# **Commissioners end agreement with jail construction company**

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court will no longer be working with Lott Brothers Construction, and will look at receiving sealed proposals for the new Crockett County Jail project.

During Monday's regular meeting, the commissioners approved to end the county's contract with Lott Brothers

Construction and to end the construction manager at risk for the jail project.

County Judge Fred Deaton said the county is now changing the method of how they are doing the project.

Under construction manager at risk, the contractor (Lott Brothers) is hired early in the process and is involved in the design of the project. The contractor also oversees the subcontractors.

The property owner, in this case the county, and the contractor settle on a fixed price for the project to get a guaranteed price.

Deaton said with the jail project that hasn't worked out.

Now, the commissioners and Wayne Gondeck, architect with DRG Architects, will oversee the project.

"We are now taking a different avenue of approach,"

Deaton said.

The commissioners also approved to modify the jail documents and issue for competitive sealed proposals.

Proposals are different than sealed bids because the price can be negotiated after the company is selected, Gondeck said.

During the Sept. 12 regular commissioners' court meeting, Gondeck and Mike

White, with Lott Brothers Construction, presented the bids they received from subcontracts. The bids totaled around \$7.18 million.

In November 2015, Crockett County Voters approved a \$6 million bond to build a new jail.

Since then, Gondeck has been working with Lott Brothers, as well as talking with the sub-contractors that bid on the project.

Gondeck said Lott Brothers officials told him they could not get any closer to the budget price and did not recommend that any alternate methods be tried because they didn't believe they would work.


### Texas GOP, no stranger to facing off with feds, now faces a shift

iven their focus on trying to limit the power and reach of the federal government under a Democratic president, Texas Republicans now find that lamppost that was supporting them has suddenly disappeared.

Under President-elect Donald Trump, many of them will need to find something new to lean on.

The chances for White House support for their aversions to everything from federal environmental regulation to directives for transgender people's use of public school restrooms improved immensely in last week's elections. Federal waivers to states like Texas that want to modify Medicaid rules seem more plausible now.

A Texas government that has been at the forefront of state resistance to federal power, that has defined itself by its opposition to the feds, now finds itself — maybe — ideological-ly aligned with the Republicans who will take their places in Congress and the White House early next year.

Trump will probably appoint a new justice to the U.S. Supreme Court to replace the late Antonin Scalia, and he could name one or two more justices during his four-year term.

Texas Democrats didn't win much on Election Day, but there were a couple of bright spots for them. The Texas House will have five more Democrats in it in January than it does today. Harris County, the state's biggest, went from purple in 2012 to blue in 2016. Neighboring Fort Bend County flipped from red to blue. In some ways, Texas mir-

Some officeholders, like Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Joe Straus, have a jump on this. Patrick's ambitions for the coming legislative session include setting standards for who uses which public restrooms or other facilities, limits on growing local property taxes, and an expansion of school choice that would allow money now used exclusively for public schools to be used for private schools if parents and students in certain circumstances so choose.

It sounds like the new president is on board with that.

Straus has stressed infrastructure and improved public and higher education, issues that have support from Washington conservatives and that could thrive if friction between the state and federal governments is lessened or erased.

The two lawyers at the top of state government – Gov. Greg Abbott and Ken Paxton, who succeeded Abbott as the state's attorney general — have made their reputations as litigants against federal encroachment. Paxton took the suethe-feds baton from Abbott and ran with it. Abbott's federalism is now concentrated on his efforts to bring states together to try to amend the U.S. Constitution in ways that would limit the federal government

urban counties voting strongly for Democrats think Harris, Dallas, Bexar, Travis and El Paso — while the rural and suburban counties remain deeply Republican. One party needs to figure out the cities, and the other one needs to figure out the 'burbs and the country.

Those splits are already evident in the Texas Legislature, where issues like school choice run into geographic obstacles that transcend the partisan differences of Republicans and Democrats.

Those party differences remain strong, however, and the push and pull between the Republican state government and the Democratic White House have defined Texas politics for the last eight years, from the Tea Party to Rick Perry to Ted Cruz to Donald Trump.

Abbott and the others now have friends in Washington, D.C. Trump might not have been every Texas Republican's first choice, but he's also not Hillary Clinton. That's a win for the GOP however you slice it. They hold the House and the Senate. They're in the position every political party strives for - in control.

It's just what they wanted — whether they expected it or not.





Skin rashes, allergies and conditions have more causes than can possibly be listed here. They occur from expo-

sure to elements in our environment, on the job, around the house, in the air, immune system deficiencies, medications and in the foods, we eat. Our individual reactions to most of these allergens and irritants depend largely on our gene expression and the reactions will often vary greatly from person to person.

Food allergens and immune system deficiencies can especially be difficult to ascertain and to isolate as causations. Often, the conditions find their way into our normal lifestyle because they are elusive and allergy tests are very expensive to consider. Even when we do discover the allergens, a doctor's recommendation may sometimes be trite and ambiguous. Unless the skin condition is truly debilitating, our follow-through can often be lacking and we just accept it as our norm and continue as we did before.

Atopic dermatitis, or eczema is a common skin condition thought to be a "leakiness" of the skin, causing it to dry out and promote irritation and inflammation. While environmental factors come into play, certain food sensitivities can make it worse. Per the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma & Immunology, "In about half of patients with severe atopic dermatitis, the disease is due to inheritance of a faulty gene in their skin called filaggrin. Unlike with urticaria (hives), the itch of eczema is not caused by histamine so antihistamines do not control the symptoms."

If your skin encounters an allergen, as in a nickel allergy, and you develop red, bumpy, scaly, itchy or swollen skin, this would be termed allergic contact dermatitis. Such is the case when encountering poison ivy, poison oak or poison sumac.

The oily residue that covers them and gets on our

skin, or if we should touch it after it is on our clothing, it will cause allergic contact dermatitis. **HERE'S TO** ican Acade-

nology explains urticaria or hives as, "Hives are an inflammation of the skin triggered when the immune system releases histamine. This causes small blood vessels to leak, which leads to swelling in the skin. Swelling in deep layers of the skin is called angioedema. There are two kinds of urticaria, acute and chronic. Acute urticaria occurs after eating a particular food or coming in contact with a particular trigger."

Swelling and inflammation in the deep layers of the skin such as the eyelids, mouth and genitals (often accompanied with hives) is referred to as angioedema. If the condition lasts for only minutes or hours it is labeled "acute". If the condition returns and lingers over a long period it becomes "chronic". Hereditary angioedema is a serious genetic condition with swelling in various body parts including the hands, feet, face, intestinal wall and airways; in which case one should seek the advice of a reliable dermatologist.

Many people experience discomforting symptoms upon eating dairy products such as milk and cheese. Often they refer to it as a lactose (milk sugar) intolerance or a dairy allergy. It is more likely a problem with digesting a protein known as casein, the principle protein found in milk. Casein is also found in foods and products lacking lactose, like some cheeses and other products.

BodyEcology.com links casein consumption to autoimmune diseases, "Casein

Here's the skinny on skin issues has also been linked to negative effects in children with autism, ADD, and ADHD. Autistic children (and anyone else who experiences low stomach acid, poor digestion and inflamed intestines) react in a very negative way to this diary protein. Casein enters the open, permeable and inflamed gut wall and your body attacks this protein, seeing it as an enemy."

> Egg allergies usually occur in childhood and are quickly outgrown, at least by 16 years old. They often cause hives and other symptoms that develop as the immune system overreacts to the proteins in the eggs' whites or yokes. The immune system assumes the proteins are threats and deploys chemicals to counteract them. It's the chemicals that cause the symptoms not the proteins.

> Dr. William Davis, author of Wheat Belly, is a pioneer in grain sensitivities and allergies explains, "Grains are perfect disrupters of skin health. Their prolamins trigger autoimmune skin reactions and turn antibodies against skin enzymes; their lectins fan the fires of inflammation; their proteins provoke allergies; and their amylopectins send blood sugar and insulin skyhigh and provoke the skindisrupting hormone insulinlike growth factor-1 (IGF). The whole grain package adds up to an impressive collection of skin conditions that can take a variety of forms, from simple red, itchy rashes to scaly, oily raised patches to large vesicles and even gangrene."

Grain and dairy allergies will be discussed at length in a follow-up article, since they are the two main obstacles and sources of misinformation and difficulty in isolating their causes and effects in our nutrition.

with sealed proposals.

Bids for the sub-contractors were out for three weeks and Gondeck said he did not feel like there was good coverage for that short period of time.

He said with the sealed proposals, the process needs to be longer and due to that the county should get more competitive prices.

"I know the budget we have is tight. I'm not being unrealistic about that. I do feel we can get there," Gondeck said. "With proposals there is more latitude. We are looking at it as a best value price."

Instead of bids, where the county has to take the set price, the county selects the company with the lowest bid and then works with that company to meet the budget, Gondeck said.

Gondeck said for the county to not start receiving proposals until the second week of January.

"I feel like we've been burned pretty hard on this deal," Deaton said.

"We can argue, or they (Lott Brothers) can argue, all the reasons why," Gondeck added. "I do believe this is the next best step. I'm in this project with you all. I'm going to work on this until I get this right."

Gondeck also made around \$719,000 cuts to the jail construction plans.

"I have a hard time building a \$6 million jail, and then when the taxpayers tour it we don't have it fully furnished," said Commissioner Randy Branch.

Gondeck said that was not his intent, and that he plans on trying to get all the and outside, as well as has an alarm to notify the sheriff's office if anyone is in the building after hours.

She also said the road department is installing a motion-sensor light outside the building.

Commissioner Eligio Martinez asked about paying for the security system.

Local citizen Bob Pearce said he did some prior research for the county's previous librarian, Louise Ledoux, on security systems and he found Simpli Safe provides affordable systems.

Deaton said more research is needed but that the county will find a system.

#### COUNTY HOLIDAYS, EMPLOYEES PTO

Tambunga brought up the discussion of not deducting county employee's paid time off (PTO) for county designated holidays.

Tambunga said a lot of employees had come to him about this issue. He asked why not just pay employees for the holiday and not take it out of their PTO?

"It's also unfair we set the holidays, we're closed and they have to take that day as PTO," Tambunga said.

Deaton said for county offices that close on holidays that could be done, but the Crockett County Care Center and the sheriff's office do not close. He also said most other counties do not have a care center as other counties have hospital districts that deal with employees.

The county sets 11 holidays each year.

Martinez mentioned county offices that close at noon prior to holidays. Those hours are set by department heads and elected officials.

heads and elected officials. County Treasurer Karen Webb said employees are paid for a full day on the days departments close at noon. No PTO hours are taken on that day.

Webb said another option would be to offer holiday pay to employees who work at the care center and sheriff's office.

Deaton said a new budget starts Jan. 1, and that this issue will require a budget cycle to fully study the issue.

"I don't think we are going to find a perfect solution. We will just work at it and try to figure out what we want and what we can do," Deaton said.

The commissioners did approve the 2017 Holidays: Jan. 2 New Year's Day; Feb. 20 President's Day; April 14 Good Friday; May 29 Memorial Day; July 4 Independence Day; Sept. 4 Labor Day; Nov. 10 Veterans Day; Nov. 23-24 Thanksgiving and Dec. 25-26 Christmas.







### computer science leam holds fall meet

On Saturday, Nov. 5, the Ozona High School held "Computer Science Fall а Meet". In this meet other schools came and participated in a Computer Science and Programming Test.

These schools included: Ozona, Sonora, Iraan, and Alpine.

Teams were split for Ozona as the following:

Ozona Team 1 contained: Manuel Torralba and Citlalli Cano

Ozona Team 2 contained: Chantz Elliott

Ozona Team 3 contained: Humberto Torralba and Josh Knaack

The Computer Science Written Test is composed of 40 multiple choice questions, in 45 minutes. The maximum score that can be achieved is 240 points. These problems include debugging and tracing code, converting to different number bases, and several real life programming engineer problems.

In the Written part of the Computer Science Test, Tate Shannon from Sonora placed first with a score of 202, Isais Gerena in second with a 192, Manuel Torralba ending in third with a 172. Logan Duschatko (Alpine), Chantz Elliott (Ozona), Kristy Sanchez (Sonora), Josh Knaack (Ozona), Roarke Zimmer (Alpine), Citlalli Cano (Ozona), Hernan Valles (Alpine), Humberto Torralba (Ozona), Daniel Loughran (Iraan), Evan Shannon (Sonora), Ivan Castilla (Iraan), Barret Yarbrough (Iraan), and Ryan Garlock (Iraan) respectively.

The Computer Programming portion of the test is a 2 hour team based competition. The questions consist of given situations such as playing "Go-Fish", mapping an area, printing out a sentence, and solving complex math problems. There are 12 scenarios, each one being 60 points apiece. 5 points are deducted for each wrong submission and must be turned in by flash drive with a submission paper.

In the Programming portion of the test, Sonora Team 1 (Tate Shannon) placed first with a score of 857, Alpine Team 1 (Logan Duschatko and Isaias Gerena) came in second with a score of 755, and Ozona Team 2 (Manuel Torralba and Citlalli Cano) came in third place with a 490. The other teams placed in this order: Ozona Team 1



cared, because this district recognizes a lot more work needs to be done."

Hurd claimed victory over an old rival for the second time, Democratic former U.S. Rep. Pete Gallego in the state's only competitive federal district on Tuesday night, on the heels of Donald Trump's apparent election to the presidency.

Hurd won Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Loving, Winkler, Ward, Crane, Upton, Reagan, Pecos, Terrell, Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton, Edwards, Kinney, Uvalde, Medina and Bexar Counties.

Gallego won El Paso, Culberson, Reeves, Presidio, Brewster, Val Verde, Maverick, Zavala, Dimmit, Frio and La Salle Counties.

"One thing I've learned: We are a resilient nation," Gallego said. "The sun rises tomorrow. It's a new day. And we begin putting one foot in front of the other as we have every other day for generations' and generations' past and as I know we will for generations to come."

Hurd's win was one of many blows to the Democratic Party nationwide — he was considered one of the most vulnerable House Republicans and among the easiest pickups for the Democrats.

Hurd ran one of the best executed and funded congressional campaigns the state has seen. The hope among some Texas Republicans is that he can hold onto the seat long enough and build enough constituent loyalty that he can cease the flip-flop nature of the district until the next round of redistricting.

Hurd's win bolsters U.S. House Speaker Paul Ryan's standing among House Republicans. Ryan was a strong supporter of Hurd's re-election, and Hurd's presence in the GOP conference eases Ryan's path to a second term as the House GOP leader.

Just like every cycle, the 23rd Congressional District is all-but-certain to be a top target for the opposition in 2018.

Crockett County also voted in favor for Donald Trump for president with 980 votes to 372 for Hillary Clinton.

#### **Pete Gallego** Democratic Challenger, House District 23 Race

Crockett County favored Republican candidates in contested state races, including the State Senator's Race for District 19.

Locally, Crockett County voted in favor for Republican challenger Peter P. Flores with 546 votes compared to Democratic Incumbent Carlos I. Uresti, who had 285 votes. Uresti won the overall race.

The San Antonio veteran lawmaker promised a focus that includes the well-being of Texas' most vulnerable children.

"My priority for the next four years is the same as my priority has been for the past 19 years, our children," said Uresti.

He said he will work to improve child protective services and public schools and further assist Texas A&M-San Antonio to expand opportunities on the South Side and in South Texas.

State Rep. Andrew Murr, R-Junction, easily won his race against Democratic challenger Stephanie Lochte Ertel. In Crockett County, Murr had 660 votes and Ertel had 200.

#### LOCAL RESULTS

Wesley Bean defeated Weldon Nicks, 268 votes to 156, to become the new commissioner of Precinct 3. Bean will replace incumbent Randy Branch who chose not to run for another term.

Bean will be sworn into office in January.

In the two contested CCCCSD School Board races, Travis Davidson defeated Butch Gonzalez and Dean Fierro for the At Large District. Davidson had 529 votes. Gonzalez 450 and Fierro 253. In the CCCCSD Single Member District 2 race, Justin Morris defeated Jerry Cantu 95 votes to 70.

The next regular school board meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 21, at the Administration Building. During this meeting, school board candidates that won Tuesday's election will be sworn in. The meeting is open to the public.

#### **VOTER TURNOUT**

Crockett County had 2,552 registered voters for the 2016 General Election. That is 160 more registered voters than the 2012 General Election. Voter turnout was around 56 percent with 1,430 ballots cast in the General Election. Early voting had the biggest turnout with 919 ballots cast in the General Election. In the CCCCSD School Board races, 1,260 ballots were cast.

In comparison, Crockett County had 51.58 percent turnout in 2012 and 56.66 percent turnout in 2008.

Statewide, in 2012 fewer Texans voted compared to the presidential election four years earlier. The trend reversed this year, as more than 800,000 more Texans voted in this year's general election compared to 2008 or

2012. This follows a dismal presidential primary season where Texas ranked eighth to last in the nation for voter turnout. But while the number of Texans voting in the general election grew this year, it wasn't enough to keep up with a state growing as fast as Texas. This year's turnout rate dropped slightly from 46.1 percent in 2008 to 42.6 percent in 2016. Of all Texas counties with populations over 10,000, Polk County in east Texas saw the highest rate of voter turnout at 87.4 percent of its voting age population showing up to vote. In contrast, Terry County, located southwest of Lubbock, saw the lowest voter turnout in the state at only 18.3 percent of its voting age population.

Democrat Mary Ann Perez, an insurance agent and former state representative who was elected to the House District 144 seat in 2012 and lost to Pena in 2014. The district includes parts of east Houston, half of South Houston, and parts of Pasadena and Baytown.

- State Rep. John Lujan, R-San Antonio, who won a special election in January 2016 to succeed retiring House District 118 Rep. Joe Farias, lost by 10 percentage points to Democrat Tomas Ūresti. The district includes south San Antonio, Somerset, Elmendorf, St. Hedwig, Selma and Universal City in Bexar County.

- In the race for the 4th Court of Appeals, Place 6, Justice Jason Pulliam of San Antonio, a Republican, lost by three percentage points to Democrat Irene Rios of San Antonio, a former Bexar County court-atlaw judge. The court is comprised of seven justices who hear cases from 32 counties in South Texas and the Texas Hill Country.

In a few other races:

Former state Rep. Wayne Christian, a Republican, won a seat on the three-member Texas Railroad Commission with 53 percent of the vote.

Current state Rep. Borris Miles, D-Houston, won the race to succeed retiring longtime state Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, with 92.5 percent of the vote. Senate District 13 includes parts of Harris County and Fort Bend County.

Republican Dawn Buckingham, a medical doctor, surgeon and former school board member, won the race to succeed retiring state Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay, with 72.4 percent of the vote. Senate District 24 includes the Central Texas counties of Taylor, Callahan, Brown, Comanche, Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, Lampasas,

Sen. Jane Nelson, chair of the Senate Finance Committee, said, "This is the first step of a continuing effort, but rest assured we will do everything we can to protect children. There is no issue of greater importance.'

**HEGAR SENDS TAX REBATES** Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Nov. 9 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$737.9 million in local sales tax allocations for November, 0.8 percent more than in November 2015.

These allocations are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in July, August and September by quarterly filers.
