

School board approves administrator contracts by melissa perner THE OZONA STOCKMAN

The CCCCSD School Board approved administration contracts during their Feb. 22 regular meeting.

After meeting in executive/closed session, the board approved one year contract extensions for OES and OMS Principal Tamara McWilliams, OES Assistant Principal Vicky Munoz, Federal Programs Director Janina Savala and Technology Director Keith Harmsen.

The board also approved a one year administrator contract for OMS Assistant Principal Edward Perez.

OHS Principal Ronny Clayton's contract was tabled until the March 22 regular board meeting.

In his report, Superintendent Raul Chavarria gave the board an up-

date on the 2016-2017 School Budget as of January 2017.

In the report, Chavarria said the district is currently operating around \$10 million below last year's budget.

The recapture amount the district has to send to the state is \$6.9 million, which is less than last year's \$12.4 million. This is the money the district must send as part of the Robin Hood plan due to CCCCSD being considered a property-rich district.

"If it stays this way that's a \$419,000 savings to us. That's huge," Chavarria said.

The district also made cuts in maintenance. Chavarria said if any major items need repair or fixing then the district may have to look at using the fund balance.

"We are in good shape considering all of the budget cuts that we had to implement this year," Chavarria said. "Those cuts do not affect the teaching and learning of our students."

SCHOOL CALENDAR

In his report, Chavarria said the District Site-Base Committee and district officials will be working on the 2017-2018 School Calendar.

He said they will be considering important dates parents and the board want to observe, including Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas,

Texans collaborate for private property rights

When you defend a philosophy and try to create change for the better, there will be opposition from those who have a different philosophy and from those who like things the way they are.

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) leaders and many other Texasbased organizations have taken an aggressive, offensive approach to eminent domain reform in the 2017 session of the Texas Legislature. These organizations have formed the Texans for Property Rights coalition to better defend against the opposition that has already begun to Pipeline and power line companies and cities are

litigation. They claim eminent domain reform will result in more lawsuits, making trial lawyers' dreams come true. I'm sorry to burst the dream, but our eminent domain reform goals are well thought out, reasonable and not designed to increase lawsuits. In fact, these changes are meant to decrease the amount of litigation necessary for both landowners and condemning entities. By providing a better initial offer to landowners, it will be less likely that the transaction will need to be resolved in the courtroom.

Landowners are at a huge disadvantage when dealing with the condemnation process and the Texans for Property Rights initiative will begin to level that playing field.

It's harder to play offense than it is defense, which is why we have more than doubled our work on this issue. We are talking to legislators about supporting the change, educating them on why eminent domain reform is necessary, and answering opponents' allegations with sound solutions and examples of real-life landowner

problems. To see some of these examples firsthand, visit our website at www.texansforpropertyrights.com.

We are asking anyone who believes private property rights are of paramount importance to our state to contact your state representative and state senator today, and let them know you support eminent domain reform and private property rights.

We urge you to remind legislators that landowners, not the pipeline and power line companies, voted them into office.

In 2011, the Texas Legislature enacted Senate Bill 18, which included a provision that an entity with eminent domain authority that wants to acquire real property from a property owner must make a "bona fide offer.'

A component of the Texans for Property Rights initiative is to beef up the bona fide offer section of the law. This means including details up-front for the property owner about how

Then I thought I heard her reply, "You can't (mumble, mumble) a nap, it's (mumble, mumble) in the afternoon!" It was then that I realized that the noise was not emanating from the mouth of my beautiful bride but from my gastrointestinal tract. My stomach was growling. Big time. If I'd

Federal judge sides with plaintiffs in Planned Parenthood case

AUSTIN — Texans who rely on Planned Parenthood as a medical care provider won't have to seek those services elsewhere, pending an upcoming trial.

In the lawsuit titled Planned Parenthood et al. v. Texas Health and Human Services Commission, U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks of Austin on Feb. 21 granted a preliminary injunction to prevent the Texas Department of Health and Human Services from eliminating funding for Planned Parenthood in the state's 2017-18 budget.

"There is no legitimate public interest in allowing Texas to complete its planned terminations (of funding) based on the current facts," wrote Sparks. "Instead, the public interest favors enforcing the individual plaintiffs' rights and avoiding disrupting the health care of some of Texas's most vulnerable individuals."

Sparks found that an in-

junction would ensure that Medicaid recipients in Texas "will continue to have access to medical care at their chosen providers" and the Texas Department of Health and Human Service's termination of Planned Parenthood's provider agreements likely violates federal law.

Sparks ordered the plaintiffs and defendants to work out a schedule for presenting arguments within 30 days. The court will then schedule a trial date.

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton expressed disappointment in the ruling and said he plans to file an appeal.

'BATHROOM BILL' CONTINUES

The Trump administration has reversed last year's Obama administration move to allow transgender students to use the bathrooms and locker rooms of their choice.

The civil rights divisions for the federal justice and education departments on Feb. 22 issued a joint "Dear Colleague" guidance letter reversing the controversial move last May.

In late August, a Fort Worth federal district court enjoined nationwide enforcement of the Obama administration's directive.

Meanwhile, Senate Bill 6 by Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham, is awaiting a hearing by the Texas Senate's State Affairs Committee.

The state legislation, considered a high priority by Gov. Greg Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, would require transgender students to use facilities that match the biological sex they were assigned at birth.

SENATE PANEL HEARS BILL

The Senate Education Committee on Feb. 23 heard testimony on legislation that would prevent a teacher fired for sexual misconduct in one school district from getting hired by another district.




Putting it out there and getting it back "You can lead a horse to water but you can't make it drink." How many times have we referred to that old, overdone adage? Being a health coach and an administrator for a large nutrition group on Facebook has borne that fact out more than anything else, however. I've ferreted out some golden information regarding optimum health, discovered the motherlode of

dietary misinformation and helped others negotiate their own returns to good health. Still, it is very difficult to convince the unwilling they can improve their lot in life with some basic changes.

Case in point (actual post from the Facebook group I help to administrate):

MB.: "Thanks so much [soand-so], for putting all of this into easy to read and understand terms... I'm not diabetic at all, but worried sick about my husband, been trying for over a year for him to jump on the keto [ketogenic way of eating] wagon with me. He has massive stores of fat on his stomach. Can't hug him anymore, my arms won't go around him... I have dropped 50 pounds, no more BP [blood pressure] meds, no acid reflux. Feel amazing... His Dr. says "pre-diabetic", and he has lost no weight on what his dietician has him eating?"

A fellow member replied: "My T2 [type-2 diabetic] partner didn't make any significant changes to his lifestyle until he witnessed me shed 40kg [90 pounds] and attain remission status A1c of 5 percent within a 7-month timeframe. Prior to that, he was halfhearted about his own recovery process. I found when I focused just on my own T2 recovery and left him to his own thoughts (nil encouragement from me) and simply became an example of a person taking responsibility for my own self, that was what got him noticing. I think it is the 'path of least resistance' that has the greatest impact. Me stepping back from his stuff meant if anything was going to change/improve in his

thanks for sharing your experience. Far too often, we build barriers between us instead of understanding, when we attempt to force our beliefs on another, regardless of their validity. We each have but one life and one body, and though we would do well to take responsibility and educate ourselves regarding its optimum wellness and functioning, most of us have suffered the effects and become jaded by the nutritional misinformation that abounds. Often, it is only by witnessing the experiences of others for ourselves, that says more and allows us to better adapt truth and reality in a manner only we can best interpret for ourselves."

Health coaching has taught me at many levels that even though I dedicate most my time to the study of nutritional science, our ancestral dietary history, have read some 250 books and numerous studies and publications; it means very little to those who are not ready or want to hear the information. I share my passion with the few who do listen and use what I've learned for my own health and personal benefit... the results have been amazing.

In 1998, I was diagnosed with Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) after giving myself chemical asthma in 1996 and having smoked tobacco products for some 20 years. In 2001, a basal cell carcinoma was removed from my upper lip and three others appeared in subsequent years. I had a heart attack on Aug. 28, 2004. I quit smoking that day but my weight increased over

the next 6 years until I tipped the scale at 310 pounds and my blood pressure was showing to be consistently high in the summer of 2010.

My VA caregiver informed me I was diabetic in the spring of 2010 and would begin the drug regimen in November of that year. I dreaded taking the pills most. With all the medications I already took, diabetes meant at least another two scripts to be filled every month. I was already taking eight meds every day. That notwithstanding, he also told me that people with my conditions had about a 5-year life expectancy.

It was during the summer of 2010 I happened across an old article published in the New York Times (2002) entitled, "What if It's All Been a Big Fat Lie?" by a Gary Taubes. It sparked my interest and resonated as true to me, and ultimately led to the remission of all the aforementioned diseases and conditions, and a decrease of 135 pounds of body weight. I weighed 183 pounds during the last physical and according to my doctor, I've increased my life expectancy to over 25 years.

For the past 7 years, I have studied nutrition and ancestral dietary development, and have reinvented myself as a health coach, inspired by my personal health triumphs and my wife's conditions. Many of you already are aware she suffers from dementia and rheumatoid arthritis. The point is, good health is possible for most people who learn and responsibility care for their own body, and are mindful of the proper nutrients that goes into it. It is our ignorance and misguided trustfulness of certain profit-driven corporations, industries and institutions that stands between us and our own good health and wellbeing.

Here's to your health.








The OHS Baseball Team won the 2017 Ozona Baseball Tournament last week.



"Food Safety: It's In Your Hands" is set for Wed., March 15, at 10 a.m. at the extension office at 1301 Avenue AA.

This 1-2-hour course will now be required for all food service employees to help promote the service of safe food.

The certificate is good for two years and is valid anywhere in the State of Texas.

The course is a basic overview of food safety practices that are necessary to ensure that safe food is served at your establishment.


As a court of appeals justice, Pope's reassessment of water rights conveyed by Spanish and Mexican land grants changed Texas water law forever. As chief justice he forged a way to guarantee income to finance legal assistance for the poor. Concerned with double litigation in the same case, he won legislative support for statutory changes to thwart "forum shopping" for favorable judges.





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
