## Ozona man sentenced to four years in prison for sexual assault of a child

An Ozona man was sentenced to four years in prison after originally being charged with 17 counts of sexual assault of a child.

At a hearing Friday in the Crockett County Courthouse, 112th Judicial District Judge Pete Gomez Jr. sentenced Augustine Jerardo Dominguez, 25, to four years in prison for

six of the 17 counts and then deferred adjudication probation for 10 years for the remaining nine counts.

Dominguez had previously entered a guilty plea to the charges in August 2017, where

he was placed on seven years deferred adjudication community supervision and had to register as a sex offender.

He was charged in three separate indictments with sexually assaulting three separate young girls on multiple occasions, according to court documents. All three victims were under the age of 17. The incidents occurred from 2013-2015.

The charges were second-degree felonies that carried

a minimum sentence of two years and a maximum sentence of 20 years each.

Friday's hearing was due to Dominguez violating the terms of his probation by allegedly committing the offense of possession of marijuana on April 4, hanging around a 13 year-old juvenile without approval, being within 1,000 feet of a school, failed to report to the community supervision officer and lying

to the community supervision officer about his residency, according to court documents.

"You have the opportunity to go to prison and see what that is like," Gomez told Dominguez at Friday's hearing. "Successfully completing the probation is up to you. I can still send you to prison for the rest of your life. You are only 25. You are worth trying to salvage."

In his closing statements

at Friday's hearing, 112th Judicial District First Assistant District Attorney Jerry Phillips emphasized that Dominguez should be given a lengthy prison sentence.

"Good guys don't have sex with children. He needs to go to prison and go to prison for a long time," Phillips said. "One of the most important jobs we have is the protection

## School board discussing moving forward with Guardian Plan at tonight's meeting

The CCCSD School Board will discuss moving forward on instituting the Guardian Plan at tonight's (Sept. 19) regular meeting.

The meeting will start at 6:30 p.m. at the Administration Building, 797 Avenue D. The meeting is open to the public.

The agenda also states that the board will discuss creations of guidelines and regulations to govern the Guardian Plan.

The Guardian Plan allows local school boards to determine training standards and authorize specific employees to conceal carry firearms on campus at all times.

The school board and school district officials have been discussing options regarding conceal and carry and district staff members since the April 18 regular board meeting.

"The arming of teachers is not something we take lightly. We want to explore all options and research area plans to come up with one that fits our needs," said Superintendent Raul Chavarria at the Aug. 15 board meeting.

Also on the agenda, the board will have dis-

cussion and possible action for the selection of replacement of board member for the vacant position left by Amy Newton when she resigned last month.

The item is also on the agenda to discuss in closed session under Texas Government Code 551.074 that allows to deliberate the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline or dismissal of a public officer or employee in closed meeting.

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## Support Animal Agriculture Disease Preparedness in the 2018 Farm Bill

The Farm Bill authorizes many programs designed to support farmers and ranchers, but one new provision deserves special attention from lawmakers: the creation of a foot-and-mouth disease (FMD) vaccine bank.

Back in 2001, producers in the United Kingdom suffered severe financial losses after FMD spread rapidly in cattle, sheep and pigs. The disease does not impact human safety or the safety of our food supply, but the consequences are severe for animal agriculture and producers. By the time the English FMD outbreak was

over, 6 million animals were dead, and the United Kingdom suffered economic losses of more than \$16 billion.

I have a particular interest in protecting against such an outbreak, not only as a producer but also as the Chairman of the Cattle Health and Well-Being

Committee at the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Producers and veterinarians agree that the U.S. must improve its ability to rapidly respond to animal diseases. The FMD Vaccine Bank would be a step in the right direction.

Under the status quo, the current vaccine bank is shared with Mexico and Canada. The amount of vaccine would not be enough to cover the needs of cattle in Texas, let alone three countries who share borders. If an FMD outbreak were to occur, the U.S. would not be able to quickly acquire enough vac-

cine to respond effectively. Current language in the 2018 Farm Bill changes that, directing the U.S. Department of Agriculture to establish and maintain a rapidly-deployable FMD Vaccine Bank with the capacity to develop a sufficient quantity of vaccines in a timely manner.

Industry groups have requested that Congress provide \$150 million annually for five years to get the foot-and-mouth disease vaccine bank up and running. It is a large sum of money, but it must be weighed against the potential consequences and economic losses of an outbreak.

A study released by Iowa State University concluded that an uncontained FMD outbreak in the United States would cost the beef and pork sectors more than \$128 billion over 10 years. Corn and soybean farmers would also be impacted, losing \$44 billion and \$25 billion, respectively. Overall employment would fall by about 1.5 million jobs.

Beyond the FMD Vaccine Bank, other programs under consideration in the Farm Bill would make important contributions to animal disease preparedness. The Animal Pest, Disease and Disaster Preven-

tion and Response Program (APAD) and funding for the National Animal Health Laboratory Network, are both critical components of the U.S. response infrastructure as well.

The 2018 Farm Bill can make significant improvements in animal disease preparedness. These programs are responsible investments in the future health of our agricultural economy. Federal lawmakers would be wise to support and fully fund them.

## Property taxes rise, state education spending falls - that's the design

The state's budget situation improves as the financial load on Texas property owners increases. That makes for noisy and gnarly politics.

Officials from the Texas Education Agency gave state budget writers an early look at their budget numbers this week — the Trib's Aliyya Swaby wrote about it — saying that they expect property values to rise 6.8 percent per year over the next two years. Their takeaway gives a new meaning to take-away: That means local property taxpayers will be paying billions more for public schools and that the state will spend billions less than it would otherwise as a result.

This is so normal in Texas politics and state budgeting that even the finger-pointing is choreographed. Local officials say the state is funding its budget with money that's supposed to be spent in local schools. State officials will tell you that's how the school finance formulas are supposed to work: by figuring out local property values — what the school districts can raise locally — and then adding enough state funding to bring them to the level where the state wants them to be. Local officials will tell you that the state is scamming taxpayers, funding state government by bleeding money out of local schools and the property taxes that support them.

If that makes it sound like legislators are victims of the system, in a way — that, hey, there's not much they can do about your local property taxes going up — all the better, at least politically.

Remember, though: Those same state lawmakers are the authors of the formulas. They have the power to change things whenever they can muster the votes.

Local school districts are supposed to have complete control over property taxes. It's an odd dance, though. The state government is constitutionally barred from levying property taxes, so they can't set rates and so on. But they've written school finance laws to keep local districts between the rails — raising enough that they're not cheating the state and also effectively capping property tax rates for maintenance and operation of schools (big stadiums and water parks are an-

other part of the law, for another day).

So the state isn't setting rates. But the locals can't put the rates wherever they want, either.

Slick, ain't it?

This is a perennial issue in the Texas Legislature. Public education is big, important, expensive and political. It's not something that can be permanently fixed, either — just look at the evidence.

Texas remains heavily reliant on property taxes; according to the Tax Foundation, ours is the sixth highest such tax in the country. Texas ranks 12th highest for sales tax, the lion's share of which go to the state. It's not like there's a lot of ready money floating around, a popular new tax to levy, or a clamor for another whack at education funding like the one made by the Legislature in 2011. Amend that, slightly: The state's so-called Rainy Day Fund has a record balance, but legislators have been loath to tap it for ongoing expenses.

Property owners really dislike property taxes, especially in the face of a long-tailed increase in property values like Texas is in. It's great to own an appreciating asset, but if it's a house, it raises the cost of living whether the owners' incomes are increasing along with it.

It's a financial burden that becomes an irritant that becomes a political problem that becomes a legislative debate so familiar that the players can recite each other's arguments.

TEA got to start this round by simply reciting how the machine works: Property values are rising and with them, local tax revenue. The state, as a result, will spend less on public education while locals pay more. Or was it that the state is stealing money from the local districts and funneling it to whatever is on the other end of the funnel this time.

It's hard to remember who did what, isn't it?

## Name Your Poison

Today's lesson is about poisonous plants, dangerous delectables and fatal feedstuffs. I'm talking nightshade, lupine, milkweed, and the poison used to kill Socrates: hemlock. Water hemlock is said to look a lot like parsnips and a human can die in half an hour just by licking the blade of the knife used to cut a hemlock root. That's why I avoid all feedstuffs that look like vegetables!

Some plants are poisonous only in huge doses. A 500 pound calf would have to eat one and a half pounds of cocklebur seed to die.

The preferred plant for cows considering suicide is locoweed, but a bovine has to become addicted to it and eat it for two to three weeks to go nuts, or develop what cow coroners call "wet brain". (Also known as Congressperson brain.)

An old cowboy once told me to just remember that most poisonous plants are yellow and have three leaves; "Three leaves stay clear, 5 leaves no fear." I've never had a cow die from eating a poisonous plant but that doesn't mean there aren't some really dangerous feedstuffs a cow can consume. Here's my list of the worst:

Floral Arrangements: Although I've never engaged in the practice, I understand there are some men who buy their wives, girlfriends, or both, arrangements of flowers at a place called a "florist". If you're a cattleman you have a good excuse for not buying such things. One time a neighbor threw an old flower arrangement over her back fence and one of my cows ate it and

got really sick. Although we could never prove it, the vet and I believe it was the delphiniums.

Alfalfa: I'll never forget the time I saw two dozen bloated carcasses by the side of the road and a rancher sitting on top of one of them bawling his eyes out. He had drug them there to make it easier for the tallow man to put them in his truck. The cows died from instant gasification, you might

say. I heard later that the rancher thought a change of pasture was just what the cows needed but the next day there was another batch of dead cows. Prussic acid has killed more cows than your vet and Mad Cow put together.

Hay: Ranchers routinely throw their net worth out of the back end of the feed truck and every flake they throw is one dollar not saved for retirement, or spent on a romantic vacation with the wife. Putting up hay is a leading cause of exhaustion, accidents and divorce. This is why when they hear of an approaching fire most ranchers, instead of saving their herd, their family, or their barb wire collection, will scream, "Save the haystack."

Vegetables: Although there were nine wires on the fence between a rancher's cows and his neighbor's carrot and lettuce

fields, the hungry herd broke through and trampled and consumed 40 acres of lettuce and carrots on a \$25 per carton lettuce market. Like most vegetarians, the cows were clammy, pasty looking, aloof, smelly, and sickly afterwards. They got the Trotsky Two Step and their cow pies glowed an iridescent orange. The legal settlement was so huge the rancher couldn't even look at a salad bar without upchucking.

Corn: Cheap corn is one of the most dangerous plants in the world. In order to "capture extra profits" that economists opine about, it causes farmer/ranchers to feed their corn to their cattle instead of just taking their lumps and selling the corn and the calves. A farmer friend once told me he would have lost less money if on the day he put his calves in his own makeshift feedlot every one of them would have dropped dead.

Green Grass: Easily the most dangerous plant known to man. It has ruined more ranchers than trich or the BLM. The symptoms of grass fever are a constant smile on the face of cattlemen, an outbreak of new trucks and the sight of ranchers treating their wives to lunch at the sale yard coffee shop. Green grass fever disrupts the cognitive process and regular function of brain cells and causes ranchers to pay crazy prices for old, barren, toothless cows. The prognosis is bad and the sufferer should be quarantined until the market crashes or the brain synapses start firing again.

## Weather system prompts Texas to prepare as hurricane season continues

AUSTIN — Before Hurricane Florence reached the shores of the Carolinas last week, Gov. Greg Abbott focused on the Gulf of Mexico, where an inbound tropical disturbance threatened the southern region of Texas.

Proactively, Abbott on Sept. 14 issued a disaster declaration for 78 counties stretching from the Texas Gulf Coast to deep into the interior of the Lone Star State.

A daily earlier, Abbott ordered the state's emergency operations center to increase its readiness level and said some 25 state agencies, plus the American Red Cross and The Salvation Army, would be ready to help communities. The governor urged Texans to prepare by assembling emergency kits, essential documents and evacuation maps.

Abbott also recommended that Texans in coastal areas:

- Select a safe evacuation route for all family members and pets;

- Consider special needs for individuals with disabilities or the elderly;
- Stay informed about changing weather conditions; and

- Follow local officials' instructions if a storm develops.

While last week's tropical disturbance proved to be much milder than anticipated, the Atlantic hurricane season continues until Nov. 30. Comprehensive disaster readiness and response tips can be found at the National Weather Service website, weather.gov and ready.gov.

### RAINY DAY FUND IS EYED

In preparation for the upcoming legislative session scheduled to begin in January, the Senate Finance Committee in a Sept. 11 hearing considered state spending and costs related to the 2017 Hurricane

Harvey disaster.

Figures provided to the powerful, budgeting-writing committee by the Legislative Budget Board show the state already has spent \$2.6 billion on Harvey-related disaster recovery. But that amount, largely federal funds, does not include dollars for public education, according to the Senate News Service.

Public education in Texas is funded primarily by local property taxes, so when property values in a district decrease, so does the money available for public schools there.

Lost property value could mean up to \$1.4 billion less for school districts in the areas affected by Hurricane Harvey, which caused an estimated \$125 billion in damages.

Some members of the committee suggested tapping the state's nearly \$11 billion

Economic Stabilization Fund, also known as the Rainy Day fund, to help overcome local property tax revenue shortfalls.


Michael is survived by his parents, Ray and Sheri Hill of Ozona, two brothers Jonathan Hill (Tatum) of

The main concerns with multi-level marketing companies, however, is their unqualified representatives and the efficacy of their products. The sellers often promote themselves as an authority after only one or two of their respective company's product information meetings. In near sheepish oblivion, they adopt their tutor's dialogue, ignore the inflated product costs, and have no idea that some of the products' ingredients inflict harm over time. An experienced practitioner in the art of deception could not have developed a more effective way to turn ordinary people into scam-artists.

They promote the idea of selling products and convincing others to sell for you in an intense, cult-like, brain-washing presentation. Their explanation or sharing commissions in a "get rich quick" system is very appealing. The truth is, it's "too good to be true."

"Let's start off by clarifying that in general, multilevel marketing companies are legal scams in the United States. The government allows them to exist and multiply. They offer products which are little more than a "front" for the schemes, since without a legitimate looking product or service, the companies would be at risk of appearing to be illegal pyramid schemes," explains Tracy Coenen, a forensic accountant and fraud investigator with Sequence Inc.

in Chicago and Milwaukee.

A \$550-billion-dollar industry, worldwide, it's no wonder celebrities like Marie Osmond, Kirstie Alley, Gwyneth Paltrow, Oprah Winfrey and hundreds more are seen in all forms of social media hawking the benefits to your health and wellness with their "miracle" products and detoxifying remedies.

According to the National Council Against Health Fraud (NCAHF), "A focus upon new distributor recruitment in hopes of sharing in their commissions can cause multilevel marketing programs to become illegal pyramid schemes. An important legal criterion is that in pyramid schemes, most of the products become inventory in the hands of hopeful distributors instead of being bought and used by consumers. Thus, the unwitting, hopeful distributor may be victimized twice."

We assume our society's business dealings are regulated by law. We tend to believe our government and public agencies are in place to keep us from making mistakes. However, commercial entities cleverly take advantage of these beliefs and hire those who understand how human failings and vulnerabilities can best be exploited. They are determined to separate you from your money and make it theirs, one way or another.

Government agencies do not work in the best interests of our health and wellness. They are there to bolster our national economy by funneling resources to corporate entities and aiding them in securing their 'investments'... and WE are their most abundant resource.

In 2009, a group of scientists brought together by, "Sense and Science", a United Kingdom charity contacted the manufacturers of fifteen health and wellness products sold in pharmacies and supermarkets. Among the products were dietary

supplements, smoothies and shampoos. However, when the scientists asked for evidence behind the claims, none of the manufacturers could define what they meant by their product claims, let alone name the toxins.

I called three representatives of the above mentioned MLM's regarding their product claims for an earlier HTYH submission. I asked each rep at least two questions. One was, "How will your product benefit me?" and, "What toxins will be cleansed by your detoxifying product?"

In reply to the first question, I heard the scripted spiel of each representative's emotionally-punctuated, company-mandated claims, but none of them could support their assertions with scientific evidence. To the second question, I was told the detoxifying products cleansed hundreds of toxins, but no one could give or help me find a list of toxins eliminated.

Your best leverage with corporate entities is how you spend your dollars. They do their job and they do it well, but be wary of the persuasive tactics they employ. Wise-up to the commercial marketing ploys and psychological tools they use and, most importantly, be mindful of everything you put into your body.

Seek the advice of trusted healthcare professionals, rely only on science-backed information and foster fact-based knowledge. It's YOUR body. Ask questions. Get second opinions. Assume responsibility of your own health and wellbeing.

Remember, your money is best served... when it serves you.

counties. "I represent big towns and small towns. I represent people who voted for me and those who didn't," Hurd said to the Ozona crowd. "There's way more that unites us than divides us."

Hurd is facing Democrat Gina Ortiz Jones in the upcoming Nov. 6 General Election.

At Monday's town hall, the congressman stressed that District 23 is the only "50/50" district in Texas, meaning 50 percent Republican and 50 percent Democrat.

Jones, 37, is a former Air Force intelligence officer from San Antonio. She points to her work on security and trade issues in the Obama administra-

tion and says she would bring urgency to health care and other matters vital to Texans.

During his talk, Hurd mentioned the 843 bipartisan bills passed in congress out of 854.

Some of the bills deal with opioid epidemic and human trafficking.

He talked about the energy boom happening in the area and the positive impact it is having on the economy, but that it is also having a negative impact on the roads.

"We've been working with TXDOT on a major grant that the department of transportation is going to fund," said Hurd. "We've been working with them on priority projects, and hopefully we will be hearing about them in the next couple of weeks."

Hurd also discusses access to rural health care and making sure everyone's insurance works in all hospitals and receiving general access to health care.

He also addressed border security issues. More than 820 miles of Hurd's district is along the border with Mexico.

"We should be having smart solutions, and we should be looking at every mile of the border separately. There is not a one size fits all solution to border security," said Hurd. "I just recently went to Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala. I looked at the root causes that is causing drugs coming into our country and illegal immigration. We address this problem there, then it is not on our shores."

of our children. You choose to sexually assault a juvenile you need to go to prison for a long time. That message needs to be heard. This community needs to know that this will not be tolerated."

Phillips also mentioned Dominguez's parole violations in his closing statement. "He has put himself here," Phillips said of Dominguez at the hearing. "He is putting himself in prison and that is where he needs to be. He had a second chance. The only way to protect this man from this community is for him to go to prison for a long time." Dominguez was repre-

sented by Ozona attorney Orlando DeHoyos.

In his closing statement, DeHoyos said the victims were over the age of 14, meaning by the law that allowed for consent. He also said by Dominguez pleading guilty he has already accepted responsibility, and that Dominguez understands the mistakes he made in violating his probation.

"There are resources in place to make sure none of this happens again. He has not exhibited any of that behavior since then," DeHoyos said. "Since he violated his probation, he's not had any contact with any minors."

Dominguez has 30 days to decide whether or not to appeal Gomez's decision.

## Game Warden Field Notes

### TREASURE HUNT

On Aug. 17, a Montgomery County game warden used his side scan sonar to check the water around public boat ramps on Lake Conroe for dumped vehicles. While scanning the Scott's Ridge boat ramp, the warden recorded an image that looked like a vehicle submerged in the water. The Montgomery County Precinct 1 Constable dive team was called out to assist with determining what the object was. They recovered a late model Mercedes Benz sedan that had been reported stolen on June 25. The investigation as to how the vehicle got there is ongoing.

### GOT A SPARE KEY?

On Aug. 8, Aransas County game wardens received a call concerning two indi-

viduals on a jet ski in Copano Bay who had gotten separated after the driver was thrown from the vessel with the kill switch lanyard still attached to his arm. Without the kill switch, the passenger was unable to restart the vessel and floated away from the operator. Friends of the two individuals located the jet ski and passenger but could not locate the operator. After searching the area and hearing faint a yell from the bay, the wardens and sheriff's deputies were still unable to locate the operator. The United States Coast Guard was notified and a helicopter requested to aid in the search after dark. The USCG helicopter located the operator and guided the game warden boat to the victim's location where he was transported to his vacation residence. Both individuals were unhurt and now have a new respect for the bay and for life jackets. A job well done by the three agencies involved in the search. The outcome could have been a much different and tragic one.

enables victims and claimants to apply online for Crime Victims' Compensation and Emergency Medical Care Compensation for sexual assault exams.

The portal is intended to make it easier for crime victims, claimants and their advocates to submit applications, upload crime-related bills and follow the steps of the claim and bill review process with near real-time updates.

Created by the Legislature in 1979, the Crime Victims' Compensation program is administered by the attorney general's office and reimburses victims and claimants for certain crime-related expenses not paid by other sources, such as funeral and burial, mental health care, loss of wages, loss of support, child care and medical care.

The program receives criminal court costs, fees and fines from convicted offend-

ers to reimburse victims and their families for crime-related expenses of up to \$50,000. More information can be found at [texasattorneygeneral.gov](http://texasattorneygeneral.gov).

### REVENUE IS DISTRIBUTED

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Sept. 12 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts some \$739 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of September, an amount 10.5 percent greater than the amount returned in September 2017.

Allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly.

Texas Secretary of State Rolando Pablos on Sept. 7 posted a reminder that Oct. 9 is the voter registration deadline and to make all necessary preparations to be able to cast a ballot in the upcoming November 6 General Election.

Pablos encouraged all eligible Texas voters to ensure that they:

- Are registered to vote in their county of residence; and
- Are aware of what they need to bring to the polls in order to cast a ballot.

"Don't wait until the last minute," Pablos said, and encouraged Texans to avoid waiting at the polls on Election Day by voting during the early voting period that will begin on Monday, Oct. 22, and end on Friday, Nov. 2.
