

# Fort Lancaster hosts Frontier Day **Saturday**

Fort Lancaster State Historic Site will come alive with history, soldiers, and settlers during the free annual Western Frontier Days, Friday, May 19, and Saturday, May 20, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Visitors can see what early frontier life was like in Texas. Living history interpreters and reenactors will represent all aspects of Fort Lancaster's history, including: U.S. soldiers, pioneers, army laundresses, Texas Confederates, farm animals, Buffalo Soldiers, settler families, camels, and much more.

Visitors can talk with soldiers, see early settlers and wander through the ruins imagining the once-impressive fort buildings including the barracks, stables, blacksmith shop, and hospital.

As part of Western Frontier Days, the site will recognize the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Fort Lancaster and celebrate Armed Forces Day at 1 p.m. on Saturday, May 20.

Spanning 82 acres in the Pecos River valley, Fort Lancaster State Historic Site commemorates Fort Lancaster, established in 1855.

The fort played an important role in westward expansion by providing escorts for mail carriers, wagon trains, and settlers on the San Antonio-El Paso Road en route to California.

The visitors center exhibit presents the story of Fort Lancaster through artifacts, images, scale models, a lifesized camel replica, and an introductory video.

Fort Lancaster is located 30 minutes west of Ozona, off Interstate 10 at 629 Fort Lancaster Rd., in Sheffield.

# Legislative session in the final stretch

One month to go in the 85th Legislative Session. Both the Texas House and the Senate are sending our final bills over to the other side before taking up the bills of the opposite chamber, only to meet in the middle on the Governor's desk by Sine Die, which falls on Monday, May 29 this year.

At this point in session there are many competing interests, jockeying to pass last minute legislative priorities or to shore up funding in the budget. The budget is in conference committee, where the

differences between the House and Senate budgets are being ironed out.

Recently, I have passed a number of bills through the Senate including: Senate Bill

188 - Provides liability protection to Good Samaritans who rescue a vulnerable individual or pet from a hot car.

## **Texas House members** can save open government

ow, state lawmakers have the opportunity to pass multiple negotiated open government measures to improve the Public Information Act and restore its strength, for the benefit of all Texans.

The Texas Senate took a stand Thursday by overwhelmingly approving House Bill 2328 and amending it to include transparency bills that had stalled in a House committee. The anchor legislation by Rep. Eddie Lucio III, D-Brownsville, providing quicker access to public information, was sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin.

Open government is a bipartisan issue, and Watson successfully urged fellow senators to include in the legislation other bills by Republican Reps. Todd Hunter of Corpus Christi and Giovanni Capriglione of Southlake, as well as hills Watson pushed

It's critical that the Texas House of Representatives join this effort to save open government by concurring with Senate amendments to the Lucio legislation.

The provisions would repair damage to the Public Information Act done by two Texas Supreme Court decisions in 2015.

A ruling known as the Boeing decision closes public access to many government contracts with private businesses. In some cases, it has become impossible to see how taxpayer money is spent on items such as contracted school services or even how much total money is spent on a contract, as in the case of singer Enrique Iglesias hired by the city of McAllen to perform at a holiday event. The court ruling allows closure of those records.

The court's ruling in the Greater Houston Partnership case closes off financial information about certain non-profits that are funded by government and acting essentially as an arm of government.

A well-organized business contingent at the Capitol is lobbying to

make sure these court decisions stand and to block the legislation to fix them, originally introduced by Watson and Capriglione. Citizens who care about openness

must speak up to their local lawmakers to counter this powerful

House Bill 2328 also includes measures by Hunter to give citizens improved access to government records kept in officials' private email accounts and to dates of birth in many government records.

A regional appeals court placed dates of birth off limits, but birthdates are necessary in accurate news reporting on criminal justice matters and in the public's vetting of cand dates for elected office. Banks, background check companies and other businesses also need access to dates of birth in public records.

The updated Lucio legislation includes a requirement for governmental entities to tell a Public Information Act requestor if there are no records responsive to the request or if documents can be withheld based on a previous attorney general ruling. This seems like common sense, and it often happens already, but it's not required by law so not every government does it.

This important bundle of bills serves all citizens and plugs holes in the Public Information Act, a law long known as one of the strongest of its kind in the nation that was born in the early 1970s amid a state scandal.

The Texas House of Representatives has the opportunity to uphold this modern-day tradition of openness and protect the public's right to know.

Texans must speak out and let it be known we expect no less.

# Sorry Cattle

It was a strange phone call. Everyone knew that old Bean Belly Bill always sold his cattle to the same buyer every year, so why was he calling Red, a field man for an auction market 500 miles away?

Despite his reservations, Red returned Bean Belly's call and, sure enough, old Bean was going to give him a shot at his cattle. Normally Red wouldn't go so far out of his trade area but we're talking here about a big deal: 2,000 head. There was only one stipulation: "You gotta be here early this Saturday if you want to bid on

This meant that Red would have to miss his son's Homecoming football game on Friday night, and his son was the star quarterback playing in his last season. But we are talking about 2,000 head and opportunities like that come around as often as a cowboy's pickup with a PETA sticker on it. So Red made the 500 mile journey on a Friday freeway clogged with urbanites escaping the big city. Which also made finding a motel room difficult. The last room in the only town close to Bean Belly's ranch was a frilly bed-and-breakfast that cost \$250 for one night, which was more than the monthly mortgage on Red's house! As if to rub it in, with the lights off the room looked exactly like the \$49 rooms Red usually staved in.

Red had heard stories about Bean Belly being tight, but that also described his wire gates. By the time he got to Bean's house Red's hands were sore, his back

hurt and the abuse had only just begun. Right away he knew the stories of Bean's frugality were accurate because there was only one running board on Bean's old truck, and it was on the driver's side. The passenger, usually his poor wife, had to climb up in the truck unaided. After opening 12 more gates Red's body was feeling

arthritic and abused. Red first tried to get Bean Belly to consign

the cattle to the auction where he'd get the best price but Bean wouldn't hear it. He'd only sell them off the ranch. After haggling over terms Bean invited Red to lunch in town. They took separate trucks and by the time Red arrived at the coffee shop Bean Belly had invited a farmer friend and the banker to join them for lunch. Naturally, Bean stuck Red with the tab.

Red gave Bean Belly the price he'd pay for the cattle and Bean told Red he'd "Get back to him." But he never did. So Red called Bean and found out that Bean had sold his cattle to the same buyer he always sold them to at the same price Red had bid. When the buyer of Bean's cattle and Red next crossed paths on sale day the cattle buyer laughed and asked Red "Next time you appraise Bean's cattle could you

price them a little lower so I don't have to

pay so much? Ha, ha." It finally dawned on Red that Bean never had any intention of selling his cattle to him; he'd merely been the appraiser. Having missed his son's football game really irked Red, so he sent Bean an invoice for his "appraisal service." There was a mileage charge for the 1,000 miles he'd driven, the exorbitant cost of the frilly B and B, the lunch tab, and a chiropractor's bill for straightening out Red's crooked back from opening and closing all the gates. ## Legislature grinds toward May 29 close with much still to accomplish

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — With a mere two weeks remaining until the end of the 85th regular session of the Texas Legislature, lawmakers have not yet finalized a state budget for fiscal years 2018 and 2019.

The Legislature's 150 House members and 31 Senate members can work around the clock, if need be. Their only absolutely required accomplishment in the 140-daylong session is to produce that budget and put it on the governor's desk. If they don't, the governor will call them back for a special session.

House floor debates, protracted by Republican intraparty bickering, ate up the clock last week. Sheaves of mostly noncontroversial local and consent bills accumulated and died as deadlines took effect, and chances were reduced for hundreds of other bills to earn a spot on a floordebate calendar.

Despite the atmosphere in the House, the body tentatively passed House Bill 39, the Child and Family Protective Services and Health and Human Services reform bill authored by Gene Wu, D-Houston; Richard Raymond, D-Laredo; Sarah Davis, R-Houston; Toni Rose, D-Dallas; James White, R-Hillister; and coauthored by Jason Isaac, R-Dripping Springs; and Ina Minjarez and Tomas Uresti, both D-San Antonio.

The bipartisan bill seeks to support the existing child protective services system by creating programs and procedures that respond to service gaps, provide resources for parties involved in child welfare and the foster care system, and establish a more efficient case management system.

HB 39 still must gain Senate approval before advancing to the governor's desk.

"After more than a year of work, we were able to accomplish something that includes input from numerous child welfare system stakeholders and experts, along with proposals from both sides of the aisle," Rep. Wu said. "We worked together to keep our word and came up with comprehensive legislation to make the necessary reforms we so desperately need. I am confident that these reforms will change the lives of vulnerable children and families in Texas and I look forward to working with the Senate to make these comprehensive reforms state law."

## SANDRA BLAND ACT OK'D

Meanwhile, at the East end of the Capitol building, the Senate unanimously approved SB 1849, the Sandra Bland Act.

Sandra Bland was found dead in a Waller County jail cell in July 2015, three days after a state trooper arrested her in a traffic stop. In September 2016, Bland's family was awarded \$1.8 million from Waller County and \$100,000 from the Texas Department PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 10

# TxD0T hosting centennial celebration Friday

SAN ANGELO - The Texas Department of Transportation is celebrating a century of service this year with a traveling exhibit which includes a refurbished 27 foot long 1918 Liberty Truck and other transportation memorabilia.

The San Angelo District, in partnership with the Ozona Chamber of Commerce and Visitor Center, will host a community event on Friday, May 19, at 10 a.m. in celebration of the occasion.

Festivities will begin at the Chamber's Plaza, 505 15th St. in Ozona, with remarks from Crockett County Judge Fred Deaton, San Angelo District Engineer Mark Jones, and retired Sonora Resident Engineer Joe Lane. Lane is the only surviving resident engineer who oversaw the building of Interstate

Following these remarks, guests will be invited into the Chamber to view two videos about the centennial.

One video features the history of the agency for the last 100 years and the other features the history of the San Angelo District with interviews from retired and current employees.

TxDOT would like individuals to sign the centennial poster, take a selfie with "Miss Liberty," and enjoy light refreshments.

The event will also feature lots of old photographs and exhibits. "Share a Memory" cards will be available for guests to write a memory of

TxDOT. These cards will be placed in a time capsule later this year at the district headquarters in San Angelo, to be opened in 50 years.

The construction of 152 miles of Interstate 10, spanning Kimble, Sutton and Crockett counties, was one of the most significant projects in the history of the San Angelo District.

An 8.5 mile section starting at Taylor Box Road was the only section completed by 1969.

The 1970s, however, brought the interstate to town. This decade saw the completion of a 10 mile section west of Ozona to Bachler

Both sides of Gurley Draw were completed in 1976. This project involved a 5,000 yard concrete pour over the dirt elevation built up on both sides of the draw.

The 600 foot span bridge over the Pecos River, 35 miles west of Ozona, was under construction in 1978.

This \$8 million dollar project was the largest and most challenging section of road built in the San Angelo District. It involved movement of 1.5 million cubic yards of excavation. "The Big Cut," as it was known, covered half a mile and required tiered blasting down 100 feet to reach the road base.

The excavated rock was used to fill in the dry Pecos River bottom in an area that became known as "The Big Fill." The Big Fill raised the interstate more than 100 feet from the riverbed and required more than 4,000 feet of reinforced concrete pipe for drainage.

The Big Cut and the Big Fill were finished in the 1980s and thus completed the 53 miles of interstate in Crockett County.

In 2002, Crockett County received \$1,139,040 in funding from TxDOT's Statewide Transportation Enhancement Program to build a visitor center in Ozona.

## **Ozona hosting Partners Event Thursday**

The Texas Pecos Trail Partners Event will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday, May 18, at the Crockett County Museum. The event is open to the public.

Guests will tour the Crockett County Museum originally, the Methodist Church of Ozona. It was built in 1926, but burned in 1942 leaving only the rock structure. The building was turned into a hospital, which was there until 1956. was then that it became the Courthouse Annex which is where the Crockett County Museum landed two years later in 1958. Finally, in 1998 the museum began restoration to solely occupy the three-story building. Guests will also tour the Historic Town Square and the Crockett County Interpretive Trail.

Lunch and the Texas Pecos Trail Region Board meeting will be held at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center. Cost of lunch is \$10 per person and will be collected at the door.

The regular board meeting will be held before and after lunch depending on schedule.

The Texas Pecos Trail Region encompasses 22 West Texas counties in the Trans-Pecos area: Andrews, Crane, Crockett, Ector, Edwards, Glasscock, Kimble, Kinney, Loving, Martin, Maverick, Midland, Pecos, Reagan, Reeves, Sterling, Sutton, Terrell, Upton, Val Verde, Ward, and Winkler.

## Walking, the exercise as old as mankind

Walking conditions our body by allowing gradual adaptations that strengthen our feet, knees, and hips. A long, brisk walk can help increase endurance. And if you are a runner, walking is a means of cross-training that gives your joints and running muscles a break that can help reduce or eliminate the aches and pains caused by running.

Jeff Galloway, in "Walk to Strengthen Muscles: Slow down to get stronger and go longer" advise, "Pay attention to form. Most walkers find an upright posture to be the most natural and comfortable. Take short steps to avoid over striding, which can cause aches and pains in your legs, feet, and hips. Keep your feet low to the ground and step lightly."

Walking is an efficient way of burning fat and increasing blood flow to aid recovery.

Change up the terrain... the more varied your walking medium, the better workout you'll get. Climb a few hills, or climb the same hill a few times. Do a few repetitions up and down the bleachers at the football stadium. Stairwells are great places for exercise, too... and do several flights a day, several times a day to build leg strength.

The National Academy of Sports Medicine recommends that, "Walking can actually be considered a full body exercise. Although the locomotion comes from the work the legs are doing, the arms still have to swing, and the core still has to work to stabilize you while you're moving. The primary muscles involved in walking are the muscles of the lower leg (soleus, gastrocnemius, tibialis anterior/ posterior, and peroneals), and the thigh/knee (vastus lateralis, medialis, obliques, and rectus femoris)."

Dr. Pierre Dukan, Nutrition & Dietetics, lists the muscles most involved in walking. They are:

"The quadriceps. At the front of the thighs, they are by far the body's biggest muscles. They raise and push forward the thigh and leg.

"The hamstrings. These form the back of the thigh and move your leg backward.

"The buttock muscles. Very powerful and bulky, their job is to complete the backward movement of the step. When these muscle masses sag, this shows that they are not being used enough for their primary function, which is walking. "The stomach muscles.

These contract with each step forward. "The calf muscles. These are smaller, but are among


the most heavily used muscles when you take a step. "The pelvis's stabilizing muscles. These form a muscular crown around the pelvis and include the external abductors, the internal ad-

"The symmetrical tibialis anterior muscles in front of

ductors, the abdominal mus-

cles at the front, and the spi-

nal muscles at the back.

cles. These raise the foot up so that it does not flatten or scrape the ground as you take a stride. Walking greatly develops these muscles.

"The arm and shoulder

muscles. These contribute less than the others, but they can be used a great deal in power walking."

Besides conventional walking, Nordic walking (used by backpackers, skiers and trekkers) is also very beneficial for adults, especially older adults. "Nordic walking provides additional benefits in muscular strength compared to conventional walking, making it suitable for improving aerobic capacity and muscular strength as well as other components of functional fitness in a short period of time." - Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia.

Nordic walking is a form of fitness-walking with specially designed poles. Trekkers, backpackers and skiers have been using this concept of walking for decades, developed as an off-season skitraining activity while using one-piece ski poles. Skiers, deprived of snow, have long used and still use their onepiece ski poles for ski-walking and hill-bounding.

As explained in Wikipedia, compared to regular walking the benefits of "Nordic walking involves applying force to the poles with each stride and will use more of their entire body with greater intensity to receive fitness building stimulation not found in normal walking for the chest, latissimus dorsi muscle, triceps, biceps, shoulder, abdominals, spinal and other core muscles. This may result in significant increases in heart rate at a given pace. Nordic walking has been estimated as producing up to a 46 percent increase in energy consumption, compared to walking without poles."

Regardless of your preference, both Nordic walking and conventional walking improve cardio-respiratory fitness that resistance training does not.

In addition, Nordic walking provides the additional benefits of upper-body muscular strength and is an effective and efficient mode of exercise to improve overall fitness in older adults. Walking is as old as mankind, for it has been our primary mode of transportation since the dawn of our existence. You might say it is our nature... we were born to walk.

# 31st annual Sixth Grade Field Day





CROCKETT COUNTY SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

On April 21, Crockett County Soil and Water Conservation District and NRCS hosted the 31st Annual Sixth Grade Field Day and Ninth Annual Marty Acton Memorial.

The all day event was held at Jack Baggett's ranch, 10 miles south of Ozona. We had about 80 that attended this year.

We were blessed with beautiful weather this year, especially welcome after a rather cold and misty day last year. We had seven presenters and a time keeper to help make the field day a success.

They are very interactive with the students as they present their specific topic regarding conservation of our natural resources. The students were divided into three groups and they rotated between the stations. They were able to see, learn and participate in educational, yet fun, presentations. We had some guests who joined us and it was just an all-around fun day. We can be proud of these kids and their teachers.

Some things the students were able to enjoy were an observation beehive and a sample of the beekeeper's honey which was presented by Carla Ebeling Dusek from the Concho Valley Beekeepers Association. Amanda Bragg gives a good soil identification presentation. This helps the students see how the type of soil under our feet determines its stability when building and also the nutrients and water retention. Practical application was made by sifting sand through different sizes of screens and then relating that to sandpaper grit size in

the hardware store. They enjoyed a sheep shearing station with Kraig Chandler and his helper. The students learn how much hard work there is in raising sheep and then collecting the wool. They were then rotated to a station where Karen Stieler snowed them some 11nal products made from the wool after it was sheared.

Taylor McCumber had a rainfall simulator that was a vivid demonstration of runoff, erosion, and how much water went back to our groundwater supply, depending on the plants and use of the soil. She also presented the GPS scavenger hunt which sent them out into the pasture to search out items so they got a bit of exercise from this one. We were especially grateful she was able to pull double duty after illness kept one of the presenters from attending.

Mary Humphrey presented information about different wildlife habitats and how wildlife management is beneficial. The information compared the wildlife to humans so the students could understand how one species habitat is connected to another and how interwoven we are to our natural surroundings.

Slate Williams brings out a pump and it's always a fun, hands-on demo. It shows how we pump the aquifer groundwater up to us and into our homes. Anthony Munoz came down for Farm Bureau. He explained how everyday items that we consume are ultimately connected with the earth and the amount of resources that are needed to produce them.

The students were sent home with a goody bag that contained different items we hope they will enjoy and share with their family. Wildflower seed packets were included so they can plant a butterfly garden in their yard. We encourage their parents to help them plant the flower seeds. It will be a fun family activity and beneficial to the pollinators as well. It is important that all people, young and old, pay attention to our natural surroundings. We can learn much by being observant. Our aim is to help the students understand the need for conservation of these natural resources and how they can be more aware in their everyday life of what's happening in nature.

Between the morning and afternoon rotations we had lunch. The directors always enjoy cooking up the hamburgers and believe me, they know how much it's appreciated when at least 15 of the kids went back for seconds. During lunch break the students had an opportunity to see and pet some little kid goats which are always super cute & get a good amount of attention from everyone.

We want to thank the many who support us and help us have activities such as this. Several of them were able to attend and enjoyed lunch with us.

Special thanks go out to Eligio Martinez, all the NRCS presenters, Concho Valley Beekeepers Assistant beekeeper Carla Dusek, Slate Williams from the Crockett County Groundwater Conservation District. Ozona Bank and Frank Tambunga, The Ozona Stockman for coming out to take pictures, CNB, Mary Humphrey of the Parks and Wildlife Department, Anthony Munoz of the Farm Bureau, Dairy Queen for providing ice cream tokens and Adkins Septic Service. We couldn't sponsor the field day without their participation and help.

A special thanks go to Jodi and Jack Baggett for hosting this event at their ranch. They always make sure everything is ready and provide a very welcoming atmosphere to all who attend.

Thanks also to the school and teachers for arranging the schedules so the students can continue to enjoy this annual field day and thanks to the students for their participation and helping to make it a fun day.







## Managing range, livestock pests set for May 24 in Sonora

SONORA Ranchers Roundup-Managing Range and Livestock Pests will be conducted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service May 24 at the Sutton County Civic Center, 1700 N. Crockett St. in Sonora.

Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. The program will follow from 9 a.m.-2 p.m.

Pascual Hernandez, AgriLife Extension agent in Sutton County, said the tri-county program is being hosted by the AgriLife Extension offices in Sutton, Edwards and Val Verde counties.

Individual registration is \$15 by May 19 and \$20 thereafter. The fee includes the noon meal.

"Though timely rains benefited our rangelands, the mild winter and subsequent rainfall have also increased rangeland and livestock pests," Hernandez said. "The annual Ranchers Roundup program will address those issues. Speakers will also speak on the outlook for wool and hair sheep and take a second look at Spanish goats."

## DPS urges to use caution around motorcyclists

As part of Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding drivers to use extra caution around motorcycles on roads and highways.

DPS recommends that all drivers "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles," which is a motorcycle safety public awareness campaign launched by the Texas Department of Transportation.

In 2016, 493 people were killed while riding a motorcycle or scooter, accounting for approximately 13 percent of all crash fatalities for the year. Drivers and motorcyclists

can reduce their chances of being involved in a serious or fatal crash by adhering to basic safety measures, including:

· Perform a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors and blind spots before entering or exiting a lane of traffic, and at intersections.

Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic.

**Last Puzzle** 

· Allow more following distance - three or four seconds - when behind a motorcycle, so the motorcyclist has enough time to maneuver or stop in an emergency.

· Wear protective gear when driving or riding on a motorcycle.

· Never tailgate. In dry conditions, motorcycles can stop more quickly than cars. · Never drive while dis-

tracted. Motorcyclists must be properly licensed to operate a motorcycle in the State of Texas. Currently more than one million individuals possess a Texas Class M (motorcycle) license. Proof of successful completion of a DPS-approved basic or intermediate motorcycle operator training course is required for licensing. Licensed motorcyclists can also take a refresher course to reinforce

of Public Safety, defendants in a wrongful-death lawsuit.

The bill, authored by John hitmire, D-Houston, dean of the Senate and chair of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee, would require training for jail officers to teach them to recognize signs of

mental illness in newly incarcerated individuals and take appropriate action, such as notifying a judge in a timely fashion. The bill also would require county jails to install surveillance cameras, if funding allows. On May 11, the bill moved to the House for consideration.

## **AG FILES PREEMPTIVE SUIT**

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 8 filed a lawsuit asking the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas to uphold Senate Bill 4, legislation finally passed on May 4 and signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott on May 7.

SB 4, which takes effect Sept. 1, bans sanctuary cities in Texas and requires all governments throughout the state to comply with immigration law and detainer requests. The law is expected to trigger lawsuits challenging its constitutionality. "Texas possesses an inde-

pendent sovereign responsibility to protect the health, welfare and safety of its residents," Paxton wrote, explaining why he filed the lawsuit. "Texas, cognizant of this duty, recently enacted SB 4 to set a statewide policy of cooperation with federal immigration authorities," he added.

## **SALES TAX CHECKS INCREASE**

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 10 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$787.8 million in local sales tax allocations for May, an amount 2.6 percent more than in May 2016.

These allocations are based on sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly and sales made in January, February and March by quarterly filers.

The cities of Irving, Round Rock, Dallas, San Antonio and Odessa saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations and the cities of McAllen and Sugar Land saw noticeable decreases, Hegar said.
