Nationwide crackdown on student loan scams

Student loans affect more than 44 million Americans and total more than \$1.3 trillion in debt. In 2016, the average student owed \$37,172, making these loans a potentially huge financial burden to many. That's according to a report released earlier this year by Forbes. Unfortunately, the prevalence of student loan debt provides scammers the opportunity to take advantage of current and former students.

To crack down on these student loan scams, the Federal Trade Commission has

launched a new, nationwide effort along with 11 states, including Texas. It is called Operation Game of Loans and is the first coordinated effort between federal and state authorities targeting these types of

The FTC says, over a number of years, the alleged scammers charged more than \$95 million in illegal upfront fees, falsely promised to help reduce or forgive student loan debt burdens and pretended to be affiliated with government entities. The agency says these acts are in violation of the FTC's Telemarketing Sales Rule and the FTC Act.

Since 2016, BBB Scam Tracker received 447 reports of student loan related scams nationwide.

To avoid these types of

scams, BBB advises current and former student loan holders to follow these tips:

 Never pay upfront fees. Avoid deceptive phrases like, "We do the work for a fee." Real lenders will take a percentage once their service is complete and will never demand a fee upfront.

· Never give a third-party power of attorney. Don't sign anything giving a company the power to negotiate on your behalf. A fake company can use this to take control over your loans.

· Do your research and ask questions. Check to see how long the company or lender has been in business and ask questions such as: does the lender appear to be well-established? Are they pushing you to make a fast decision? Remember, don't give out any personal information, including your Social Security number, to unfamiliar parties.

· Know your options. If you are having trouble paying back your student loans, contact your lender directly to discuss ways to make it easier to repay your debt. Options may include making lower payments or suspending loan repayments for a while. It is also important to remember that, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Any company that promises to completely erase your debt is likely a scam.

Just as America is doing, the cattle industry is separating itself into two classes: the HAVES and HAVE-NOTS. According to the USDA, 57 percent of American ranchers have less than 20 cows and the average herd is only 42 head. But it's the ranches with over 500 cows that produce most of our beef. Going all the way back to the Johnson County Wars, the beef cattle business always has been about the BIG against the small; the HAVES versus the HAVE-NOTS.

HAVE lives in a house that's been in the family for five generations; HAVE-NOT lives in a double wide. HAVE-NOT pulls an antique two horse trailer behind a 1982 two door Chevy. HAVE loads his \$10,000 Quarter Horse into 24 foot Goosenecks® pulled by a 2014 Ford F350. HAVE-NOT'S remuda consists of a 25 year old kid's horse or a young and crazy BLM adoptee.

HAVE'S highly bred cattle are worked in a hydraulic squeeze chute in a building that's bigger than HAVE-NOT'S house. HAVE'S working facilities were designed by Temple Grandin, the barbed wire is still shiny on his five wire fences that were built with the aid of a gas powered post driver. HAVE-NOT'S fences were built with the aid of an illegal. His squeeze chute is made from two old dairy stanchions and the loose wire hanging on their fences is Glidden Winner, patent 1874.

HAVE cowboys live in a bunkhouse. HAVE-NOT has a doghouse. The great debate in HAVE'S bunkhouse is whether a Bud Box or a sweep tub is best. The big

cows bought cheap at the Junker Jamboree. HAVE-NOT'S cows are impregnated by one of the uncastrated calves following them around like ducks in a row, or they fail to conceive. Again. HAVE-NOT's herd improvement program consisted of buying

in the Thrifty Nickel for \$1,200 apiece. HAVE has no calving trouble because only low calving ease EPD bulls are used and only heifers with wide pelvises are kept. HAVE-NOT doesn't have any calving trouble either, at least that he's aware of. HAVE NOT fertilizes his pastures by leaving carcasses where they lay while HAVE actually buys fertilizer. The last time HAVE-NOT'S pastures were reseeded was when the Forest Service mixed seed with the borate they dropped on a brush fire of suspicious origin.

HAVE'S calves weigh 775 at eight months and are organic, natural, NHTC, nonantibiotic, grass fed, and qualify for all the programs. HAVE-NOT'S aren't treated either. At all. For anything. HAVE aims for Certified Angus Beef but all the initials CAB mean to HAVE-NOT is who to call when he's had one too many. HAVE collects carcass data and uses artificial insemination. To HAVE-NOT the initials AI are the nickname of Allan Iverson. The only thing HAVE-NOT collects are the skulls that litter his pastures.

HAVE was Cattleman of the Year, is on his or her alumni advisory committee, sits on the Fair Board, Farm Credit, and two bank boards. HAVE-NOT went to the fair but never to college, hasn't paid back Farm Credit and has been denied a credit card by several banks. The HAVES own private land and have wolves but no snakes of the zoologic or BLM variety. They are diversified and may own oil wells, wind farms, solar installations or any combination of the three. HAVE NOT leases his ground, buys his oil by the quart, has a sunny disposition but can be windy.

Mr. HAVE is married to a wonderful woman who keeps all the records, pays the bills, anchors their team roping team, cooks for the main house and the bunkhouse, and come branding time can be seen holding a baby or grandbaby in one hand with a syringe in the other. Mr. HAVE-NOT also has a wonderful wife who does all of the above, in addition to teaching school. If the wife left either HAVE or HAVE-NOT the operation would fall apart within 24 hours.

Portal enables donors to help Harvey-stricken schools

AUSTIN — Texas Education Commissioner Morath on Oct. 17 announced that school systems needing instructional materials — either because of enrollment of students displaced by Hurricane Harvey or from property damage caused by the hurricane — can create an online list for donors to access.

Potential donors can find the lists through the Texas Education Agency's Instructional Materials Assistance web page: https://tea.texas. gov/Academics/Hurricane_ Harvey_Instructional_Materials_Assistance/.

"From the initial days of the hurricane, many people have stepped forward wanting to help. The TEA Instructional Materials Assistance web page provides a way to see what school districts truly need and then allow for those needs to be met," Morath said.

Morath called the electronic system a type of "wedding registry" where school districts can post their instructional materials needs. Donors can elect to fulfill a district's needs list completely or in part, and the agency's educational materials ordering system updates the list to help avoid duplication of supply donations.

To date, 14 school districts have created needs lists in the system. The materials on those lists total approximately \$1.2 million.

The system has paired three potential donating districts with three districts in need. One district has already indicated all its identified needs are filled.







Rick sees himself as being a risk taker, a visionary, and leader of learners.


He is credited with numerous achievements and

Murr talks property taxes during Ozona visit

Andrew Murr plans on continuing to challenge the "Robin Hood" school finance plan, if he is re-elected.

During his visit to Ozona last week, Murr talked about his bill filed this summer during the State Legislature Special Session that would do away with the current school finance plan known "Robin Hood," where property rich school districts like Crockett County CCSD send money to property poor districts, and replace the funding with an increase

in the state sales tax. The bill died in committee, but it got lots of people

talking, Murr said. "It was a last minute fix. I have heard that a lot of people like the idea of finding a new way to fund our school districts," Murr said. "A lot of people are eager to engage in that discussion."

Murr's visit was part of the tour of his district, which includes the Hill Country, West Texas and South Texas counties.

Murr said over the recent legislative session property taxes was the biggest issue that was dealt with, and no solution was found at the end.

"We saw a lot of ideas on property tax reform," Murr said.

Murr's bill is one he said he plans on refiling if he is re-elected in 2018. Murr has already drawn a Democratic challenger in Joe P. Herrera, of Natalia, Texas.

"When I filed this bill, it was the first time I spent on a fully engaged committee. We had a back and forth discussion that was meaningful and phenomenal. I look forward

to pushing that discussion." Murr also discussed also legislative issues, such as

dealing with mental health

issues and teacher retire-

ment. Murr sits on the select committee on mental health. While Gov. Greg Abbott has said a special session dealing with the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey will not be called, Murr said expect a lot of bills to be filed in the

ing with that issue. "One of the biggest challenges will be the loss of tax base," Murr said.

2019 legislative session deal-

Murr said he encourages the people in his district to contact his office not only with concerns, but also with ideas.

"We look to you for guidance and solutions. If you think of a good idea, get it to us before the next session starts," Murr said.

Hulings aiming to challenge Hurd

Jay Hulings is aiming to give U.S. Rep. Will Hurd a serious run.

Hulings stopped in Ozona on Oct. 18 at El Chato's Restaurant to meet with local citizens and speak about his challenging the Republican Congressman.

"We are coming at this fresh. I know what it means to be an outsider," Hullings said.

Hulings is a former federal prosecutor from San Antonio. He is an ally of the Castro brothers — U.S. Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-San Antonio, and former U.S. Housing Secretary Julián Castro.

Prior to living in San Antonio, Hulings worked in Del Rio. He is a graduate of Harvard Law School, Virginia Tech and Westwood High School in Austin.

His wife, Elysia Petru Hulings, is originally from San Antonio. The couple are new parents to their son, John.

Hulings said he can match Hurd, who is a former CIA agent, when it comes to his background. Hulings was a staffer on the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence and worked as legislative director for retired Rep. Jane Harman (D-Calif.). Both of his parents

were CIA agents.

However, Hulings said Hurd's talks about cybersecurity and technology is not what people in rural areas of the district want to hear.

"He's not listening to his constituents," Hulings said. "His voting record is very conservative in the district. He says one thing in the district and votes a different way in Washington. As a member of Congress, how you vote counts."

Hulings thinks he can win back District 23 for the Democrats, which Hurd, R-Helotes, has represented for the past four years after beating former Congressman and State Rep. Pete Gallego,

D-Alpine, twice. Gallego announced last

month he will not challenge Hurd to a third race.

At least two other Democrats have already announced they will take on Hurd in 2018: Rick Treviño, a teacher from San Antonio; and Gina Ortiz Jones, a former Air Force intelligence officer from San Antonio.

District 23, which spreads from El Paso to San Antonio, is the most competitive in the state, a regular target of both national Democrats and Republicans. When Hurd, a former CIA officer, won re-election last year, it was the first time an incumbent held on to the seat for a second term in eight years.

Hurd won Crockett County 875 votes to Gallego's 462 in 2016.

Nationally Hillary Clinton won the district in the 2016 Presidential Race.

"It's gigantic but it's winnable," Hulings said. Democrats have put

Hurd's seat in their top five targets in 2018.

"If somebody thinks they can outwork me, good luck," Hurd said during his August visit to Ozona. "It doesn't change what I'm doing. I'm hearing what people are concerned about. I represent those who voted for me and those that didn't."



TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in said County as provided in an ORDER CALL-ING A BOND ELECTION duly passed by the Commissioners Court of said County, which Order is substantially as follows:

ORDER CALLING A BOND ELECTION FOR THE CROCKETT COUNTY CONSOLIDATED COMMON SCHOOL DISTRICT NUMBER 1 INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

THE STATE OF TEXAS § COUNTY OF CROCKETT §

WHEREAS, the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Number 1 (the "School District") is a "common school district" under the laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the boundaries of the School District are coterminous with the boundaries of Crockett County, Texas (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 45.001, Texas Education Code, the Commissioners Court of the County, on behalf of the School District, is authorized to issue bonds to finance the construction, acquisition and equipment of school buildings in the School District, and to levy, pledge, assess, and collect annual ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the principal and interest become due, if the issuance of such bonds is authorized by a majority of the qualified voters of the School District voting at an election held for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, Section 45.003, Texas Education Code, requires the Commissioners Court of the County to call an election on behalf of the School District to authorize the issuance of such bonds for the School District; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the School District has determined that it is necessary to hold an election for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of up to \$5,000,000 in principal amount of bonds for the construction, acquisition and equipment of school buildings in the School District and for the purchase of new school buses, and the Board of Trustees of the School District has requested that the Commissioners Court of the County approve this Order for the purpose of holding an election on Tuesday, November 7, 2017, for such purposes; and

WHEREAS, based on such request of the Board of Trustees of the School District, the Commissioners Court of the County deems it advisable to call the election hereinafter ordered; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Order was passed was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place, and purpose of the meeting was given, all as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF CROCKETT COUNTY, TEXAS THAT:

- 1. VOTING ON ELECTION DAY. An election shall be held between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M. on Tuesday, November 7, 2017 ("Election Day") at the Crockett County Courthouse Annex, 909 Avenue D, Ozona, Texas. Said County shall constitute a single election precinct for said election.
- 2. PRESIDING JUDGES. The Presiding Judge and Alternate Presiding Judge for each of the election precincts and polling places and the Early Voting Clerk have been previously appointed by the Commissioners Court for the General Election on November 7, 2017. Such appointments, and any additions or modifications of such appointments, shall also be effective in connection with the election called under this Order.
- 3. ELECTION CLERKS. Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than five qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting the election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.
- 4. EARLY VOTING. Electors may cast their early votes by mail, and may request a ballot by writing to the Crockett County Clerk, P.O. Drawer C, Ozona, Texas 76943, or by personal appearance at the following locations:

during the period early voting is required or permitted by law, being Monday, October 23, 2017, through Friday, November 3, 2017, the hours designated for early voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and legal state holidays; and the Early Voting Clerk shall keep the early voting place open during such hours for early voting by personal appearance.

5. EARLY VOTING BALLOT BOARD. An Early Voting Ballot Board is hereby created to process early voting results. The Presiding Judge and the Alternate Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board have been previously appointed by the Commissioners Court for the elections held by the County in 2017. - 7. OFFICIAL PROPOSITION. At the election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

CROCKETT COUNTY PROPOSITION A

Shall the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas be authorized to issue bonds on behalf of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Number 1, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$5,000,000 for the construction, acquisition and equipment of school buildings in the School District and for purchase of school buses, with the bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with law at the time of issuance, all within the discretion of the Commissioners Court; and shall the Commissioners Court be auth¬orized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the School District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds?

- 10. BILINGUAL ELECTION MATERIALS AND COMPLIANCE WITH THE HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT. All election materials (including notice of the election, ballots, instruction cards, affidavits, and other forms which voters may be required to sign) and all early voting materials shall be printed in both English and Spanish, or Spanish translations thereof, and/or other assistance shall be provided, as required by the Texas Election Code (the "Code") and the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, each as amended. Pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act ("HAVA") and the Code, at each polling place there shall be at least one voting system that is equipped for disabled individuals, and each such voting system shall be a system that has been certified by the Texas Secretary of State as compliant with HAVA and the Code.
- 11. GENERAL STATEMENTS. In accordance with the provisions of Section 3.009(b), Texas Election Code, it is hereby found and determined that:
- (a) The proposition language that will appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 9 hereof.
- (b) The purpose for which the bonds are to be authorized is set forth in Section 8 hereof.
- (c) The principal amount of the debt obligations to be authorized is set forth in Sections 8 and 9 hereof.
- (d) As set forth in Sections 8 and 9 hereof, if the bonds are approved by the voters, the Commissioners Court will be authorized to levy annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the School District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds.

- (g) The aggregate amount of the outstanding principal of the School District's debt obligations, through respective maturity, (all of which are secured by an unlimited tax levied for debt service purposes) as of the beginning of the School District's 2016-17 fiscal year is \$4,760,000.00.
- (h) The aggregate amount of the outstanding interest of the School District's debt obligations (all of which are secured by an unlimited tax levied for debt service purposes) as of the beginning of the School District's 2016-17 fiscal year is \$966,795.95.
- (i) The ad valorem debt service tax rate for the School District for the 2016-17 fiscal year is \$0.0540 per \$100 of taxable assessed valuation.
- 12. NOTICE OF ELECTION. The Commissioner's Court shall cause a copy of this Order (in English and Spanish) to be posted and published as the notice of election ("Notice") required by Sections 4.003(a)(1)(A), (b) and (f), Texas Election Code. The County Clerk, County Judge, and Bond Counsel to the District are authorized to correct, complete and revise the Notice to conform to changes that occur subsequent to the passage of this Order.
- 13. EFFECTIVE DATE. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 1201.028, Texas Government Code, this Order shall be come effective immediately upon adoption thereof.

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

WHAT IS THE INCREASE OF TAXES IF THE BOND WERE TO PASS?

The increase in tax is minimal for the return that it provides to our school children. The rates are as follows.

HOW LONG DO WE HAVE TO PAY OFF THIS BOND? WILL MY TAXES EVER GO DOWN WHEN IT IS PAID OFF?

The Bond is set up on a 5 year note. You will see your taxes go down 5 cents after two years and then down another 9 cents once this bond is paid off. The huge advantage of a bond is that you as a voter control the tax rate.

If the tax were to be raised on the M&O side, that tax will remain the same for an extended period, or until the school finance problem is corrected by the state. Below you can see what the tax rate will be through the period until Bond is paid off.

DEBRIS REMOVAL CONTINUES

The Texas Division of Emergency Management on Oct. 20 reported that nearly 7.5 million cubic yards of Hurricane Harvey debris had been collected so far.

The Texas Department of Transportation, individually, reported on Oct. 16 that its employees had removed more than 10 million cubic feet of debris in the four districts most impacted by Hurricane Harvey since landfall Aug. 25.

From Corpus Christi to Beaumont and towns in between those cities, TxDOT crews, composed of more than 600 employees working in weekly rotations, have worked to help clear roadways and help citizens in their ongoing recovery efforts.

Of the 25 requests for debris removal TxDOT has received, work has been completed in 10 counties and cities, the agency said.

TEA RELEASES REPORTS Preliminary Texas Academ-

ic Performance Reports are now available online at tea. state.tx.us, Education Commissioner Mike Morath announced Oct. 17.

These reports provide campus-level, district-level, regional and statewide details of academic performance with information about staff, programs and demographics.

Final ratings following the resolution of district appeals of preliminary academic accountability ratings are scheduled for release on Nov. 16.

ZIKA DATA IS REPORTED Information posted by the

Texas Department of State Health Services on Oct. 17 shows that some 429 individuals residing in Texas were on the federal Centers for Disease Control's Zika Pregnancy Registry. The registry includes preg-

nant women with laboratory evidence of Zika infection and their infants, regardless of laboratory evidence.

To be reported as a Zika disease case in pregnancy, the pregnant woman must have had at least one clinical sign or symptom compatible with Zika and also have a positive Zika test result, according to the DSHS.

FORMER JUSTICE DIES

Texas Supreme Court Justice Ted Z. Robertson, 96, who served on the high court from 1982 through 1988, died at his home in Dallas on Oct. 13.

Robertson served as a Dallas County probate and juvenile judge and as a state district judge in Dallas County before he was elected to the Texas Supreme Court.

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


