment plan was that I'd work the two-day dispersal and sell ad space for the sale but I'd purchase a dollar amount of cattle in the dispersal equal to the breeder's total outstanding bill and not pay for them. The sale manager thanked me profusely and readily agreed to the deal.

I thought I was the first person to come up with such a plan but my buddy Russell from South Dakota busted my high opinion of myself when he told me about a similar deal he struck in the first year he had his real estate office.

member of the county school board which was in the mandatory process of bussing kids to school and changing where many kids went to school. One parent complained bitterly to Russell who half-jokingly replied, "Why don't you sell your ranch and move closer to the school." A month later the complainer did just that.

Russell got the place sold but the rancher owed so many people money that there wasn't enough left to pay Russell's commission, so Russell took a pony cart, a Shetland Pony, a harness to pull the cart and an IOU for \$2,500. Two years went by and still Russell didn't get his money. One day Russell saw a ranch auction advertised for the guy so Russell went to the banker, explained his predicament and the banker said he could deduct \$2,500 off any amount he paid

"I got the cows bought," said Russell, "but I started worrying if I had enough money to pay the difference and how was I going to get the cows to my ranch. I was walking to my pickup when a man ran up and asked, 'Have they sold the

cows yet?' I said yes and I'd just bought them.

So Russell sold the cows to the tardy auction-goer after tacking on a commission, got his \$2,500 and came out of the deal smelling like a rose.

I only wish I could say the same thing. After I'd bought some bulls roughly equal to what the purebred breeder owed us I had them home only a few days when I got a call from the sale manager who explained that I was going to have to pay for the cattle because a bankruptcy trustee was at the sale and he wrote down the price and buyer of every hoof that went through the ring and now he wanted to know when this Lee Pitts feller was going to pay up. The sale manager told me, "Either you or I are going to pay and it darn sure isn't going to be me."

Oh, the scoundrel, how he lied! In the end, we never got paid for any advertising, I had to pay for the bulls and I used them on a small jag of cows. I only wish the bulls were as full of bull as the guy who bred them because they only settled 40% of my cows and those that did get pregnant had dwarf-like calves. So I sold the bulls in the slaughter run for \$1,000 less than I paid and I still wasn't finished paying because every time I looked at those runty calves I just had to ask myself, "Am I a genius or what?"

# States, lawmakers file briefs in support of Texas' voter ID law

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Sept. 23 filed a petition on behalf of the State of Texas, asking the U.S. Supreme Court to reinstate the Texas voter ID law.

On Oct. 31. Paxton announced that a coalition of states and members of Congress had filed a friend-ofthe-court brief in the United States Supreme Court, in support of Texas' voter identification law that passed in 2011 as Senate Bill 14.

"Our democracy does not work unless voters have confidence that election results are not skewed by fraud," Paxton said, alleging the existence of a nationwide voter-fraud problem.

The coalition in support of the Texas voter ID law includes the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah and West Virginia. The states' brief concludes, "There is no reason to expect that Texas's

Voter ID law will somehow cause substantial harm to voter participation, when nothing of the sort has happened in 10 years of Voter ID in Indiana." A like-minded amicus brief was submitted to the high court by U.S. Sens. John Cornyn and Ted Cruz, both R-Texas, and Sen. David Vitter R-Louisiana; U.S. Reps. John Culberson, Blake Farenthold, Joe Barton, Kevin Brady, Bill Flores, Louie Gohmert, Kay Granger, Michael Burgess, John Carter, Michael Conaway, Jeb Hensarling, Will Hurd, Ted Poe, Sam Johnson, John Ratcliffe, Kenny Marchant, Pete Sessions, Michael McCaul, Lamar Smith, Randy Neugebauer, Mac Thornberry, Pete Olson, Randy Weber, Brian Babin, and Roger Williams, all R-Texas; U.S. Reps. John Fleming, Garrett Graves and Charles W. Boustany Jr., all R-Louisiana; and U.S. Rep.

Steven Palazzo, R-Mississippi.

Like the Indiana law, the Texas law requires a citizen to present one of several forms of photo identification in addition to a voter registration certificate before casting a ballot in person. The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit found that the law, while not discriminatory in intent, is discriminatory in effect. Last summer, a federal district court relaxed voter identification requirements for the Nov. 8 general election.



# What can we do about fatty liver disease?

The adult human liver weighs about 3.5 pounds and will normally have a modicum of fat dispersed within its cells. Fatty liver disease (FLD) or hepatic steatosis occurs when the fat content (aka: triglycerides) reaches 5 to 10 percent of total organ weight, which occurs when triglycerides have abnormally accumulated in the storage bubbles of the cells called vacuoles. This process is known as steatosis and is reversible.

There are many different reasons for the accumulation of fat in liver cells; insulin resistance, Type 2 diabetes, alcoholism, excess fructose consumption and the maligned processing of carbohydrate and dietary fat, to mention a few.

"Despite having multiple causes, fatty liver can be considered a single disease that occurs worldwide in those with excessive alcohol intake and the obese (with or without effects of insulin resistance). The condition is also associated with other diseases that influence fat metabolism. When this process of fat metabolism is disrupted, the fat can accumulate in the liver in excessive amounts, thus resulting in a fatty liver." ...as stated by Wikipedia.

Hepatitis, otherwise termed progressive inflammation of the liver, may not be accompanied by obvious symptoms. When associated with fat accumulation the, condition is called steatohepatitis. It is very difficult to distinguish alcoholic FLD from nonalcoholic FLD because both show similar variations in fatty buildup at different phases. When considering whether alcohol is consumed, FLD can be called alcoholic steatosis or nonalcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD)

Jeff Cyr explains FLD in his article, Please Excuse Me; FLD occurs: "If your adipose tissue (fat cells) have become so insulin resistant that stored body fat can no longer be properly regulated for use as free fatty acids for use as energy in times of energy needs. If your skeletal and heart muscle cannot use the

of free fatty acids for direct energy ... The excess fatty acids are sent to the liver to produce more triglycerides. There is a constant flow blood of triglycerides

and free fatty acids between your adipose tissue and liver, this cycle runs non-stop 24/7... The excess production of triglycerides in the liver ends up as visceral fat."

Visceral fat forms in the liver, pancreas, kidneys, intestines, eyes and skeletal and heart muscle; impeding their functioning, communication and synchronicity with one another. This condition can cause the organs to lag, shut down and be fatal for the individual.

Insulin and glucagon are the two hormones regulating blood sugar levels for both the body and the brain. This is accomplished by way of the liver and pancreas synchronizing their efforts to maintain proper levels throughout the body, and just one of the vital functions visceral fat will disrupt.

In the past, scientists used flawed methodology in choosing and interpreting the data from their studies and mislead public health authorities, agencies and organizations; who disseminated the faulty information as factual. Thus, it has adversely affected the health and welfare of billions of lives around the world. Only now is new science emerging to correct 70 years of misinformation but it is slow to reach the people that would benefit the most. I, for one, don't have time to wait.

Fatty liver disease can be reversed by eliminating sugar, high fructose corn syrup (HFCS) and all sweeteners from our diets, it will help ease the load on the liver. Alcohol and HFCS is processed only by the liver and stores in it cells

as triglycerides. High glycemic carbohydrates (white vegetables) contribute to insulin resistance and unhinges the body's homeostasis.

Manufactured seed oils and trans fats are carcinogenic. Processed or not, the belief in "healthy grains" is a myth and they are linked to some 200 autoimmune diseases. All these elements are literally killing us worldwide, one-by-one every day; and by the millions every year. They have and will continue to rob us of our health with Type 2 Diabetes, heart disease, cancer, obesity and all the other "western diseases."

The recipe for good health is very simple and literally as ancient as man, himself. Each of us has an optimal combination of macronutrients that will fuel and sustain us per our body type, condition and environment. We need to find the proper amount of protein and healthy dietary fat our body requires daily, and consume only low glycemic carbohydrates (leafy greens, etc.), if any at all. Remember, some dietary fat is necessary; but the more dietary fat we eat, the less stored fat the body will consume to produce energy and sustain its homeostasis.

A fun and challenging exercise regimen is recommended for a healthy cardiovascular system and will benefit the liver and other organs. Resistance and strength training, as well as walking or swimming will work well and are all good options.

High Intensity Interval Training (HIIT) or circuit training is a form of conditioning using high-intensity aerobics. It targets strength building and muscular endurance, and empties your glucose reserves into the lean body mass very quickly.

We should understand that FLD, AFLD, Type 2 diabetes, and many other diseases that plague us can be reversed. Here's to your health.





# FSA County Committee Elections beginning

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Val Dolcini has announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will begin mailing ballots to eligible farmers and ranchers across the country for the 2016 FSA County Committee elections on Monday, Nov. 7, 2016. Producers must return ballots to their local FSA offices by Dec. 5, 2016, to ensure that their vote is counted.

"Producers elected to FSA county committees play a vital role in local agricultural decisions," said Dolcini. "Their contributions are essential to the daily operation of nearly 2,200 offices across the country. It is a valued partnership that helps us better understand the needs of the farmers and ranchers we serve."

Nearly 7,700 FSA County Committee members serve FSA offices nationwide. Each committee has three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of office. One-third of county committee seats are up for election each year.

County committee members apply their knowledge and judgment to help FSA make important decisions on its commodity support programs, conservation programs, indemnity and disaster programs, and emergency programs and eligibility.

Producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program to be eligible to vote in the county committee election.

Approximately 1.5 million producers are currently eligible to vote. Farmers and ranchers who supervise and conduct the farming operations of an entire farm, but are not of legal voting age, also may be eligible to vote.

Farmers and ranchers will begin receiving their ballots the week of Nov. 7.

Ballots include the names of candidates running for the local committee election. FSA has modified the ballot, making it easily identifiable and less likely to be overlooked. Voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can pick one up at their local FSA offices.

Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than Dec. 5, 2016. Newly elected committee members will take office Jan. 1, 2017.



# Game Warden Field Notes

# DEPARTMENT LAW ENFORCEMENT REPORTS.

**EXPIRED AND ARRESTED** A Morris County game warden observed a small flat bottom boat with three male occupants on Big Cypress Creek along Sand Crossing at the Morris County/Camp County Line. Using binoculars he could see that the boat had an expired registration decal. Upon making contact, the warden found several violations in addition to the expired registration. None of the occupants had fishing licenses and there was only one life jacket in the boat; the law requires a life jacket for each person onboard. Two of the men were issued citations, while the third received a ticket and a trip to the Morris County Jail after an identification check revealed he had a warrant for a parole violation for burglary.

#### A SHOCKING DISCOVERY As Bowie County game

wardens arrived on the scene in response to a complaint about a truck and trailer blocking a boat ramp, they noticed a boat had just pulled in and was in the process of being loaded onto the trailer. While making contact with the operator, the wardens observed an illegal fish shocking device onboard with wires still connected. During a subsequent search of the vessel and the truck, wardens recovered and released back into the lake two flathead catfish. They also found numerous devices used for illegal fishing, including a four bar telephone, wires, dip nets, a drill, voltage meter and spotlight; all were seized as evidence. A meth pipe, narcotics and a pistol were also taken as evidence from the vehicle. The two subjects were booked into the Bowie County jail for fishing violations and drug charges.

Veterans find work. cant gains from retail trade and restaurants.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in October 2016 was down by 2.1 percent compared to the same period a year ago, Hegar said.

Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections. Motor vehicle sales and rental taxes, motor fuel taxes and oil and natural gas production taxes also are large revenue sources for the state, according to the comptroller's office.

#### **STRAUS LAUDS TEA DECISION**

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus on Nov. 2 welcomed the Texas Education Agency's announcement last week that

it is halting the use of one indicator in a special education monitoring system.

Concerns had been raised that the 12-year-old indicator, which was designed to ensure that schools did not put students into special education when it wasn't warranted, had actually been used by some school districts to keep students out of special education, according to the speaker's office.

In late October, Straus urged Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath to suspend use of the indicator so that the education agency and legislators could work together in the 2017 legislative session to make sure students get the services they need.

"This is good news for Texas families," Straus said in a news release. "TEA's decision will give the agency time to work with legislators and

others to make sure students get the services they need."

#### **PERFORMANCE DATA POSTED**

Texas Education Commissioner Morath on Nov. 3 announced the availability of preliminary 2015-2016 Texas Academic Performance Reports on tea.texas.gov, the Texas Education Agency web-

site. The reports, Morath said, provide a wide range of performance information for every public school and district in the state. The campuslevel, district-level, regional and statewide reports combine details of academic performance with information about staff, programs and

demographics. The final version, following the resolution of district appeals of preliminary ratings, is scheduled for release by Dec. 2.

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
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
