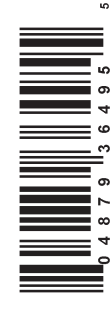

Superintendent breaks down school funds

The most recent Legislative Session was not friendly to schools in the State of Texas. A long overdue replacement or overhaul of the School State Funding Formula by our Legislature did not take place. From 2008 to 2017 the state has lowered their percentage of contribution to schools, yet increased regulation over the schools.

	2008	2017	increase/decrease
State Share of Funding Education	45%	38%	Decreased by 7%
Local Share of Funding Education	45%	51%	Increased by 6%
Federal Govt. Share of Funding	10%	11%	Increased by 1%

Combine the state lowering their share of funding along with the loss of ASATR State Funding, and we are faced with raising taxes to support our schools.

Another fact regarding state funding, in 1994 the Robin Hood "contribution" from "rich" school districts like CCCSD has grown to over a billion and a half dollars each year. That is a huge amount of M&O tax money that gets sent back. It is no wonder why a majority of districts across the state have decided to pass bonds to raise money for their schools rather than just taxes on the M&O side. We do not need to send any more money to the state than we have to.

An I&S Tax Bond keeps 100 percent of tax funds in Ozona for CCCSD students.

Commissioners discuss speed bumps at Quail Run

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court discussed speed bumps at Quail Run during Monday's regular meeting.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga wanted to discuss the item because the bumps were placed at Quail Run without being brought to commissioners' court by Commissioner Eligio Martinez.

Martinez oversees Precinct 4, which includes Quail Run. Martinez was absent from Monday's meeting.

County Attorney Jody Upham said she researched the placement of speed bumps on county road and said a Texas Attorney General's opinion stated that they can be installed, but the county has to get permission from the Texas Department of Transportation.

"So, it doesn't matter where the street is, TxDOT still has to give us approval?" Tambunga said.

Upham said that is what the attorney general's opinion stated, which was written 17 years ago, but that nothing more recent had been issued. She

also said there was not a set of standards in the TxDOT manual.

Tambunga said he didn't mind that the speed bumps were at Quail Run, just that Martinez should have gone through commissioners' court before installing them.

Tambunga said he talked to Martinez and told him what he did was illegal.

"I've been trying to put speed bumps in my precinct. You need to go through the right channels," Tambunga said. "I don't mind helping out people, but we need to do it the right way."

County Judge Fred Deaton asked Upham about having the correct speed limit with the speed bumps. Currently there is a 20 mph speed limit with the speed bumps at Quail Run, which Deaton said is too fast.

Upham said there was nothing in the TxDOT manual about specific speed limits for speed bumps.

"That's why you have to request permission and they (TxDOT) come down and look at it to figure out the speed limit. It's a case by case basis," Upham said.

Lions edge out Angoras

ROCKSPRINGS - The Ozona Lions came back with a couple of fourth quarter touchdowns to defeat the Angoras, 34-20, Friday night.

The Lions led as much as 20-6 in third quarter, but Rocksprings rallied back tying the game 20-20 with 3:45 left in the third.

Ozona regained control scoring twice in the fourth quarter to pull away for the win.

"We played well at times and moved the ball easily most of the time, but we had too many penalty yards," said Athletic Director and Coach Kyle Freeman. "We were in long yardage situations too much because of it. It was a good win, but we did not play well overall this week."

Quarterback Alec Lara was 12-15 passing for 224 yards, including two touchdowns and 41 yards rushing for one touchdown.

Licensing products, process and gain rewards

Entrepreneurs who are developing a product (product or process) for commercialization basically have two choices to get their product to the marketplace; manufacture it themselves or license the right to make and distribute to someone else. This process is called licensing out. A license, through a licensing agreement, is a formal granting of the rights to make and sell to another party, who is called a licensing partner. The entrepreneur, or licensor, is usually paid in up-front fees and on-

going royalty payments. Licensing offers a way to reduce capital investment by selling the rights to those who are in the business of manufacturing, selling and distributing. In addition, an entrepreneur who develops a product may

not have the expertise to manufacture and take it to market. Licensing provides a way to develop the product and has experts in these areas do the rest. The chances of success and gaining wealth from the development of a product are greater if you allow experts with manufacturing plants, sales forces, and well developed distribution systems handle taking the product to market. Licensing can also be used to expand into markets where one has little knowledge or experience. For example, I know

of a firm developing a medical device. They will manufacture, sell and distribute the device themselves here in the U.S. However to expand to other countries, the firm will license the rights to licensing partners to make and distribute the product in a particular country, and gain additional revenue without having to invest a large amount of money. In the future, when the licensing agreement runs out, the firm may decide to develop the capabilities themselves if they then have the capital and ex-

pertise to do so. Experts say licensing is not an easy task, and an entrepreneur needs to develop a licensing strategy or plan of action. Visiting with an attorney experienced in licensing is your first step. They can help develop a licensing strategy, negotiate a licensing agreement, and help research and select a licensing partner. In addition, they can help secure your intellectual property through patents. The SBDC can also assist. We have the resources to help en-

trepreneurs with market and industry analysis for any purpose. So if you have developed a product, and have a working prototype, you should explore licensing as a way of getting the product to market in a less expensive way. If you find the right licensing partner, you may be able to reap the rewards through royalties.

New laws on the books

After a long, five-month legislative session in the spring, and an August, 30-day special session this summer, there are several new laws on the books that went into effect on September 1. Here is a brief run-down of a few of the new state laws which are currently in force:

NO TEXTING AND DRIVING

Effective immediately, reading, writing or sending a text while driving a moving vehicle is against the law. There are exceptions for using a GPS device for directions, and hands-free devices are not impacted by this legislation, but those stopped for this violation for the first time can face fines up to \$99. Repeat offenders will be on the hook for as much as \$200. As we've seen right here in our district, distracted driving can be fatal, so play it safe and handle those text messages once you reach your destination.

LOWER FEES FOR HANDGUN LICENSES

Until recently, Texas had one of the highest fees in the nation to obtain a handgun license. To bring Texas more in line with other states, we decreased the fee for a first-time license from \$140 to \$40, and the renewal cost will also drop from \$70 to \$40. Additionally, licensed peace officers and members of the military will have their fees waived entirely.

STANDING WITH POLICE

The penalty for assaulting a police officer is now increased to a second-degree felony as it is considered a hate crime. In recent years, our law enforcement officials have become targets and have been ambushed across the state, including an attack in Dallas last year that left six Dallas officers dead, and one in San Antonio near San Antonio College.

HUNTING FROM THE AIR

In our ongoing effort to get a handle on the growing populations of feral hogs, coyotes and other nuisances to farmers and ranchers, we passed a new law to allow folks to hunt

these animals from hot air balloons. You do need a permit from Texas Parks and Wildlife before taking to the sky, to eradicate a growing nuisance from our properties.

RESTRICTIONS ON DRONES

Flying a drone aircraft over a prison can now cost the drone operator up to \$2,000 just for the first offense. This law was written in response to growing concerns within the law enforcement community that drones are being used to drop drugs, weapons and other contraband into correctional institutions. There are numerous examples in other states of this occurring, so it is a pre-emptive effort to keep contraband out of prisons and to keep our correctional officers safe.

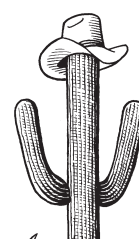
PENALTIES FOR CYBERBULLYING

It is now a misdemeanor to electronically harass or bully a minor with the intent of causing them to harm themselves or commit suicide. The new law, also known as "David's Law" for the young man in Alamo Heights who killed himself last year after a string of cyberbullying attacks, requires schools to notify parents within twenty-four hours if there child has been bullied or is accused of bullying others. Once again, we have seen the unfortunate consequence of unchecked bullying right here in our district, so hopefully this law will keep teachers and administrators more on-alert for this kind of behavior.

Abbott, Texas delegation ask Congress for hurricane relief funds

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott and members of Lone Star State's congressional delegation last week signed a letter seeking \$18.7 billion in Texas-specific Hurricane Harvey relief and recovery funding in the next federal supplemental appropriations bill.

Meanwhile, the Texas Department of Emergency Management Commission is working with county judges and mayors to secure funding and resources requested by those local officials.

John Sharp, who heads the commission, testified along with other state officials before the Texas House Appropriations Committee at a meeting in Houston last week examining recovery costs. In his testimony, Sharp urged officials in Harris County and other hurricane-stricken counties to submit the FEMA-required Request for Public Assistance forms by Oct. 31. Sharp speculated that the \$140 billion early estimate

of Hurricane Harvey recovery costs would be turn out to be low.

REVENUE TOTAL INCREASES
Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Oct. 5 announced state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.36 billion in September, an amount 10.4 percent more than collected in September 2016.

"The double-digit growth in sales tax revenue was due to increased spending in the oil and natural gas related sectors," Hegar said. "But moderate growth was evident in sectors fueled primarily by consumer spending, including retail trade and telecommunications services."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in September 2017 is up 5.5 percent compared to the same period a year ago, Hegar added.

AG OPINES ON NALOXONE

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Oct. 4 released his official opinion that under the Texas Health and Safety Code, law enforcement agencies in Texas are authorized to receive prescriptions of naloxone, a drug to treat opioid overdoses.

The opinion, written in response to an inquiry by the Texas Medical Board, says that a state law passed in 2015 permits the prescription and dispensing of an opioid antagonist to persons at risk of experiencing an overdose, along with any person in a position to assist in an overdose emergency.

Paxton said the Legislature "made clear its intent that the law authorizes both individuals and law enforcement agencies to obtain opioid antagonists by prescription."

TXDOT CAMPAIGN BEGINS

The Texas Department of Transportation on Oct. 5 rolled out its "Plan While You Can" sober-ride campaign with football season in full swing.

"Football is big in Texas and while fans make plans to attend games, watch parties and tailgating events, we also

Lemon pepper chicken, smothered cabbage, carrots, bread, bread pudding with lemon sauce and milk.

There are no essential carbohydrates

Yes, contrary to popular belief, there is no such thing as an essential carbohydrate. The human body can live and thrive throughout its lifespan and never have to consume a single carbohydrate. Not so, regarding fat and protein nutrients... we would soon expire without them in our diet. As a matter of fact, the human organism can produce what little carbohydrate it uses from lactic acid, glycogen and proteins, in a demand-driven process called gluconeogenesis.

Carbohydrate is defined as any of various neutral compounds of carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen (such as sugars, starches, and celluloses) most of which are formed by green plants and which constitute a major class of animal foods. You might say, "carbohydrate is the food our food eats."

So, what are the absolute essential nutrients necessary for human survival and health?

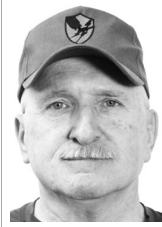
They are amino acids, fatty acids, electrolytes, vitamins, minerals, water and energy.

As you may have already determined, energy generates and dominates an overwhelming majority of the controversy and conflict concerning nutrition. Very little focus is placed on the nutritional value of the nutrients for all cell repair and activity, and body processes. Disconcerting is that what we think we know, is not defined by science but by personal agendas, myth and dogma that ranges from political and ideological, to absolute absurdity.

Now, almost all the credible biological and medical biochemistry literature support the fact: "the human body has no dietary requirement for carbohydrates." - Denise R. Ferrier PhD, Biochemist.

You can live long and prosper without sugar, grains, starches and dairy.

"The great enemy of truth is very often not the lie - de-

liberate, contrived and dishonest - but the myth - persistent, persuasive and unrealistic. Too often we hold fast to the clichés of our forebears. We subject all facts to a prefabricated

set of interpretations. We enjoy the comfort of opinion without the discomfort of thought." - John F. Kennedy, in the Commencement Address at Yale University, June 11, 1962

We benefit the most from carbohydrates indirectly, by way of the essential ecological functions of ruminants; the domesticated cattle, sheep, goats and other ruminants that comprise the animal products in our routine ways of eating.

The anaerobic microbial fermentation of grasses and grains, inedible by humans, convert structural and non-structural carbohydrates into fat and plant "protein" and non-protein nitrogen into high quality animal protein that we consume.

The ruminant's digestion processes reduce unstable polyunsaturated fatty acids to monounsaturated and stable saturated fatty acids. Animals produce B12 and other vitamins in their flesh for our consumption and increase the bio-availability of essential minerals.

Further, ruminants' natural growth processes degrade the potency of the malnutrients in plant components (i.e. phytates) in the production of their flesh. They also maintain the health of grassland savannahs and regulate nutrient quality to build soil health... and the list goes on.

"For years the idea of the body "requiring" sugar and carbohydrate for energy has permeated our society. This

belief has likely contributed in a major way to the epidemic rise in obesity, Type II Diabetes, heart conditions, metabolic issues, autoimmune conditions, and others as society has embraced the fallacy that eating up to 50% (or more) of their total caloric allotment per day must come from carbohydrates." - Dr. Mark Sherwood, ND; author of "Are carbohydrates essential?"

The word seems to be finally getting around and the experts seem to be catching on to the mistakes made with excess carbohydrates. In 2014, World Health Organization (WHO) dropped its sugar intake recommendations from 10 percent of your daily calorie intake to 5 percent. We have a long way to go, however; the actual intake should be 1 percent or less or caloric intake.

It is the refined and simple carbohydrates which should be avoided. Complex carbohydrates (and foods in general) that are rich in the essentials listed above should be included in our ways of eating. These foods consist of regular portions of certain vegetables and occasional fruits.

However, avoid all processed foods, sugars, and artificial sweeteners. They are all pro-inflammatory and responsible for heart disease, diabetes, and many metabolic diseases and disorders.

Last, but not least, don't buy in to the lie. Too much sugar and too many processed foods will kill you. Adopting the principles of a healthy lifestyle and being your own health advocate is key in navigating your personal health and wellness journey and reaching your personal destination.

Upham said the commissioners could vote to remove the speed bumps or approve the speed bumps pending TxDOT approval or modification.

Commissioner Wesley Bean said it would probably be best for the county to remove the speed bumps right now due to liability.

The commissioners approved to remove the speed bumps at Quail Run and then approved to install speed bumps in accordance with TxDOT's approval.

After the meeting, the Stockman contacted Martinez who said he has spoken to TxDOT officials about the attorney general's opinion and that it is not a matter of law and that TxDOT does not have anything to do with county roads.

Martinez also said he also received the same information from officials from the Texas Association of Counties.

Any further action on the speed bumps is pending due to a letter needed from TxDOT officials, Martinez said.

IT POINT OF CONTACT

The commissioners approved making Eddie Martin the central point of contact for all county information technology (IT) issues.

Martin said he believes the county needs somebody to review all technology contracts, as well as be a central point of contact for the county.

Tambunga said as technology increases he agrees

that the county is going to need someone to oversee the county's needs.

This is an increase of over \$1.45 billion M&O tax dollars sent back to the state each year.

This is the main reason that we have turned to our voters for a bond issue. Taxes must be increased to support our schools. We know that we can maximize any tax generated funds by placing that tax on the I&S side. 100 percent of funds raised in a bond stays in the community and is not sent back to the state through Robin Hood.

Surrounding communities have passed similar bonds to support their schools. Some schools have to send money back through Robin Hood and some don't. The following are School Tax Rates in other communities. One item to note is that we currently have one of the lowest tax rates in the area, and if the Bond were to pass (\$1.20 total), we would continue to be in the bottom 1/3 of those schools listed.

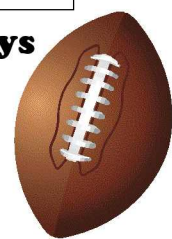
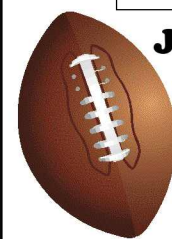

Commissioners, school board enter wind farm negotiations

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court and the Crockett County CCSD School Board entered into preliminary negotiations on an agreement for a wind farm in Crockett County.

At Monday's regular meeting, the commissioners approved to hire the firm of Westel, Carmichael & Allen LLP to establish guidelines and criteria for Crockett County for negotiation of a tax abatement agreement with Rancho Wind Farm LLC.

Rancho Wind Farm LLC is proposing to construct, operate and maintain a wind electric generating facility, which will have an operating capacity of around 250 megawatts located on 30,000 acres in northwest Crockett County, according to a letter presented by Cummings Westlake LLC, the firm that represents Rancho Wind Farm.

Rancho Wind is currently designed with around 100 of the 2.5 megawatts GE turbines being a net nameplate capacity of 250 megawatts, the letter stated.

Rancho Wind is asking

the county for 100 percent tax abatement for 10 years.

Construction is expected to begin late 2018 and be completed in late 2019. During peak construction, the project estimates there will be 250 temporary construction workers on site. Once the project is operational there will be seven permanent employees, the letter stated.

The project is being run through Scout Clean Energy out of Boulder, Colo.

At a special meeting Monday, the school board approved to accept an application for a Value Limitation Agreement from Rancho Wind Farm LLC pursuant to Chapter 313 of the Texas Property Code, authorize the superintendent to review the application for completeness and submit the application to the Texas Comptroller, and authorize the superintendent to approve any request for extension of the deadline for board action beyond the 150-day board review period as may be required.

The board also approved to retain Powell & Leon LLP and Jigsaw Consulting to assist in the application. Ryan Bean abstained from voting on both motions due to a conflict of interest
