Superintendent begins series about \$5 million school bond election

Editor's note: The following is the first in a series of articles about the Nov. 7 CCCCSD \$5 million School Bond Election.

Recently I was a guest at the Ozona Woman's Forum Meeting to speak on facts about the upcoming Bond Election.

The following are questions that were asked at that meeting, and also questions that I have been asked by others in regards to the \$5 million bond proposal.

The proposed bond will be used in three areas, transportation, technology and maintenance.

We will use bond funds in these areas to save money normally spent out of the regular budget, and address the shortfall brought on by the repeal of ASATR (Additional State Aid for Tax Reduction) state funding.

The district plans to:

· Purchase a truck for our Agriculture De-· Maintain computer labs, purchase new

computers and support for all campuses. · Purchase teaching equipment and sup-

plies for student use for all campuses. · Update our Career and Technology class-

es such as Nursing, Food Science and Agricul-· Address maintenance repairs throughout

the district as needed. Continue with the updating of existing teacher housing.

Question: If we pass a bond, can we lower the amount that we pay on M&O Tax?

Answer: Yes we could, but part of the problem that we face now is that our taxes do not generate enough funds to maintain our budget, even with the tremendous cuts we have made in the last three years. Currently we are taking advantage of our low tax rate of \$1.06 on the M&O (maintenance and operation) side. Through a bond we can make up the difference in funds the state is no longer sending

Flu shots still available at Family Health Center

The Family Health Center of Ozona had another successful Flu Shot Kickoff Drive-Thru Clinic last week.

"We gave approximately 300 flu shots, despite the heavy rain," said Susan Bilano, clinic director.

People still needing flu shots can walk into the clinic between 5-6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Children 14 and older, accompanied by a parent or guardian, can get their flu shot by walking in. Children 13 and under will need to make an appointment during clinic hours, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday.


Cost for the flu shot is

\$30 without insurance. Medicaid does not pay for flu shots.

The Texas Department of State Health Services encourages everyone 6 months old and older to get vaccinated now to protect themselves from getting the flu, according to a press release.

"The flu vaccine causes your body to make antibodies to fight influenza, but it takes about two weeks for this to happen. So, it's important to get the flu vaccine early, before influenza hits your community," said Dr. Jennifer Shuford, DSHS Infectious Disease Medical Officer. "By getting the flu vaccine every



Governor applauds TxDOT efforts in removal of hurricane debris

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Sept. 27 announced the Texas Department of Transportation had collected more than 2.4 million cubic feet of debris left behind by Hurricane Harvey in roadways across the four districts hardest hit by the storm.

TxDOT is continuing to assist in the removal of debris from roadsides in Corpus Christi, Houston, Beaumont and a number of areas along the Gulf Coast region, Abbott said in a news release.

"This is a tall order, but I want to assure Texans that TxDOT is up to the challenge and has already made great progress. We will not rest until this important job is finished, and we are working to do so as quickly as possible," he added.

Texas Transportation Commission Chair J. Bruce Bugg Jr. pointed to TxDOT's "remarkable progress" in bringing agency employees from across Texas to impacted areas. He made special mention of those working through the protracted cleanup while "dealing with their own personal losses" caused by Hurricane Harvey.

More than 600 employees from all 25 TxDOT districts are involved in debris removal in areas impacted by Hurricane Harvey, Bugg said. Patrick assigns tasks

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick on Sept. 28 issued a list of interim legislative charges to certain committees of the Texas Senate.

Patrick called for the committees on Agriculture, Water and Rural Affairs, Business & Commerce, Education, Finance, Health and Human Services, Intergovernmental Relations, and State Affairs to study and make recommendations on a wide range of issues related to hurricanes and other severe weather events.

TEXANS ARE NOMINATED

The White House on Sept. 28 announced President Donald Trump's nomination of Texas Supreme Court Justice Don Willett and former Texas Solicitor General James Ho to the New Orleans-based United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

The Fifth Circuit hears cases on appeal from federal district courts in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and the Panama Canal Zone. It is authorized to have 17 active judges.

Gov. Abbott on Sept. 28 released the following statement: "The nominations of Don Willett and James Ho to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals are outstanding choices by President Trump. As Texas attorney general, I had the pleasure of working with both Don and James and can attest to their brilliance as lawyers

and their unwavering commitment to the rule of law. I look forward to their swift approval by the U.S. Senate and to their service on the 5th Circuit, where I know they will uphold the Constitution." **ABBOTT POSTS**

Museum annual meeting features Deaton Stage Line

The Crockett County Museum had their annual Membership Drive and Meeting on Sept. 26 at the Civic Center.

Guest speaker was County Judge Fred Deaton who spoke on the Deaton Stage Line that ran from Comstock, Juno and Ozona from 1888-

Deaton showed photos of newspaper clippings with the schedule of the line, as well as family photos and a map of the line that ran from Comstock up to Ozona.

Historical photos showing stops on the line, including the Kirkpatrick Hotel in Ozona, as well as photos various wagons and hacks that were used, were part of Deaton's presentation.

Deaton said the line kept a herd of 40 or 50 horses to run the stage line. The line carried wool and mohair back to Comstock.

George K. Deaton sold the stage line in 1910. He was 57 years old.

"I am sure that the rough rides were hard on his body," Fred Deaton said.

In 1911, the Santa Fe Railroad extended it's tracks to Barnhart.


The event also had a drawing for a Crockett County blanket, which was won by Raymond Hernandez.





year, you can help protect yourself from influenza, and thereby prevent spreading it to vulnerable people in your family or community."

It is especially important for people with chronic health conditions, pregnant women, young children, older adults, and the people who live with them to get vaccinated in order to minimize the risk of developing serious complications from the flu. Family members and others around babies should get vaccinated to protect the babies and themselves since infants under 6 months of age cannot get vaccinated, the release stated.

Influenza is an illness caused by one of a number of related viruses. Symptoms usually start suddenly and include fever, body aches, chills, a dry cough, sore throat, runny nose, headaches and extreme fatigue and can last a week or longer. It is important to note that not all flu sufferers will have a fever.

People can help stop the spread of illness and reduce their chance of catching the flu by getting vaccinated, washing hands frequently, covering coughs and sneezes and staying home if they're

flu vaccines this All season are made to pro-

gan/45/2015 (H1N1), A/Hong Kong/4801/2014 (H3N2) and B/Brisbane/60/2008 (B/ Victoria lineage). Some vaccines include an additional vaccine virus strain, B/ Phuket/3073/2013 (B/Yamagata lineage).

The CDC advises against the use of the live attenuated influenza vaccine, commonly called the "nasal spray" vaccine and sold under the trade name FluMist. Research from prior flu seasons measured no protective benefit.

People can contact their

health care provider, local health department, local pharmacy or use the Vaccine Finder at TexasFlu.org to find out where flu shots are available.


If people are experiencing flu symptoms, health officials encourage them to seek treatment promptly. Antiviral drugs may help shorten the duration or lessen the severity of the flu if started within 48 hours of the onset of symptoms.



us while keeping our taxes low. In essence we control our own tax rate through a bond, without sending those bond funds back to the state. Remember, 100 percent of bond money stays in Crockett County Schools and is not affected by Robin Hood.

Question: How long do we have to spend the bond

Answer: We have 10 years to spend bond funds. Many people think that we only have one year to use the funds and that we are in a rush to spend it. Although we will not take 10 years to spend the money, it is nice to know that we can use the money as needed for the projects listed.

Question: Will teachers and staff get a raise?

Answer: Unfortunately we cannot use bond funds for salaries or utilities. However the money that we save in the regular budget due to bond funds could be used for that purpose. The goal of the CCCCSD Board of Trustees is to make sure our teachers receive a competitive salary. Not only that, we are one of the few districts around that pay a majority of employees' health insurance. That is a huge benefit to our teachers and staff.

Question: Why do we

need an Ag Truck? Answer: Our Ag teacher has done an excellent job in growing our Ag program. Our kids are now building projects and entering competi-

new trucks all over the US and Canada.

tions with those projects. We need a truck that can haul a trailer with those projects to competitions. Some people may not know this but there is tremendous potential in scholarships for students in 4-H, FFA and Ag Metals, and our kids are starting to see success in this area.

Question: If we are a "rich" school district, why do we need a bond?

Answer: Because of the "Robin Hood" plan, Crockett County Schools has to send back money to assist other schools. We send back about 56 percent of the tax money raised in Crockett County. Most "rich" school districts pass a bond every two-three years to avoid sending money back to the state. Those schools rely on bond issues to address transportation, maintenance and technology.

I want to make this clear, any money raised by a bond issue stays in Ozona. That means 100 percent of the \$5 million would stay here to be used for our kids and not sent back to the state.

Question: My parents are on a fixed income and have always supported CCCCSD.

Will their taxes go up due to the bond?

Answer: All of the rules and exemptions of the Homestead Exemption and the over 65 Exemption are still in effect if the bond passes. This means that those with these exemptions will not see a change in their exemptions. Taxpayers that are 65 and over will not have their taxes go above the frozen levy amount/ceiling that was established whenever the Over 65 exemption was granted. Tuesday is voter registration deadline for November election

The last day to register to vote in the upcoming Nov. 7 Constitutional Amendment Elections is Tuesday, Oct. 10.

Crockett County Voters can register to vote at the county tax office in the courthouse annex.

CCCCSD is one of more than 400 school districts statewide that have signed a pledge to participate in the Texas Secretary of State Office's High School Voter Registration Initiative to make sure voter registration applications are distributed to all eligible students.

Along with the seven state propositions on the ballots, Crockett County Voters will be deciding on a \$5 million school bond.

Early voting will run Oct. 23-Nov. 3.

The Texas Secretary of State's Office reminds voters who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain a form of approved photo ID that they now have additional options when voting in person.

Those who do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID may vote by (1) signing a declaration at the polls explaining why they are reasonably unable to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID and (2) providing one of various forms of supporting documentation such as a utility bill or a voter registration certificate.

The seven forms of approved photo ID are:

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New Texas law criminalizes drone use near animal farms, telecommunication and certain oil and gas facilities

David Mimlitch was on his lunch break in 2011, flipping through the 606 aerial photos he had just taken with a drone outside Dallas, when he noticed something strange: a creek stained scarlet with blood.

"That's blood. Surely that can't be right, surely that can't be legal," Mimlitch remembers thinking.

It was pig blood. Authorities quickly traced the the waste back to Columbia Meat Packing Company, then a Dallas-area slaughterhouse and meat packing facility. A grand jury indicted the company and two executives on 18 counts, which were later dropped, and Columbia shuttered its slaughterhouse. It eventually reopened as a stand-alone meat packing facility.

Mimlitch never set out to uncover the pig waste he enjoys documenting the progress of large infrastructure projects in Dallas — and he doesn't count himself as much of an activist. But he and others worry that a new Texas law could restrict the ability of hobbyists, journalists and activists from using drones to make observations like the one Mimlitch did.

House Bill 1643, which went into effect Sept. 1, makes it a crime to operate a drone over "concentrated animal feeding operations," as well as telecommunication facilities and certain oil and gas facilities. It also bars Texas cities and towns from making their own rules regulating drone usage — a measure that has become controversial in its own right.

While the Columbia Packing facility may not classify as a "concentrated feeding operation." Mimlitch said the law strikes him as an attempt to protect companies from unfriendly eyes in the sky.

"Texas is trying to protect the businesses from prying eyes, from being vetted,' he said.

But proponents of the law see it differently. To them, drones pose a threat to agriculture across the state. As the technology develops, some fear the unmanned aircraft could be used to nefarious ends, like poisoning livestock or knocking out power lines.

State Rep. Drew Springer, R-Muenster, one of the authors of the legislation, said he was concerned about drones being used to infect cattle with footand-mouth disease.

"That disease could be spread through drones very easily and that is a massive fear for the economy of Texas, for the food supply in Texas, and really all of the United States," he said.

While he couldn't point to an example of a specific threat or complaint about spreading diseases through drones, he said "that was the natural next step if you look at security risks that would be anticipated."

"There are people who disagree with eating domesticated animals and they will stop

at nothing to make sure nobody else can do that," Spring-

Opponents of the bill are skeptical of the threat that drones pose to the facilities and argue that many of the activities it seeks to prevent — like poisoning the national food supply — are already considered crimes in Texas.

"It would be an act of terrorism," Judith McGeary, the executive director of the Farm and Ranch Freedom Alliance, said. "There'd be multiple felonies that could be brought, the idea that a class B misdemeanor for flying the drone is how you're going to stop that kind of action is absurd."

McGeary said she fears that the law targets academics and other researchers who want to shed light on practices in the agriculture industry. Still, though, she said she doesn't know of any academics using the technology to conduct that kind of research.

ctor of EFF-Austin, a technology advocacy group, said that the new law prevents people from taking advantage of drones in the future.

"Instead of adapting to these new technologies like committee, wrote to Abbott.

drones, Texas is restricting the people we want using them." he said. "We want to promote free speech and research. Drone enthusiasts are going to be penalized by this bill."

But Josh Winegarner, the director of government relations for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, said that ranchers often cooperate with outside researchers.

"We cooperate with universities, we've done a lot of stuff with journalists," he said, adding that hiding the facilities from public view was "not an intent behind the bill."

Concerns about the bill extend beyond the bovine. The Texas Association of School Boards, the Texas Municipal League, and the City of Plano all sent letters to Gov. Greg Abbott asking him to veto the legislation. They each argued that the law's new rules limiting local control over drone usage would have detrimental effects.

"The bill's requirements Josh Cohn, the political di- would hinder school districts' ability to quickly respond to safety and privacy risks to our students and communities," Jim de Garavilla, chairman of the Texas Association of School Boards' legislative

"Schools cannot rely on existing federal and state laws to address all of the safety and privacy risks."

Springer said that provision was intended to help companies experimenting with drone delivery. Cities and towns will still be able to regulate drone usage in some scenarios, like special events.

"We're trying to find that fine balance between public safety and still allowing commercial development of the technology," he said. "Those groups — whether it's Google or Amazon or anybody else that is looking at drone delivery systems - were worried about a patchwork quilt of regulations that would have prevented them from going forward with that technology."




