# School board adopts budget and tax rate, Newton resigns

### **BY MELISSA PERNER** THE OZONA STOCKMAN

The Crockett County CCSD School Board approved the 2018-2019 budget and tax rate during a special meeting and public hearing Monday night.

The 2018-2019 budget shows a total decrease of \$315,346. Unlike 2017-2018, where the district adopted a budget with a \$1.6 million deficit, the 2018-2019

budget has a deficit of only black, Chavarria said. \$571,000, said Superintendent Raul Chavarria.

Once state relief money comes in, the deficit will be around \$196,000, Chavarria said.

If the November bond election is passed to move the Qualified School Construction Bond loan payment from the maintenance and operations budget to the interest and sinking budget, then the district will be in the

The \$3.5 million loan, which was approved in 2012, has been used for roof repairs, ac and heating units, the football field turf, teacher housing and school maintenance. The district budgets \$231,000 each year for the QSCB loan payment.

By moving the loan to the I&S fund, the district will be able to pay off the loan faster and have more money in their M&O fund to use for salaries,

teaching supplies and daily ture, I will be able to hold operations, Chavarria said.

To move money from one fund to another, it takes a bond election, Chavarria said. If approved by voters, it would add \$231,000 a year to the maintenance and operations budget, save taxpayers \$446,511 in interest and there is no tax increase to the

taxpayers of Crockett County, Chavarria said. "This will be a huge cost-

savings. Hopefully, in the fu-

The board did adopt the 2018-2019 tax rates. The total tax rate will be \$1.204 per \$100 of taxable value, this includes \$1.06 M&O rate and \$.144 for I&S.

There is a \$.09 increase in the total tax rate this year due to the district combining the 2014 \$3 million and the 207

# State senator candidate, Flores, holds meet and greet in Ozona

While Democratic candidates duked it out over tax liens and residency, Peter Flores was just spreading his message throughout counties of Senate District 19.

A message that got voters' attention and put Flores, a Republican, atop of an eight-candidate field on July 31.

Now, Flores is spreading his message ain as he faces former U.S. and State Representative, Pete Gallego, in a Sept. 18 runoff for the State Senate District 19 Special Election. "Shock and awe," said Flores during a meet and greet Monday at the Crockett County Public Library. "We came out five points ahead of Pete Gallego. We knocked out Roland Gutierrez. The grassroots showed up. We never stopped the relationships in our communities. Flores, a retired Texas game warden from Pleasanton, finished ahead of Gallego, 34 to 29 percent. Gutierrez, a state representative from San Antonio, drew just 24 percent of the vote despite starting his campaign in early 2017 and raising more than \$500,000.

A-F school grades: what stands

Several days after Texas gave school districts their first official grades, school communities are still figuring out how to digest their report cards and interpret the results.

Even school superintendents, the biggest critics of the new A-F school ratings, are poring over the data forced to balance their mistrust of the new system with a responsibility to score high by its metrics.

"I can walk and chew bubble gum at the same time," said John Kuhn, Mineral Wells ISD superintendent, whose North Texas district received an overall rating of C. "I can criticize a system that is patently unfair while also seeking to improve under that system. I do feel a great deal of pressure to move our score up.'

State officials have argued that giving school districts grades instead of the previous pass/fail ratings, will give parents more information to choose the best educational options for their kids. But so far, there's a lot of disagreement about exactly what the data means.

The election is being held due to Carlos Uresti, who last represented the district, being convicted on 11 felony counts including fraud and money laundering. Uresti resigned from office in June.

1. The majority of Ds and Fs were given to districts with higher rates of economically disadvantaged or low-income students than the state average. No school district with a rate of low-income students lower than 30 percent received an overall rating of C, D or F. (The state calculates the percent of low-income students based on the number who receive free or reduced-price meals, which many agree is

# Homeowners - Be wary of homestead exemption offers

Mailboxes of new homeowners are often flooded with letters from companies looking to cash in on things you might need, like lawn care services or cable. Included in all the mail solicitations could be a letter offering to register you for a homestead exemption — for a fee. Recently a warning about this solicitation was issued by the Texas Attorney General's Office.

The official looking letter is titled, "Designation of Home-

ers who re-

the form and send it in along with a payment to file the exemption.

What appears to be a letter from an actual government agency is really a craftily designed solicitation. Homestead Recording Service is not a government agency, nor is it associated with any taxing authority.

To look even more legitimate, the reverse side of the form is filled with relevant text from the Texas Constitution and the Texas Property Code about homesteads. Scammers aren't usually in the habit of quoting the law, so this seems to add to the credibility of the document. Also, instead of directly asking for money, like most sales letters, it instructs you to do the opposite. The form states, in all caps, "YOU MUST USE THIS FORM, OR WE WILL NOT PREPARE YOUR DOCUMENT.'

Buying a home can be costly, so it's best to avoid un-

necessary fees when you can. Here are a few tips to keep in mind if you receive this letter:

>> Don't pay for something that is free. Filing for a homestead exemption is relatively easy and it is free. You can either go to your county Tax Assessor's Office or file online.

>> Read each letter carefully. New homeowners will likely be inundated with mail. Look for disclaimers in the small print.

>> Don't share personal

information. Scammers often ask for sensitive information that could put you at risk for identity theft. Know who you share your information with. To report a scam, go to





# **Officials observe anniversary of Hurricane Harvey at Rockport church**

AUSTIN — August 25 marked one year since Hurricane Harvey's battering winds and torrential rains brought death and destruction to coastal and inland counties of Texas.

Repairs and rebuilding in the region continue to this day, and the U.S. Office of Coastal Management has estimated the cost of the storm at \$125 billion.

Gov. Greg Abbott and a host of other government officials spoke on Aug. 22 at the First Baptist Church in the hard-hit city of Rockport on the Coastal Bend.

"I know there are miles to go before this race is finished. Our goal is to do far more than just rebuild. Our goal is to ensure that we rebuild all of these communities even better than they were before Hurricane Harvey hit," Abbott said.

Vice President Mike Pence said he had come on President Trump's behalf "to re-

### an inexact measure.)

Educators point to this data to argue that the new ratings benefit districts that already have resources and don't show how well school districts are performing despite the inherent challenges of educating students whose families are struggling.

Many argue the ratings are too heavily based on state standardized tests and therefore are unfair to schools enrolling mostly low-income students, who tend to perform lower on those tests.

"The ratings reflect a mixture of factors that are within the schools' control and that are without the schools' control," Kuhn said. "The state should not be allowed to underfund schools in a community and then slap on a failing score without acknowledging the state's role in not providing resources."

"If you're looking at this B district and it really should have scored a C, there might be great things going on in that district," said Chris Jackson, accountability director at Cleburne ISD, a North Texas district that received an overall rating of C.

### 2. But it wasn't impossible for school districts enrolling higher rates of low-income students to do well.


The majority of school districts in the state's South Texas region, which includes the Rio Grande Valley, received overall ratings of As and Bs, despite educating mostly students who are low-income and in need of additional resources to learn. State education officials have pointed to these districts to say that poverty has a "moderate" but not allencompassing effect on the ratings.

Valley View ISD, at the border with Mexico, was the traditional, non-charter school district with the highest rate of low-income students to also receive an A from the state. Superintendent Rolando Ramirez attributes the high grade to the district's has implemented a system of programs that fill in the gaps for students who don't have a lot at home: free meals during and after school, community events with free vaccines and physical exams, and free services for parents.

The districts in West Texas between Midland and Big Bend have the lowest average scores in the state. On average, 53 percent of students here are economically disadvantaged.

"We're in the oil fields. Many of the kids who have been economically disadvantaged in the past, their parents have jobs now or have good-paying jobs," said Superintendent Scotty Carman. The district would have received a D, without a feature of the rating system critics are calling "forced failure." Any district that receives three out of 4 Fs in the subcategories that make up the overall grade automatically receives an overall grade of F — no matter its actual score.

schools. "We're doing so great that teachers who are not getting results are moving out, the ones who are are improving, and the ones who are doing well are reaching the highest levels of pay," said Miguel Solis, board trustee.

Administrators decided this year to scale back the program in part by decreasing the number of educators eligible for stipends.

### 4. There wasn't a major disparity in the results for charters and traditional school districts.

Charters — public schools with more freedom from state regulations – and traditional districts often compete for students in urban and suburban areas of the state.

The percentage of charters receiving overall A grades more than doubled the percentage for traditional districts. But both had a comparable level of As and Bs combined. A larger percentage of charter districts scored overall ratings of Ds and Fs than traditional school districts. Laura Kelly, the Texas Charter Schools Association's director of quality, said that the percentage of low grades is amplified by the relatively small number of charter districts. Texas gave grades to 87 charter districts and 742 traditional school districts this year.

Flores faced Uresti in 2016, where he received 97,600 votes and won Crockett County.

"I strongly believe in this. I don't ever quit when I know it's the right thing to do," Flores said.

Gutierrez and Gallego, both Democrats, went toe-totoe over Gutierrez's tax liens and forfeitures and Gallego's residency outside the district during the campaign. The Republican Party of Texas is suing to remove Gallego from the ballot, alleging he does not live in the district as required by state law.

A state district judge ruled that Gallego can be on the ballot and the runoff election can proceed.

In a phone call Tuesday morning, Gallego said he is planning on making a stop in Ozona next month.

Flores, 58, heads into the runoff with the backing of Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, Sens. John Cornyn and Ted Cruz.

The 35,000-square-mile district runs west from Bexar County past Alpine and Pecos, covering 400 miles of the U.S.-Mexico border and all or parts of 17 counties, including Crockett County.

Flores and Gallego took the West Texas counties, but Flores won the Election Day vote in Bexar County with 41 percent.

If Flores should win, he will be the first Republican to represent the district since right after the Civil War.

"The next few weeks will be historic. We don't have the same families from San Antonio," Flores said.

Flores, a graduate from Laredo High School and Texas A&M University, worked himself up through the ranks as

a Texas Game Warden to become the Chief Game Warden of the State.

"I don't waste taxpayers' money. I have worked with the legislature and I know it's all about relationships," Flores said. "I'm not going to violate my oath for you."

Flores will tell you he is a "fiscally conservative Republican" and "believes in God, family and the constitution."

"My opponent will not be able to get it done in a Republican dominated senate," Flores said.

Flores said in his travels throughout the district, the one main question he is asked is "will you come see us again?"

During his term, Uresti never visited Crockett County.

"I'm hearing that everywhere. That's sad," Flores said.

With the runoff election being held at an odd time, Flores said the biggest thing he is doing is encouraging people to just get out and vote. An estimated 20,000 voters are expected to turnout in the runoff.

"If not for the party, then vote for the man," he said.

Early voting runs Sept. 10-14. Runoff Election Dav is Sept. 18.

"We're trying to help parents and kids and alleviate, as much as we can, any expense they might have," he said.

However, in West Texas Permian Basin region, most school districts received Cs, Ds and even one F — despite having generally lower rates of low-income students than the state average. Crockett County CCSD received a C.

Wink-Loving ISD – a small rural district with two campuses and 400 students — scored that F, making it an outlier given its 30 percent poverty rate.

strict sanctions for chronically low-performing schools, including state-mandated closure of a school or state takeover of a school district.

Fort Worth ISD and Dallas ISD both had 14 schools that got failing ratings last year. Fort Worth ISD boosted a couple of schools up to a passing rating.

Dallas ISD whittled its list low-performing schools of down to 4, in part by giving stipends totaling up to \$12,000 to high-quality teachers who choose to work in those struggling schools — a tactic state officials have expressed interest in replicating across the state.

Dallas ISD is struggling to fund the stipend program's successes, as more teachers turn around low-performing

Unlike educators in traditional school districts, she said she doesn't see school funding issues playing a role in the distribution of this year's ratings.

"Traditional school districts struggle under limited resources the way charters struggle under limited resources," she said. "Do I think that plays out in the academic accountability system? I don't."



the board. There were tough decisions that our board faced and made," Chavarria said.

The board also approved the agreement for the purchase of attendance credits for the 2018-2019 school year.

This year the district will be sending \$5.6 million to the state for recapture as part of the Robin Hood plan. This is an increase of \$84,318 due to values increasing.

The budget also includes a pay increase for teachers and staff. Teachers will now be paid \$9,500 above state average

"That puts at the top tier of teachers pay for our area,' Chavarria said. "As soon as we saw a chance to reward our staff and teachers with a pay increase, our board jumped on that.'

Some of the other changes in the 2018-2019 budget include:

· A \$164,184 reduction in instruction with cuts made in contracted services, computer equipment, supplies and technology (which were replaced by bond fund), and salaries in positions that were absorbed. The district has reduced teachers and staff from 148 employees to 136 through attrition.

· A \$586 increase in instructional resources and media services for library general supplies, but a \$250 cut was made in librarian travel.

• An \$8,178 reduction in instructional staff development due to reduction in having to travel for training and more online training decreased need for substitutes.

· A \$23,208 increase in instructional leadership due to moving the testing coordinator's salary (now dual credit) into this budget and a \$970 decrease in travel.

· A \$2,474 reduction in school administration in principal and secretary salaries and benefits and office supplies and equipment.

· A \$63,938 reduction in

• A \$2,596 increase in food services due to Teacher Retirement Services Benefit Increase.

• A \$24,743 reduction in co-curricular with decrease in UIL sponsor or change in stipend, cuts in the officials and clinicians' budget, cuts in athletic fuel and inventory supplies and cuts in coaches, band and UIL travel.

• A \$1,044 increase in administration due to salaries and windfarm legal expenses, but \$3,800 cuts to school board and general supplies budget and \$1,500 cuts to

equipment. A \$11,349 increase in data processing due to salaries and benefits, cell phone, fuel and Region 15 contracts.

· A \$12,858 reduction in debt service because interest decreased on the QSCB note.

Four out of five pregnancy-related deaths in 2012 would have had at least some chance of being prevented with the proper intervention, DSHS said.

"The report provides us with more evidence to guide our activities to address maternal mortality and morbidity in Texas," said DSHS Commissioner Dr. John Hellerstedt. "It shows where interventions like TexasAIM can have the greatest impact."

Launched earlier this year, TexasAIM is a partnership with more than 180 hospitals to implement maternal safety "bundles" — sets of practices that help hospital staff prevent and respond to pregnancy complications. Hospitals are first implementing the bundle on maternal hemorrhage. Future will address opioid use and high blood pressure, the DSHS said.

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced the Aug. 22 sale of \$7.2 billion in Texas Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes received a net interest rate of 1.84 percent.

Hegar said his office received 65 bids worth \$27.4 billion, or 3.8 times the amount offered for sale. The state of Texas uses money from the sale of the notes to help fund expenditures such as publicschool payments made early in the fiscal year before the arrival of tax revenues later in the year.

Hegar said the fact that bids totaled nearly four times the amount offered demonstrates "the market is confident that Texas remains a solid investment.'

Notes sold on Aug. 22 will be repaid on Aug. 29, 2019, Hegar added.



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
