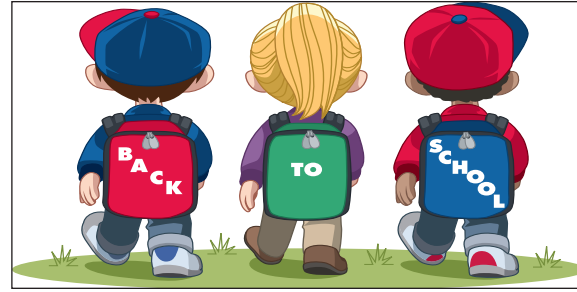

## Congressman makes stop in Ozona

When it comes to being faced with opposition, Will Hurd has two words for his challengers: "good luck."

Last week, the Republican Congressman traveled across his district making 20 stops for this third annual "DC2DQ" event. He stopped at Ozona's Dairy Queen on Aug. 9, where he was met with local and area citizens.

This was Hurd's second visit this year to Ozona. He attended and spoke at the local Memorial Day ceremony in May.

While President Trump's name was not mentioned by Hurd during the visit, the Congressman did talk about using technology to create a "smart wall" instead of building an expensive physical concrete wall as proposed by Trump.

"It's 2017 and we haven't been able to get operational control of the border," said Hurd, a former undercover CIA officer and cybersecurity expert. "We haven't been able to get control because we have a one-size-fits-all solution to the border and we are not looking at all 2,000 miles. We should be using technology and man-

power to secure the border." Using technology to create a smart wall would cost \$500,000 per mile, Hurd said. As proposed by the Trump administration, a concrete wall would cost

\$24.5 million per mile, Hurd added. "Building a wall from sea to shining sea is the most expensive and least effective way to do border security," he said.

Hurd has introduced legislation that would create his proposed "smart wall." He has some co-sponsors already lined up in the House

## County judge, road supervisor at odds over equipment funds

Discussion over missing equipment funds dominated the budget workshop portion of Monday's regular commissioners' court meeting.

County Road Supervisor Jeffrey Stuart asked the commissioners about the money in this year's equipment replacement fund. Stuart said money was no longer in the fund.

County Judge Fred Deaton said the money was moved to the road and bridge fund, due to a recommendation from the 2016 Audit completed by Eckert & Company.

The road and bridge budget has a road and bridge fund and an equipment replacement fund. Deaton said the money from the equipment replacement fund was placed into the road and bridge fund.

"What our auditor in San Angelo had told us is to combine the two funds and have one road and bridge reserve fund," Deaton said. "It's an accountability deal."

Deaton pulled up Texas Local Government Code where it states the commissioners' court may spend county funds only in strict compliance with the budget, unless it's an emergency expenditure.

For the equipment replacement fund money, that was moved, to be used the commissioners would have to call a special meeting to approve it, according to the code.

"People are not thinking of the equipment replacement fund as fund balance money,"

Deaton said. "You can't transfer from your reserve fund into your budget without some kind of procedure to do it."

Stuart said he carries money that is not spent from his budget each year and asks for it to be put in the equipment replacement fund in case new equipment, or equipment needing to be repaired, needs to be purchased.

Stuart said he called the county's representative at Eckert & Company and was told the equipment replacement fund was not a problem on the 2016 Audit.

Stuart also said he researched past commissioners' meeting minutes and did not find any record of the commissioners voting on a change to the fund.

"We've just always had the fund," Stuart said. "It needs to be about \$400,000 and it just went away. I think it needs to go back where we can have it tomorrow."

Deaton said the money was put into the road and bridge fund because he felt it was not legal the way it was previously done.

The decision to combine both funds was made last year by the commissioners during budget workshops, Deaton said.

"We've been pulling it out of fund balance without declaring an emergency. It's the commissioners job to put the money where they want to put it. It's the responsibility of the commissioners' court," Deaton said.

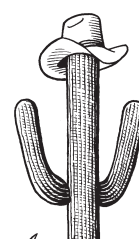
## Six Degrees of Friendship

## Abbott signs 3 bills with few likely to reach his desk in final week

AUSTIN — Three bills reached Gov. Greg Abbott's desk last week, with the 30-day special session of the Texas Legislature set to expire Aug. 16.

Abbott signed all three into law on Aug. 11:

-- Senate Bill 5, increasing criminal penalties for voter fraud, by Kelly Hancock, R-North Richland Hills, and sponsored in the House by Dan Huberty, R-Kingwood;

-- Senate Bill 20, the "sunset bill" that extends the life of the Texas Medical Board and several other health-care-regulating state boards, by Van Taylor, R-Plano, and sponsored in the House by Larry Gonzales, R-Round Rock; and

-- Senate Bill 60, relating to the funding of those revived healthcare boards, also by Taylor and sponsored by Gonzales.

Two more bills headed to the governor for consideration are:

### STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

-- HB 13 by Giovanni Capriglione, R-Southlake, and Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, legislation requiring emergency healthcare providers to report complications from abortions and for the Health and Human Services Commission to publish the data; and

-- HB 214 by John Smithee, R-Amarillo, and Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe, banning abortion coverage through the federal Affordable Care Act and allowing private insurers to offer abortion coverage.

And, in an Aug. 12 weekend session, the House debated and tentatively passed SB 1, legislation lowering the property tax rollback rate and requiring voter approval to increase the rate above the threshold.

The House-amended version differed from the one passed in the Senate, howev-

er, and as of deadline it was unclear whether the two sides could reach a compromise.

With time running out, the House and Senate did concur on amendments to SB 6, a bill to reform municipal annexation, but a municipal annexation reform bill was still unsettled.

Negotiators for both bodies are working toward settlement on that and other bills on the governor's call as the Aug. 16 deadline inches closer.

Racing against the clock are bills that would:

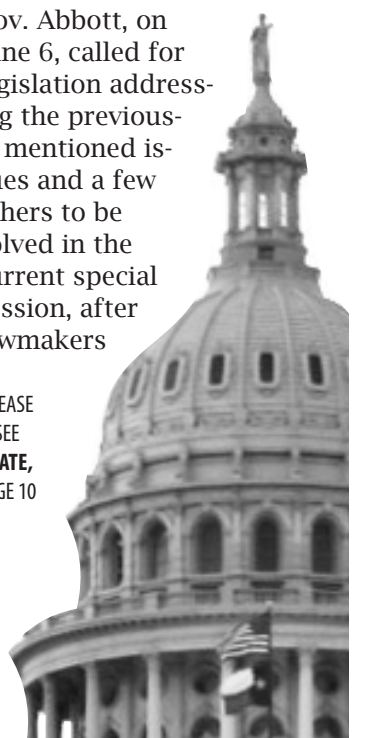
- Increase the average salary and benefits of Texas teachers;
- Provide a more flexible and rewarding salary and benefit system for Texas teachers;
- Establish a spending limit for political subdivisions and curb their power;
- Ban local regulations of the use of hand-held mobile

communication devices while driving; and

-- Ensure action is taken to reduce the maternal mortality rate in Texas.

Gov. Abbott, on June 6, called for legislation addressing the previously mentioned issues and a few others to be solved in the current special session, after lawmakers

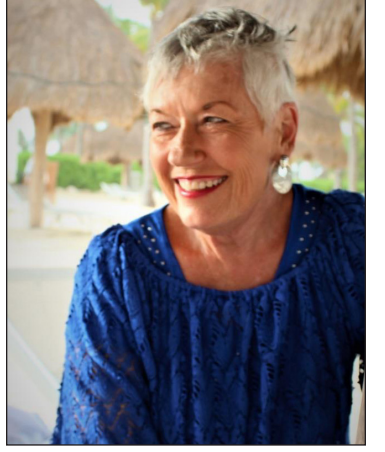

# No Land No water

*Editor's note: The following article is being printed with permission from the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board. The article was part of the statewide campaign for Soil and Water Stewardship Week, April 30-May 7.*

Do you know where your water comes from? Before water can freely flow from our taps at home, it begins as a single raindrop. The instant availability of fresh, clean drinking water flowing from a faucet is easily, and unfortunately, something that we all can take for granted.

The Texas Agricultural Land Trust reminds us of the importance of water, but also the value of stewardship on agricultural working lands with their message of "NO LAND NO WATER™."

Texas farmers, ranchers, and foresters are constantly aware of the significance of this natural resource, and have been working with their local Soil and Water Conservation Districts to voluntarily implement conservation practices that increase the quantity and improve the quality of our water, while conserving water through innovative agricultural practices.

When it rains in Texas, 83 percent of it falls on farms, ranches, and forests. In these areas, the rainfall either infiltrates down into the ground-water, absorbs into the soil, or it runs off into creeks, rivers, and reservoirs.

On the other hand, in urban areas, water cannot absorb into the ground as readily due to impervious barriers such as paved roads, houses, apartments and office buildings. This results in much more runoff, as well as less groundwater flow that prevents our much needed and relied upon aquifers from recharging.

Rural working lands are

crucial to protecting and preserving the water resources of Texas, and our water sustainability depends in large part on the stewardship and conservation of these private lands. These rural lands also provide the scenic landscapes across our state that agricultural producers have managed for wildlife, timber, migratory birds, and even bees and butterflies. These are benefits that all Texans enjoy. Yet, frankly, these are benefits that we rarely pay for.

However, fragmentation, the breaking up and selling of large land parcels, is impacting our land resources, and thus negatively influencing our water resources.

As recent rainfall events have reminded us, the loss of open space and privately-owned working lands can lead to devastating floods due to the loss of permeable cover and the increase of concrete, asphalt, houses, and buildings in urban areas.

"There is too little public recognition of how much we all depend upon farmers as stewards of our soil, water and wildlife resources." - John F. Kennedy

Nevertheless, Texas agricultural producers, with the assistance of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the Texas Agricultural Land Trust, and many other conservation agencies, strive to be good stewards. With proper management, their operations will greatly impact the quality and quantity of drinking water for all Texans.

So where does our water come from? It comes from land stewardship on private working lands. Let's all do our part for a clean and plentiful water resource. Remember, NO LAND NO WATER™. The lands we protect today will sustain our future.

of Representatives and is talking with senators to get the proposal introduced in that side of Congress as well.

Hurd also said the U.S. Border Patrol is behind his "smart wall" proposal.

"It's using taxpayer's money wiser," Hurd said.

Hurd also talked on tax reform, his support anticipation of working with U.S. Rep. Mike Conaway, R-Midland, on the new Farm Bill, the situation in North Korea and his recent bipartisan road trip with Democratic Rep. Beto O'Rourke, a fellow Texan who is challenging Ted Cruz for his Senate seat.

Local citizens were appreciative of Hurd's stop in Ozona.

Abbey Carnes with Ozona Bank recently traveled to Washington D.C. to speak on behalf of the Financial Choice Act, which will help local and community banks. The act has passed the House and now heads to the Senate.

"Our county is a great example of a nationwide bank not being available," Carnes said.

Hurd said if the act doesn't get through the Senate, the House will find other ways to for the legislature to pass.

A group of women from San Antonio with the Texas Democratic Party attended the Ozona event and questioned Hurd's record of voting, arguing that it runs contrary to his image. The women tried to point out that Hurd's votes in line with Trump an overwhelming majority of the time.

Among Democrats' emerging exhibits against Hurd: He

may have voted against the House bill earlier this year to repeal Obamacare — it narrowly passed — but he repeatedly voted for similar efforts under the last president.

When questioned by Mary Suttle, of San Antonio, on his healthcare voting record Hurd repeatedly tried to respond and explain his voting record.

"This time — new bill, new thing — I voted against it. I was the only Republican in Texas that voted against it. I've always said when it comes to health care, you gotta do a couple things: You gotta increase access and decrease cost of health care. And that bill didn't do it, and that's why I voted against it," he said. "I don't make a decision until I know what the piece of legislation is about."

Hurd said 20 Republicans and 20 Democrats are currently working on new healthcare legislation.

"We have a real opportunity to work together and create framework to stabilize the individual market," Hurd said.

Laurie Hale from Crockett National Bank asked Hurd about getting the information he was talking about to the public. She said the media isn't reporting a lot of what Hurd was discussing.

"There are a lot of things that people aren't educated on and what's really going on up there," Hale said.

The Ozona Stockman frequently runs press releases from Hurd's office, as well as his "Hurd on the Hill" column.

Hurd is also a big proponent of social media, having accounts on Twitter, Facebook, Snapchat, Instagram and more,

as well as an email newsletter sent out by his office.

"We try to push out information about what is going on in Washington," he said. "You call us we will respond. We care that we get that information to you guys."

Hurd's district, which spreads from El Paso to San Antonio, has been called the state's only true swing seat because of its record of having both Democratic and Republican representatives.

Former U.S. Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, who represented the district from 2013-2015, unsuccessfully challenged Hurd last year and is now weighing another run for the seat.

Another prominent Demo-

cratic challenger is Gina Ortiz Jones, a former Air Force intelligence officer from San Antonio.

At least two other Democrats are seriously considering a run: Judy Canales, a former Obama appointee from Eagle Pass, and Jay Hulings, a federal prosecutor from San Antonio.

"If somebody thinks they can outwork me, good luck," Hurd said. "It doesn't change what I'm doing. I'm hearing what people are concerned about. I represent those who voted for me and those that didn't."

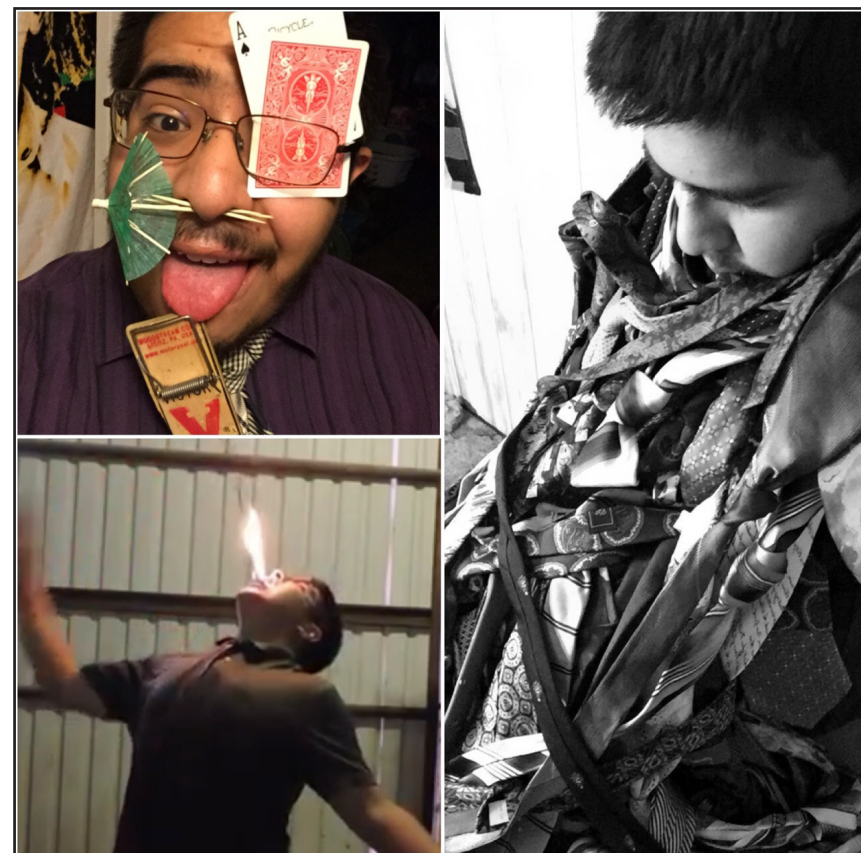

Stuart asked if the money could be put back into his budget due to equipment purchases he was wanting to make this year.

"I could spend all that budget money every year and nothing roll over. I do save it in case we have an emergency. I thought I was doing a good job by not spending all the money.

In the 2018 proposed budget, \$297,140 has been budgeted for the equipment replacement fund. Deaton said this is what he figured Stuart would have left over in 2017 to roll over into 2018.

"We've got to make a decision at our next budget workshop on how much money we want to move from the reserve and put into the budget," Deaton said. "The money is all there and it's all accounted for."

TAX RATES

Crockett County tax rates will remain about the same for next year.

The commissioners approved 2017 tax rates for the county.

The county's general maintenance tax rate will be \$.61489 per \$100 evaluation with an interest and sinking rate of \$.18511 per \$100 evaluation for a total of \$.80. This is the same total rate as last year.

The maintenance tax rate will generate \$8.6 million for the county. The interest and sinking rate will generate the \$2.5 million payment for the jail and wellness center bonds.

The county's road and bridge tax rate will be \$.15231 per \$100 evaluation, which is \$.00231 increase from last year.

EXTENSION OFFICE

Crockett County 4-H Member Taylor Babb gave a presentation on her 2017 Texas 4-H Globe Trip to Costa Rica.

Babb talked about her trip this summer where she lived with a local host family and learned about the culture and people of the country.

Babb said she toured coffee, sugar cane and cocoa farms, a dairy farm, a banana plantation, took a Spanish class, tried a coconut, toured a pepper plantation

where she ate fresh jalapenos, learned traditional dances and went white water rafting.

"Learned about the agriculture and home life compared to the United States. I also learned the importance of conservation and leaving a smaller footprint on the world," Babb said. "I thank my community for supporting me on this trip. I want to do more community service and travel around the world."

HAMPTON INN

The final status of the Texas Community Development Block Grant for the new Hampton Inn was presented.

were unable fulfill his legislative priorities during the 140-day regular session that ended May 29.

JUDGE DISMISSES SUIT

Austin U.S. District Court Judge Sam Sparks on Aug. 9 dismissed as moot Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton's

lawsuit requesting the court to consolidate several lawsuits challenging the constitutionality of SB 4.

Paxton's lawsuit, filed preemptively in support of the legislation widely referred to as the "show me your papers" immigration bill, was passed by the state Legislature and signed into law by Gov. Abbott on May 7.

In a news release, Paxton reacted to Sparks' ruling in Texas and Ken Paxton v. Travis County et al., claiming the ruling by Judge Sparks would have no effect on the merits of SB 4 cases pending in San Antonio courts and that he plans to keep fighting.

Scheduled to take effect Sept. 1, SB 4 requires law enforcement agencies across Texas to detain individuals pursuant to the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's federal detainer program.

In his ruling, Sparks said Paxton does not have standing to bring suit because the law has not taken effect and therefore no violation has occurred.

HEGAR TO SEND REVENUE

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Aug. 9 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$779.2 million in local sales tax allocations for August.

The amount is 1.3 percent more than in August 2016. Allocations are based on sales made in June by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in April, May and June by quarterly filers.

MARK WHITE LAID TO REST

The body of former Gov. Mark White lay in state in the Capitol Rotunda on Aug. 9 and burial followed in the Texas State Cemetery.

White died at age 77 at his home in Houston on Aug. 5. He was the 43rd governor of Texas, serving from 1983 to 1987. He also served as Texas attorney general from 1979 to 1983, and as Texas secretary of state from 1973 to 1977.



**PUBLIC NOTICE TO PARENTS OF CROCKETT CCSD STUDENTS**

The use of corporal punishment is permitted by the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District as a corrective action to certain rules infractions in order to preserve an effective and orderly educational environment. Factors of student size and age, and the physical, mental, and emotional conditions of the student shall be considered before the administration of any corporal punishment. Corporal punishment shall be limited to spanking or paddling and shall be administered only in accordance with the following guidelines: (1) The student will be informed of the reasons(s) for corporal punishment; (2) Corporal punishment may be administered by the teacher, school principal, or assistant principal; (3) The instrument to be used in administering corporal punishment shall be approved by the principal; and, (4) The administration of corporal punishment shall be performed in the principal's office and in the presence of one other professional employee of the district. Parents who object to the use of corporal punishment must submit a written statement of objection to the appropriate campus principal.

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
