

On February 10, 2004, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed its Second Amended Application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and incurred costs associated with Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented from February 1, 1996 through December 31, 2002 between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and, in many instances, the exchanges of other local telephone companies. The Second Amended Application was filed pursuant to the Commission's Substantive Rule § 26.221 titled "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service Surcharges."

ELCS expands the local calling scope of a telephone exchange to include one or more additional telephone exchanges if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. Costs and lost revenues associated with Valor's surcharge application are those not recovered through existing ELCS fee

In the Second Amended Application, VALOR proposes to implement monthly ELCS surcharges for five years beginning on the date the Commission issues a final order on VALOR's request. The Commission can establish an ELCS surcharge for any duration. ELCS surcharges apply in addition to monthly ELCS fees. VALOR proposes the following monthly ELCS surcharges per residential line: \$.86 in Year 1, \$.85 in Year 2, \$.03 in Year 3, \$.02 in Year 4, \$.01 in Year 5. VALOR proposes the following monthly ELCS surcharges per business line: \$1.72 in Year 1, \$1.70 in Year 2, \$.06 in Year 3, \$.04 in Year 4, \$.02 in Year 5.

VALOR is currently billing interim ELCS surcharges approved by the Commission, including an interim ELCS surcharge of \$.65 per month per residential line and an interim ELCS surcharge of \$1.30 per month per business line. If rates below the level of the interim surcharges are ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR may be required by the Commission to refund all or part of the interim surcharges. If VALOR's Second Amended Application is approved, the net annual effect on VALOR's Year 1 revenues will be zero since the

requested surcharges are designed to replace lost revenues and to reimburse VALOR for increases in costs associated with the provision of ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$3,867,372 in Year 1, 3,791,870 in Year 2, \$133,831 in Year 3, \$89,220 in Year 4, and \$44,610 in Year 5.

Board member and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said, "Our whole society is based on the ability to read. If you can't do that, then you can't compete in the marketplace." Earle added, "We run the risk of developing a permanent underclass, and a permanent underclass is not consistent with

The Dyslexia Research Foundation contains a host of prominent experts in education and criminal justice, including former U.S. Secretary of Labor Ray Marshall, former Supreme Court of Texas Justice Jack Hightower, University of Texas Dean of the College of Communications and newly named Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost, University of California, Riverside Dr. Ellen Wartella.

Leading nationwide expert on dyslexia and Yale pediatrics professor Dr. Sally Shaywitz has also offered her support. "The proposed study will give us a more tangible measurement and concrete numbers on what is the cost to change society," Shaywitz said.

Results from the nonpartisan study are expected to encourage a major overhaul in Texas prisons and public schools and may eventually serve as a template for making changes in children's lives nationwide. The study will get under way by summer; its first phase is expected to be completed within a year.

Using Our Resources in the Elderly

Andy Rooney said that the best classrooms are at the feet of an elderly person. I think this is very true. We spend money on schools and seminars taught by persons who do not have nearly the experience of some of our senior citizens. We probably all know someone who has been where we are hoping to go. These people do not charge for sharing their knowledge and welcome the chance to make a contribu-

For instance I have an elderly friend who was a hairdresser during the days of "finger-waving." This is almost a lost art but valuable for those of us who have naturally wavy hair.

So many of us know people in the community who have been excellent farmers and who have had experience handling days of drought.

I have an uncle who retired from attache positions in several countries including Iran. He could offer valuable information into the mindset of people in that part of the world. These are just a few examples of the resources we have in elderly people.

Pearl and B.J. Anderson are the oldest married couple in Clyde. B.J. is 95 And Pearl is 91. Pearl is a young-thinking person. She says we live thinking back and we must not criticize the young people for not understanding our days. They are living in their own days of change. She would urge young people to study the book of Proverbs in the Bible. It is an instruction

manual for life. Pearl remembers with delight the old silent movies. She tells about how during the depression people were hungry for diversion, and big trucks would bring in tents to a community and show movies. The sides of the trucks were the marquees. B.J., Pearl's husband, has also seen many times of change. Some things that have come into being in his span of life are automobiles, tractors, and farm equipment. He has seen oxen doing the plowing. He has seen houses without electricity, and our many electrical appliances are a contrast to the implements found in a kitchen fifty years ago. He saw the advent of TV and wide spread use of telephones. The many developments over a span of 95 years is amazing. He was a pecan farmer for years. He could give us much advice with our pecans in Clyde.



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

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County Attorney Allen Wright recognized by Attorney General

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott today announced a \$32,000 lump sum child support payment from one of the Attorney General's Most Wanted Child Support Evaders, in a case that originated in Brown County. William Osborn wrote the check which pays in full the child support debt he owed for his two children, after having been arrested in January in San Diego County, California.

"I am grateful to the San Diego Sheriff's Department and Callahan County District Attorney Allen Wright for their cooperation in tracking down Evader Osborn and making him pay his child support," said Attorney General Abbott. "Parents have a duty to support their children, and if they run from their obligation we will pursue them until ment ring in his pant pocket that child support debt is paid in

Osborn, who was named to the list of Top Ten Most Wanted Child Support Evaders in October 2002, was arrested in January after investigators with the Office of the Attorney General provided a tip on his whereabouts to the San Diego Sheriff's Department.

The warrant for Osborn's arrest on charges of criminal non-

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
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Osborn subsequently decided to pay the child support he owed in a lump sum, and last week the mother of his two children ages 13 and 11 - received a check for \$32,689.58.

County Attorney Wright said his office was contacted by the Attorney General's Office to worth on four cases, including Osborn's case. He said his office still has two remaining cases pendina.

Wright said on a tip, Osborn was arrested at a luxurious hotel in front of a packed ballroom where he was about to propose marriage to his fiance. Wright said Osborn had the engagewhile being searched.

"We're glad to help out," Wright said of the arrest os Osborn.

In January 1997, a court ordered Osborn to pay \$406 a month to cover current support and \$8,969 in unpaid child support. He continued to fall further behind, and because of missed payments and the interest that accrues on unpaid child support his debt swelled to more than \$32,000. Charges relating to nonpayment of his child support now are expected to be dismissed, due to the fact that Osborn has fulfilled his child support obligation.

"I am gratified that these children now have a brighter future because Mr. Osborn finally paid the child support he owed," Attorney General Abbott added. "I hope other evaders will heed his example and begin supporting their kids.'

Since Attorney General Abbott took office in December 2002, 32 Child Support Evaders have been brought to justice.
