

City Council Minutes Ordinance #2004-0003

April 6, 2004

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. All members of the council were present except for Dean Dillard, who was out due to illness. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

Mayor Purvis gave the monthly police report. He reported 64 calls for service, 4 criminal mischiefs, 5 thefts, 2 warrants served, 4 assaults, 1 prowler, 1 gas drive off, 2 deadly conducts, 2 terroristic threats, 1 burglary of a vehicle, 2 accidents 1 drug arrest, with 27 warnings, 44 citations. By general consent the council approved the report as presented.

Bob Hill, Municipal Judge, presented the monthly Judge's report. He reported 44 citations for March with 17 remaining outstanding. There are 3 citations outstanding for February and 4 remaining outstanding January. Collections for March were \$4,997.50. By general consent the council approved the report as presented.

Rodney, with WestTex Con-Broadband/Wireless Internet Service, met with the council to discuss the City of Cross Plains entering into an agreement with them allowing them to install equipment on the City's water tower to provide high speed internet service to the citizens of Cross Plains. He asked that the agreement be an exclusive agreement between the city and WesTex Connect, and that no other internet service providers be allowed to place equipment on the tower using the same frequencies. By general consent the council agreed to have Debbie Gosnell look into the matter to see if the city can legally give them an exclusive contract for that purpose and to place the item on the special meeting set for April 12, 2004 at 6:00 p.m.

Brad Kuykendall, representative for BFI, met with the council to discuss a 4 percent increase in their garbage charge. Mr. Kuykendall discussed the fact moved to enter into the interlocal that BFI has not had an increase agreement. since 1995 and explained that the rising cost in fuel, financial assurance insurance, health care benefits, and the loss of state fuel tax credit has made it necessary to ask for the increase., and that the increase would take effect May 1, 2004. Edwin Weiss moved to table the discussion of the bids until council had time to look over all the specifications of each bid and to place the item on the agenda for April 12, 2004 at 6:00 p.m. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion

Judy Porter, representative for the Food Pantry, met with the council to inform them that the pantry did receive their grant and that they needed the City's approval of the floor plan since the building would be sitting on City property. By general consent the council agreed to look over the plans at the called meeting on April 12, 2004 at 6:00 p.m.

Keith Lawrence met with the council to ask them to reconsider opening the south end of Avenue B and to rescind the motion to open the street. By general consent the council agreed that they would not rescind the motion and told Keith that they had already addressed the matter in two previous meetings, and that they were going to open the street at the city's convenience.

John Ivie met with the council to discuss selling the city a 20' rightof-way on the west end of his property. After lengthy discussion, Jerry Cassle moved to purchase the 20' for \$1,000.00 and to build a 4' chain link fence on the east side of the right-of-way to separate the city's property from Mr. Ivie's. Gene Dillard seconded and motion carried.

Discussion was held concerning an interlocal agreement between the City of Cross Plains and Callahan County for the purchase of a 10,000 gallon emulsion tank for the purpose of storing emulsion during the paving season for both the city and the county due to Koch Material shutting down their Brownwood Plant.
