School superintendent addresses voters bond election questions

Crockett County CCSD Superintendent Raul Chavarria addressed voters and answered questions Monday night during a town hall meeting on the proposed bond election.

The election will appear on the Nov. 6 General Election ballot.

The bond will involve moving money from the school district's maintenance and operations budget, which is subject to recapture by the state's Robin Hood plan, to the district's interest and sinking fund. All the money in the I&S fund remains in Crockett County.

The funding that is being moved is the Qualified School Construction Bond (QSCB) loan that the board

approved in 2011-2012. The \$3.5 million federal loan has been used for roof repairs, ac and heating units, the football field turf, teacher housing and school maintenance.

The district budgets \$231,000 each year for the QSCB loan payment.

By moving the loan to the I&S fund, the district will be able to pay off the loan faster and have more money in their M&O fund to use for salaries, teaching supplies and daily operations, Chavarria said.

To move money from one fund to another, it takes a bond election, Chavarria said. If approved by voters, it would add \$231,000 a year to the maintenance and operations budget, save taxpayers \$446,511 in interest and there is no tax increase to the tax-

Texas' economy depends on 'educational climate change'

■oday's Texas economy is doing greatand education, well. not so much.

In 2017, the economy of Texas was the secondlargest in the U.S. and ranked first for current economic climate thanks to strong employment.

Strong economies—from the rolling plains to the high-rises—depend on a qualified workforce.

Society has developed, adopted and scaled an incredible range of technological innovation that has transformed our world. However, economists predict that continuing advances in technology will reward education and the skills necessary to

maintain steady employment. Selecting from among more than 28,000 U.S. public high schools and 1,044 Texas school districts, U.S. News & World Report included 601 Texas schools in the 2018 Best High School rankings. Of those 601 Texas schools, 62 percent earned a bronze rating, 26 percent were awarded silver, while 12 percent achieved gold!

But national school rankings, like national football rankings, can bring false reassurance.

Within a dozen years, the Texas labor force will need 60 percent of all 25- to 34-year-olds — almost 2 million — to hold industryrecognized certificates and college degrees. Today, only 34 percent of this group is so equipped, and technology will be replacing one-fifth of the low-skilled workers.

Lagging education and skill levels have a negative impact even with innovations in technology and increased business investments. Whether it is correlation or causation, employment rates, higher earnings and overall well-being are associated with college education. We want this for our children... and their children... all children in Texas.

Much of tomorrow's workforce must include prepared Hispanic (the majority among the state's school-age children) and first-generation college students — and from the untapped potential of 700 Texas rural schools.

Trends show that over the past two decades, rural Texans have fallen behind

in income, assets and health care. Rural students are less likely to have postsecondary degrees or industryrecognized certificates. However, that can be improved with better access

to broadband Internet, online certifications and distributed college degree programs.

It won't be easy! Many first-generation college students have restricted mobility, low expectations and weak academic preparation—compounded by grinding generational poverty. Early practices like providing structured support systems, fostering higher aspirations, offering early college high school and rewarding "grit" can help overcome these disadvantages.

As a small rural school, Roscoe Collegiate ISD began in 2006 to address these emerging issues by increasing access and preparation from pre-K through postsecondary education and by encouraging persistence and degree completion by rural students. The curriculum highlights a collaborative, sustainable and replicable model through postsecondary preparation, access, persistence and degree completion.

It is working. Over the past decade, the model has integrated STEM project-based learning, dual credit college courses, and student-centered research, culminating with 90 percent of the graduating seniors earning postsecondary degrees and industryrecognized certificates. And they are doing it from their home community while incurring little to no debt.

If schools, colleges and policymakers fail to consider the risks and opportunities ahead, they will fail to engage a large pool of potential students who will—skilled or unskilled-become Texas' workforce. Such a failure would prolong inequality, reduce lifetime earnings and short-circuit the economy.

Panel hears about what's being done to 'harden' school campuses

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling | Texas Press Association

AUSTIN — The Texas House Committee on Appropriations met Oct. 9 to hear ideas on improving school safety in the aftermath of the May 18 Santa Fe High School shooting that left eight students and two teachers dead and 13 injured.

"It's an unbelievable reality that shootings in schools are occurring more frequently," said state Rep. John Zerwas, chairman of the powerful, state budget-writing committee. "As a Legislature we must do what we can to ensure our schools are places of learning

and not places of fear." During the four-hour hearing, the committee heard invited testimony from representatives of the Texas School Safety Center at Texas State University, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, the Texas Education Agency, the Office of the Governor, the Legislative Budget Board and others.

Santa Fe Independent

School District Superintendent Leigh Wall testified that federal and state grant funds are being spent in his district on items such as:

- Architectural redesigns to accommodate metal detector units;
- Panic buttons and automatic locks;
 - Mental health services;
 - Staff training; and
- Adding security personnel.

SAFETY GRANTS ARE AWARDED

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath on Oct. 8 announced the Texas Education Agency has received two federal grants under the Students, Teachers and Officers Preventing (STOP) School Violence Act

Both grants, worth \$1 million each, will be used to support mental health training for Texas school districts,

as well as establish effective campus threat assessment practices across the state.

"Texas remains committed to providing a safe learning environment for every student on every public school campus across our state," Morath said. "By focusing on these two key areas of mental health and preventative measures, we strengthen our state's ongoing commitment to school safety."

ANTI- DRUG FUNDS TO COME

Drug deaths in Texas have been increasing and nearly half of them are attributed to opioid overdose, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

On Oct. 9, the DSHS announced the receipt of a \$2.66 million grant to help fund the expansion of the state's public health response to opioids over the next year. The grant comes from the

Atlanta, Georgia-based U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The funding will help local health departments and health care providers prevent overdose deaths, enhance the available data on opioid use in Texas and expand the PLEASE SEE STATE, PAGE 12

Murr honored as Friend of First Amendment, discusses upcoming legislative session

While updating local citizens on the upcoming legislative session, State Rep. Andrew Murr, R-Junction, was praised for his efforts in the last session.

Murr received the Friend of the First Amendment award from the Texas Press Association during his Ozona stop on Oct. 11 at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. During the 2017 Texas Legislative Session, Murr helped stop bills that would have kept public notices out of newspapers.

"We thank Rep. Murr for all his hard work in helping to block these bills and his support," said Ozona Stockman Editor and Publisher Melissa Perner.

Murr said he was honored to receive the award and thanked Perner and Texas Press Association's Donnis Baggett for all their work.

Addressing a full room of family, friends and local officials, Murr took time to look ahead to topics that are expected to be discussed in the 2019 Texas Legislative Ses-

During the end of the 2017 special session, Murr filed a bill to eliminate the Robin Hood school finance plan, where Chapter 41, or "property rich" districts like Ozona, have to send half of their maintenance and operations budget to the state.

When the program started in 1994, there were 35 Chapter 41 districts. In 2019, there will be 217 Chapter 41 districts paying \$2.7 billion to the state.

Also in 1994, 45 percent school financing came from local property taxes and 45 percent came from the state. In 2016, those numbers changed with the majority of the funding now falling on local property taxpayers (58 percent) and a reduction in state funding (38 percent).

"That's why this is not working," Murr said. "The system doesn't seem to function well and we all struggle to pay for things the school district needs.'

Murr's bill would eliminate the Robin Hood plan and paying for schools through property taxes. Instead, the \$23 billion collected from property taxes would be replaced with an increase in state sales and use tax.

Murr said he plans on filing this bill again, if re-elected, in 2019.

"It's a starting point. It's to engage policymakers in Austin and make them think," Murr said.

County Commissioner Frank Tambunga how the Texas Lottery works when it comes to funding education.

Murr said 97 percent of lottery proceeds go toward public education, which is around \$4-\$5 billion annually. The overall statewide cost for public schools is \$46-\$48 billion.

"We don't buy enough lot-

tery tickets to offset the cost," Murr said.

Along with school finance, Murr said the biggest topic of the 2019 session will be paying for Hurricane Harvey. The 2017 natural disaster cost an estimated \$125 billion in damages to home, businesses and infrastructure.

The Legislature Budget Board estimates \$1.8 billion was spent as additional funds in 2017, Murr said in his presentation. Around \$1.4 billion in federal funding flowed through the state budget in response to this disaster.

However, this amount does not include dollars for public education, which was also affected with an estimated \$1.4 billion lost in property values for schools.

Murr said policy issues that could come up include discussion on floodplain management authority, which could affect rural counties like Crockett, Sutton and Kimble, a possible state "flood plan," flood containment, emergency response operations and damaged schools.

In his presentation, Murr said expect lawmakers to want to use "rainy day" funds for Harvey legislation.

"That's why it's important to maintain relationships to make sure these people don't forget about our part of the state," Murr said.



Protein has been getting a bum rap

Protein is made out to be the "holy grail" of nutrients by many athletes while many experts and practitioners caution clients about the negligible effects of consuming "too much". True, protein is essential to sustain life and a 6-ounce portion of red meat will give most adults what they need for normal daily activities (from 50 to 60 grams), but what is "too much" and

what are the risks? A macronutrient present in food consisting of amino acids, protein provides building blocks for every cell of the human body. They are the Tinker Toys or Legos, used to build all the varying cell-types.

Protein takes longer to digest than carbohydrates, which means that calories from protein tend to keep you full longer than calories from carbohydrates. This can be very helpful in controlling calorie intake and managing weight. It doesn't cause sharp spikes in blood sugar and reduces the risk of diabetes and can modestly boost the metabolism, or the rate at which

the body burns calories. The body makes most of its own amino acids but some, called essential amino acids, must come from the food we eat. While our bodies can recycle up to 300 grams of protein per day and store it as glucagon (a carbohydrate), protein itself cannot be stored, as in the case of the glucose and triglycerides from consumed carbohydrates and dietary fat.

"When the stakes are that high, it's not surprising that the body prioritizes its use of amino acids. Survival first; sixpack abs second. But when the body has all the amino acids it needs, protein can also be used as an alternative source of energy or calories." - says the Nutrition Diva, Monica Reinagel, MS, LD/N, CNS.

Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia further explains, "Amino acids are necessary nutrients. Present in every cell, they are also precursors to nucleic acids, co-enzymes, hormones, immune response,

all cells of the body and is the major structural component of all cells in the body, especially

muscle." A person can live and thrive without ever eating a single carbohydrate during their lifetime. In a process called "gluconeogenesis", excess protein is converted by the liver into glucagon and used elsewhere as energy.

The hypothesis that excessive protein is bad for the kidneys persists despite the lack of evidence to support it. Stuart Phillips, PhD, one of my most trusted protein researchers wrote, "...the idea that protein is harmful for the kidneys is usually derived from circular logic of people's experiences in renal wards where there's little doubt that lower protein diets can help extend a person's health and life due to the lower urea and therefore less 'work' filtering such substances by the kidney. The incorrect circular logic that is then applied is that 'therefore' [sic] high protein diets cause renal disease. That's poor logic, flawed reasoning, and just plain wrong."

Glycated blood is sticky, thick, and sludgy; and glycated blood vessels under the influence of insulin are hard, stiff, and resistant to smooth flow. Instead of normal flowing easily through rubbery, pliant, flexible, veins and arteries, glycated blood is trying to force itself through a narrow, hard tube. This creates higher pressure and more breakage (aneurisms). It's not protein that damages the microscopic blood ves-

sels in the kidneys, it's the constant, unrelenting exposure to high levels of glucose and insulin.

Kidneys are damaged by chronic hyperglycemia, hyperinsulinemia, congenital defects, viruses, chronic urinary tract infections (UTIs), kidney stones, and various cancers. And according to Amy Berger, MS, CNS, NTP, "Not every case of kidney disease originates from diet and lifestyle. As much as we like to believe we can control every single aspect of our health and longevity via diet, sometimes stuff just happens."

Meat, dairy, eggs, and fish are the best sources of complete protein. Plant based sources of proteins such as grains, legumes, nuts, seeds and fruits must be combined because their proteins are incomplete, as far as the human organism is concerned. Also, certain phytochemicals in these plants tend to cause various autoimmune diseases and like animal products, will trigger

food sensitivities. However, protein is an essential nutritional building block each of us must include in our individual diets for good health and wellbeing, and to rebuild the musculature stressed by strength training and an athletic lifestyle. Because we all are bioindividuals, there is no onesize-fits-all diet or quick fix that is going to cure everyone. Each of us owes it to ourselves to take responsibility and be proactive about our own wellbeing, mindful of what we ingest and absorb, and facilitate the efforts of our team of doctors and specialists.

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

AUSTIN - Newly elected State Senator Peter "Pete" Flores, R-Pleasanton, took the oath of office Friday, becoming the newest member of the Texas Senate. Flores won a special elec-

tion for Senate District 19 in September, and will now represent the largest district in the state, stretching from western Bexar County all the way to Reeves County in West Texas, covering 35,000 miles and includes 400 miles of the international border with Mexico, including Crockett County.

Flores won his seat by crisscrossing the district, putting more than 7,000 miles on his truck in five weeks of campaigning, said Lt. Governor Dan Patrick.

"To win a campaign, you have to have a good candidate and you have to have someone who is willing to work hard," said Patrick. "He was the best candidate, and he worked hard...knocking on doors, introducing himself, meeting voters, many who had never had anyone knock on their door to introduce themselves and ask for their vote."

Patrick pointed to the in-

enthusiasm for the run-off election as proof of his hard

work. While

run-offs normally see a decrease in turnout, turnout for the SD 19 run-off almost doubled the first round of voting, rising from 26,000 voters to 44,000 in September.

Texas Senate welcomes Peter Flores

as newest member

"That is an historic, all time high of a percentage of people turning out for a runoff election [in Texas], and that's attributable to you, Pete," Patrick said.

Flores is a former Texas game warden who rose to the rank of colonel and head of the Law Enforcement Division of the Parks and Wildlife Department, the first Hispanic Texan to hold that

Carter Smith, the current executive director of TPWD, offered effusive praise for Flores at Friday's ceremony.

"I first met Pete about a dozen years ago and his reputation as a lawman aptly preceded him," said Smith.

"Plenty affable, plenty likable, he'd give you the shirt off his back if he thought you needed it. He was also no-nonsense, a straight shooter, somebody who was absolutely not confused about what was right and what was wrong."

Flores was gracious in victory, thanking his family and constituents for their support.

In his inaugural speech, Flores identified property tax reform, economic development and support for law enforcement as his top priorities for the upcoming ses-

"We're all here for a better Texas, all of us, and with that in mind we'll get there," he told his colleagues. "With me, you're going to have an open mind and you're going to have some one who will listen and who is with you towards the same goal: to be a better Texas."

A graduate of Texas A&M University, Flores grew up in Laredo and settled in Pleasanton in 2012 following his retirement after 27 years as a game warden. He and his wife Elizabeth have two daughters and two grandchildren.

payers of Crockett County, Chavarria said.

The district has \$1.85 million in principle and \$446,511 in interest left on the QSCB loan, which will take the district until 2026 to pay off.

The wording on the ballot will read:

ISSUANCE OF "THE \$1,895,000 OF BONDS FOR THE REFUNDING OF ALL OR ANY PORTION OF THE DIS-TRICT'S MAINTENANCE TAX NOTES, TAXABLE SERIES 2011 AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

A vote for the bond would allow the district to move the money. A vote against the bond would keep the money where it is in the M&O budget.

The reason for doing this is so the district can have a balanced budget. Right now, the district is \$80,000. Two years ago, the state cut around \$2-\$3 million funding.

Chavarria told the audience that the school district has made cuts to its budget this year. He said \$570,000 was cut from this year's budget, including athletic budgets, but that the district is still \$80,000 short.

If the bond passes, the district will be "in the black."

Chavarria said the district has met with financial advisors and this was their recommendation due to the county's evaluations going up because of pipelines and wind farms coming in.

WHAT ARE THREE THINGS YOU WOULD LIKE TO ACCOMPLISH IF ELECTED?

If elected as county commissioner I would first like to implement a system to help keep my constituents informed and up to date on county news and topics being discussed during upcoming commissioners' court meetings. An idea I've come up with to help keep citizens in my precinct informed is a quarterly newsletter type system that would feature future agenda topics and things we would be voting on during upcoming meetings.

Secondly, I would like to find a way to incentivize our county employees to stay longer and work harder. With the proposed raises set to take effect next year I believe that in itself has helped raise moral among county employees. While that is definitely a step in the right direction I still believe more can be done for employees seeking long-term incentives. Some ideas that have been brought to my attention include a restructured retirement and health care program, making adjustments to county policy on employees having to use PTO to get paid holidays off, and implementing "performance based raises.'

The third thing I'd like to accomplish would be to gather community input and come up with a way to make Pecan Street, and surrounding streets, as safe as possible after the new one-way exit ramp is constructed and in service

off of I-10. By the time you're reading this that project will already be underway and once it is in service it will be an important task to install whatever measures are necessary to maintain the safety of the children and pedestrians affected by the inevitable increase in traffic.

WHAT DOES PRECINCT 4 NEED MOST FROM

A COUNTY COMMISSIONER? It is no secret that Precinct 4 usually always has the lowest percentage of our citizens vote every election year. However, that doesn't mean that we don't have any opinions on county issues or items being voted on.

A good county commissioner should work tirelessly to always seek the opinions of their constituents. During my campaigning process I've spoken to many families who say they've never even met our county commissioner, much less been asked for their input or feelings toward county matters.





Unlike the first half, the Lions defense improved in the second half keeping the Bulldogs to only two touchdowns. Ozona also scored more points in the second half than Stamford.

Joe Salas had three tackles, a sack and two quarterback pressures.

Abraham Rodriguez and Marcus Perez each had seven tackles. Jacob Childress had five tackles and Aiden Fuentes had four tackles, including one for a loss.

"Stamford showed why they are a top 10 ranked team. They are very explosive and threw the ball well. We came out and played hard in the second half and made some good adjustments. The boys played hard. We had a rough time matching them in scoring and didn't get stops when we had to in order to come away with the win," said Head Coach Kyle Freeman. "We are hoping to be ready and healthier when we

face off against Forsan this week."

Stamford's Kalib Flick suffered a game-ending injury, in the first half, as he was taken off the field on a stretcher by Crockett County EMS personnel and transported by ambulance to San Angelo with what appeared to be a broken arm or broken collarbone. The Stockman has learned he will have surgery later this month.

Ozona will face Forsan next week for their second district matchup. The Buffaloes (2-5) were open Friday night. In their last matchup the Buffaloes defeated Wink 25-24.



Section 1. The statements contained in the preamble of this Order are true and correct and adopted as findings of fact.

Section 2. An election shall be held in the County on Tuesday, November 6, 2018 (the "Election Day"), a uniform election date, which date is 78 or more days from the date of this Order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted in accordance with law:

CROCKETT COUNTY - PROPOSITION A

- Pursuant to Section 3.009, Texas Election Code: (i) the proposition language that will (a) appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 3 of this Election Order, (ii) the purposes for which the bonds are to be authorized are set forth in Section 2 of this Election Order, (iii) the principal amount of bonds to be authorized is set forth in Section 2 of this Election Order, (iv) if the issuance of bonds is authorized by voters, taxes sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the annual principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements may be imposed, as set forth in Section 2 of this Election Order, (v) bonds authorized pursuant to this Election Order may be issued to mature over the number of years (not to exceed 40 years from their date of issuance) and bearing interest at the rate or rates as authorized by law and determined by the County Commissioners Court, such interest rate or rates being not more than 6.00%, (vi) as of the beginning of the District's current fiscal year, the aggregate amount of outstanding principal of the District's debt obligations was \$8,904,000.00 and the aggregate amount of outstanding interest on the District's debt obligations was \$1,019,493.13, and (vii) the District's ad valorem debt service tax rate as of the date of adoption of this Election Order is \$1.1140 per \$100 of taxable property.
- (b) The statements contained in subsection (a) are provided in accordance with and solely for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements of Section 3.009, Texas Election Code. Such statements (i) are based on information available to the District and the County on the date of adoption of this Election Order, including projections obtained from the District's financial advisor, (ii) necessarily consist of estimates and projections that are subject to change based on facts, circumstances and conditions at the time that bonds approved pursuant to this Election Order are issued and (iii) are not intended to limit the authority of the County to issue bonds in accordance with other terms contained in this Election Order. Accordingly, actual tax rates, interest rates, maturity dates, aggregate outstanding indebtedness and interest on such debt, will only be established and known at the time that bonds are issued. To the extent of any conflict between Section 4 and other terms of this Election Order, such other terms control.

Section 5. Except as otherwise provided herein, the precinct judges and alternate judges for the voting precincts shall be the same precinct judges and alternative judges as determined and utilized by the County on the Election Day. Except as provided herein, the voting precincts for the Election, the boundaries thereof and the polling places therefore are hereby established on Exhibit "A". On Election Day the polling places shall be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

The Election shall be conducted by election officers, including the presiding judges and alternate presiding judges appointed by the Court at a subsequent meeting, in accordance with the Education Code, the Election Code and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and

the United States of America. The presiding judges shall appoint not less than two (2) or more than five (5) qualified election clerks for the conduct of the Election; provided that if the presiding judge actually serves as expected, the alternate presiding judge shall be one of such clerks. The appointment of such clerks shall include a person fluent in the Spanish language to render oral aid in Spanish to any voter desiring such aid at the polls on Election Day.

The main early voting location is designated in Exhibit "B". The individual named as the Early Voting Clerk as designated in Exhibit "B" hereto is hereby appointed as the Early Voting Clerk to conduct such early voting in the election. The Early Voting Clerk shall appoint the Deputy Early Voting Clerks. This office or place shall remain open to permit early voting each day as stated in Exhibit "B". Early voting shall commence as provided on Exhibit "B" and continue through the date set forth on Exhibit "B" all as provided by the provisions of the Texas Election Code.

Section 6. Voting machines will be used in holding and conducting the election on election day; provided, however, that if the use of voting machines is not practicable, then in that event, electronic voting devices may be used in conducting the election on election day; provided, however, in the event the use of such electronic voting devices is not practicable; the election may be conducted on election day by the use of paper ballots (except as otherwise provided in this section). Voting machines or paper ballots may be used for early voting by personal appearance (except as otherwise provided in this section). Pursuant to Section 61.012, as amended, Texas Election Code, the Court shall provide at least one accessible voting system in each polling place used in the election. Such voting system shall comply with Texas and federal laws establishing the requirement for voting systems that permit voters with physical disabilities to cast a secret ballot. Paper ballots may be used for early voting by mail.

Section 7. All resident, qualified voters of the District shall be permitted to vote at the election, and, on the day of the election, such voters shall vote at the designated polling places. The election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, except as modified by the provisions of the Texas Education Code, as amended, and as may be required by law. To the extent required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

Section 8. A substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper notice of the election. This notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published at least one time in a newspaper published within the District's territory or, if none is published in the District's territory, in a newspaper of general circulation in the District, and the publication of this notice of election shall occur in such newspaper not more than 30 days and not less than 10 days before the Election Day. Additionally, this notice shall be posted on the bulletin board used for posting notices of County and District meetings not later than 21 days prior to Election Day.

Section 9. This Order, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted: (1) on Election Day and during early voting by personal appearance, in a prominent location at each polling place; (2) not later than the 21st day before Election Day, in three public places in the boundaries of the District; and (3) prominently on the District's and County's Internet sites along with the Notice of Election during the 21 days before Election Day.

Section 10. It is officially determined and declared that the meeting at which this Order is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Order, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, as amended, Texas Government Code.

Public Notice on outbreaks of Avian Paramyxovirus in Texas

EL PASO - Recently, a number of Eurasian collared doves near El Paso have tested positive for avian paramyxovirus, specifically Pigeon Paramyxovirus-1, or PPMV-1. Dead doves have also been reported in Alpine.

Past outbreaks have been observed in the vicinity of many of the larger urban centers of the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions such as Midland, Lubbock, and Alpine, but outbreaks may occur elsewhere within these regions. The majority of PPMV-1 outbreaks in wild birds in the United States have involved Eurasian collared doves and rock doves (pigeons).

Symptoms include doves becoming lethargic and reluctant to move, producing green diarrhea, or having difficulty in standing or holding their head upright. The virus can cause conjunctivitis (pink eye) in humans, therefore, if you encounter multiple dead or dying doves, do not handle the birds without hand and eye protection.

Some strains of PPMV-1 have been shown to cause disease and death in domestic poultry. Chickens can contract the disease from indirect contact such as dove feces in chicken feeding ar-Therefore, backyard chicken owners may want to take precautions to minimize potential contact between chickens and doves.

If an outbreak occurs in your area, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recommends discontinuing bird feeding and watering activities to decrease possible transmission between doves and other birds.

If multiple sick or dying doves are located in your area, please contact a local TPWD biologist or Don Kahl (don.kahl@tpwd.texas.gov; 806-475-1308).

Additionally, please advise the use of protective gloves, masks, and glasses if handling sick or dying birds in these areas.

The funds will improve the state health department's ability to track opioid-related illnesses and other conditions being seen in emergency rooms around Texas. It will also provide researchers and the public with more information on opioid use and its consequences via the DSHS Texas Health Data website, allowing access to more data more quickly down to county and ZIP code levels.

"Having more information on where opioids are being used and their effects on communities will let state agencies and our partners in cities and counties focus their efforts where the needs are most pressing," said DSHS Commissioner Dr. John Hellerstedt. "Using data to better understand and respond to the opioid crisis will ensure that resources provide the most benefit for the people of Texas."

Additional funds will be used to train public health personnel at the community level on when and how to properly administer naloxone, a drug that may be administered to prevent someone who has overdosed on an opioid from dying.

FRAUD UNIT MAKES AKKESIS

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Oct. 12 announced that four individuals have been indicted on 30 felony counts of voter fraud and arrested following an investigation by his office's Election Fraud Unit.


The defendants, Paxton alleged, were paid to target elderly voters in certain northside Fort Worth precincts in a scheme to generate a large number of mail ballots and then harvest those ballots for specific candidates in 2016.

"Ballots by mail are intended to make it easier for Texas seniors to vote. The unfortunate downside is their extreme vulnerability to fraud," Paxton said. "My office is committed to ensuring that paid vote harvesters who fraudulently generate mail ballots, stealing votes from seniors. are held accountable for their despicable actions and for the damage they inflict on the electoral process."

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Oct. 10 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts some \$736 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of


