## Jail ground breaking **Tuesday**

A Ground Breaking Ceremony for the new Crockett County Jail will be held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 9, at the site located between the south softball park and the cemeteries, south on State

Highway 163. At the March 13 meeting, the commissioners awarded the \$5.4 million proposal to Lyness Construction LP, of Cleburne, Texas, to build the facility. Lyness Construction is also building the new wellness center.

In November 2015, Crockett County Voters approved a \$6 million bond to build a new jail. The facility is expected to be 16,800 square-feet.

## **Commissioners hire attorney** for Invenergy agreement

A new wind energy project proposal prompted the Crockett County Commissioners' Court to hire a Sweetwater attorney.

During an April 26 special meeting, the commissioners approved the hiring of Allen Carmichael, of Wetsel & Carmichael, L.L.P, to advise the county and review a road use agreement from Invenergy.

Invenergy is looking to construct a 120-windmill project, the Santa Rita Wind Farm project, in parts of Crockett, Irion and Reagan counties.

About 80 percent of the turbines will be located in Reagan County, said Courtney Timmons of Invenergy in a March San Angelo Standard-Times article.

The project and is expected to take one year to complete.

Timmons said one of the main buyers for this electricity is the City of Denton, which signed an agreement with Invenergy in February of this year as part plan by the city to buy more electricity generated from renewable sources.

Invenergy estimates the wind farm will generate \$85 million in landowner royalties and tax payments over the lifetime of the project, benefiting Crockett, Irion and Reagan counties, the Irion and Reagan county independent school districts and Reagan County's hospital dis-

The company said the estimated price of the project is about \$350 million.

County Judge Fred Deaton gave a presentation to the commissioners about the 2018 County Budget.

Deaton said the county's funding looks to be the same as 2017. The commissioners

# Fate of key transparency bills is uncertain

here's no question that Americans particularly Texans — are increasingly suspicious of government. Trust in government is at a dangerously low level.

That's why virtually every candidate who runs for the Texas Legislature loudly proclaims that he or she is all for transparency and accountability. Unfortunately, campaign season is a distant memory at this point in Texas' legislative session. Lawmakers have spent four full months in the company of lobbyists who are paid nicely to convince them that the interests of their clients are threatened by transparency.

Today, with only a month remaining, a Legislature that began as a tabernacle-sized choir singing the chorus of transparency has dwindled to a small combo that could rehearse in a two-car garage. With time running out and important pro-transparency bills hanging in the balance, it's time for those who sang in the choir during campaign season to remember the music.

Six transparency bills must pass to restore Texas to what it once was — a state with some of the strongest transparency laws in the nation. For that to happen, citizens must tell their legislators they expect them to come down on the side of the folks who voted them into office.

By asking where they stand and then watching how they vote on these bills, you can judge for yourself whether your lawmakers are walking the walk on transparency. Then you can hold them accountable at the primary ballot box next spring.

The first three bills are extremely important. Last year the speaker's office urged transparency advocates, governmental groups and other stakeholders to hammer out transparency measures they could unite behind. The groups met for 11 months, and these three bills were among the measures they all agreed to support:

-HB 2670 by Rep. Todd Hunter, R-Corpus Christi, would close a loophole that enables officials who use their private electronic devices for public business to hide records that should be public. That's illegal, but because of the loophole, the law goes largely unenforced. The bill puts teeth in the law by establishing a process for the attorney general to

dates of birth, it can be impossible to determine which John Smith is which. As implementation of this ruling spreads to other regions, it hamstrings members of the public seeking detailed child-support information, sex offender lists, even political candidate applications. It also hinders the work of mortgage companies, background check companies, data firms such as Lexis-Nexis, and the media. Without this information, stories such as the abuses at the Texas Youth Commission would never come to light. Without date-of-birth information, businesses, citizens and the media would have no way of correctly identifying people with common names who have conviction records and the like.

-HB 3848 by Hunter includes provisions of the previous two bills, and also would require a governmental entity to notify a citizen who requested information if there's nothing available. If the governmental entity has the information but believes it's not required to release it, the entity would have to explain why. Currently, the entity can choose to simply say nothing, and the citizen is left to assume that his request was placed in File 13, fostering even more distrust in government.

Bills that are agreed upon by major stakeholder groups normally sail through their committee hearing. But these three important bills met stiff opposition at a hearing in the House Government Transparency and Operation Committee on Monday, and now their fate is uncertain.

Here are three other bills that need to pass to restore Texas' standing as an opengovernment leader:

-SB 407 by Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, and its companion, HB 792 by Rep. Giovanni Capriglione,

## How To Load A Horse

Here is the correct way to load a horse. 1. First, catch your horse. Using apples, carrots and sweet talk, draw it near. When it's eating out of your hand rub its neck and attempt to put the lead rope around its neck. After this doesn't work place a bucket full of sweetmix on the ground and when the horse comes within your range, rope it. When that fails just have the wife catch your nag for you. It works every time.

2. Lead you horse to the loading area. When it spies the hated horse trailer it may rear on his hind legs and jerk the lead rope from your hand. If so, repeat step one.

3. Leaning on the lead rope with all your weight play tug of war with your horse to drag it into the trailer. You weigh 185 pounds and it weighs 1,200 pounds. You do the math. Next, ask your wife and one of the kids to get behind the horse, lock hands around his rump and push while you pull on the lead rope. 4. Next, ask your neighbor to grasp your horse's tail and twist and pull on it to get your horse moving towards the trailer. Go to house to retrieve ice and cold compresses for your neighbor to apply to area where he got kicked.

6. Your wife suggests that you put a rope through the hole in the front of the trailer and winch the horse into the trailer using the winch on the front of your fully restored 1955 International pickup. Realizing too late that you should have used a chain, your horse pulls the front end off your beloved International and breaks your favorite rope in the process. You turn the air blue with a string of cuss words which prompts the wife to demand, "Don't speak that way in front of the children."

7. Because all your ropes are now broken use the garden hose and place it just under the horse's rump. With your wife

and kid pulling on the hose and you on the lead rope pull with all your might. Take a short carpentry and plumbing break to stop the gusher that resulted because the garden hose was still attached to the faucet, which was in turn attached to the tack room.

8. Place a bandana over the horse's eyes so that it can't see and must therefore depend on you for guidance. Once again you realize too late that horses are dangerous on both ends and your horse nearly bites your finger off. Splint with popsicle stick and duct tape and be careful not to jam your throbbing finger the rest of the day or your kids will learn some more new words.

9. Put horse in narrow alley and back the trailer into the horse so that it's forced to enter the trailer because there's no place else to go. Have wife block the narrow opening on the side. Make a mental note to replace the mirror on the side of the truck and buy flowers for your wife as she limps back to the house after being

## GOP majority pushes 'sanctuary city' bill to passage in Texas House

AUSTIN — During his "State of the State" address on Jan. 31, Governor Greg Abbott declared legislation banning so-called "sanctuary cities" to be one of his top priorities and an emergency item, saying: "Elected officials don't get to pick and choose which laws they obey."

In 2011, when Rick Perry was governor, he made the original call for such a ban. Last week, after more than a dozen hours of spirited floor debate and parliamentary maneuvers, the Texas House approved legislation banning so-called sanctuary cities.

Senate Bill 4 passed the House on a party-line vote, with Republican members casting 93 votes in favor and Democratic members casting 54 votes in opposition. Democrats collectively made numerous and largely unsuccessful attempts to amend the bill in ways to protect Texas' immigrant communities.

On Feb. 8, the Senate

passed its own version of a ban on sanctuary cities, also on a party-line vote. Next, the Senate must decide whether to concur with the House's version of SB 4. If not, a conference committee of House and Senate members would meet and try to agree on a final version to be returned to their respective bodies for consideration. If both houses of the Legislature approve an identical bill, it will go to the governor's desk.


Under SB 4, a sheriff, police chief, constable or jailer who has custody of a person subject to a federal Immigration and Customs Enforcement detainer request and who knowingly fails to comply with the detainer request could be charged with a Class A misdemeanor. A conviction for noncompliance would result in immediate removal

from office.

Also, the bill would prevent governmental entities from adopting or enforcing an ordinance, order, rule, policy or other measure to prohibit the enforcement of immigration laws, or prohibiting enforcement of immigration laws as demonstrated by pattern or practice.

Another requirement of the bill would be for the state to establish a competitive grant program enabling the Criminal Justice Division of the governor's office to provide financial assistance to cities to offset costs associated with immigration enforcement and fulfillment of immigration detainer requests.

Rep. John Frullo, R-Lubbock, welcomed the passage of SB 4, saying, "After voting for this type of legislation numerous times since 2011 when I served on the House Committee on State Affairs, I'm glad we finally got this bill through the House and the Senate."



## **Mary Nell Capps**

Mary Nell Capps of Ozona, Texas passed away on Sunday April 30th in the presence of her family in Brenham, Texas at the age of 82. It is with a heavy but joyful heart that we remember the life she lived.

Mary was born in Oklahoma during The Great Depression (February 1935) to Mary Beatrice (Birdwell) Walker and George M. Walker. She was the second oldest sister of three with two

She and her family moved often, living many places, including Texas, New Mexico, and Tennessee, (where she attended high school with a boy named Elvis Presley). In 1956, Mary found her way to Ozona. Once she was there, she caught the eye of a local "green eyed hunk" aka Glenn Capps, while waitressing for his mother and it wasn't long before they were saying their vows. Glenn was the love of her life, and after his death in 1974 Mary would remain a widow.

While in Ozona she helped the Capps family with the rural mail route to Juno, Comstock and Pandale and began her family with Glenn. In 1964 they were blessed with a daughter, Glenda Carol Capps and two years later, a son, William Ples

Mary's life had its ups and downs, as everyone's does. But she was a hard headed (not bald headed) woman who knew how to get things done. If you knew Mary, you knew she was good with her hands - she could make pretty much anything. She saw it in her mind, bought the materials, and then it was there for you to hold. She was resourceful and happy as long as she had pockets, safety pins, and sunflower seeds.

She enjoyed her work and the people in her life at that time. She worked for over 20 years in the high school cafeteria and (in my opinion) helped make some of the best peach cobbler and chicken spaghetti that I've ever tasted. She also worked for the Crockett County Youth Center for a time and I swear it was the kids there that helped keep her young. You may not know it but quite a few of you made a lasting impression on her and thoughts of you gave her the giggles up until her last days.

Most of all, Mary enjoyed being outside and exploring the world as much as she could. One of her favorite past times was going for a ride and "exploring" Ozona and the countryside. Or getting lost in San Angelo; she and Ples could spend hours just driving around with no place to go.

Mary is survived by her favorite sister (Lyn Morgan), her favorite daughter (Glenda Capps), her favorite granddaughter (Morgan Downing) and her favorite great-grandson (John Samuel Downing), as well as her numerous favorite nieces and nephews (you know who you are). She was as determined and tenacious in her passing as she was in her life and despite being declared unresponsive with massive trauma due to a stroke, she managed to rally enough to make very clear to the entire room that she was not going without saying goodbye to

Mary was a faithful servant of the Lord. She dedicated herself to her church family, as not only a Sunday School teacher to many through the years, but also using her God given talents to make repairs to the building itself. She was a member of Cavalry Baptist in Ozona, and not only helped Glenn construct the cross which hangs outside, but helped her dear friend in painting the river scene above the baptismal.

The funeral will be held today, May 3, at Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona, Texas. It will be graveside service only starting at 3 p.m. A viewing will be held at the graveside from 2:30 to 3 p.m. The family asks that only close friends and family attend.

In lieu of flowers, the family suggests donating a book to the local library in memory of Mary's love to read or sending a donation to the Brenham Nursing and Rehabilitation Center in Brenham, Texas as a thank you to all of the staff and nurses who helped Mary these last couple of years.

#### **CAN ONE MISTAKE CAN BE SO COSTLY?**

Years ago when I went into a prison to help some of the inmates in their relationship to God. While I was there one inmate started crying and wanted to talk to someone. As we talked he said he missed his family very much and he wanted to be with them. His statements of "I am in here because of one mistake" and repeatedly saying "one mistake, one mistake" reminded me of something the Bible talks about. There will be more people permanently separated from God in the future than those in His presence, (Matthew 7:13&14). If we are still alive there is still hope but if physical death occurs it will be too late, there will be no escape and no second chances. I don't know what the prisoner did to be locked up and put into prison but the Bible is very clear about what sends or condemns someone to hell (Romans 6:23). It is disobeying or breaking Gods laws or rules (Romans 3:23) and the killer is the rejection of Jesus Christ. A good example of this is the two men who were crucified with Jesus (Luke 23:33-43). One repented, asked for forgiveness and mercy from the Son of God (Mark 10:45). One found mercy, forgiveness and eternal life (in paradise with Jesus, Mark 23:43), the other didn't. In our relationship to God we are either, Forgiven or Condemned. See you in Church next Sunday.





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

R-Southlake, aim to repair the damage done by a 2015 Texas Supreme Court ruling. The court ruled that businesses and governmental entities can withhold information about their contracts with each other by claiming the information might put them at a competitive disadvantage in the future. Using this easy cover, city officials in McAllen sealed information on the amount they paid singer Enrique Iglesias to sing in the city's holiday parade. And the city of Denton sealed contract details on the largest capital project in the city's history — a quarter-billiondollar municipal power plant being built with taxpayers' money. There are hundreds of other examples, and the list is growing daily. SB 407 has already passed the Senate. Like the previous bills, it is pending in the House Government Transparency and Operation Committee.

-SB 408 by Watson and its companion, HB 793 by Capriglione, aim to undo another bad 2015 Texas Supreme Court ruling. Ignoring decades of precedent, the high court ruled that a non-profit organization paid by the City of Houston to perform economic development work was not subject to the public information act. The result: taxpayers have no way to know how that money was spent. The Houston situation isn't unique. Many economic development groups receive the lion's share of their funding from governmental entities, and often the same elected officials who allocat-



ed the money to them serve on the groups' boards. SB 408 passed the conservative Texas Senate overwhelmingly, despite strong opposition from business interests. It too is pending in the House Government Transparency and Operation Committee.

HB 3581 by Capriglione would give a citizen who requests governmental information the ability to get the information in the format in which it's filed. (Some entities produce a PDF file even when a requestor asks for an existing spreadsheet, making the information harder for the requestor to analyze.) The bill would make available much-needed details on how the data is organized, the computer program that was used and the heading of each column of information in a document. (Yes, some entities actually respond to a request by providing charts with no column headings, leaving the requestor to guess what the numbers mean.) The bill is also pending in — you guessed it — the House Government Transparency and Operation Committee. Like the other bills, it needs to be voted out of committee and get a House vote immediately.

the detention of criminals, it would "target children, victims of crimes and even immigrants who served in our armed forces."

"The Texas Legislature has now passed an Arizonastyle, 'Show-me-your-papers' law that will disproportionately affect" communities like his own, Wu said, which he described as "hardworking communities made up of native and non-native Texans, refugees and immigrants both documented and undocumented.'

Following the passage of SB 4 on April 27, the Mexican American Legislative Conference, a group of 42 members of the Texas House, released a statement by its chair, Rep. Rafael Anchia, D-Dallas. "It's

a shameful day in Texas," wrote Anchia. "Legislators debated for over 14 hours to pass, with little hesitation from the majority, a bill that was broadly opposed by law enforcement and faith leaders, including the Texas Conference of Catholic Bishops. If it was the goal of Governor Abbott and GOP legislative leaders to terrorize the Latino community, they have succeeded."

#### **BUDGET NEGOTIATIONS BEGIN**

A conference committee of House and Senate members met April 24 to begin hashing out differences in the House and Senate versions of the proposed \$218 billion state budget for fiscal years 2018 and 2019.

Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, expressed confidence that the panel would be able to agree. "Both chambers have prioritized child protective services, mental health; both chambers have prioritized our long-term commitment to transportation funding," she said. "Both want to ensure our borders are secure and our children are properly educated. I have no doubt that we are going to pass a budget that meets our needs and keeps Texas strong and successful."

Appropriations House Committee Chair John Zerwas, R-Richmond, said, "It's not going to be the House, it's not going to be the Senate, it's going to be the citizens of Texas that ultimately win as a consequence of this conference committee."

The crafting of a state budget is the only constitutionally required act of the Texas Legislature when it meets in regular session every two years.

#### **EX-GOVERNOR'S FATHER DIES**

Joseph "Ray" Perry, 92, of Haskell, died at an Abilene hospital on April 27, following a brief illness.

Perry was a lifelong farmer near Paint Creek in Haskell County, where he was born, and he was the father of U.S. Energy Secretary Rick Perry, Texas' longest-serving governor.

Perry served as a tailgunner on a bomber in World War II, flying some 35 missions over Nazi Germany.

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


