High demand for a full-time **Crockett County** veterinarian

For years, Ozona was able to support a full-time veterinarian.

For the past four-five years, once a week Dr. William Edmiston and his staff have traveled from Eldorado once-a-week to Ozona to provide services for residents.

During his time in Ozona, Edmiston has periodically employed veterinarian students trying to encourage them to come back to rural West Texas once they graduate.

"We enjoy coming over here. The people here thank you. It's a good day for us," Edmiston said of his time in Ozona. "If we find a vet we would like for that person to be a part of our practice over here. Ozona is more situation to have a regular clinic. The problem is finding someone to live in a small, West Texas town."

Because of the lack of veterinarians in the area, Crockett County, along with Irion, Reagan, Terrell and Upton Counties, have all be declared high priority in the USDA's Veterinarian Shortage Program by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Early voting runs through Friday, March 2, in the March 6 Primary Election.

Crockett County Voters can cast their ballots from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday at the courthouse annex.

Election Day voting will run 7 a.m.-7 p.m. March 6. Polling locations are: Precinct 1 Crockett County Courthouse Annex, Precinct 2 Crockett County Senior Center, Precinct 3 Crockett County Civic Center and Precinct 4 Ozona Chamber of Commerce Visitor's Center.

The primary election will determine which candidates will appear on the ballot as the nominees from the Republican and Democrat parties in the November general election. Texas voters may vote in either the Republican or Democratic primaries, but not both.

ID must be current or have expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place.

As provided by court order, if a voter does not possess and is not reasonably able to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, the voter may vote by (1) signing a declaration at the polls explaining why the voter is reasonably unable to obtain one of the seven forms of approved photo ID, and (2) providing one of various forms of supporting documentation: certified birth certificate (must be an original), a valid voter registration certificate, a copy or original of one of the following: current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck, or other government document that shows the voter's name and an address, although government documents which include a photo must be original and cannot be copies.

The training is called Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRA-SE) and is accredited through Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALERRT). ERRT is a grant-based organization administered by Texas State University and headquartered in San Marcos, Texas.

Operating for several years now, ALERRT has set the standard for active shooter training by offering classes in Texas, around the nation, and internationally, to commissioned law enforcement officers, Waddell said.

"The course is designed to be presented to groups that might be vulnerable to an active shooter attack, such as schools, businesses and other public areas like at sporting events," Waddell said.

Don't bank on it: Fake check scams making the rounds

It may seem like your lucky day to look through your mail and find a random, legitimatelooking check written out to you for several thousand dollars but think before you take the money and run. Chances are, that check is a forgery. Fake check and money order scams take on many different forms, but the underlying scheme is typically the same.

The stories that con artists use vary widely. You might be selling something online and the scammer pretends to be interested in a purchase. Or

scammers will "hire" you for a job, such as secret shopping, or tell you you've won a sweepstakes prize.

In all cases, the amount of the check is "accidentally" far more than the amount agreed to. The scammer in-

to deposit the check, keep the amount owed, and wire back the difference. When you deposit the check, the funds will appear to be available within days. The check eventually bounces, and since you have already wired back the "overpayment" to the scammer you are left liable for the entire amount.

According to Better Business Bureau's Risk Index, fake checks are the second riskiest scam behind home improvement scams. This ranking is based off factors such as how likely someone is

to be targeted, the odds of losing money and how much money is typically at stake. The full study can be found at bbb.org/

It's also a common scam reported on BBB Scam Tracker. As of early February, this year, there have already been 140 reports across the U.S.

Be immediately suspicious of overpayments. A check can bounce even after your bank allows you to withdraw cash

representative tells you that a check has "cleared" you can't be sure it won't be detected as a forgery weeks later and you could be liable for the funds drawn against the amount.

· Never send money to people you don't know. This is especially true if they ask for the money in an unusual form such as wire transfer or prepaid deb-

 $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ If the buyer insists that you wire back funds, end the transaction immediately. Legitimate buyers don't pressure you to

from the deposit. Even if a bank send money via wire transfer services. In addition, you have little recourse if there's a problem with a wire transaction.

> · Resist any pressure to "act now." If the buyer's offer is good now, it should be good after the check clears.

> If you think you've been the target of a fake check scam, file a report with Better Business Bureau at bbb.org/scamtracker.

Unsung Heroes

ebruary marks Black History | Month, an opportunity for all Americans to reflect upon and celebrate the countless contributions of African-Americans to our great nation.

Having spent nine years as an undercover officer in the CIA, I had the opportunity to serve shoulder-to-shoulder with our brave men and women in uniform.

It is this experience that underscores the deep gratitude for the military histories that I represent throughout South and West Texas.

There is a group of African-Americans, who have a connection to our district, that despite segregation and racism served this country with honor and distinction during the Second World War.

The Tuskegee Airmen were the first African-American pilots to fly in our nation's Army Air Corps, now the U.S. Air Force.

Trained at Tuskegee Army Air Field in Alabama from 1941 to 1946, the more than 1,000 African-American pilots flew 15,000 sorties and destroyed more than 260 enemy aircrafts during WWII, earning 96 Distinguished Flying Crosses and three Presidential Unit Citations.

These trailblazing aviators earned the nickname 'The Red Tails' because of the bright red paint of their P-51 tail assemblies. More than 30 of these heroes were from the Lone Star State, and roughly 20 were from San Antonio. One such San Antonian, Thomas Ellis, served from 1942 to 1945, and recently passed away at the age of 97. As a member of the 301st Fighter Squadron, Ellis earned seven battle stars and achieved the

rank of Sergeant Major. Ellis grew up in San Antonio and graduated from what is now Brackenridge High School.

a jazz quintet in his spare time from his post-military job with the U.S. Postal Service.

Another brave pilot was Major James Kelly who still lives in San Antonio with his wife of more than 50

After originally joining the Army Air Corps as an engineer, Kelly was selected to transfer to the medical corps, graduating with

Stationed at Fort Sam Houston and Fort Hood, Kelly was with the 332nd Group at Lockbourne Army Air Field in Ohio until the base's closure in 1949.

He also served in the Korean War, aiding in the medical evacuation of the 1st Marine Division from the Chosin Reservoir Battle in Japan.

He retired in 1971 and has since dedicated his life to social and community improvement in San Anto-

As we continue to reflect throughout this month, it's important to remember that black history is American history.

These brave men are extraordinary patriots who fought for this country despite segregation and racism.

"We the people," get closer to forming that "more perfect union" our founding fathers wrote about through the sacrifices and dedication of so many people and we can better cherish the rights we exercise now by being aware of how we got here.

Governor orders action to address safety at schools

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Feb. 21 sent a letter to Texas Education Agency Commissioner Mike Morath ordering immediate action to ensure the safety of children in Texas schools following the multi-fatality shooting at a Parkland, Florida, high school on Feb. 14.

Abbott listed steps for Morath and other state education leaders to take to respond to and prevent such tragedies, including:

 Catalog and share all available information from the Texas School Safety Center on school safety programs and distribute this information to all school districts, charter schools and education service centers across the state;

— Ensure that all Texas public schools have completed their statutorily required school safety audits and have submitted confirmation of these audits to the Texas School Safety Center;

— Publish on the Texas Education Agency website and via agency press release a list of any school districts that have not completed the statutory requirements referenced in point two above within 45 days; and

- Work with the Texas School Safety Center, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the governor's office to draft recommendations to the Texas Legislature on changes to the school safety architecture of our state.

"All of Texas grieves the tragedy that occurred in Parkland last week. As governor, I take seriously the safety of all Texas residents, and as an American, I mourn the loss of 17 Floridians in a cruel and senseless act of violence. Immediate steps must be taken to keep our students and communities safe, with the understanding that more will

be expected in the future,"

Abbott said.

STATE LAWS ALLOW MARSHALS Acknowledgement of the

threat of school shootings came years ago in the form of House Bill 1009, a law passed by the 83rd Texas Legislature in 2013.

The law allows public school districts and open enrollment charter schools to appoint school marshals.

In 2015, the 84th Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 386, to include public twoyear junior colleges in the list of institutions that can appoint school marshals.

And, in 2017, the 85th Texas Legislature passed House Bill 867, a law that allows private schools to appoint school marshals.

According to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, "The sole purpose of a

school marshal is to prevent the act of murder or serious bodily injury on school premises and act only as defined by the written regulations adopted by the school board/ governing body."



Are you uptight and unable to move?

There's an old joke that goes, "You know you're getting old when the high point of your day depends on whether or not you've had a decent bowel movement."

Seriously, old or not, people do tend to get a little worried when they don't have a BM every day and are downright concerned if they don't have one for three or four days.

"Gotta get some fiber in "Need more fiber!" Fiber! Fiber! Stop the insanity!

The American Society of Colon & Rectal Surgeons stats, "The belief that one must have a bowel movement every day simply is not accurate and can lead to unnecessary concern and even abuse of laxatives. In fact, if one's daily bowel movement is hard, requires great effort to expel, or does not satisfactorily empty, the individual would still be considered to have constipation in spite of having a 'normal frequency.' On the other hand, if one has a movement every third day but it is not hard, does not require straining and completely evacuates, then one may very well consider this normal bowel movement, in spite of

We do not require copious amounts of plant fiber. We were designed to eat whole foods, animal products and limited low glycemic plants mostly digested in the small intestine and, therefore do not travel as far as the colon. The insoluble plant matter that does get as far as the colon, is there to ferment and allow the colon to extract whatever nutrients remain.

Animals do not have fiber. Instead, we use bone, cartilage and connective tissues to support our bodies and, contrary to what many health authorities advise, fiber cannot be beneficially processed by the human digestive tract.

What we call dietary fiber is extracted from the seeds and cell walls of plants.

gestible. We have been advised that soluble fiber is good because it slows the glycemic impact of fructose in the small intestine and that insoluble fiber helps speed up the elimina-

tion of food in the colon. While soluble fiber forms gels that help us feel full and retard the absorption of sugars in the small intestine, it comes at the cost of the body having to deal with toxic plant compounds; arabinoxylan, dextrin, inulin, waxes, chitins, pectin, beta-glucan and other phytochemicals.

As far as indigestible fiber is concerned... in the 2007 issue of World Journal of Gastroenterology, Doctors Tan and Seow-Choen published a review of medical studies conducted over the previous 35 years about fiber and colon health and concluded that, "A strong case cannot be made for a protective effect of dietary fiber against colorectal polyp or cancer. Neither has fiber been found to be useful in chronic constipation and irritable bowel syndrome. It is also not useful in the treatment of perianal conditions. The fiber deficit-diverticulosis theory should also be challenged... we often choose to believe a lie, as a lie repeated often enough by enough people becomes accepted as the truth. We urge clinicians to keep an open mind. Myths about fiber must be debunked and truth installed."

Boston psychiatrist, Georgia Ede, MD explains why experts believe fiber is essen-

tial for health; "It is a simple misunderstanding of the research. Well-meaning, intelligent scientists looked at all the data and came to the wrong conclusion by making a single, critically flawed assumption that led them in the wrong direction."

Additionally, many studies show little to no weight-loss benefit...according to Nutrition Reviews, "the limited number of clinical trials comparing high-fiber foods with low-fiber foods have not provided consistent data indicating that these diets are more efficacious for weight loss than low-fiber control diets."

Undigested dietary fiber in the colon attracts huge numbers of beneficial microbes and bacteria, but 15 grams daily is all that is needed keep those microscopic buggers fat and sassy. The 35 grams recommended by most health authorities can cause fermented matter to grow so bulky it lodges in the colon constipation, which leads to Irritated Bowel Syndrome (IBS), Inflamed Bowel Disease (IBD) and even Crohn's Disease.

We evolved out of and remain in a symbiotic relationship with the Earth and the universe. We are here and have long survived by the grace of our respected, fellow animals and a few seasonal plant foods. What you eat, and its benefits is governed by genetics, your location in the world, culture and family traditions.

Our individual responsibility is to determine what is best for us, but don't micromanage your body based on unsubstantiated information, impulse and trendy product claims. Our bodies have got this, they've been doing it for millions of years... listen to your body, work with it, and heed its warnings.





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

Waddell said a public class has been scheduled for noon April 24 at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce and Visitor Center.

"We can tweak the course to whatever the organization wants. All law enforcement officers in this county are being trained in these strategies," Waddell said.

The course's concepts are avoid, deny and defend. The program is based on active shooter events up until 2014.

"This is not a firearms class. This is strategies for unarmed people to survive and active shooter event," Waddell said.

Waddell said he has spoked to Superintendent Raul Chavarria about the course.

"This is a great opportunity. We want to keep everybody safe. That's the most important thing," said Board President Dwight Childress.

OPEN FORUM

During open forum, the board will listen, but is forbidden by the Texas Open Meeting Act from discussing any topic raised or making any decision unless that matter is already on the agenda of the meeting.

Fabian Onate spoke about the girls' basketball program. Onate gave stats and history of the program under Head Coach Lee Abbey, including this year's run of 22-12 record overall and making the playoffs for the first time in eight years.

Onate also said this was the first time in 17 years the Lady Lions won more than 20 games.

"Looking at the stats, the longer our coach works with our students the better we get. I'd say he is doing something right," Onate said. "If this coach leaves, once again we have to start all over. I would like to remind our board that Rome wasn't built in one day."

Onate also said he has seen "uplifting" behavior from Abbey off the court, including helping out a local family in need.

"I hope that his hard work and awesome character doesn't go unnoticed," Onate said.

OHS Student Lucy Rodriguez also spoke on behalf of Abbey.

"It takes more than a season to build a winning team. He is more than a coach. He's a mentor, he's a teacher and he's a friend. It's all the little things that count. Removing him from his coaching position will only hurt the team," Rodriguez said.

Kyann Hernandez spoke about the recent OHS Cheerleader Tryouts.

Hernandez said the two cheer sponsors acted unethical, unprofessional and discriminating in regards to the results of the recent tryouts.

"I ask the issue to be resolved and request the appropriate action be toward those individuals who participated in the discriminating and unjust behavior throughout the process of judging for the 2018 cheerleading positions," Hernandez said.

Hernandez said parents have met with Chavarria and conveyed their concerns about the tryouts. After a brief investigation, Hernandez said Chavarria informed the group that there were discrepancies in the tryout results.

The only resolution, Chavarria told the group, was to allow all the students who

tried out the opportunit to become a member of the cheerleading squad, Hernandez said.

Hernandez said while she respected Chavarria's decision, she also asked him to address the issue to the individuals who were part of the unfair judging.

"I want to communicate to you that this ordeal has affected many students and parents in the community. It is also extremely important to know that the students who have decided to take opportunity to be a cheerleader, for year 2018, their decision was solely based on their passion and pride they have being an OHS student," Hernandez said. "All of this could have been avoided. To many, it might have seem we have reached a compromise, but I feel this issue has not reached its total resolution. I leave this into the hands of the board to address and investigate."

Hernandez spoke for an entire group of cheerleader parents and some of the girls that tried out that were also in attendance at the meeting.

The final person to address the board in open forum/public comments, was local citizen Butch Gonzalez.

Gonzalez, a former school district employee, spoke to the board about how decisions make an impact.

"My point today is basically a challenge to everybody in the room, school board, administrators and parents to make sure we do the right thing," Gonzalez said. "Decisions impact everybody. The impact is real. We've got to stop focusing on wins and losses because leadership is about influence. That's what our kids need. We've got to have people in place to influence our kids. When you make decisions, whoever it is, I just challenge you when you make those decisions based on how is it impacting our kids, how is it impacting our schools, how is it impacting our community."

Childress thanked everyone for coming and thanked those that spoke and said that the board is listening to everything that was said.

SALE OF BONDS

The district is in the process of selling the bonds. The bonds will be bid out and due March 8 for any bank or investment pool willing to collateralize the \$5 million amount.

District should receive bond proceeds by the end of

The bond was approved by Crockett County Voters in November 2017.

WALL OF HONOR

In his report, Chavarria said the Wall of Honor project is still in the works.

The final design will include metal lettering, rock work surrounding the structure and a front area to mount plaques or some other form of recognizing hon-

Chavarria said the biggest challenge is the cost of the plaques due to the minimum pricing he has found has been \$2,000.

He also said location and criteria are still being determined.

TEACHER PAY STEP

Chavarria presented the board with a Teacher Pay Scale Comparison by District.

CCCCSD pays \$37,170 for a first-year teacher, which is \$7,090 about state-

In comparison with Forsan, Iraan, Sonora, Schleicher, Reagan County, McCamey, Irion County and Junction, CCCCSD pays

about the same.

Chavarria also said CCCCSD also pays \$519 per month toward employee insurance, leaving the employee portion at \$119 a month. He said Crockett County does pay the majority of insurance in comparison to other schools in the area.

School district employees also haven't had a pay increase in at least five years.

"Our goal of this board is to make sure our teachers are paid competitively," Chavarria said. "This is an ongoing discussion, but we still have to work within our means and within our budget."

Board member Roland DeHoyos said other school districts don't provide housing either.

CCCCSD has 50 housing units available for teachers.

"This is just for our information, so we know where we are," Childress said.

elected officials we are all held to a higher standard and any type of conviction like this is going to have a negative impact on the public trust. I'm sure this is a terribly difficult time for Carlos and his family and my prayers go out to them. Guilty on all 11 counts means that this jury found the evidence compelling and convincing. What it also means is that over the next few weeks we need to have a serious discussion as constituents and taxpayers about how we move forward and turn the page," said State Rep. Roland Gutierrez, D-San Antonio, who is eyeing Uresti's seat.

A day later, the Republican Party of Texas asked in a press release, "Why has Carlos Uresti not resigned?"

But Uresti has at least one big reason to stay in his seat: money.

State legislators draw a puny salary — just \$7,200 per year, with an additional per diem during legislative session. But their government pensions can grow as large as \$140,000 per year.

Uresti would still be able to draw his sizable government pension after he leaves office, despite his felony fraud and money laundering convictions. And with every month that he remains in the Senate, it just gets bigger.

The Employees Retirement System of Texas can't confirm whether individual lawmakers elect to receive government pensions, but all state legislators are eligible

— and it's an attractive package

The size of a government pension is determined by a legislator's years served. Since Uresti has served nearly 21 years in the Legislature — combined with potential additions for his four years of active service as a U.S. Marine and other optional service credits — his pension could already be as large as \$89,000 per year.

Felons are ineligible to serve in the Texas Legislature, but Uresti can keep his seat while he appeals. If he serves until the end of his current term in January 2021 his pension could grow by more than \$9,000.

And that money won't go away even if Uresti is finally convicted.

A law passed last year renders certain felons ineligible to receive government pensions. But that law isn't retroactive, meaning it doesn't apply to crimes committed before June 2017, according to Mary Jane Wardlow, spokeswoman for the Employees Retirement System of Texas.

The 11 crimes Uresti was convicted of on Thursday — and the separate bribery

charges he'll go on trial for in May — took place before the law went into effect.

Uresti isn't up for reelection until 2020, but he's already been relieved of some of his Senate duties. Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, a Republican, announced yesterday that he'd remove Uresti from his Senate committees.

And his Senate colleagues might have the option to remove him from the upper chamber before his term ends, though the procedures for such a step are murky and rarely used. The Republican Party of Texas and the Senate Democratic Caucus have both called on him to resign.

The Texas Constitution allows each house of the Legislature to "expel a member" with a two-thirds vote. That provision also appears in the Texas Senate rules.

But it seems that that hasn't happened since 1927, according to Ana Martinez of the Legislative Reference Library. In that case, Francis Dale and H.H. Moore were tossed out of the House on bribery charges.

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
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

The area is one of 187 regions in the United States that currently suffers from shortages of livestock and public health veterinarians.

The USDA's federally funded Veterinary Medicine Loan Repayment Program (VMLRP) offers student loan forgiveness to veterinarians who commit to serving at three years in underserved

The program repays up to \$75,000 in loans for each participant. The USDA selects the participants, and the Texas Animal Health Commission nominates the state locations to be designated as having shortages.

The American Veterinary Medical Association (AV-MA) is also urging Congress to help address this issue by passing the Veterinary Medicine Loan Repayment Program Enhancement Act (S. 487/H.R. 1268).

Increasing veterinary student debt - which reached \$143,758 on average for 2016 graduates of veterinary colleges - is partly to blame for these veterinary shortages, according to a press release.

The AVMA is arguing the USDA program does not receive enough funding to meet the demand, in part because each award is subject to an expensive income withholding tax that sends the program's funding back to the government, according to a press release. The VML-RP Enhancement Act would eliminate this tax to free up additional funding to support more communities in need of veterinarians, all within the current funding level provided by Congress. If this tax relief had been in place since the program's inception in 2010, an additional 211 shortage areas could have been filled.

"That is what the USDA loan repayment plan does. It allows veterinarians back into underserved areas," said Dr. Dan Posey, clinical professor of veterinary science at West Texas A&M University in Canyon, Texas. "This is one of those programs that is vital for rural areas.

Cost for just one-year tuition at Texas A&M Veterinary School runs \$24,000-\$28,000 a year, Edmiston

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Add that up over four years, plus undergrad school before that and becoming a veterinarian is costly.

Edmiston and Posey both said applicants for the program area also competitive.

Edmiston said in the past Texas has received one to two spots out of five to six applicants.

Posey said his department at West Texas A&M is willing to work with applicants, no matter what university they are attending.

"We are trying to find applicants for areas like Ozona," Posey said.

Both Posey and Edmiston said today's veterinary students mainly come from major metropolitan areas, and then want to return to those similar areas with practices.

"They don't want feces in their ear or to be out in the cold and the heat," Edmiston said. "I try to expose as many vet students to small town practice and small town life."

Crockett County is also unique in that it has a lot of young ranchers as well, Edmiston said.

According to the shortage application, the fivecounty area, that includes Crockett County, has an estimated 80,703 sheet and lambs, 50,750 goats, 42,428 cattle and calves and 1,543 horses and ponies.

Edmiston said not only does veterinarian service animals, that person also protects the public health by looking for animal disease outbreaks, especially in the remote area adjacent to Mexico.

A local veterinarian would also be a part of the community, Edmiston said.

"When I was growing up our vet did everything. That plays in that role too. People understanding that vets are still needed on large animals," Posey said. "There is still a need for large animal practitioners in the state of Texas.'

Both Edmiston and Posev said the best thing Ozona can do is encourage young people from the community interested in veterinary medicine by helping support them financially.

"If a homegrown kid in Ozona wants to become a vet, then Ozona needs to get together and help out this student financially," Edmiston said.

DUMPSTER DIVING FOR CLUES

A Lubbock area game warden received a tip from a message left on the Game Warden Facebook page concerning the dumping of geese in a Lubbock community dumpster. Upon investigation, the warden found four geese that had not been breasted out and had been dumped along with lots of other bags of trash. In the trash was a "to-go" bag from a local restaurant with a phone number on the receipt.

It was a shot in the dark, but the warden called the phone number, which led to interviews with three different people before he was finally able to identify a possible suspect that lived on the street where the dumped birds were located. The warden tracked down the suspect and, after a brief interview, he admitted to dumping the birds. Ironically, the warden had checked the suspect with those same harvested geese while in the field three days prior. Charges for waste of game and civil restitution were filed and pending.

Whitaker, 38, was scheduled to die by lethal injection on Feb. 22, Gov. Abbott signed a proclamation commuting the death sentence to life in prison without possibility of parole.

Abbott, in making the proclamation, agreed with a recommendation by the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles.

Whitaker was convicted and sentenced in 2008 for conspiring to kill his parents and brother, but he did not shoot the gun that caused the murders of his mother and brother.

DPS DRONE PROGRAM DEBUTS

The Texas Department of Public Safety on Feb. 15 announced the launch of its "unmanned aerial systems" program.

Small, unmanned aerial vehicles, generically referred to as "drones" will be used for a variety of public safety missions across Texas, including flight missions related to officer safety, search and rescue, disaster support, aerial observation support, crash reconstruction, crime scene photography and communication tower inspec-

So far, the DPS said, the

program's fleet includes 17 unmanned aerial systems costing the state an estimated \$70,000 and paid for with existing funding, grant funding or seized funds.


AG PURSUES ELDER FRAUD

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Feb. 23 announced that his office joined the U.S. Department of Justice and the National Association of Attorneys General in "the largest coordinated sweep of elder fraud cases in history.

The multi-state actions charged a variety of fraud schemes, ranging from mass mailing, telemarketing and investment frauds to individual incidences of identity theft and theft by guardians.

"Anyone can be a victim of fraud, but senior citizens are targeted more often by scammers seeking to exploit someone for a quick buck," Paxton said. "Today's action is one of many steps my office has taken in the fight to protecting elderly Texans whose financial well-being is compromised by nefarious characters," he added.

Joining Texas in the coalition are the U.S. Department of Justice, Alabama, Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, New York, North Dakota, Oregon and South Dakota.

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
