



# OVFD battles grass fire near gas plant

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, along with area departments and the Texas Forest Service, battled a grass fire near the Prism Plant in the area of U.S. Highway 190 and County Road 204.

The fire burned around 1,860 acres and was 100 percent contained Tuesday afternoon, according to the Texas Forest Service.

The fire caused local law enforcement officials to shut down U.S. Highway 190 from Midway Lane (190 and State Highway 163) west to

# Gov. Greg Abbot's 40-point plan for improving school safety

Gov. Greg Abbott's suggestions for limiting mass shooting deaths in Texas include a bevy of changes to state law, a culture shift in how law enforcement officers patrol their communities, increases in mental health practices at schools and help for educators who want to improve their abilities to remove potentially dangerous students from classrooms.

Crockett County CCSD Raul Chavarria said the CCCCSD School Board will continue with input as they move forward to creating a conceal carry plan that fits the school district.

"I have asked that once we create a plan that we support it with periodic training," Chavarria said.

Here's what you need to know about the 40page "School and Firearm Safety Action Plan" that Abbott released in Dallas on May 30.

#### Limiting who can buy and keep guns is part of the plan, though in narrow ways

While Abbott's plan doesn't call for any new state statutes that directly limit who can buy guns, it does aim to close some loopholes in laws that already bar some people from purchasing or owning firearms. And it does call for lawmakers to strengthen existing criminal penalties for some people whose guns are used to injure or kill people.

"I can assure you I

"I can assure you I will never allow Second Amendment rights to be infringed, but I will always promote responsible gun ownership," Abbott said May 30.

The governor wants courts to report felony convictions, mental health adjudications and protective orders that can block people from buying guns within 48 hours instead of 30 days.

In Texas, parents can be criminally prosecuted if they don't safely store loaded guns that end up being used in certain crimes by children who are 16 years old and younger. Abbott wants to include 17-year-olds in that law, remove the provision that only allows for prosecution if the guns were loaded when

# Proposed newsprint tariff could be devastating for local newspapers

n 1787 Thomas Jefferson wrote a letter to Edward Carrington, whom he had sent as a delegate to the Continental Congress. In the letter, Jefferson stressed the importance of a free press, specifically newspapers.

Jefferson understood that one of the most important checks on government power was a well-informed

electorate. "The people are the only censors of their governors: and even their errors will tend to keep these to the true principles of their institution. To punish these errors too severely would be to suppress the only safeguard of the public liberty," Jefferson wrote.

As the publisher of a community newspaper for more than 20 years. I understand the importance, even in 2018, of what thousands of newspapers in the United States provide for their readers.

Yes, we publish all the inside information on last Friday night's football game; there are photos of the latest theatre production at the high school; and there are notices about the next Lions

But in addition, we are there at the school board meetings, the city council meetings, and other functions of government, in your place. We are the eyes and ears - and often the advocates - for a well-informed electorate.

In addition, many local businesses - the "mom and pop" stores in your community, rely on the newspaper to deliver their advertising messages at a reasonable

Social media has proven itself unreliable - there is no one vetting the information you find there. And despite the growth of online news, the vast majority of people still get their local news and information via ink on paper.

So it is especially troubling that the U.S. Department of Commerce is considering trade sanctions (tariffs) on newsprint - the actual bulk paper all those newspapers are printed on - from Canada.

Canada has been a longterm partner with the United States when it comes to providing newsprint. In fact, Canada provides about 75 percent of the newsprint used in the U.S.

The root of the tariff proposal comes from one tiny newsprint mill in Washington State. Purchased by a New York hedge fund, the owners are now calling for tariffs, claiming Canada is

unfairly pricing its product. So let's

look at this in context: over the last 10 years or so, the demand for newsprint has declined. Several producers in the U.S. and Canada have either shut

down their mills or they have re-tooled to produce more profitable products, such as corrugated paper products for boxes.

Not a single company is going to invest the tens of millions of dollars required to start a paper mill in those circumstances. And even if they did, it would take years to get up and running. And even if every idle mill magically started producing tomorrow, the U.S. would only be able to produce about 60 percent of the needed prod-

The problem here is that tariffs are proposed for one reason - to benefit the small mill in Washington. If the tariffs are imposed, newsprint could go up 50 percent, which would be devastating to your local newspaper and all who depend on it. The employment consequences would be cata-

The effective result would be to punish those who seek to bring you your local news - "the only safeguard of

public liberty.' Toward the end of Jefferson's letter to Carrington, he said "...were it left to me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers or newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter. But I should mean that every man should receive those papers & be capable of reading them."

Please help ensure that every person who wants to read a newspaper has the opportunity to do so.

I encourage you to contact your member of Congress to express opposition to this terrible proposal, and to ask them to express opposition to the Commerce Department.

4. Real meat does not have to be chemically altered to be made more pleasing to the eye. The only things I've

seen that were the same color as fake meat were found in a box of crayons or in plastic Tupperware® containers in the back of my mom's refrigerator.

5. I'm not aware of any large restaurant chain whose business is built on fake meat. Where are the McDonalds Impersonators, the Tofurkey KFC's or the Outback Beyond-Meat Steakhouses?

6. There is no better smell in the world than real meat on a barbecue pit or bacon grilling in the kitchen. Speaking from personal experience, the smell of barbecued beefsteak can be used as a perfume to attract members of the opposite sex. How the heck do you think I got my beautiful and intelligent wife to marry me? When cooked, fake meat smells like burning tires or a wet chicken coop and can be used as an insect or rattlesnake repellent. Smoke

# Governor offers safety plan designed to prevent shootings at schools

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS** By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on May 30 joined state and local leaders in Dallas and San Marcos to unveil his School and Firearm Safety Action Plan.

The governor's plan came 12 days after the Santa Fe High School shooting in which 10 people were killed and 10 people were injured. It contains 40 recommendations, including proposals that call for:

— Increasing law enforce-

- ment presence at schools; Strengthening existing
- campus security programs; — Enhancing firearm safe-
- Requiring that gun owners report to law enforcement within 10 days if their firearms are lost or stolen;
- Providing mental health evaluations that identify students at risk of harming others, and much more.

Abbott's announcement follows three roundtable discussions seeking input from

victims, parents, educators, lawmakers, law enforcement entities and policy experts.

"This plan is a starting point, not an ending place," Abbott said. "It provides strategies that can be used before the next school year begins to keep our students safe when they return to school. This plan will make our schools safer and our communities safer."

Abbott said he wants state Senate and House leaders to issue an interim charge to consider the merits of adopting a "red flag" law that would allow law enforcement, a family member, school employee or a district attorney to file a petition seeking the removal of firearms from a potentially dangerous person, but only after legal due process is followed.

Abbott's recommendations, if adopted, would re-

quire an estimated \$110 million in funding, according to the Governor's Office.

## **ASSISTANCE IS EXTENDED**

Gov. Greg Abbott on May 25 announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency granted his request to extend the deadline to June 30 for transitional sheltering assistance for Hurricane Harvey survivors.


The assistance helps displaced individuals who are unable to return to their homes find short-term shelter in hotels or other temporary housing.

"Since the devastation brought by Hurricane Harvey, Texas has made great progress in helping families return to their homes," Abbott said.



# When your immune system attacks you



Medical interventions can include; hormone replacement therapy, blood transfusions, anti-inflammatory medication, pain medication, immunosuppressive medications and physical therapy.

They include; herbs, chiropractic therapy, acupuncture and hypnosis.

children accessed them and increase the criminal penalty from a Class A misdemeanor to a third degree felony. The plan also calls for requiring gun owners to report when their firearms are lost or stolen.

# Other possible gun laws are identified, but not explicitly recommended

The plan mentions a potential "red flag" law that would allow judges to temporarily take guns away from people deemed to be dangerous if there is legal due process. Abbott didn't call for legislators to pass such a law — he instead wants to "encourage" lawmakers to "consider the merits" of adopting it. Outgoing House Speaker Joe Straus took him up on that late Wednesday and instructed a committee of the lower chamber to study such

legal provisions.
"In the coming days, I will issue other interim charges

designed to help prevent another school shooting," Straus said in a prepared statement.

Abbott's proposal also calls for encouraging voluntary use of gun locks. It mentions that Ohio requires dealers to also sell access prevention devices and that Maine requires dealers to demonstrate how to use trigger lock devices. The plan says "Texas could emulate these laws," but does not list them as an explicit recommendation for lawmakers.

# Campuses could see more cops and armed marshals

The safety action plan says that schools and local law enforcement agencies should work closer together to increase how often officers are at schools. That includes making campuses regular stops on officers' patrols and giving them rooms inside schools to stop and file reports while on duty.

Abbott also wants to increase the number of school

marshals legally allowed at each campus, streamline the 80-hour training course required to become a marshal and repeal the legal requirement that marshals safely store their firearms. And he'd like to see schools prioritize the hiring of retired police officers and military veterans as resource officers.

# There's a high bar for a special session

A litany of the recommendations would require legislative action. But that may not begin until the next regular legislative session begins in January.

Abbott hasn't ruled out calling a special session before then. But he attached a key caveat that didn't apply to last year's special session: Lawmakers must reach consensus on what bills they plan to pass before he'll convene them in Austin.

# But some recommendations are already moving forward

Several school officials could spend the summer being trained in ways that Abbott hopes will prevent more deaths. The state is paying to train campus staffers who want to become school marshals. Educators and other school officials can also participate in free training for responding to active shooters, a workshop for emergency planning and courses on how to teach emergency incident response to others.

Two state agencies are also increasing the amount of mental health first aid training they provide this summer. And the Texas School Safety Center is partnering with SIGMA Threat Management Associates to train staffers on behavioral threat assessment, a technique used to identify potentially dangerous students and determine the best ways to intervene before they become violent.

# The threshold for kicking kids out of class or school could get

lower

Abbott wants teachers to have the power to immediately place students in alternative classrooms if they threaten violence. He also wants lawmakers to expand the criminal offenses that allow school officials to expel or put a student in disciplinary classrooms. Current felonies that can prompt removal from regular classrooms include murder, kidnapping, sexual offenses, assaults and aggravated robbery. Abbott wants that list to include stalking, cruelty to animals, any weapons-related felony and any organized crime offense.

But when students are placed in alternative class-rooms, Abbott's plan recommends that officials use what's called restorative practices to identify underlying mental health issues that influence behavior. Some Texas schools are already using sim-

ilar practices, which encourage students and teachers to talk through problems and build stronger bonds to prevent conflict and violence.

Increased mental and behav-

ioral health programs are also a major pillar

A key tenet of the proposal relies on expanding use of behavioral health programs and increasing the number of mental health professionals at schools.

Abbott wants his office and lawmakers to identify \$20 million in state funds to begin expanding a mental health screening program operated through the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. One major change proposed would create two classes of school counselors — one that focuses on academic issues like college acceptance and one that concentrates on students' mental health.

"This plan puts the state on a pathway to ensure healthier families, safer schools and safer communities," Abbott said Wednesday.

# Students' behavior — and social media posts — could get closer scrutiny

The Texas Department of Public Safety next month will launch an app called "iWatch Texas," which allows Texans to report suspicious behavior or criminal activity statewide. The safety plan recommends increasing awareness of the app among teachers and students.

"Using a single, statewide reporting system, as opposed to a school-specific system, ensures that tips from different parts of the community are all integrated linking critical data," the plan says.

Reported information is then supposed to be disseminated to relevant law enforcement agencies.

"For example, a student may report strange behavior and statements made by another student," the report says. "Later that day, a citizen reports that the same student was attempting to purchase ammunition at a sporting goods store and became belligerent when refused. The iWatch system would link these separate incidents, and all future reports involving this student on or off campus would be monitored by law enforcement."

Abbott's plan also suggests linking that data to a proposed increase in existing social media monitoring programs.

"Several recent perpetrators of mass shootings had left clues as to their potential homicidal or suicidal intent on publicly accessible social media sites in the months before committing their crimes," the plan says.

#### Some funding is already available, but it's not clear yet how much more is needed

The safety action plan doesn't detail how much it would cost to implement all of the suggestions. Some may not come to fruition. The price tag for others may depend on how many school districts buy in to voluntary proposals.

The plan says the state already has access to \$70 million for some of the recommendations and that the Texas Education Agency is working with school districts on how to prioritize \$62.1 million in federal funds for several of the suggestions. State agencies are also seeking federal funding for mental health first aid training.

The plan notes that "additional funds" could be "offered by the Legislature." But when the legislature convenes for the 2019 regular session, lawmakers will be about \$7.9 billion short of what they need to fund current programs, services and policies, according to a recent report. And in Texas, lawmakers are already largely criticized for decreasing the amount of state spending per student in recent years.





# **DPS joins annual Commercial Vehicle Inspection**

AUSTIN - Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Troopers, inspectors and investigators will conduct enhanced commercial vehicle inspections from June 5-7 as part of Roadcheck 2018, an annual three-day enforcement effort across North America to increase motor carrier, vehicle, driver and cargo safety and security. DPS Troopers will be on the lookout for commercial vehicles, including 18-wheelers and buses, with serious equipment violations and drivers out of compliance with state and federal requirements.

In addition to Roadcheck, DPS periodically carries out additional enforcement efforts in targeted areas where a high volume of trucks or buses may be operating.

During Roadcheck 2018, specially-trained troopers and civilian personnel will inspect commercial vehicles for equipment violations involving brakes, tires, lights and

loading standards. Troopers will check driver licenses and electronic logging devices/ log books, which document how long the driver has been on the road.

In conjunction with these efforts, DPS will also be watching for aggressive, distracted, fatigued or impaired passenger vehicle drivers, the cause of most commercial vehicle crashes.

As Roadcheck begins, DPS is also reminding motorists to slow down or move over for vehicles on the side of the road. By law, drivers in Texas must move out of the lane closest to police, fire, EMS, Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks that are stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated or drivers must slow down to 20 mph below the speed limit. DPS encourages Texas motorists to show the same courtesy to fellow drivers stopped along the road.

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath on May 24 addressed online testing issues that occurred in April and May when 5th and 8th grade students took the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness or "STAAR" examinations.

When the tests were administered, thousands of students encountered connectivity slowdowns and/or login and logout issues that affected their grades.

Student performance on "STAAR" is a component of school ratings. Morath, on May 23, notified school districts and charters that TEA would exclude the results of the STAAR tests for students directly affected by the online testing issues, but, he added, any test results that positively benefit a district or campus rating, that district or campus will receive the higher rating.

Morath said the Texas Education Agency would fine the contractors responsible for the testing problems and move forward with plans to rebid the assessment contracts.

#### **AG FILES MOTION FOR STAY**

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 25 filed an emergency motion with the New Orleans-based U.S. Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit to stay a lower court's May 10 ruling that Texas must alter its voter registration procedures.

The San Antonio-based Federal District Court, Western District of Texas, sided with civil rights plaintiffs in a ruling by Chief Judge Orlando L. Garcia. Texas violated the motor voter provision of the National Voter Registration Act by failing to automatically register voters who use the Department of Public Safety's driver's license renewal and change of address website, Garcia wrote.

Garcia gave the state 45 days to cure the problem and 14 days to devise a statewide public education plan to inform citizens about changes in the voter registration pro-

In his motion, Paxton argued that Garcia's ruling forces Texas to engage in monitoring activities not required by federal law.




