TxD0T I-10 project receives county approval BY MELISSA PERNER

The Texas Department of Transportation Interstate-10 Frontage Road Extension Project received county approval Monday.
During During their regular meeting, the Crockett County Com-
missioners' Court unanimously approved the project. TxDOT will fund and construct a frontage road exten sion on the eastbound side of 1-10 in exchange for Crockett and maintenance of Ranch-toMarket Road 1973 and Farm-to-Market Road 1964. The project will extend the eastbound side of the I-10 frontage road and reloca
the current 365 exit ramp to a point west of Johnson Draw to allow for more deceleration and weaving distance between I-10 and State Highway 163. A bridge will also be con-
structed over Johnson Draw to allow for residents in the Chandlerdale West area a way to evacuate during flooding. TxDOT officials said extension of the existing frontage road will necessitate its conversion to one-way opterstate standards, said John DeWitt, director of transportation planning and develop ment with TxDOT. The one-way road would

## Decision to send troops to border draws mixed reactions

Greg Ab-STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association bott on April 4 welcomed the of Homeland Security Kirstjen Nielsen that the federal government would deploy some 4,000 National Guard personnel to the U.S.-Mexico border to assist in stemming the flow of illegal immigration. "Today's action by the Trump Administration rein orces Texas' longstanding southern border and uphold the rule of law and I welcome the support," the governor said. "Going forward, Texas will continue to implement ro bust border security efforts and this partnership will help ensure we are doing everything we can to stem the flow of illegal immigration. U.S. Sen. John Cornyn of Texas said using the National Guard in a supportive role "is commonsense way to temment along the border It's critical that the Administra
ion continue to work in close deployment consultation with state and the border region can remain safe and prosperous."
Cornyn noted that the decision to deploy troops is consistent with actions taken by President Obama in 2010 and Presid
2006.
But state Rep. Cesar Blan co, D-El Paso, reacted differently. "Trump's deployment of the National Guard to our
order communities is unjus ified, irresponsible and dan gerous," Blanco said. "In 2017 apprehensions for illegal bor der crossing hit a 46 -year low -a 23.4 percent drop from 2016. Some of our border communities, such as El Pas are consistently ranked as ties in the country" commun es in the country.
-El Paso, also questioned th
"The President and other Republicans have manipulated the fears of Americans many of whom know very litte about life in on the border into a potent political weapon," Rodriguez said. "In his latest anti-immigrant action, Mr. Trump proposes to use the U.S. military as actors and the border as a stage to crea electoral theatre in hopes of
appeasing his political base,

Wescott took nonambulatory seniors from a nursing home and had them participate in a brief workout involving one set of six different exercises for a fourteen-week period. The average age of the subjects was eighty-eight and a
half. At the end of the study, the seniors had averaged a four-pound gain in muscle, a three-pound loss of fat, an increase in strength of more
than 80 percent in their lowthan 80 percent in their low-
er-body
musculature, and an increase in strength of almost 40 percent in their upper-body musculature. They improved their hip and shoulder flexibility by an av-
erage of 50 percent and 10 percent, respectively. More important, at the end of the study, many of the formerly wheelchair-bound subjects were able to walk again." No matter what training
