State budget bill moves forward as conference committee agrees

AUSTIN - Texas Senate and House budget conferees met frequently last week and
on May 20 managed to reach compromise on a $\$ 218$ billion state budget for fiscal years 2018-2019.
However, Senate Bill 1 must gain final approval from both he House and Senate in order for the budget to continue on to the governor's desk. But as pressing a matter as the budget may seem, the bulk of was used on a variety of other measures, such as property tax reform, municipal annexation, school bathroom accommodations for transgender students and religious conscience considerations for government employees

## TxD0T celebrates century of service

Reliving old memories and celebrating 100 years of transportation was cele
ed last week in Ozona. The Texas Departmen of Transportation celebrated a century of service and the construction of Interstate 10 during a community event on May 19 at the Ozona Chamber
of Commerce Visitor Center of Commerce Visitor Center. Sonora Resident Engiviving resident engineer who oversaw the building of $\mathrm{I}-10$, spoke to the crowd about his experiences.
"I was fortunate enough to be here when they turned
the first shovel of dirt in Kimthe first shovel of dirt in Kim-
ble County and to be here when they laid the final piece of dirt in Crockett County," Lane said.

The San Angelo TxDOT oversaw 152 miles of the construction of I-10, span-
ning Kimble, Sutton and ning Kimble, Sutton and ect was started in 1965 and ended in the early 1980s. This $\$ 8$ million dollar project was the largest and most challe $\neg-$ nging section of road built in the San Angelo Dis
Lane worked alongside fellow engineers Bill Dixon and Grady Rodgers.
"We knew nothing else and we wanted nothing else, Lane said of the project. "We

found contentment with this construction job. We built some pretty good roads." county Judge Fred Dea ton said I-10 has saved towns itors and tourists.
"The interstate breathed new life into this town," De aton said. "If we did not have the interstate here to help stabilize the economy, it
would be rough on the tax payers."
Along with stories about I-10, TxDOT officials showed a video about the other projects and people throughout the district, as well as a video
celebrating the state office's 100th anniversary. A refurbished 27 foot long 1918 Liberty Truck and other transportation memo-
rabilia was also on display. The San Angelo TxDOT District is comprised of 15 counties, including Crockett County.
"We
"We still hold the highest standard of honest and respect," said Mark Jones,
San Angelo District Engineer. "Throughout the whole state The have enhanced safety and regional mobility has im-
proved."
The interstate wasn't the
only local TxDOT project celebrated. The visitor center is also a TxDOT project. In 2002, Crockett County received $\$ 1,139,040$ in funding from TxDOT's Statewide
Transportation Enhancement Program to build the facility in Ozona. The facility was completed in 2007. The center has become a regular stop for people pass-

Put more simply, glycolysis and frucolysis convert simple sugars into energy."

Insulin is probably the most significant hormone in the metabolism of nutrients or their storage.

Most fats are broken down slowly in the ut via a series of enzyme alled lipases and eventually make their way into the blood stream as free fatty ac ds. Like sugars, once in the boodstream free fatty acids can be used for energy (via enesis) or stored in adipos fatty) tissue for later use," When you adopt a way of ating that limits or omits arbohydrate and includes moderate dietary fat and proper protein intake, you nstruct your metabolism to use fat to produce energy In most cases, the body re quires three to four weeks to enesis and you feel greater mental clarity, robust energ levels and the body begins to use its stored fat more e ficiently. Generally, daily caloric intake is about half of hat consumed in the carb rich Standard American Diet therefore, less fat is stored. In summary, your metabo lism will adapt to the type of fuel you most frequently in oft eating will stall the burn ing of fat for energy and trig ger insulin for fat storage. If carbs are limited to less than 50 grams (about 2 ounces) per day, the body becomes at-adapted and functions in state of ketogenesis.
"The body is remarkably good at not being wasteful and will decrease production of fat metabolism enzymes when they are used infre quently. ... insulin specificaergy by inhibiting the release of glucagon, a hormone that glucagon, a hormone that hus directly competes with insulin."

Sen. Carlos Uresti indicted on fraud, bribery charges

State Sen. Carlos Ures t, accused of misleading former client who invested in a company in which Ures-

ti has a financial stake, was indicted on May 17 by a fed eral grand jury on 11 charg es over his involvement in the alleged investment Ponzi scheme, and he also faces a separate indictment alleging bribery surrounding a gov ernment contract.
In the first indict ment, the federal grand jutonio Democrat who repre sents Crockett County, with 11 counts of wrongdoing over his complicated saga in volving a now-bankrupt company. The company, FourWinds Logistics, purported
to sell sand used in hydraulic fracturing, a process that lic fracturing, a process that
extracts oil and gas from shale rock, but has been accused of misleading inves tors and grossly misspending funds. The grand jury in dicted Uresti on one count of conspiracy to commit wire fraud; one count of conspirdering; five substantive dering; five substantive
counts of wire fraud; two counts of securities fraud one count of engaging in monetary transactions with property derived from spec ified unlawful activity; and one count of being an unreg
istered securities broker istered securities broker.
A separate indictmen centered on a contract to provide medical services to a correctional facility in West Texas. That indictment alleges that a colleague of Uresti's, Vernon C. Farthing III, paid Uresti $\$ 10,000$ per month as a marketing con
sultant and that half of the money was given to on un specified Reeves County of ficial to win over his vote to award the contract to Farthing's company. It was the culmination of a 10-year scheme to commit bribery and money laundering, pros ecutors argued.
Uresti said he would plea not guilty to the charges.
"I am hard at work re resenting District 19 in the 85th Legislative Session," he
