

Early voting on school bond continues through Friday, Election Day Tuesday

Early voting for the Crockett County CCSD \$5 million Bond Election and the State Constitutional Amendment Election runs through Friday, Nov. 3.

Crockett County Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday, including the noon hour, at the courthouse annex.

Election Day voting will be 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7. Polling places are: Precinct 1 -Crockett County Courthouse Annex; Precinct 2 - Crockett County Senior Center; Precinct 3 - Crockett County Civic Center; Precinct 4 - Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center.

the school bond was held Oct. 26 at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

Local citizens asked Superintendent Raul Chavarria numerous questions, including "what will the bond money be used for?"

Chavarria said he believes that question is asked by

A town hall meeting about many thinking that the school district has plans to buy more buses or build something that has not been disclosed.

> "The simple answer is that the bond money will be used to make up the difference that has been lost in ASATR State Funding. By replacing the money that we have budgeted for maintenance and trans-


portation with bond funds, we can make up the difference that we have been shorted by the state," Chavarria said.

Chavarria said the district has lost \$2 million in Additional State Aid for Tax Reduction funding. He told the small crowd at the town hall that is the equivalent to 20-25 teaching positions in the district.

"We wouldn't have come to our voters if we didn't need to. The CCCCSD School Board is committed to spend money wisely and frugally. The proposed bond is there to allow us to keep our district on good financial footing and to cover any unforeseen expenses that

Proposed Constitutional Amendments on the ballot

n Nov. 7, 2017, Texans have the ability to shape the Texas Constitution by voting on seven proposed amendments.

Early voting is already underway, and runs from Oct. 23, 2017 through Nov. 3, 2017.

Below is a summary of the topic of each proposed measure.

I encourage you to spend time beforehand reviewing any additional details to these amendments so that you can make educated, informed decisions at the polls.

PROPOSITION 1

Provides certain disabled veterans or their surviving spouses with property tax exemptions. Proposition 1 would allow a disabled veteran or their surviving spouse to receive a property tax exemption if their house was donated or sold to them at less than market value by a charity.

PROPOSITION 2

Authorizes several changes to current standards surrounding home equity. Proposition 2 would establish a lower amount for expenses that can be charged to a borrower and remove certain financing expense limitations for a home equity loan, establish certain authorized lenders to make a home equity loan, change certain options for the refinancing of home equity loans, change the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, and allow home equity loans on agricultural homesteads.

PROPOSITION 3

Limits the service of certain appointed officeholders after the expiration of the person's term of office. Proposition 3 would limit political appointees to only serve beyond their term in office until the ending of the legislative session that follows the expiration date of their term.

PROPOSITION 4Requires a court to pro-

the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and allows the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional.

PROPOSITION 5

Permits professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles. Proposition 5 would permit the foundations of sports teams to conduct charitable raffles at games hosted at their home venue.

PROPOSITION 6

Provides a property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of a first responder who is either killed or fatally injured in the line of duty. Proposition 6 would provide relief to the families of fallen first responders by exempting the surviving spouse of a fallen first responder from all or part of the market value of their home.

PROPOSITION 7

Permits credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes to promote savings. Proposition 7 would allow qualifying banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions to conduct promotional activities, including raffles, if it encourages money savings.

Paxton asks high court to approve court-drawn House maps

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Oct. 27 filed a brief urging the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse a lower court ruling that required nine of the state's 150 House districts to be redrawn.

In September, the U.S. Supreme Court temporarily stayed the federal district court's ruling. That allowed Texas to continue to use the existing maps while the redistricting case remains pending.

Candidate filings for the 2018 elections begin next month. Early primary voting begins in February.

"We're capter for the Su

"We're eager for the Supreme Court to review all the facts in this case, which are clearly on our side," Paxton said. "The portion of the House redistricting map invalidated by the lower court is the map the same court drew and approved in 2012 before the Legislature adopted it in 2013. It's been used in the last three election cycles in Texas, and there is no sound

reason for that to change." er

In a separate ruling, the Supreme Court also temporarily blocked a lower court ruling that invalidated two of Texas' 36 congressional seats. Paxton filed a brief on Oct. 17 asking the high court to reverse the district court's ruling in that case.

SPEAKER WON'T RUN AGAIN

House Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, on Oct. 25 announced his decision not to seek re-election in November 2018.

Straus is almost halfway through his record fifth consecutive two-year term as speaker.

The chamber will elect a new leader in the next regular legislative session, which begins in January 2019. State Reps. John Zerwas, R-Richmond, and Phil King, R-Weath-

erford, are the first two members to declare their intentions to run for the leadership post. Zerwas is chair of the state budget-writing House Committee on Appropriations. King chairs the House Committee on Homeland Security and Public Safety.

Straus has been noted as a consensus builder, able to bring Democrats and Republicans together in decision-making processes. His "big tent" style has overwhelmed challenges to his leadership and to his parliamentary abilities in moving certain bills through the process while slowing others, such as the "bathroom bill," last spring.

Gov. Greg Abbott released a statement following Straus's announcement, saying: "Joe Straus has served with distinction for both the people in his district and for the Texas House of Representatives.

I thank Speaker Straus for his service and for his commitment to the State of Texas."





Electrolytes are key to normal body functions

Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia defines an electrolyte as, "a substance that produces an electrically conducting solution when dissolved in a polar solvent, such as water... This includes most soluble salts, acids, and bases... Sodium, potassium, chloride, calcium, magnesium, and phosphate are examples of electrolytes, informally known as 'lytes.'"

Inside the body's physiology, electrolytes serve to complete electrical exchanges both inside and outside the cell, and water is the medium with which electrical interactions take place. Elemental sodium (found in salt) is the main electrolyte found in fluid outside the cell and potassium is the main electrolyte inside the cell; both help to balance flu-

ids and blood pressure. Electrolyte replacement may be warranted and is especially indicated when someone has prolonged vomiting or diarrhea, and as maintenance after strenuous, athletic-type activity; and even when situations are less than extreme. Urination caused by extreme water consumption can flush elemental potassium from the body as well. There are commercial electrolyte solutions for sick children and for athletes (sports drinks) but beware, these commercial products often include only trace amounts of electrolytes.

"The primary ions of electrolytes are sodium (Na+), potassium (K+), calcium (Ca2+), magnesium (Mg2+), chloride (Cl-), hydrogen phosphate (HPO42-), and hydrogen carbonate (HCO3-). The electric charge symbols of plus (+) and minus (-) indicate that the substance is ionic in nature and has an imbalanced distribution of electrons, the result of chemical dissociation."

"All known higher lifeforms require a subtle and complex electrolyte balance between the intracellular and extracellular environments...

Such gradients affect and regulate the hydration of the body as well as blood pH, and are critical for nerve and

tion. Various mechanisms exist in living species that keep the concentrations of different electrolytes under tight control." -

muscle func-

Wikipedia. Electrolytes play some very

significant roles in the body that include:

Calcium - helps muscle to contract, nerve signaling, blood clotting, cell division, and bone and tooth formation and maintenance;

Potassium - helps keep blood pressure levels stable, regulates heart contractions, helps with muscle functions. Wikipedia advises, "Potassium ions are very important to organisms... The ions send messages from cells to other cells. It helps biological membranes depolarize. This means go from a negative to a positive electrical charge. This is needed for muscles to contract (get shorter and move things). It is needed for the heart to beat (push blood through blood vessels)."

Magnesium - is needed for muscle contractions, heart rhythms, nerve functioning, bone-building and strength, the reduction of anxiety, in digestion, and keeping a stable protein-to-fluid balance;

Sodium - helps regulate fluid balance and nerve signaling, and is used in muscle contractions;

Chloride - regulates fluid balance.

With so many varying roles in the body, even minor disparities can cause changes that will be clear. The type of electrolyte deficiency and its level of presence in any given combination of other electrolyte deficiencies can cause numerous symptoms to occur - muscle aches, spasms, twitches and weakness; restlessness; anxiety; frequent headaches; feely very thirsty; insomnia; fever; heart palpita-

tions or irregular heartbeats; digestive issues like cramps, constipation or diarrhea; confusion and trouble concentrating; bone disorders; joint pain; blood pressure changes; changes in appetite or body weight; fatigue (including chronic fatigue syndrome); numbness and pain in joints; and dizziness, especially when standing up suddenly.

Potassium is the most commonly deficient electrolyte. The Recommended Daily Amount (RDA) of potassium for adults is around 4,700 mg. One shouldn't have to worry about eating too much of potassium because there is no upper limit for healthy adults, unless taken in supplement form. Be advised, some potassium compounds can be dangerous, some salt substitutes can be very high in potassium and others can be lacking. Be cognizant of what works well for you.

Another electrolyte/mineral commonly deficient in modern diets is magnesium. The RDA for healthy adults is 450 mg a day. You should consult your doctor or health care provider if you have kidney disease or taking diuretics.

Sodium has always suffered a bad rap. But the truth is, your body needs adequate sodium because insulin levels effect sodium levels, too. The recommended intake amount is 3,000-5,000 mg (3 - 5 grams) of elemental sodium occurring naturally in food and in supplemental form. Some people require even more sodium. Don't be afraid to use salt, and even if you feel you need more, drink 1-2 cups of bouillon or broth a day, or what works for you.

Electrolytes are significant elements in the maintenance of health and in the quality of life. Seek out your optimum levels as they will differ from person to person.







come up, without dipping into our fund balance," Chavarria said.

The bond ballot reads: "The issuance of \$5,000,000 of school building bonds to construct, acquire and equip school buildings and purchase school buses for the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Number 1, and levying the tax in payment thereof.

"The reason that the bond wording lists buses and buildings on it is because we left that open in case we had an emergency need to purchase a bus, or if we needed to do extensive maintenance work on one of our buildings," Chavarria said.

Chavarria said the biggest expenses the district has is in maintenance and transportation. Last year, the district had an unexpected expense of about \$50,000 to replace the air conditioning and heating units in the OHS Davidson Gym.

"If not for the wording of the bond, as listed above, we would have had to dip into our fund balance to pay for those new units," Chavarria said. "This year we had to replace an engine in one of our buses that had over 200,000 miles on it. Again, we were able to use bond funds to pay for this repair."

In previous articles published in the Stockman, Chavarria has said the district does plan to purchase a truck for the agriculture department, maintain computer labs, purchase new computers and support for all campuses, purchasing teaching equipment and supplies for student use for all campuses, update the career and technology classes as nursing, food science and agriculture, address maintenance repairs throughout the district and continue with the updating of existing teaching housing.

Chavarria also said CCCC-SD has one of the lowest tax rates in the area, but that the current tax rate of \$1.06 is not enough to maintain the budget. He also said the district has cut \$1 million from the district's budget, and plans on continue to cut more.

Chavarria also reminded the crowd that many school districts operate on rolling bonds, continually asking voters to pass bonds. Bond money is not subject to state recapture.

"The question is do we raise it on the maintenance and operation side and send over half back through Robin Hood, or do we raise it through a bond and keep 100 percent her in Crockett County?" Chavarria said.

from Hurricane Harvey. The charges are to be studied and discussed leading up to the next legislative session.

Committees will focus on Hurricane Harvey's impact on public health, the juvenile justice system, agriculture and the state's tax structure and evaluate how state agencies responded to the storm. They also will make recommendations to the full House for legislation addressing the issues.

Straus also created the Select Committee on Opioids and Substance Abuse in which lawmakers will study the prevalence and impact of substance abuse and substance use disorders in the state. Rep. Four Price, R-Amarillo, will serve as chair of the select committee and Rep.

UPDATE: HURRICANE RECOVERY

Since Hurricane Harvey hit Texas in late August, federal and state agencies, local governmental bodies, volunteers and private property owners have been hard at work to return to normal the many stricken areas of the Lone Star State.

As of Oct. 26, according to information posted by the state-run Commission to Rebuild Texas, \$5.83 billion in federal funds had been provided directly to Texans. That amount includes FEMA grants to households, National Flood Insurance Program claims payments and SBA disaster loans.

Also, some 882,935 individual assistance applications were received. FEMA's deadline to register for individual disaster assistance is Nov. 24 for the residents of 41 designated counties. And, as of Oct. 27, some

51,416 individuals were taking advantage of FEMA's Transitional Sheltering Assistance. Some 145,737 individuals were counted as having visited Disaster Recovery Centers for assistance as of Oct. 26.

YOUTH VOTE IS ENCOURAGED

Texas Secretary of State Rolando Pablos on Oct. 25 issued a proclamation designating the first Friday of the early voting period as Student Voting Day.

More than 800 Texas high schools committed to assisting their eligible students in registering to vote, an effort supported by secretary of state's 2017 High School Voter Registration Initiative.
